"If you look at the matter *selfishly*, it is very much your *interest* to give these Lads a lift, because they are exactly at an age when habits of industry and honesty on the one hand, and of idleness and vice on the other, are permanently formed. *It is now or never for them.* The next two or three years will probably decide whether they are as workers to increase the public wealth, or whether they are to lessen it by living upon it for the rest of their days as paupers, vagrants, or possibly worse."—LORD DERBY at Annual Meeting January, 1873.

The Tenth Annual Meeting of the MANCHESTER AND SALFORD BOYS' AND GIRLS' REFUGES AND HOMES was held at the Central Refuge, Strangeways, on Monday, January 14th, 1880.

The MAYOR OF MANCHESTER took the Chair at 6 p.m. o'clock.

The Meeting having been opened with prayer, the Annual Report was read by the Hon. Secretary, Mr. LEONARD SHAW, and the Financial Statement of the Treasurer by Mr. R. B. Taylor.

Moved by H. J. LEPPOC, Esq., seconded by GEORGE MILNER, Esq., and supported by Rev. WILLIAM YOUNG.

"That the Report and Financial Statement now read be adopted, printed, and circulated under the direction of the Committee, and that the Committee for the ensuing year be Messrs. R. B. Taylor, Louis M. Hayes, T. H. Rymer, William Oldham, and Leonard K. Shaw; and that the Treasurer be Mr. J. C. Stuart."

Moved by ADAM MURRAY, Esq., seconded by CHAS. SEVER, Esq., and supported by RICHARD JONES, Esq., and HAROLD LEE, Esq.

"That this Meeting rejoices at the successful operations of this Institution, and considers that the record of its work during the past ten years constitutes a strong claim on the support of all sections of the community."

These Resolutions were adopted unanimously; and a vote of thanks to the Mayor for presiding concluded the proceedings.

ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1879.

“THOU shalt remember all the way by which the Lord thy God hath led thee,” were the words addressed to God’s people of old at the close of an important epoch in their history.

These words, with the many thoughts which arise out of them, are present to the minds of the Committee of the BOYS’ AND GIRLS’ REFUGES AND HOMES, as they meet their friends on this their tenth anniversary.

Ten years ago there was no place where the Homeless and Destitute Children of our great city could claim a shelter and a home. Orphans or worse, they were to a large extent left to grow up the vagrants and drunkards, who fill our workhouse and gaol. To-day, in connection with this Institution, there are ten separate Homes where children of all ages—from the little orphan of a few years old, to the roving street boy on the verge of vagrancy and crime—can be received, trained, and cared for.

Ten years ago one small house was taken to shelter *thirty* boys, to-day over 230 are provided for in the various Homes and the Training Ship connected with the Refuge, while over a thousand children of all ages, and in all phases of destitution, have been admitted during the ten years! Whether then we contemplate the large number of homeless ones who are now being supported and trained in our various Homes, or the larger number who have passed away from them, and are now scattered in various parts of

the world as honest working men, or bright brave sailor lads, we cannot but remember the way by which we have been led.

There have been difficulties and trials not a few in the past; the retrospect is not all brightness; but we know that "He who *hath* led *will* lead," and in that confidence we would go forward once more without fear in the path which He has marked out for us.

Nor are there wanting encouragements thus to go forward. We have ample encouragement in the great fact that we have at the present time so large a number, viz., 230—once destitute—boys and girls, growing up in our various Homes happy, contented, and industrious, and with every prospect of becoming respectable and useful members of society.

We have stronger encouragement still in being able to point to a large number who have passed away from our care, and who, in this city and elsewhere, in homes of their own, and supporting themselves by their honest labour, are living monuments of the blessing The Refuge has been to them. While the figures showing the steady

Decrease of Juvenile Depravity

during the past ten years are full of significance and encouragement.

This Institution was founded in 1870, at that time over 1,000 boys of from 10 to 16 years of age were annually apprehended by the police, and brought before the magistrates; and now we beg our friends to notice the following statistics:—

The actual figures for the ten years are as follows:—

The smallest number on record!

Remembering that we, dealing with the very class that produce criminals, receive boys from 10 to 16 years of age, and that from 12 to 16 is the age at which boy criminals are made, we feel these figures are full of encouragement. When we remember

The Cost of One Criminal!

and who can estimate that cost? not the money cost alone! though that is large! but the blighted hopes! the broken hearts! the desolate homes! the grey hairs brought down with sorrow to the grave! and above all the far-reaching consequences of his vice and crime in its effects on others!

And when we think of the misery and burden to himself and to society of one *pauper!* and then remember that for some £12. per annum we can support and train up in ways of truth and soberness children who otherwise must become such! shall not these considerations form a powerful appeal to us who carry on this work, and to all who support it, not to relax, but rather increase our efforts.

