*The Eleventh Annual Meeting of the MANCHESTER AND SALFORD BOYS' AND GIRLS' REFUGES AND HOMES was held at the Central Refuge, Strangeways, on Friday, May 6th, 1881.*

The Rev. WILLIAM MC.CAW took the Chair at 6 p.m. o'clock.

The Meeting having been opened with prayer, the Annual Report was read by the Hon. Secretary, Mr. LEONARD SHAW, and the Financial Statement of the Treasurer by Mr. R. B. Taylor.

*Moved by Rev. PREBENDARY MACDONALD, and seconded by Mr. ALDERMAN HARWOOD.*

"That the Report and Financial Statement now read be adopted, printed, and circulated under the direction of the Committee, and that the Committee for the ensuing year be Messrs. R. B. Taylor, Louis M. Hayes, William Oldham, and Leonard K. Shaw; and that the Treasurer be Mr. J. C. Stuart."

*Moved by Mr. GEORGE SMITH, of Coalville, and seconded by Mr. T. C. DAVIS-COLLEY.*

"That the neglected condition of many children still to be found on the streets and in common lodging-houses of all large cities, and in other places, is fraught with danger to the best interests of society, and calls for renewed efforts in order that by legislation and other means, the evil may be diminished.

These Resolutions were adopted unanimously, after which the children of all the Homes assembled, to whom special addresses were delivered by Rev. Julius Lloyd, Messrs. Richard Johnson, Henry Beales, and Thomas Jackson, the usual votes of thanks closing the proceedings.

## ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1880.

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At the close of the eleventh year of the operations of the BOYS' AND GIRLS' REFUGES AND HOMES, the Committee are thankful to be able to record that the Institution in its various branches is in a state of thorough efficiency; and that its operations throughout the year have been attended with a considerable amount of success, and, they would trust, of blessing.

The year which closed in January has, like those which preceded it, been one of extension. At our last anniversary the Institution numbered nine establishments, but shortly afterwards a friend (after going all round the work and seeing what was being accomplished; seeing also that each Home was full) voluntarily placed in our hands the amount required to establish another Orphan Home. This Home was opened on June 4th by the Bishop of Manchester, so that this year we have to chronicle TEN HOMES as composing the Institution.

The Central Refuge, Strangeways.

Four Homes for Working Lads in Broughton.

Four Homes for Little Orphan Boys in Cheetham.

And One Girls' Home, Broughton-lane.

EACH HOME BEING FULL.

We commenced the year 1880 with a total of 200 children under our care in the Refuge and its branches.

During the year, out of the large number who sought our aid, 101 of the most needy were admitted.

It would very much under-rate both the work and the usefulness of the Institution if it were supposed that no help was afforded to those who, from various causes, were *not* deemed eligible for admission. Very often these cases, from their peculiarity, involved more labour and anxiety in giving them the help they needed than those whose condition and surroundings at once marked them out as suitable for admission. In this Institution we feel we cannot deal in a cold and official manner with the poor children and young persons who, either in their wretchedness or waywardness, seek our help and guidance. Each case is separately gone into, and the temporary aid—whether it be lodging, clothing, food, employment, counsel, or warning—which their case seems to require, is, as far as possible, afforded.

But, leaving these cases amongst the unwritten records of our work, we proceed to speak of the 101 children admitted.

Physically, they were of the usual type—dirty, ragged, and neglected. As to parentage—

42 had lost both parents,

43 had lost one parent,

16 had both living somewhere.

*As to education.* Their condition was as follows:—

If we add these 101 children to the 200 in our Homes when the year began, it gives a total of 301 *under our care during the twelve months*, and of these we are able to give the following account:—

It will not be necessary to speak in detail of, or describe the various branches which compose the Institution.

