SUMMARY OF ANNUAL MEETING.

The Twentieth Annual Meeting of the MANCHESTER AND SALFORD BOYS AND GIRLS' REFUGES AND CHILDREN'S AID SOCIETY was held in the Mayor's Parlour, Town Hall, Manchester, on Tuesday, May 6th, 1890.

His Worship the Mayor took the Chair at Three o'clock. Among those present were the Rev. Canon Woodhouse, Rev. Benjamin Bell, M.A., Rev. Robert Catterall, Professor Hopkinson, W. J. Crossley, Esq., G. F. Fisher, Esq., J.P., T. L. Farrar, Esq., W. W. Coulborn, Esq., R. Heaton Smith, Esq., Dr. Boutflower, Dr. Rodger, and others.

The Meeting was opened with prayer. Letters of apology for non-attendance from Isaac Hoyle, Esq., M.P., Lees Knowles, Esq., M.P., William Mather, Esq., M.P., Jacob Bright, Esq., M.P., J. W. Maclure, Esq., M.P., Edward Hardcastle, Esq., M.P., C. E. Schwann, Esq., M.P., Rev. Canon Stowell, Rev. Prebendary Macdonald, Rev. Alexander MacLaren, D.D., and others, were read.

The Annual Report was read by the Hon. Secretary, Mr. LEONARD K. SHAW, and the Financial Statement by the Hon. Treasurer, Mr. HENRY CHARLTON.

It was then moved by His Worship the Mayor, seconded by the Rev. Robert Catterall, and supported by Professor Hopkinson, and resolved:—

"That the Report, together with the Financial Statement, now read, be adopted, printed, and circulated under the direction of the Committee."

It was also moved by the Rev. Benjamin Bell, M.A., supported by Dr. Ziemann and Rev. Canon Woodhouse, M.A., and resolved:—

"That the Committee for the ensuing year be Messrs. R. B. Taylor, L. M. Hayes, Henry Charlton, James Boyd, T. R. Ackroyd, Gilbert R. Kirlaw, and Leonard K. Shaw, that the Treasurer be Mr. Henry Charlton, and the Auditors be Messrs. Theodore Jones, Crewdson, and Youatt."

The Meeting closed by the singing of the Doxology.

ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

MANCHESTER AND SALFORD

Boys and Girls' Refuges and Homes

AND

CHILDREN'S AID SOCIETY,

FOR THE YEAR 1889.

IT is with no ordinary feelings that the Committee of the Manchester and Salford Boys and Girls' Refuges and Children's Aid Society meet the friends of the Institution on this its Twentieth Anniversary. Twenty years ago, on the 4th January, 1870, a modest house was quietly opened in Quay Street, Deansgate, and fitted with 25 beds, as a Night Refuge for Homeless Boys. Exactly 20 years afterwards, on the 4th January, 1890, the Bethesda Home for Crippled and Incurable Children (the only home of the kind in the whole district) was opened in George Street, Cheetham Hill, the last addition, and forming the 18th branch, of this same Institution.

The interval between these two periods has seen the development of an Institution perhaps as complete as anything in the kingdom, whose various agencies, both at home and abroad, meet the necessities of almost every class of child destitution and suffering to be found in this district. During the interval the 25 lads first occupying the Night Refuge off Deansgate have grown into a total number of **2,555 Boys and Girls** who have been permanently received, provided for, educated, and trained to some useful industry, while about 2,000 children (the exact number cannot be stated, as in the earlier years no record of such cases was kept) of both sexes have received temporary aid for such periods as their individual cases required.

Those who were first privileged to undertake this work, as well as those who have joined it with earnest and loving devotion as the years have gone on, cannot look back upon the steady but remarkable growth of the work without feelings of deep thankfulness, and they invite the friends of the Institution everywhere to join with them on this its Twentieth Anniversary in raising a loud note of praise to Him whose good hand has been upon the work from the beginning, even until now.

"The little one has become a thousand," and to-day the Institution comprises the following distinct branches of work:—

1. The Central Refuge and Industrial Home, Strangeways, the headquarters to which all applicants come and where Industrial Training is carried on.
2. Home for Working Boys and Lads' Institute, Great Ducie Street, Strangeways (new building).

