“If you look at the matter *selfishly*, it is very much your *interest* to give these Lads a lift, because they are exactly at an age when habits of industry and honesty on the one hand, and of idleness and vice on the other, are permanently formed. *It is now or never for them.* The next two or three years will probably decide whether they are as workers to increase the public wealth, or whether they are to lessen it by living upon it for the rest of their days as paupers, vagrants, or possibly worse.”—LORD DERBY at *Annual Meeting, January, 1873.*

SUMMARY OF ANNUAL MEETING.

The Fourteenth Annual Meeting of the MANCHESTER AND SALFORD BOYS' AND GIRLS' REFUGES AND CHILDREN'S AID SOCIETY was held in the Large Hall of the Young Men's Christian Association, Peter Street, on Tuesday, March 11th, 1884.

His Worship the MAYOR took the Chair at Seven o'clock.

The Meeting having been opened with singing and prayer, the Annual Report was read by the Hon. Secretary, Mr. LEONARD SHAW, and the Financial Statement by the Treasurer, Mr. HENRY CHARLTON.

It was then *moved* by Rev. THOS. TAYLOR, Lytham; *seconded* by Rev. BENJAMIN BELL, and Resolved,—

“That the Report together with the Financial Statement now read be adopted, printed, and circulated under the direction of the Committee, and that the Committee for the ensuing year be Messrs. R. B. Taylor, Louis M. Hayes, William Oldham, E. J. Walker, Gilbert R. Kirlew, and Leonard K. Shaw; and that the Treasurer be Mr. Henry Charlton.”

It was *moved* by Miss ELLICE HOPKINS; *seconded* by the Ven. Archdeacon ANSON, supported by ISAAC HOYLE, Esq., and Resolved,—

“That this meeting, while fully recognising the importance and need of voluntary agency in the work of rescuing young lives from degradation and misery, feels the paramount importance of putting in force the existing Acts for the protection of children, and calls upon those whose duty it is to enforce the Industrial Schools Act and Industrial Schools Act Amendment Act of 1880 in any case of need.”

These resolutions were carried with acclamation.

The annual distribution of prizes, by the Mayoress of Manchester, was then proceeded with. After which singing by the children of the Homes, and by the boys from the Training Ship, “Indefatigable,” closed the proceedings.

ANOTHER year of active but happy service in behalf of the Orphan and Destitute Children of this district closed on the 31st December, 1883, and now the Committee offer a brief record of a year's work, more important, perhaps, than any year which has preceded it, and would thank God that they have been permitted for another twelve months the joy and privilege of rescuing young lives from sin and sorrow—of sharing in the work of our Lord and Master—by seeking “*to save that which is lost.*”

The Committee quite hoped to have been able this Anniversary to announce

A Completed Institution,

But the virtual collapse of the *old* central premises in Strangeways just when the *new* additional building was almost finished, has compelled us to rebuild the former, and, though no doubt this adds symmetry, completeness, and stability to the whole, it also adds considerably to our expenditure, and postpones for at least three months longer the formal opening of the new buildings.

Still an important portion of the extension scheme

has been entirely completed. The Orphan Homes and Girls' Homes branch; and a new feature of our work—The Seaside Home for weak, pale-faced city children—has been established at Lytham, both of which have formed important features in the year's work, of which we shall say more when we come to speak of these branches.

The year 1883 began with a total of 255 children under our care and training at the Refuge and branch Homes.

During the year 346 fresh cases sought our aid.

This large number with very few exceptions were ragged, neglected, and uncared for.

Of this total number 229 were, after close personal investigation of each case, deemed ineligible for permanent admission.

81	were declined as <i>entirely</i> unsuitable.
88	received temporary help in food and lodgings.
39	were restored to friends.
21	“ passed on to other institutions.

We trust our friends will realise that, although these 229 children were not permanently admitted, and their names, therefore, do not appear upon the books of the Institution, that, nevertheless, a vast amount of time and care was bestowed in their cases, and that the aid they received was not *only* advice and counsel but in many cases substantial help and assistance.

The balance of 117 were admitted to the benefits of the Institution, and these, added to the 255 in our Homes when the year began, gives a total of 372 children under the care and training of the Institution during the year.

This large work of *Rescue, Clothing, Feeding, Education and Training* has been done at a cost to the public of £4,868 or £13. 1s. 9d. per head; and when it is remembered that this nett cost includes the temporary help to *over one hundred* children whom we could not admit permanently, it will be seen that the cost per head is thereby reduced.