The Central Refuge, Strangeways, Still continues the head-quarters of the work, where the raw human material is first received from off the streets, and where the impressions first received will to a large



extent determine the boy's future course. Most thankful are the Committee that these early impressions are chiefly in the hands of such earnest and devoted labourers as their master and matron, Mr. and Mrs. Browne, who lay themselves out specially in those early days to win to all that is true, and pure, and good, the unpromising material with which they deal.

As we said formerly—work, bright, active, cheerful work, is one great means used at the Refuge in reclaiming the wild street boy; and to one or other of the employments carried on in our workshops the boy is at once put on admission, and begins very early to learn the great principle of "Self-help."

Schooling in the morning, employment during the day, and again school in the evening, varied on alternate nights with recreation, makes up the daily life at the Central Refuge.\*

### The Homes for Working Boys,

Of which there are four, and which form the second branch of our operations, have pursued their course of quiet usefulness during the year. They are conducted on the family principle—17 to 18 boys in each Home, who, having passed through the parent Refuge, are now employed in one or other of the various trades of our city.

\* During the year we have felt crippled in our workshop for want of room, and there is no doubt that our principal industry could be extended, and the usefulness of our Institution increased, if, by some means, more room could be provided.

One of the features of this branch of our work has been that a number of the elder lads having become self-supporting, are being gradually provided by the Committee with safe lodgings. As each one is moved out, his place is taken by another from the Refuge, and thus room made at the Refuge to rescue another from the streets.

The two divisions of which we have so far spoken, contain the boys who are able to work. Their earnings form a very important item in the income of the Institution, and we cannot but think constitute a strong appeal to the public to provide willingly the balance required, seeing it is "helping those who are really trying to help themselves."

The total earnings for the year have been... £2,312 13 6  
Of which amount the boys have paid  
towards their support ..... 2,190 1 1

The difference between these two amounts, after allowing a portion for pocket money and lawful recreation, is placed in our Savings Bank towards their clothing.

### The Homes for Little Orphan Boys,

At Johnson-street, Queen's-road, Cheetham, for children who have lost both parents and are otherwise quite destitute, form a very interesting and important branch of our operations. We have now FOUR of these SMALL FAMILY HOMES, each containing 12 fatherless and motherless children; each Home under the loving care of a Christian mother, who the children speak of, and are taught to look up to, as *their* mother.

They are being trained up on God's plan, surrounded by all the wise and *hversig* influences of a happy home, to



become, we trust and pray, His children, and in after life as His servants to bless our city and neighbourhood.

At the date of our last report we were still under the responsibility of rent for one of these Homes, but we are thankful to be able to record that the appeal then made has been responded to, and now the Committee are relieved of this responsibility in the case of each of our Orphan Homes.

### The Girls' Branch,

At Heathfield, Broughton-lane, has pursued its course of quiet usefulness throughout the year; as a girl has been passed out either into a place of service or adopted into a family, the vacancy has at once been filled by another needy one, and so the full number has been kept up. This is a bright and happy Home, and will well repay a visit. The importance of training the neglected little girls of the courts and alleys of our great cities is felt by all; and the Committee cannot doubt but that the wise and loving care bestowed by our matron in this Home will bear fruit in years to come.

### The Training Ship

Branch of our operations claims a passing word. The 14 boys which we have sent from the streets of our city to the ship during the past year makes a total of 94 who have been thus provided for—many of these have passed away from the Training Ship, and are either in THE NAVY or MERCHANT SERVICE rendering service to the country.

The Night Employment of Street Children  
Has continued to engage the attention of this Committee, because they have felt and still feel that it is one fruitful source of the vagrancy and misery with which they have to deal. During the past year we have again joined our leading public bodies in a deputation to the new Home Secretary, who seems alive to the evil of street hawking by children at untimely hours, but we did hope that ere this the simple legislation required to rectify a crying evil would have been passed:

### Our Magazine, "The Worker,"

We must just mention, ere we hasten to our concluding words. This Magazine, which is conducted in the interests of Homeless and Destitute Children, has been gradually winning its way, and interesting an increasing circle of readers. Each month has contained one or more articles descriptive of or illustrating our work, while other articles of general interest have contributed to make "The Worker" a welcome guest in many homes. We trust each of our readers will subscribe themselves, and also make "The Worker" known among their friends. The price is one penny monthly, or 1s. 6d. per year post free.