3. Brigade Boys' Home, where dwell the Caxton, Shoeblack, and Parcel Brigades (new building).
 4. The Boys' Emigration Training Home, Gt. Ducie-street, Strangeways (new building).
 5. The Homes for Little Orphan Children (Boys and Girls), Cheetham Hill—six in number.
 6. The Girls' Emigration Training Home, "Rosen Hallas," Cheetham Hill.
 7. The Cottage, "Rosen Hallas," for Convalescent Children, Cheetham Hill.
 8. "Bethesda" Home for Crippled and Incurable Children, Cheetham Hill.
 9. The Girls' Industrial Home, Heathfield, Lower Broughton.
 10. The Open-all-Night Shelter for little wanderers, 8, Chatham-street, Piccadilly, City.
 11. The Prevention of Cruelty to Children Society, 8, Chatham-street, Piccadilly, City.
 12. The Sea-side Home for weak and sickly children, Lytham.
 13. The Day Nursery, Carruthers-street, Ancoats.
 14. The Training Ship, "Indefatigable," New Ferry, Birkenhead (In connection with).
 15. The Canadian Branch Home, Belleville, Ontario, Canada West (In connection with).
 16. The Out-door Industrial Brigade, Major-street.
 17. Summer Camp for Poor City Boys, Ansdell, Lytham.

While in addition to these, the number of cases investigated by the Prevention of Cruelty to Children Branch was **732**;

The number of Boys working in the City Messenger Brigade was **120**;

The number of attendances at the Day Nursery was **2,398**;

And the number of discharged prisoners who accepted the invitation given at the Gate each morning, and came to our Mission Room, was **10,864**.

Before proceeding to give a very brief outline of the work in some of the leading branches, it will be interesting and instructive if we give particulars as to the condition of the applicants who applied for help, and also of those whose cases proved on investigation to be worthy of admission.

The 161 children who were permanently admitted, added to the 341 in the Homes when the year began, give a total of 502 under our care and training during 1889.

(These figures, of course, do not include the children dealt with by the Prevention of Cruelty to Children Branch, the City Messenger Brigade, the Day Nursery, and the Prison-Gate Mission.)

We need hardly repeat that the great principles which lie at the foundation of the Institution, and which are incorporated in the Trust Deed, and which the Committee cherish more than ever—still guide them in their conduct of the Institution.

1st. To receive only homeless and destitute children, for whom there is no other means of support.

2nd. To receive such, if genuine, at once, without the delay and expense of election, and irrespective of creed.

3rd. To give to each one thus admitted a sound mental, religious, and industrial training, and so fit them for a life of honest labour.

The Central Refuge, Strangeways,

continues the headquarters of the work, and has been, during the past year, if possible, more than ever a scene of busy active enterprise,—each of the four industries carried on there have been in full employment.

The increased number of boys, however, which the transfer of the Shoeblack Brigade, the Caxton Brigade, and a portion of the situation leads to the new building will enable the Central Refuge to receive, and thus extend the usefulness of the charity, involves the providing of a new industry, and this the Committee have now under anxious consideration. Whether it be printing or baking, both of which have special suitability for us, or whatever it may be, it will mean an extra expenditure for plant, &c., of probably £500. May we commend this need to some of our wealthy friends, who may rely from the experience of the past that the Committee will not begin an industry unless they see their way to carry it on actively and efficiently. Our

four workshops give employment to 54 boys, many of whom are regularly apprenticed to their various trades, and under the direction of thoroughly efficient foremen are turning out work of which they need not be ashamed.

During the year the tailors' shop has been enlarged as part of the extension now about completed; another important addition has also taken place by the provision of a well-appointed Infirmary at the further end of the building, which, up to the present year, this large and crowded Institution has never had. It bears the appropriate title of

The Andrew Boutflower Infirmary,

to perpetuate the name of one who has been a great benefactor to the Institution since its foundation, by the unwearied attention he has given, without fee or reward, to the health of the inmates.

The Working Lads' Home and Institute.