The various branches of the Institution, as stated in former Reports, have been in active operation throughout the year. The work at

The head-quarters of the Institution, has been carried on under considerable difficulties, owing to the building

operations which have been in progress; and more recently owing to the collapse and rebuilding of the old premises. Our excellent master and matron, Mr. and Mrs. Browne, have been sustained with the prospect which a new and very complete building, fitted with all the best modern appliances for carrying on its varied operations, inspires. We quite hope and believe that when finished it will be the most perfect Institution of its kind in the Northern Counties. Already the new and large workshop, with its very complete machinery for the manufacture of firewood, which is driven by a new and powerful "Otto" gas engine, the munificent gift of one of our trustees; also the shoemakers' shop and the tailors' shop are in operation.

Already the new and handsome Swimming Bath is a great joy, and a source of health and recreation to the boys in all our Homes.

In the new School-room we hope to see better educational work done than ever.

While in the new and large Lecture Hall, already crowded every Sabbath by large and attentive congregations, we trust and pray that impressions are being made and seed sown in the hearts of our own children—boys and girls—which will bear a rich harvest in days to come.

But the Central Refuge still needs the Boys' New Day Room to be completed; the large new Workshop—now in temporary use as a dormitory—to be occupied;

the Steam Laundry and Bakehouse to be in operation, with other improvements of various kinds, ere it will reach the standard we have set before us in its beneficent work of child-rescue and reclamation.

The Homes for Little Orphan Children,

Both boys and girls, situated in George Street, Cheetham Hill, claim a special word this year, as the completion and occupation of these six Homes finish the first half of the extension scheme, which a year and a half ago the Committee placed before the public.

The history of the rise and progress of these Homes is deeply interesting, did time and space permit us to recount it. Suffice it to say, that in nearly every case the funds required to establish them have been *voluntarily* offered; and that here are received little fatherless and motherless ones of 10 years and *under*, who are most carefully trained on the "family principle," carried out, we believe, as truly and exactly as it is possible. Each house contains 16 children, a "Mother," and a helper, who dwell together as one family.

No. 2, George Street, bears the name of the "Langworthy" Home, under the care of Miss Crowther.

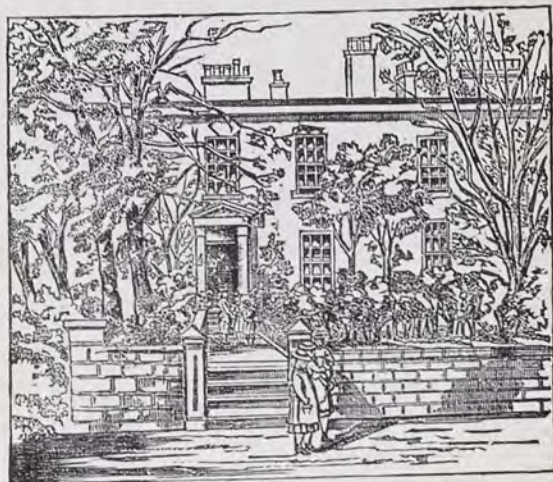
No. 4, George Street, bears the name of the "Garnett" Home, and is under the care of Miss McKinnell.

No. 6, George Street, bears the name of the "Crossley" Home, and is under the care of Mrs. Hodson.

No. 8, George Street, bears the name of the "Higgins" Home, and is under the care of Mrs. Russell.

No. 10, George Street, bears the name of the "Atkinson" Home, under the care of Mrs. Knight.

No. 12, George Street, bears the name of the "School Girls'" Home, and is under the care of Miss Fox.

Visitors are always welcome, and we venture to say that those who do go will not be disappointed.

The Homes for Working Boys,

Three in number, in Lower Broughton, have continued their course of quiet usefulness throughout the year.

16 to 18 working lads, nearly all of whom have passed through the Central Refuge, and a "Father and Mother" constitute the family in each house. They are situated as follows:—

No. 8, Camp Street, under the care of Mr. and Mrs. Bradbury.

No. 214, Lower Broughton Road, under the care of Mr. and Mrs. Sandiford.

