

SUMMARY OF ANNUAL MEETING.

The Sixteenth Annual Meeting of the Manchester and Salford Boys' and Girls' Refuges and Children's Aid Society was held in the Central Refuge Hall, Strangeways, on Tuesday, February 16th, 1886.

His Worship the Mayor of Manchester took the Chair at Three o'clock. Among the large number of friends who assembled were the Mayor of Salford, Rev. Canon Stowell, Rev. Canon Woodhouse, Rev. Canon Davenport Kelly, Rev. Prebendary Macdonald, Rev. Arthur Parkinson, Rev. Dr. Nicholson, Mr. Oliver Heywood, Mr. W. J. Crossley, Dr. J. Watts, Mr. Henry Charlton, Dr. Samuelson, Mr. T. L. Farrar, Mr. Joseph Neill, &c., &c.

The Meeting was opened with prayer. Following the few introductory remarks from the Chairman came the Annual Report, read by the Hon. Secretary, Mr. Leonard K. Shaw, after which Mr. Henry Charlton, Treasurer, read the Financial Statement.

It was then moved by Rev. Canon Stowell, supported by the Mayor of Salford, and Resolved,—

"That the Report, together with the Financial Statement now read be adopted, printed, and circulated under the direction of the Committee."

It was moved by Rev. Dr. Nicholson, supported by D. Harris, Esq., and Rev. Preb. Macdonald, and Resolved,—

"That the Committee for the ensuing year be Messrs. R. B. Taylor, Louis M. Hayes, E. J. Walker, Henry Charlton, Gilbert R. Kirlew, and Leonard K. Shaw; that the Treasurer be Mr. Henry Charlton; and the Auditors be Messrs. David Smith and Garnett."

These Resolutions were unanimously carried, and the Meeting then closed.

and efficient; but at the foundation of the State system lie one or two evils which we fear to a large extent mar its kindness and beneficence, and we have only to point to the crowds of neglected children still found on our streets, and to the *thousands* who annually are brought up in our police courts, in proof that, as to efficiency, it is found wanting. It was a sense of the need arising out of the *inefficiency* of all State systems, which has led during the latter half of this century to the establishment of many Voluntary Institutions, and orphanages connected with various churches, carried on, on decidedly religious principles, as a distinct work for God and in obedience to His own command.

And we believe one great hope for the future lies in the multiplication of these voluntary Christian agenciesfor the State can never do well what the Lord designed His Church and people to do. If each church had its own orphanage, and each district its own home or homes, conducted on Christian principles, and though not controlled by, at least protected by the State, to the extent that those who have neglected the children in early life shall not be allowed to come in when the term of training is over, and prevent the training the children have received from being turned to the best possible account. If such a state of things were to prevail, or rather, we would say, when it does prevail, for we believe the Church of Christ is awakening to her true position and to her solemn duty in this matter, and when State agencies, if not superseded, are at least fully and effectively supplemented in this way, then the future of our beloved country will be full of hope, because those who are to control its destinies in that future are being trained up in the way they should go.

It will not be necessary on this the 16th Anniversary of the Manchester and Salford Boys' and Girls' Refuges and Children's Aid Society, to repeat the story which has been often told of its rise and progress, or to restate at any length the principles which lie at its foundation.

The great object and aim of the Institution, as laid down in the first trust deed, was and still is—"to Reclaim, Reform, and Evangelise Homeless and Destitute Children," both boys and girls.

In seeking to do this the principles guiding the Committee have always been,—

- 1. To personally investigate the case of each applicant and see that none but homeless and destitute ones are admitted.
- 2. To receive such homeless ones at once, if satisfied of their genuineness, without the delay and expense attending election.
- 3. To receive such cases irrespective of creed, no question whatever being asked on that subject.
- 4. To see that each one thus admitted receives a a simple Elementary Education, sound Religious Instruction, and to all over 10 years of age an Industrial training, to fit them for a life of useful honest labour.

These rules have been consistently adhered to since the foundation of the Institution and still guide its working.