We commenced January 1st, 1879, with a total of 190 children in the Refuge and its branches.

During the year, out of the large number that sought our aid, 94 of the most destitute were admitted. Their physical condition and general surroundings were in most cases very wretched.

The following are the outlines of a few cases, which will fairly represent the others:—

We recall the case of

Two brothers—honest boys, in work—whom we found sleeping in an empty room! Father dead; mother dying in workhouse of consumption,—since dead. Were taken in, and are still in the same situation. Had it not been for the Refuge, they must have gone to the workhouse in a few days, as their wages were barely sufficient to keep them in food, to say nothing of clothes and lodgings.

Then there was a fine lad who had a father,

but much better for him if he had none, for this man was in prison for three months for illusing him! As the time was about to expire, and fearing a renewal of his cruelty, the boy applied here, and being in a really lost and wretched condition, was taken in. On making inquiries, we found that the man, indirectly, was the cause of his wife's death. The lad is still with us, and doing well.

One night, when out somewhat late, we found a superior boy,—

the son of a man once holding a good position in Manchester,—living in a literally empty room with his mother! Alas, she was addicted to drink, and the boy was employed until late at night on the streets to satisfy her thirst. He is now in the Refuge, and doing well.

We shall not soon forget the case of John—

He came one night the early part of last year, very ragged. He had been "sleeping out." Both parents were dead, and things had gone hard with John. He had been *three times before the magistrates!* and yet he had a good, honest face. Yes, he was no criminal, though he had just served fourteen days; but he had got mixed up with a bad gang, and as we pointed out to him the probable end of the sad life he was beginning, he burst into tears and said—"If you would but get me away from Manchester, I would do well." We placed him on board the Training Ship, where he is making a good name.

There have been few more unpromising cases than

G.—A real *gamin*, living on the streets for years,—gradually getting more pronounced. Admitted and after awhile placed out into a situation, where he bids fair to get on in the world.

About the same time we took in

D.—A precocious little fellow. Had been farmed by a professional mendicant;—in danger of being used for worse purposes. Case brought under our notice by keeper of lodging-house, and admitted. He is still in Refuge, and doing well.

The last case we have time to recall was—

A well-made but low type lad, brought up in a workhouse, and from there placed out in a situation, but soon ran away and wandered about the country with tramps! We soon sent him to the Training Ship, and he is now in the Royal Navy and bearing a good character. We had a nice letter from him a few weeks ago.

Educationally their condition was as follows:—

These 94 children—added to the 190 in our Homes when this year began—gives a total of 284 under our care during the twelve months, and of these we can give the following account:—

Having frequently described the various branches of the work, a very few words respecting each of them will suffice. At the

Central Refuge, Strangeways,

Which is always open to visitors, and which still remains under the care of our excellent and devoted master and matron, Mr. and Mrs. Browne, there are 71 boys. Here the raw human material with which we deal is first received from off the streets, and here the first impressions are made which will to a large extent determine whether the boy will, as a *worker*, increase the public wealth, or whether he will diminish it by becoming a *pauper*, a *vagrant*, or possibly worse!

One great means used here for reclaiming the wild arab boy is *work*,—*bright, active, cheerful work*. From the day he is admitted he begins to learn the great principle of “Self-help,” and that we only “Help those who *try* to help themselves.” Work is ever held up before our boys

as a blessing, and a healthy, manly, independent spirit cultivated where previously a begging pauper feeling existed.

If our friends make their visit in the early morning, they will find an active, orderly school in operation, under the care of our master. Later on in the day the workshops are in full swing, chiefly producing the well-known Firewood and Fire-lighters, with a small Shoemaking and Tailoring department; while towards evening the boys who are in outdoor situations, and the little band of Shoe-blacks, come trooping home. After tea, a Night School on three evenings, and Recreation on the alternate evenings, completes the outline of the daily life at the Central Refuge.

During the past year a great improvement has been carried out here, though at considerable expense. The cellars under the old central building have been altered so as to make a bright and airy day-room for the boys. Easy of access from the yard, it is the best used apartment on the premises, and on wet days and recreation nights it is invaluable.

The second great branch of our operations are—

The Homes for Working Boys.

These four Homes—which are situated in Lower Broughton, at an easy distance from the Refuge and from each other—have pursued their course of quiet usefulness during the year. There are 17 boys in each Home, chiefly apprenticed to the various trades of our city, and under the care of a Christian father and mother, are growing up as one family, to develope, we trust, into good and useful men

During the year some 24 of the elder ones, having become self-supporting, have been provided by the Committee with safe lodgings; and as each one is thus moved out, his place is taken by another from the Refuge.

These two divisions—"The Refuge" and the "Homes for Working Lads"—contain all the boys who are able to work, and their earnings have formed an important item in the income of the Institution.