No. 2, St. John's Place, under the care of Mrs. Craig. Each Home being oversighted by a member of the Committee. This is also the case at

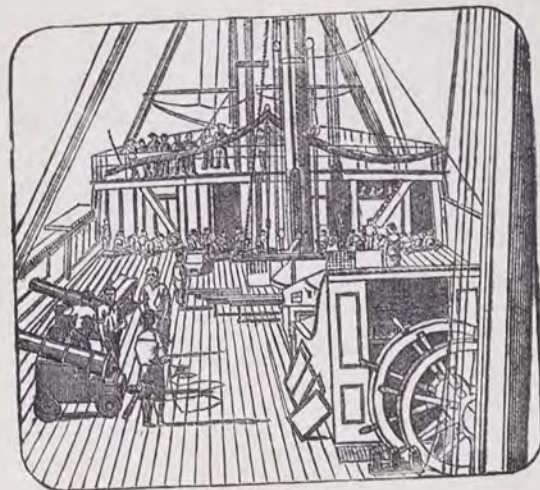
The Girls' Home, Heathfield, Broughton Lane,

which, under the care of Mrs. Opie, continues a very interesting and important branch of our work. As little girls of 10 years and *under* are received at the George Street Homes, so girls above that age are received at Heathfield. The Committee realising the importance of this branch of the work decided on the enlargement of this Home as part of the extension scheme. That enlargement is almost completed, so that we look forward to the coming year as one of increased usefulness in preventive work amongst our girls.

Other important branches of the work we must pass over with a very brief notice, such as

The Training Ship Indefatigable,

On the river Mersey, to which we have sent now a total number of 127 boys from our Manchester Streets.

The Boys' Rest and Lodging House,

Angel Meadow, where the beds were occupied 6,131 times during the year, being an average of 17 per night—and many a lad thus protected from the low common lodging houses which abound in the neighbourhood—at a total cost to the Refuge Committee of £26! A separate report is appended.

Boys' Industrial Brigades.

We cannot do more than glance at the results in connection with this important branch of our work. During 1883, the number of boys who have passed through the various brigades has been 323, the average number at one time being 75 boys. These boys have sold during the year a total of over one million two hundred and one thousand papers, including our own Magazines—"The Christian Worker" and "Children's Own Paper." The total sum received by this sale being £2,644. 14s. 8½d., and the boys' earnings amounting to £1,202. 13s. 2d. One special feature is that these earnings are not made to be squandered by drunken or vicious parents, as every boy is visited at home—over 900 such visits having been made during the past year. Special services are held for these lads, in which they take a lively interest, and a Savings Bank also encourages them in habits of thrift. For further details of this branch we must refer our hearers to the special report. See page 73.

A brief notice of these must suffice for the present, while we hasten to say a word of a new and truly charitable branch of the work which has been established during the past year. We allude to

The Seaside Home at Lytham.

This was long felt to be a need in Manchester. Those who visit in the low quarters of our city, and penetrate its courts and alleys, alone know how many weak, pale-faced children there are, pining away under the

depressing influences which surround them, to whom two or three weeks at the sea-side would be like a fresh lease of life.

Our Seaside Home was opened on June 20th, the cost of fitting up and furnishing being £130. 16s. 9d. It was soon occupied by a little family, and from that time to the end of the year 92 *children* (53 girls, 39 boys) had partaken of its benefits, which points to *nearly 200 children per annum* being thus *helped, strengthened, and cheered* by this agency. This important work has been done at a very moderate expenditure. Cost of maintenance, £170. 14s. 7d.; railway fares, £24. 11s. 4d.—£195. 5s. 11d.; or a total cost per head of those admitted of £2. 2s.

We wish it to be widely known that our Seaside Home is not meant for the children of our Institutions *only*. Any poor weak child in our city—*FREE OF INFECTIOUS DISEASE, and able to walk about*—may be admitted, in point of fact it has been so, about *one-half* of those received during the six months just closed being outside cases.

The Seaside Home has gathered round it a large circle of friends, and it will interest our readers to know that the funds to carry it on have so far been raised outside our general funds, and without any cost to the Institution.

The ladies of the Broughton Park Mission entirely support one room; various other friends have undertaken to provide for individual cots. £15 supports a cot for one year, and so we have the

"*Mary Amelia*" cot, the "*Olga*," the "*Annie*," the

"Primrose," The "Lily," the "Rose," the "Pansy," the "Violet," the "Daisy," the "Buttercup," the "Forget-me-Not," and the "Bowdon Cot."

It is a very bright and happy Home, the details of management being undertaken by a local Committee at Lytham, to whom the Central Committee are deeply indebted, and specially to the two medical gentlemen who devote so much time to it.