This forms the largest portion of the new building, fronting the Refuge, Great Ducie-street, Strangeways, and next claims a word. Owing to the unfortunate delay of last year, for which the Committee were not responsible, these buildings, instead of being occupied last autumn, have only been entered on within the last few days. The two homes for Working Boys in Broughton are now therefore closed, two rents are thus saved, and the great benefit of bringing the lads in touch with the healthy active influence of headquarters is secured.

As the name indicates, the object of this branch is twofold—a suitable *Home* for those elder working lads who still dwell with us; and an *Institute* both for them, and also for those elder lads and young men whom the parent Refuge was the means of rescuing years ago, but who had passed from under our immediate influence into lodgings of various kinds. The Committee look forward to the Institute becoming a centre where the elder ones, both past and present, will be surrounded by every healthy and holy influence, where they trust many a doubtful one will receive guidance, and tried and tempted ones buckle on the divine armour which will enable them to resist the temptations of a great city.

It is fitted up with Class Rooms, Reading Room, Library, Baths, and a well-appointed Gymnasium.

It will thus continue the education begun in the adjoining Refuge, and from it the Temperance and Evangelistic work hitherto carried on by a band of earnest workers, chiefly young men who have themselves been Refuge Lads, will be still further developed. The whole effect of this will, we trust, be to retain permanently a larger number of the elder lads under our influence until their character is properly formed, and their prospects in life fairly assured; for if it has been needful to rescue the children in early life, it is if possible of more importance to carry on the work until its influence for good has become effectual, and its results as far as possible permanent.


The Committee earnestly commend this enterprise, which, if not entirely new, now enters upon a renewed stage, under more favourable auspices than before, to the prayerful sympathies of all their friends.

Industrial Brigade Boys' Home and Emigration Training Home.

Adjoining the Working Lads' Home and Institute are the Brigade Boys' Home and the Emigration Training Home. Owing to the same unfortunate delay before mentioned, these two Homes, instead of being in full operation for the last six months, are only being occupied this week. Of course the work indicated by the name of each Home has been done, but it has been done under difficult conditions. In the first-named Home there dwells the Shoebblack Brigade, the City Parcel Brigade, now becoming so useful, and the Caxton Brigade, which distributes healthy literature. The removal of these from the Central Refuge will not only enable the Refuge to provide for an increased number of destitute boys, but will also remove a somewhat disturbing element, inseparable from street employment, from immediate contact with those who are following the various permanent trades at the Refuge, at the same time enabling these Brigade Boys meanwhile to be more favourably dealt with under separate management. *The Emigration Training Home* will enable us to give a better preparation to those boys intended for Canadian life than we have hitherto been enabled to do.

The Rosen Hallas Training Home

at Cheetham Hill still continues the Emigration Training Home for Girls. This home has been gradually filling up during the spring, and is now quite full, and from it on the morrow will go forth a party of some 30 girls to good farm homes in Canada, which have been carefully

selected, and which are now awaiting them. The surroundings of this band in this country were in nearly every case undesirable, but we look forward full of hope to their future lives in the new land.

The Orphan Homes, Cheetham Hill.

These homes, six in number, for little fatherless and motherless children (including the adjoining home Rosen Hallas), have continued very full throughout the year. 89 fresh cases have been admitted, making with the 127 in the homes on the 1st January, 1889, a total number of 216 under support and training during the twelve months.

The Committee are more than ever convinced that the true family life carried out here is the best way of training little children, and their opinion is confirmed by the results obtained by the after life of those who have thus been brought up.

Adjoining these homes is

The Cottage

for Convalescent Children, in Rosen Hallas grounds, the usefulness of which has been increasingly manifest during the past year.


The Bethesda Home

for Crippled and Incurable Children. This "House of Mercy," so long desired, has become an accomplished fact since our last annual gathering. When the Committee realised how few homes there were in existence for these children, who, in addition to their poverty, had the added affliction of maimed, crippled, or incurable

bodies, they longed to brighten the lives of those whose lot is so sad. They desired to provide a combined home and hospital, where, under the best possible conditions, both within and without, these little suffering ones could be dealt with, and their afflicted bodies, if not in every case cured, should at least be so far restored as to reduce the present heavy burden of life and afford some hope of future usefulness.