The total earnings of our boys for the year have been £2,234. 17s. 11d., of which amount they have paid towards their board £1,795. 0s. 3d. The difference between these two amounts, after allowing a small sum for pocket money and lawful recreation, is placed in our savings bank towards their clothing.

The other branches of the work—

The Homes for Little Boys,

The Girls' Home, and

The Training Ship—are, of course, unproductive.

The Homes for Little Orphan Boys,

At Cheetham; are an interesting branch of our operations. Here little ones who have lost both parents, and who are otherwise entirely destitute and under 10 years of age, are received; and in small Family-homes,—each home under the loving care of a Christian mother who the children speak of, and are taught to look up to, as *their* mother,—they are being trained up on God's plan, surrounded by all the wise and loving influences of a happy home, to become, we trust and pray, His children, and in after life as His servants, to bless our city and neighbourhood.

Two of the three Orphan Homes are free of the responsibility of rent, having been purchased by two friends, presented to the Committee, and are now vested in Trustees for the benefit of the orphan children of our city.

The appeal we made in our last,—that the third Home should be likewise purchased, has not so far been responded to; but we live in hope that some heart will yet be moved to supply this need, and relieve us of this anxiety.

The Girls' Branch,

At Heathfield, Broughton-lane, has continued quite full throughout the year, doing good and useful work. There were twenty inmates when the year began. During the twelve months seven were passed out, but their places were at once filled with other needy ones, so that the full number has been kept up. A healthy, happy group of girls they are, and, under the wise and beneficent training of our matron, are being fitted, we trust, to go forth ere long to fill various posts of usefulness in our city. The

Night Employment of Street Children

has continued to engage the attention of this Committee. Being the earliest to call public attention to this great and crying evil a few years back, they rejoice at the sound public opinion which has been formed and expressed on the question. We have joined our leading public bodies in memorializing the Home Secretary, and have corresponded with members of Parliament representing all the large boroughs in the kingdom on this question; and though legislation may be postponed a little, owing to the

change of Government, we believe that the reproach of allowing miserable half-clad children to toil upon the streets until near midnight to the injury alike of body and soul will ere long be wiped away.

The last branch of our operation that we notice is—

The Training Ship.

To transform vagrant street boys into bright, useful sailor lads continues to be a popular and important branch of our work. During the year we have been enabled to send 18 *boys* to the Ship, which, with those formerly sent, makes a total of 80 lads who have been thus provided for.

Ere we hasten to our concluding words we must mention one enterprise, begun during the past year, in the interests of our Institution, from which we hope the best results. We allude to—

Our New Magazine, "THE WORKER,"

PRICE ONE PENNY MONTHLY.

The operations of our Institution have always been conducted very quietly, and without those public announcements which characterize some societies; and though this of itself is very desirable, one result was, that many in our city and neighbourhood were not aware of the existence of our work, while few, indeed, knew its extent or at all realized its importance. Hence, if the work was to be maintained in efficiency it must be made known, and therefore the Committee have long had it before them to issue a magazine. So far the results have justified the experiment.

While chiefly designed to awaken interest in *Homeless Children*, "The Worker" will not be wanting in articles of general interest. It is a marvellously cheap pennyworth, and has already a circulation of some 7,000 monthly, and, we trust, will be a welcome visitor in the home circles of our city. We venture to express the hope that all our friends will become subscribers to "The Worker," 1s. 6d. per annum.

And now, in

Conclusion,

We cannot close this brief record, which is in some sense a record of "Ten Years' Work among the Homeless and Destitute," without recalling the great object of the Institution, as declared in the Trust Deed, which is—TO RECLAIM, REFORM, AND EVANGELIZE, HOMELESS AND DESTITUTE CHILDREN. We reclaim them from the streets that we may reform them in our various Homes, and we do both in order that by God's blessing they may be brought under the power of the Gospel of Christ. We receive the *Homeless and Destitute because they are such*, and for *this reason only*, without distinction of class or creed,—no questions being asked on these points. The Committee desire on this occasion to declare their unabated attachment to these great principles.

We would also declare our unabated confidence in our methods of working:—Immediate admission to urgent cases, without the delay and expense involved in election; personal investigation of each case by the Committee, thus avoiding the evil of the "recommend" system; and then training up our children on the family system (which

is that carried out at our *nine* branch Homes), as the plan best calculated—because the Divine plan—to form character and produce good and useful men and women,

These are the great features of our work, and ten years' experience has only served to convince us of their importance, as it has also convinced us of the *continued need* of their application.

Yes, the need for our Institution continues. This is an important fact at the close of ten years. And it *will* continue, for *Death* is still busy rendering children *orphans*, and drink and vice and crime are still active making homes desolate, and turning little ones on to the streets; and in addition to these, so long as there is in all our great cities the large class who have no fixed habitation—such as hawkers, vagrants, tramps, showmen, &c., who dwell chiefly in the common lodging-houses, and tramp wards; so long will their children inevitably drift on to the streets, and unless laid hold of by some such organization as this, will walk in the steps of their parents.