But the sight of the children is the best vote of thanks. Watched over as they are very lovingly and tenderly by the good "Mother" of this Home, Mrs.

Hindle, the few weeks stay at Lytham is long remembered as a bright spot in many sad and weary little lives.

Emigration.

The only other branch of our work that we will notice is that of Emigration, which during the past year has assumed greater proportions than in any former year, and we believe is destined still further to grow.

It is a matter for thankfulness that during 1883 we were enabled to place in safe homes, either in Canada or the U. States, 38 children. With the exception of 12, they were children whose "surroundings" were such that their only hope lay in putting the ocean between them!

The twelve who form the exception to this rule were those who went out to Mr. Moody's Training Homes at Northfield, Massachusetts. This event, which formed an interesting and important feature in last year's work, had much in it that we felt was truly providential.

The very same week that Mr. Moody made the offer of receiving into his Homes and Training for Mission work 12 boys from our Orphan Homes, we received a letter from a gentleman—a perfect stranger to us—to say that having been a resident for awhile in Canada and the States, and seeing the openings there for boys and girls, he was prepared to place funds in our hands sufficient to emigrate some 30 children.

The offer of good homes, with the best of training on the other side of the Atlantic, and the means to outfit and place them in those homes, having come

simultaneously, unexpectedly, and unasked, we could not but feel that the hand of God was in it, and so, having carefully selected a band of bright hopeful boys they sailed for Northfield, on May 30th, accompanied by Mr. Shaw, who desired to investigate personally the prospects of Juvenile Emigration in the great Western Continent. On the same day a similar party of our *girls* sailed for Canada, under the care of Miss Rye and Mrs. Birt.

The conclusion forced on all who examine the question without prejudice is that, for our congested population at home, Canada and the Western States offer a decidedly hopeful future; and specially is this so of children. Hundreds, nay thousands of homes in Canada, chiefly respectable farmers, are waiting to receive children from 5 to 13, there to grow up as members of their families in habits of industry and godliness! While here, at home, What have we got? According to a return recently issued, and quoted in an article on "Social reform" in *The Nineteenth Century Magazine*, we have some 261,386 pauper children under 16 in England and Wales—not counting Scotland and Ireland. If we add to this over 5,000 children *now* under sentence of detention in Reformatory Schools, it gives us an alarming total of some 267,000 children whose future, to say the least, is very doubtful.

Nor is the outlook hopeful as to this number being seriously reduced. Employment is not abundant, and along side of this fact we have another staring us in the face, *our population is growing at the rate of 13 to 14 per cent. per decade.*

Do not these facts lie very near the root of the "Bitter Cry," which not only from "Outcast London," but from "other cities also" is reaching our ears!

Wherein lies the remedy? Is it not under God's blessing, in a wisely-directed scheme of Emigration, in removing our children from pauper schools, which too often breed pauperism, and placing them in Christian Homes in the regions beyond.

£12 will outfit a child, carry it to Canada, and place it in a good home there. The Committee are prepared to undertake this work on a considerable scale if funds are placed in their hands to do it.

Finances.

Respecting the general funds of the Institution, a reference to the very full financial statement of the Treasurer will show that the large needs of the work during the past year have been supplied, leaving a balance of £177 with which we begin the new year.

Thankful to the Father of the fatherless as we are for this result, we must remind our friends that this balance (not two weeks' supply, for the Institution now requires £100 per week to carry on all its operations) has long since been absorbed.

The Extension Fund.

We should like, did space permit, to have said a word about the Extension Fund. £2,457 was added to this fund during the past year, making its total to the present date about £9,000. But in order to finish the work which is now in hand, and make the Institution

complete and fitted to do its great work *well, some £5,000 more is required.* We venture with all humility and yet with hope and confidence, to ask Manchester to give us this amount, *for the work's sake.*

Parental Control—Its Limits.

There is another question which is coming to the front and which concerns our work very closely. That question is—Shall parents be allowed to ruin their own children? Have parental rights and parental control no limits?

We rejoice that this question is raised very plainly in the Report just issued by the Royal Commission on Industrial and Reformatory Schools, presided over by Lord Aberdare. They state a fact with which we have been long painfully familiar—That the low and vicious friends of a boy or girl committed to an Industrial School or Reformatory keep up an intercourse with that child, and specially as the term of detention draws to an end. Then a wonderful interest in the child's future is manifested; and when the managers propose to place that boy in the navy or merchant service, or to provide that girl with a safe home in one of our colonies, the parent steps in, refuses his or her consent, the child gradually drifts back to the old surroundings, and the cost and the labour and training of years is undone, and the last state of the child is often worse than the first.