We now proceed to enumerate very briefly the various branches of the Institution, all of which are in active operation, and record the work of the year in connection with them.

The first is

The Central Refuge and Home, Strangeways.

The head-quarters and offices of the Institution, containing 115 beds, where the raw material is first received from the streets, where the initial processes of cleansing, feeding, and educating are carried on, where the first lessons are given in honest labour, which we hope is to have such a reforming influence on character, and where the first impressions are received concerning a higher and better life.

We need not describe the various agencies in operation here to accomplish these results, last year's report did that; suffice it to say that there are four industries—Firewood Making, Shoemaking, Tailoring, Joinering; an active School providing a sound education for all who need it; a Reading and Social Room; a good-sized Swimming Bath; a large Steam Laundry; an attractive Lecture Hall; Sunday and Week-day Services; airy and comfortable Bedrooms with small Hospital, and all the minor appliances needful to the health and happiness of its large family.

The second division of the Institution in point of size and importance is

The Six Homes for Little Orphan Children,

George Street, Cheetham Hill, where little ones of from two to ten years of age are received. The special feature of this branch of the work is the very true family training which is given to the fatherless and motherless children, both boys and girls, who are here provided for, and

which is bearing such happy fruit in the case of those who have been placed out during the last two years in their first situations. During the year 145 children have been under training in this branch of the work; 31 have left during the year, leaving 114 in the Homes at the year's close.

These Homes have been over full throughout the year, and their crowded condition still continues.

The third branch of the Institution is

Family Homes for Working Boys,

of which we have two, situated in Lower Broughton. The members of these Homes are lads who have nearly all passed through the Central Refuge; they are now variously employed at the workshops or warehouses of our city, and from time to time, as soon as their wages are sufficient, they pass out into lodgings provided or sanctioned by the managers of the Homes, and become entirely self-supporting, their places being taken by other lads from the Central Refuge, whose places are in their turn filled by fresh applicants from the streets. Thirty-eight lads have occupied these Homes during the year; seven have left, leaving 31 at the year's close.

Fourth branch,

The Girls' Industrial Home

at Heathfield, Lower Broughton, is the fourth division of the work. Here girls over 10 years of age are received and trained for useful service. The number of girls under training at this branch throughout the year has been 42; 18 have left during the same period, leaving 24 who remain in the Home at the year's close.

The Shelter for Wandering Children,



ITUATED at 14, Major Street, Portland Street, which has been a very active and useful branch of the Institution, as the following figures will testify:—

The number of children brought under its care during the year has been 210, and 52 of these children being found without proper guardians, they

were either received into the Refuge or placed in safe homes in other Institutions, the remainder were returned to their friends after due caution.

The Shelter is open day and night, and 4,984 meals have been supplied, and the beds occupied 1,648 times during the year. The mother-in-charge, Mrs. Craig, will care for any wandering children brought to her.

At this Shelter the operations of the Prevention of Cruelty to Children Society, in connection with the Refuge, have been carried on, particulars of which are given on page 27. The sixth,

The Boys' Rest and Lodging House situated in the midst of the moral darkness and social depravity of Angel Meadow, is, as its name signifies, a better class of lodging house, where boys who either cannot or will not apply at the Refuge, and otherwise would be found in the lowest class of houses which infest this neighbourhood, may have a clean bed, a comfortable bath, and be surrounded by every wholesome and elevating influence, all for 3d. per night.

The Sub-Committee who manage this branch report that the total number of times beds were occupied was 4,554 or an average of 13 boys for every night in the year.

The total cost of this branch of the work to the Central Committee has been £59; about £20 over the usual amount owing to some alteration and cleaning both inside and out.

The seventh branch of our operation is

The Sea-Side Home at Lytham

for weak, pale-faced city children, which has become an important branch of the work, and has proved a great help and blessing to the 175 children who have enjoyed its benefits during the past year. There are now 16 cots, and the Committee desire it to be widely known that this Home is not intended for Refuge cases only, but that any poor ailing child in the district is eligible for admission, and can stay from one to four weeks as the case may require.