We have little space or desire to say much about funds. Special efforts were made at the close of last year which averted a deficiency, which at one time seemed imminent, and enabled us to begin this present year with a small balance in our favour, which has since been absorbed.

What the Institution requires is, a larger permanent income; we require an income of £2,500. to carry on the extensive operations of the Institution efficiently. Our annual subscriptions amount to about £1,600. It is essential, therefore, that if this work—so important to the well-being of our community—is to be maintained in its

present efficiency, and is to continue its course of blessing, a considerable increase should be made to our subscription list or permanent income.

Shall we plead for this in vain? Shall not the work done in the past stimulate all, both *workers* and *givers*, to increased effort in the future?

Surely the *work* is worthy of the effort. It is work that will bear reflection as the close of life draws on, and as working days are almost done.

To clothe the naked, to feed the hungry, to rescue the perishing children, to be a father to the fatherless little ones, "*to seek and to save that which is lost*," surely *this* is to walk in *His* steps who "went about doing good." And in so doing we shall most effectively be diminishing *pauperism*, *drunkenness*, and *crime*—those great evils that afflict our country—and hastening that day when there shall be "no decay, no leading into captivity, and no complaining in our streets."

"Happy are the people who are in such a case," and thrice happy they who have done most to hasten it."

ADDENDA.

It will be apparent to all who think, that the entire control and oversight of such a large number of children as we provide for in our various Homes, cannot possibly be carried out by a small committee, without much and constant aid from a large and increasing number of friends, whose loving service, cheerfully and voluntarily rendered, has never been more conspicuous than during the past year—lightening wonderfully the burden which otherwise would have been too heavy for the Committee to bear, and largely contributing to the welfare and success of the Institution.

It will not be needful to do more than name our kind medical officer, Dr. Andrew Boutflower, who continues to watch over the health of our large family; our legal adviser, Mr. T. L. Farrar, and our friend Mr. Edward Ashworth, each of whom has rendered important service and laid the Committee under many obligations.

The trustees of Minshull's Charity, and of Butterworth and Bayley's Charity, have again enabled us to apprentice many poor boys to some of the best trades in our city.

Dr. Braddon has again, with much kindness, watched over the health of the children at our Orphan Homes; and Dr. Pinder has been similarly kind at our Girls' branch.

Broome, Murray, and Co. have again very kindly audited the accounts of the Institution; and Mr. and Miss Gregory have throughout the year been most unwearied in devising plans to help the boys and the work.

The various Lady friends who help our work in so many ways have been most constant and devoted in their labours of love throughout the year.

The Little Boys' Home Committee have not only looked after the general interests of these Homes, but have been chiefly instrumental in raising the £678. 9s. 10d. required to carry on this branch of the work, and by so doing have relieved the Central Committee of a heavy responsibility.

The Ladies' working party have met on the last Tuesday in each month at the Central Refuge, and have prepared all the day

shirts, night shirts, socks, &c. required by our large family. A similar party have recently begun a meeting at Kersal Rectory, at Whalley Range, and at Sale, for the same purpose.

The Lady Collectors have again rendered most important service, as a glance at our subscription list will show. To them, and also to the Sunday School teachers, the week-night school teachers, and the kind friend who presides at the harmonium at our Sunday Evening Service, the Committee offer their hearty thanks. Nor would they forget the unwearied care and attention of their excellent master and matron, Mr. and Mrs. Browne, and the assistants who aid them at the Refuge; also the masters and matrons of the various branch Homes. Most faithful and devoted have each been in their several spheres of labour, showing in every way that they have the highest interest of the work at heart.

To each of them, and to all, whether named or unnamed, who have aided the work in any way, the Committee tender their hearty thanks.

Our excellent friend Mr. H. B. Harrison has been obliged to retire from the Committee owing to numerous engagements, having rendered much and valued service to the work during a period of five years. In electing Mr. William Oldham to fill the vacancy, the Committee doubt not but that they are securing an active and earnest worker.

MEDICAL REPORT.

I have much pleasure in stating that during the past twelve months the health of the boys generally has been exceedingly satisfactory—indeed, I may almost say that, with the exception of two or three somewhat serious cases, there has been an entire freedom from sickness; and although the district surrounding the Refuge has been extensively attacked with scarlatina, not a single case of any form of epidemic disease has occurred.

The hygiene and dietary are all that could be wished, and the boys well supplied with suitable clothing and shoes.

I must also bear testimony to the care and attention which is shown to the boys by the masters and matrons at all the branch Homes—a fact which largely accounts for the healthy condition of the inmates.