They recommend, and we heartily echo the recommendation, "That parents *who by their vicious example and neglect* are the cause of their children's committal to a

State Institution, shall *thereby* forfeit the power of control—shall be prevented from *undoing* the work which has been done, and that the managers of such institutions shall, *with the child's consent*, have full power of disposal *without* the consent of the parent.

If this recommendation becomes law we shall hope and urge that the same power be secured to managers of *Voluntary* Institutions.

Meantime, while the majority of the children we receive are orphan children, we have to deal with a considerable number who have a parent, *a worthless parent*, under whose care the child is slowly but surely going to ruin, and some very wise and moral people would tell us by receiving such children are you not offering a premium to those worthless people to desert them?

To such we would say,—If you can compel those parents to do their duty to the children none will rejoice more than we—*we will help you all we can.* But if you tell us in the face of a child that is being *lost*—"Don't stretch out a hand to save that child, lest in so doing you relieve that heartless parent!" We say, No! we cannot follow this advice; "It is not the will of our Father in Heaven that one of these should perish." We would save both parent and child if we could, but we cannot. One is lost! but, God helping us, we will save what we can from the human wreck around us.

This is what we are doing, dear reader, and

In Conclusion,

In this work we ask your help—your continued, your increased help. When you know what our boys and

girls are doing to help *themselves* we feel sure that your sympathies will be still more drawn out towards them. During the past year they have contributed out of their earnings towards their own support the handsome sum of £2,044. 3s. 11d.

With our enlarged Institution, this amount will increase. We are thus seeking to train up our children in habits of industry and sobriety, as well as "In the fear of our Lord." In this large work we have a noble band of workers and volunteer helpers, without whose constant self-denying labour the Institution would not be what it is, and to whom the Committee owe more thanks than they can express.

We rejoice to welcome on our platform this evening another noble volunteer,* one whose voice has rung throughout England in behalf of our girls.

And we ask the friends of poor children everywhere, we ask all who profess and call themselves Christians—all whose eyes or ears our words shall reach—*For Christ's sake* lend a hand—a *strong, willing, full* hand—in this work of rescue; so shall this Boys' and Girls' Refuge, and every other kindred Institution, become so many rills to swell that mighty river whose streams shall one day "*make glad the city of God.*"

Medical Report.

Since my last report the new buildings of the Boys' Refuge have been opened, and are in every way much more suitable and capacious than the cramped and patched-up houses previously in use. A sanatorium has also been added, the necessity of which I have frequently urged.

During the past year the health of the boys at the Refuge and Branch Homes has been quite satisfactory. There has been an almost total absence of infectious and contagious disease, the exceptions being two cases of scarlet fever, but the prompt removal of the boys to Monsall Hospital prevented any further outbreak.

All the sanitary arrangements are excellent, the food substantial and good, and the clothing efficient.

The Committee desire to place on record their sense of the loss which this Institution has sustained by the death of the late Richard Haworth, Esq., one of its Trustees.

The vacancy thus created, together with that caused by the lamented death of the late Chas. Leigh Clare, Esq., has been filled by the appointment of Isaac Hoyle, Esq., and Wm. J. Crossley, Esq., as Trustees.

They regret also to announce that Jas. C. Stuart, Esq., so long the esteemed Treasurer of the Institution, has felt obliged to retire owing to the state of his health and probability of early removal to London. He is succeeded by Henry Charlton, Esq., who has very kindly accepted the post at the unanimous request of the Committee, and whose interest in the work of the Institution is well known.

ADDENDA.

The Committee cannot send forth this Report to plead, as they hope it will do successfully, the cause of orphan and destitute children, without offering their heartfelt thanks to a large circle of voluntary helpers, who during the past year have contributed in no small degree to the successful and efficient working of the Institution.

Throughout the year Dr. Andrew Boutflower has been unwearied in his attention to the health of the boys at the Central Refuge, and at the three Homes for working lads in Broughton; and though it has been a year when epidemics have prevailed we have been spared serious illness. The six Orphan Homes at Cheetham Hill have made heavy claims on the time and attention of Dr. Rodgers, which has been most cheerfully met on his part,—so of Dr. Pinder at our girls' branch, Broughton Lane,—and to the medical authorities at the Manchester Royal Infirmary, the Salford Infirmary, and the Clinical Hospital, for much attention to our sick cases we owe many thanks; nor should we omit in this connection to thank Dr. Tatham for much prompt aid rendered in cases requiring immediate removal.