### Conclusion.

This brief and imperfect record of the work of a year among the most neglected and helpless of our population; a work carried on day by day and night by night, not only in the anxious care involved in the training and oversight of the large number in our



various Homes, but also in *seeking out* in the streets and lodging houses of the lowest quarters of our city the lost and wandering ones,—this brief account cannot close without an allusion to some questions which we believe lie very near the root of much of the juvenile depravity which still exists, and which, if not increasing, is certainly not diminishing as rapidly as we had some right to expect.

And *first*, the question of JUVENILE STREET HAWKING. That we have already alluded to, and doubtless it will ere long be dealt with in some way; we only fear that the full extent of the evil is not realized by those in authority, and that therefore the remedy may not be adequate.

Another question is—THE IMPRISONMENT OF JUVENILE OFFENDERS. This evil has been condemned by the almost unanimous voice of the country, and will ere long, to a large extent cease to exist. We have at last awoke to the fact that we have been dealing with the poor street boy who has sore temptations to offend; nay! whose offence has almost been a *necessity*, in an entirely different manner from which we have dealt with the same errors in our own children. We have called the offences of the street child by ugly legal names, and the similar offences of our Home children we have looked upon as boyish freaks, *and we have punished them accordingly*, with the result of converting the street offender into a gaol bird, and the parlour offender into a respectable member of society! But we have awoke! The evil will soon be remedied, and *so far*, one of the causes producing juvenile vagrancy and crime will be diminished.

But another question more important still presses for settlement, we mean

#### JUVENILE IDLENESS!

Ought children and young persons to be permitted to idle about the streets, and to fester in the common lodging houses—we mean after they are permitted by law to leave an elementary school.

Thousands of children pass out of our Board Schools every year, but how many go into regular work? Is it not to be feared that a large number, after “hob-jobbing” about at casual employment, at length (through want of the opportunity of regular work) drift on to the streets, frequent the “idle corners,” and so on to vagrancy and worse.

We do not blame the children; we can testify from long experience that the street-boy has a real ambition to work. But look at the *conditions* that surround them. Their parents careless or drunken, their homes comfortless and unhappy, their clothing dirty and ragged, and then say, is it to be wondered at that so many lose their first place of work (which may have been utterly unsuitable for them, and for which they had no previous training) and never get another.

Our law has wisely decided that all children shall be educated. The vicious parent neglected this duty. The State has stepped in.

But is not *industry* as important to the welfare of a State as *education*? The vicious parent neglects the industrial training of his child now, why should not the State step in



again and insist that the child who has cost the country much to *educate*, shall not cost the country *more* by growing up in idleness and vagrancy?

This is a large question, but a deeply important one. How far STATE LABOUR SCHOOLS—in no sense *pauper schools, still less penal*, but bright active hives of industry, where every child of from 10 to 16 years, either as half or full timers, might learn habits of industry—would meet a great want and avert a great evil we venture not to say; but we do plead for employment for our street children; we do ask that they shall not by the conditions which surround them be practically excluded from entering on regular work, for it is as true to-day as ever that—

“Satan finds some mischief still  
For idle hands to do.”

And now, reader, we have done. Our work for the past is before you—the future is in God’s hands; but present duty to our poor children is *ours*, and it is *yours*. We each have solemn responsibilities resting upon us, which we cannot shake off, with regard to those who are our flesh and blood, growing up as they are in our midst; and soon, *very soon*, to be either a curse or a blessing to themselves and to us!