Of the 175 children who occupied the Home during the year, 121 were sent from the courts and lanes of our city on the recommendation of visitors, raggedschool teachers, and others, who knew them to be cases needing this help; the balance of 54 were Refuge cases. The Committee hope to benefit a still larger number in the coming year. They would only urge friends who know of weak, needy children, not to keep them back until the midsummer months when the pressure of cases may cause delay.

The eighth is

The Training Ship "Indefatigable," which continues a very useful adjunct to the work of the Refuge as an outlet for such of our boys as desire and are physically fit for a sea-faring life.

Those we have sent during the past year make a total of 148 thus provided for since our work began.

The great majority of these are now serving usefully in various parts of the world. From time to time we hear from them, showing that the care and money spent has not been in vain. A letter just to hand from Galveston, U.S.A., says:—

"Dear Sir,—I suppose you are wondering who I am. Well, you will remember T. B., one of the boys you rescued from the streets in 1875. I went from the Refuge to the Indefatigable, through the kindness of Mrs. Langworthy, and now I desire to help on the good work, and enclose 10s. for the Refuge. I am trying to save what money I can this year, so that I can come home and pass an officer's examination, for Mrs. L. hopes to see me more than a common seaman, and I hope to God I shall not disappoint her.

"I now conclude, wishing success to the Refuge. I hope your life will long be spared to save poor little street arabs.

The ninth division is

Emigration.

Every organization which undertakes the difficult problem of dealing with and providing for destitute children, and children of the pauper and dangerous classes, has felt the need of adopting *Emigration* as one branch of its operations. The reason is not far to seek. Not only are good homes offered in our Colonies, which at once *meets their need* of child population, and relieves the Mother Country of her too-numerous offspring, but what is of far more importance the emigration of such children at once separates them from "surroundings" here which are highly dangerous, and which in too many cases drag them back into the degradation from which they had been rescued.

Hence the Committee of this Institution always felt that when the work of material extension was completed, which, added to all the other work, absorbed their energies for some years, had set their hands and thoughts a little free, that they should give attention to this important question and develop this branch of the work.

A good beginning has been made during the past year.

41 children, healthy, hopeful, and promising, but the majority with dangerous surroundings, have been placed in good homes in Canada, and from them, as from the smaller bands who have gone in previous years, very satisfactory accounts continue to be received.

In addition to the want of time previously named, one difficulty in developing our emigration operations has been the want of a Home in which to train those who are destined for this future, for all who have had experience on the subject in the Colonies agree that it is alike unfair both to the children and to the homes and families who receive them in Canada, as well as injurious to the work, to send out untrained children, while experience has shown us that to take out a few here and there from

our settled family homes is most disturbing and unsettling to those who remain.

Hence it seemed distinctly providential, and another indication of the Good Hand which has guided this work from the beginning, and has met each need at the most suitable time and in the best way, that when the Committee felt called on to do more in emigration, the Home in which to gather and train the young emigrants should be given to them.

This has actually taken place. A large house and grounds adjoining the Orphan Homes, Cheetham Hill, has been given, entirely unasked, by one of the Trustees of the Institution at a cost of £1,000, where we purpose establishing the Training Home which we expect will enable us to rescue from misery here and place in bright Canadian Homes some sixty more children each year than we have ever been able to do before.

We trust in this new development of the work to have the prayerful interest of all our friends.

The tenth and last division is

The Boys' Industrial Brigades

branch of the Institution, which is an honest effort to elevate a difficult class,—boys who are already on the streets or who are drifting that way, and yet who cannot be received into the refuge because they are not strictly "homeless and destitute," they having parents and so-called homes.

There are three Brigades—the Caxton, News, and Messenger, which have given employment to 297 boys during the year. Means are taken to prevent their earnings being squandered by vicious parents. From

these Brigades 45 boys have been provided with regular employment, and all this has been done without any cost whatever to the Institution.