Messrs. Farrar and Hall, our honorary solicitors, have again laid the Committee and Trustees under heavy obligations. Throughout the year we have constantly had to seek their aid and counsel on most important matters, which has always been most cheerfully rendered.

The large number of Ladies who in various departments of the work, and in many ways, are furthering its interests and providing for its wants, the Committee owe many and hearty thanks. When it is remembered that the working party who meet at the Refuge monthly have provided over 200 day shirts, over 100 night-shirts, and a large number of socks and stockings, in addition to useful contributions of similar articles from other ladies, it will be seen how active our friends have been.

To those Lady friends who, in connection with the Central Refuge or with the various branch associations, have acted as *collectors*, the Committee are deeply indebted. Their successful labours during the past year have relieved us of much anxiety.

Nor would we omit our Sunday School Teachers; the Sub-Committees, who are rendering most valuable service in carrying on the various branches of the Institution, such as the Orphan Homes, Cheetham; the Seaside Home, Lytham; the "Boys' Rest," Angel Meadow; the News and Caxton Brigade, Clarence-street, and others; not forgetting Mr. T. Hopkin, veterinary surgeon; also Mr. Broughton, who has devoted much time in order to illustrate our work with his beautiful ethoxo-light lantern and by photography; and others, who, if not named here, are not forgotten.

To each and all of these valued helpers the Committee offer their hearty acknowledgments.

TO OUR KIND DONORS.

These gifts of various useful articles, both for clothing and feeding the children, and also for use in the Homes, have been enumerated and acknowledged month by month in the pages of our magazine, "The Christian Worker." The Committee have only now, therefore, to thank all those who have thus shown an interest in our work and in the varied wants of our Homes. We have again to express regret that the number of children engaged in street selling is not decreased.

We would, however, on the other hand, testify to the beneficial results of the street children clauses, in the recently-passed Manchester Improvement Act. In addition to the children directly affected by its provisions, those who do not come within its reach, are in a large measure indirectly benefitted.

The circulation of our two Magazines by the lads of the Caxton Brigade still continues.

The Newsboys' Special Services have been vigorously carried on during the year. Our plan is to distribute circulars announcing the Service, the day on which it is to be held, giving at the same time a cordial invitation to come. Many interesting gatherings have resulted, and the large number of lads present testifies to the popularity of the meetings. We are pleased to note instances of much good being done by the direct

agency of the Services. 15 Services in all have been held since they were first started, attended in the aggregate by 1,265 lads, amongst whom some 5,000 tracts and leaflets have been distributed.

The Free Library and Reading Room are open nightly, and have been largely used by the lads during the winter. A variety of books and games are provided, and a counter attraction to the numerous low places of entertainment thus offered.

Another attraction, in the shape of a drum and fife band, has been provided, and so far proved a success and a source of considerable interest to the lads.

The Savings Bank is still used by the boys, and the Clothing Club has also been of great assistance in providing them with good clothing at a cheap rate.

A Messenger Brigade has also been established, the object of which is to supply boys of undoubted integrity and respectability with a superior class of employment. This additional effort is entirely self-supporting.

The Home Visitation of our boys is an important and pleasing part of the work. Between 900 and 1,000 visits have been made during the past year, and the amount of good done by this means it is impossible to estimate.

We think a word of commendation for their encouragement is justly due to our Brigade lads. During the year some three thousand pounds, for which no security whatever was held, has been trusted in the hands of

some 400 boys. Ten pounds would more than cover the loss through the deliberate dishonesty on the part of any amongst them.

The year opened with 79 boys in the Brigade, 322 have been admitted, and 323 have left during the twelve months, leaving 78 members still in the Brigades at the close of the year.

The 323 boys who have left us are accounted for as follows:—

- 1 absconded;
- 2 admitted into the Boys' Refuge;
- 2 referred to School Board;
- 2 emigrated;
- 6 sent to Industrial Schools and Training Ships;
- 18 unsuitable cases;
- 20 withdrawn by parents and guardians;
- 33 dismissed for breaking rules and bad conduct;
- 41 ceased selling altogether;
- 51 left of own accord;
- 57 left the town or district;
- 90 taken regular situations.

In conclusion, we ask for the continued prayers of all our friends on behalf of this special effort to raise, both temporally and spiritually, the street lads of our great city.