The Committee of this Institution are seeking to win the hearts and lives of the lost children of our city for God. He claims them as His own, for His Son died for them; and He claims that we who have happy homes—we who have bread enough and to spare—we whose children are shielded and watched over with such love, and care, and

tenderness—that *we* shall deny ourselves something in order to rescue and save these; and to encourage us in this blessed work, He has left on record those wonderful words—  
“INASMUCH AS YE HAVE DONE THIS UNTO ONE OF THE LEAST OF THESE, YE HAVE DONE IT UNTO ME.”

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### Medical Report, 1881.

I have much pleasure in stating that the health of the boys at the various Homes has been extremely satisfactory during the past twelve months, and reflects great credit on the careful management exercised by the authorities. I should be glad, from a medical point of view, to see the principal Home in Frances-street either enlarged, or better still, removed to a situation with some open space around it, such as the plot of land behind the Strangeways prison.

At the Orphan Homes, Cheetham, DR. BRADDON has again been most attentive to the children; and DR. PINDAR has been similarly kind at the Girls' Branch; and in this connection we are thankful to record that no case of serious illness, much less of death, has occurred during the year. Under God we owe this to the constant attention of our good medical friends.

OUR HONORARY SOLICITORS, MESSRS. FARRAR & HALL, have again been most kind on all occasions where their valued services were required.

We owe many thanks to a large number of LADIES who have been most constant and devoted in their labours of love throughout the year.

First we must mention the ORPHAN HOMES COMMITTEE, who have taken a deep interest in the welfare of these Homes, and in addition have raised, chiefly in the Cheetham district, the handsome amount of £726. 5s. towards their support.

THE LADIES' WORKING PARTY have, as heretofore, met on the last Tuesday in each month at the Central Refuge. When we say that they have prepared the day shirts, night shirts, stockings, socks, &c., &c., required by our large family, it will be seen at once what an important service they have rendered.

In this connection we must not omit to mention and to thank a similar party at Kersal Rectory, at Whalley Range, at Bowdon, and also at Sale.

THE LADY COLLECTORS have again rendered very important service, as a glance at our subscription list will show; also those good friends who have taken *Collecting Boxes* and *Collecting Cards*, and have made such good use of them.

TO THE SUNDAY SCHOOL TEACHERS, and the kind friend who presides at the harmonium at our Sunday Evening Service, our hearty thanks are due. We cannot allude to them without expressing our sense of the loss our Sunday School has sustained by the departure from Manchester of Mrs. Leggett, who for a long time had been a most valued helper.

During the year a BRANCH COMMITTEE has been formed at BOWDON, where much sympathy exists for our work, and where our lady friends have collected in its aid the handsome sum of £250. 13s. 6d. We offer them our heartfelt thanks.

TO MESSRS. BROOME, MURRAY, AND Co., who have again kindly audited the accounts of the Institution; to the Trustees of Mynshull's Charity, and of Butterworth and Bayley's Charity, who have rendered us help in apprenticing our boys; to Mr. J. H. Walker, dentist, of Strangeways, who has given his professional services to a number of our boys; to Mr. A. F. Lafosse and Mr. John Eastham, who have very kindly photographed several of our orphan boys; to several Clergymen and Ministers who have allowed collections in their churches in aid of our work; and to all those, whether named here or unintentionally omitted, who have aided the work in any way, the Committee tender very hearty thanks, but better still than our poor thanks, "God is not unmindful to forget the work and labour which proceedeth of love," which has been rendered.

Our good friend Mr. T. H. RYMER, who had been so long connected with our work as a member of the Committee, felt himself obliged to retire at the close of last year. In his retirement the Committee are thankful for the assurance that he will still continue to render what service he can to a work for which he and his have done so much.

The Committee pray they may continue Band of Hope boys until their lives ends.

## WHITSUNTIDE, 1880.

This was a week of much enjoyment. On Monday we were joined by our Sailor Boys from the "Indefatigable," and together marched in the Annual Procession, headed by the NEW BANNER, the gift of Mrs. and the Misses Higgins, of Mount House. The boys all dining together afterwards at the Refuge.