The devotion of the Sub-Committee who conduct these Brigades merits the warmest thanks of the Central Committee.

We have thus briefly sketched the Ten Divisions of the work which, combined, comprise the Institution, and which, we venture to think, present a network of agencies which hardly leaves a class of child-destitution untouched, and which renders the Institution as complete as human skill can devise.

The Year's Work.

We now proceed to give the statistics for the year, showing the total number of children dealt with, the number admitted, and the total number under our care during the twelve months, with the results concerning them.

We began the year 1885 with 307 children under our care in the Central Refuge and its branches. During the year the number of fresh cases which sought our aid were—

Their parental condition was as follows :-

Of this number 289 were found after close investigation to be ineligible either for the Refuge or Homes, and were dealt with as follows:—

70 received temporary help.

15 were sent to other institutions.

204 were declined as entirely unsuitable, many
of them being restored to friends.

289

Many of these *ineligible* cases involved the expenditure, of more time and labour than those that were admitted.

The balance of 172 were found to be entirely destitute, and these were admitted to the benefits of the Institution.

This large work of Rescue, Clothing, Feeding, Educating, Training, and Emigrating has been done at a cost to the public of £5,820. os. 5d., which shows a cost per head on the average number of Inmates throughout the year of £16. 3s. 3d.

Finances.

On the general question of our finances we need to say little; the very full statement of our Treasurer (see pages 34 and 35) renders it unnecessary to do so. As last year, so now, we have to record that the large and varied needs of the work in all its branches have been supplied, leaving a credit balance with which to begin another year.

The Committee thank their liberal subscribers, their earnest collectors, their indefatigable young friends—who, by collecting cards, boxes, and by children's bazaars, have helped the funds much, and several of the clergy and ministers who have given collections or part offertories for the benefit of the Institution; but over all they see in this continued goodness year by year the hand of God inclining the hearts of those to whom He has given *His* silver and gold to offer it willingly.

In view then of the large needs of the future we would "thank God and take courage."

During the year that is past, the legacy under the will of the late Mr. Chas. Leigh Clare, to which we alluded at the close of our last report, has been paid, thus adding about £300 a year to our income.

In Memoriam.

We cannot close without recalling amongst the many others no longer here, two honoured names,—friends of this and of every good work,—who have passed away during the year. The first is the Earl of Shaftesbury: a name that will live in the hearts and homes of the poor wherever the English language is spoken, and whose memory will long be cherished by Christian and philanthropic workers. Two and a half years ago he made a special journey from London at his advanced age to lay the corner stone of our central building, and in the progress of the work in all its branches he continued to

take the deepest interest to the close of his life. The other is our good Bishop, whose face we miss to-day, who was seldom absent from this annual gathering, who has preached in this hall at our simple Sunday evening services, and whose smile and counsel will always be remembered here.

Among the contributions which came at the close of the year, and which helped to remove our financial anxieties, was one for £100 from Mrs. Fraser, accompanied by the words—

"In memory of the dear Bishop."

We have also to record other changes. Mr. and Mrs. Browne, who so long acted as master and matron of our Central Refuge, retired at the close of last year, followed by the good wishes of the Committee. Their places have been taken by Mr. and Mrs. Stephens, of the Home for Crippled Boys, London, for whom the Committee would be peak the sympathy and support of all the helpers and friends of the Institution.

The one vacancy on the Committee is filled by the election of Mr. Henry Charlton, for some years the Treasurer, and for many years a warm supporter of the Institution. The Committee welcome Mr. Charlton among them, and doubt not but that his business experience will be most valuable in the industrial departments of the work.

Nor would they conclude without recording how deep is the debt of gratitude which the whole Institution owes to the many devoted friends, without whose valued aid the work of the year could never have been accomplished; to Dr. A. Boutflower, who has the medical care of the Central Refuge; to Dr. Rodger, who fills the same important office to the Six Orphan Homes, Cheetham Hill; to Dr. Pinder, who watches over the Heathfield Home; to Dr. Mann, the hon. dentist; to Messrs. Farrar and Hall, solicitors; to Mr. A. C. Maberley, Q.C., the standing counsel; and to the large number of ladies who, in various departments of the work and in many ways, are constantly caring for its wants and furthering its interests. They offer most heartily all they can offer—their best thanks.

The Hospitals.

The Salford Royal Hospital and Dispensary has been very helpful throughout the year in receiving—through the recommendation of our hon. medical officer, who is on the staff of the Hospital—several of our sick boys and giving them every care and attention.

The boy who died—and who was a hopeless case from the beginning—was very carefully nursed at this Hospital.

To the authorities of the Clinical Hospital we also owe many thanks for receiving and nursing several of our orphan children.

Conclusion.

A few words now and we close.

Much has been done, but much remains to do. We cannot walk our streets by day, much more by night, we cannot visit among the common lodging houses of our city, we cannot read the statistics of our workhouses, reformatories, and police courts without feeling that this is no time for relaxing efforts, that very much remains to be done, and that those who love their country, those who care for the sufferings of little children, those who

are in sympathy with Him who said,—"It is not the will of your Father in Heaven that one of these little ones should perish," must be up and doing.

Death and drink are very busy rendering children orphans and making homes desolate. The evil of street-hawking by little children still continues. The need of some industrial training for the children of our poorest classes still continues. The influence of vicious parents in preventing the reclamation of their children still continues; every week we are compelled to refuse children because they have a parent, and yet it requires little foresight to tell that these children who might be saved to-day, will in a few years take their vicious parents' place and prey upon society.

Much then remains to do in order to secure the thousands of young lives growing up around us from blight and misery. The snares and temptations surrounding the young were never so numerous as at present; but as "evil men grow worse and worse," so may the lovers of their country, the friends of God, the friends of little children, rise to the emergency with renewed consecration of time, of means, of prayers.

May each reader of these lines do what they can, do all they can in this blessed work of rescue, so with God's own blessing on the work we shall yet see, even from the waifs and strays of our streets, the fulfilment of the promise that

"Our sons may grow up as the young plants, and our daughters be as the polished corners of the temple."

Medical Report.

It gives me great pleasure to be able to state that the health of the inmates of the Boys' Refuge has been well maintained. There has during the past year been an entire absence of all infectious diseases. One boy afflicted with tubercular pneumonia died in the Salford Royal Hospital, and, with the exception of two other serious cases of lung inflammation, which both recovered, there has been hardly any sickness. The boys are all well fed, the clothing satisfactory, the sanitary arrangements and supervision all that could be wished, and the same conditions exist in the Branch Homes.

The Boys' Industrial Brigades.

Another twelve months of happy work amongst the street news-boys of this city has been brought to a close, we believe, to the lasting benefit of many of the dear lads brought under our influence. To God alone be all the glory.

The changes in the management of the Brigades to which we referred in our last report, have, we are glad to say, brought about the financial success we hoped for. We are enabled to close the year with a small balance in hand. The agencies at work in connection with the Brigades, viz., The Library, Reading Room, Savings Bank, Clothing Club, and Drum and Fife Band, still continue their useful help. In addition to these a Bible Class and Night School have been commenced, and are, we trust, doing good service. Other classes are in contemplation, and we look forward to a year of greater activity and increased usefulness and blessing. The visiting of our boys has been vigorously pursued, and it is constantly our pleasure to hear both from the lads and their parents of the help rendered to them through the Brigades. Many poor, hardworking, but respectable families, have been materially assisted by the earnings of the boys, and many parents have been induced to remove their children from a street life altogether.

We commenced the year with 44 boys in the Brigades, and have had 261 applications for admission during the twelve months, which, together, gives a total of 305 boys, dealt with as follows:—

As an indication of the permanent good being done by these Brigades, 25 boys received a suit of clothes during the year for keeping their situations over six months.

We pray that God may still guide us in this His own work, and that more love, and more wisdom, may be vouchsafed to us in the effort to reach the souls of the street-lads of our city.

"The Caxton Brigade,"