Last year we expressed the desire and hope that the Home would be found attractive in every way for its suffering family, and in all respects what those who love poor afflicted children would desire it to be. In the Home and grounds of Bethesda, at George Street, Cheetham Hill, the Committee feel that these hopes and desires have been to a large extent realised; they thank God that this is so. And now we want to tell these afflicted ones, as well as all who come under our care, of the Great Healer, that He may lay His hand upon them, and so a new joy and blessing may brighten their suffering lives. The Home is intended to provide for about 40 sufferers. Already it has received about half that number, and under the care of our excellent matron, assisted by two junior nurses, is accomplishing the work for which it was intended.

We cannot pass from this interesting branch without alluding to one, without whose valued aid the work could not be carried on—Dr. Rodger has undertaken, in addition to all the work devolving upon him as Hon. Medical Officer to the Orphan Homes, the heavy extra responsibility of caring medically for Bethesda. We know the heavy tax this is upon his time and strength, but the whole service is so cheerfully

and lovingly rendered that he has won the hearts of the children, and laid the Committee under lasting obligation.

This Home will of necessity be rather more costly than any other branch of our work. The Committee, therefore, invited those to whom God had given means, and who so desired to use it, to endow cots or beds for the suffering ones, and fixed a moderate sum—£400—as the cost of endowment. We are thankful to record that so far *seven* friends have contributed this amount. The cots bear the names of “The Henry and Emily,” “The Helen Cot,” “The Bishop Fraser,” “The Willie Galloway,” “The Daniel Procter,” “The Chadwick Cot,” and “The J. A. Finney Cot.” It is our desire and hope that at least one-half of the beds in this Home may be so provided for, and as the Home will hold 40, there is plenty of room for those who have the desire so to spend a portion of the wealth which God has given them.

The Girls' Industrial Home, Heathfield,

Lower Broughton, has throughout the year continued a useful branch of our Institution, training its happy family of girls as domestic servants, for which there has been a constant demand.

The Sea-side Home at Lytham,

for weak and pale-faced city children, has continued very full, and no less than 272 poor children have spent on an average from a fortnight to three weeks under the motherly care of our matron, and it has been a great joy

to see these pale-faced ones return as a rule with ruddy cheeks. Of this total number 94 were boys and 178 girls, and no less than 239 were cases not connected with the Institution, but poor children from the courts and alleys of our city.

The Open-all-Night Shelter

for little wanderers, generally known as "*The Open Door*," has done a large work throughout the year in very confined and unsuitable premises. 210 children have slept under the roof; the number of beds occupied, 1,380; and the number of meals provided, 5,599. The fact that of the 210 children received no less than 78 were brought in by the police between the hours of 10 p.m. and 5 a.m. abundantly proves the need of this agency.

These premises are also the headquarters of

The Prevention of Cruelty to Children Branch

of our operations, which during the past year has been very active. It has dealt with and investigated the cases of 732 children. Under the New Bill for the better Prevention of Cruelty to Children, this branch of our work is being increasingly needed.

As a rule its course is to caution the parents in the hope that it may lead to the better treatment of the children, where this fails prosecution has to be resorted to, and there were 36 parents prosecuted and punished during the year, whose cruelty and neglect was so gross as to leave the Society no option.

Better premises and a larger shelter has become a necessity. In this connection the Committee desire to

thank the Trustees of the late Daniel Procter for a contribution in order to accomplish this most desirable object.

We have now two officers constantly engaged in this special work, and we invite all who know of child cruelty, suffering, or criminal neglect to send information to the shelter.

Time and space only permit us to name the remaining branches.

The Day Nursery,

which had a total number of 2,398 attendances of children, where the poor mothers paid in fees £18. 8s. 9d.

The Outdoor Industrial Brigade,

which is entirely self-supporting, gave employment to 120 boys. The lads have delivered 51,017 messages, and during the winter months a Bible class is held every week, which is quite voluntary, and the average attendance has been 30. During the year 43 boys have obtained through this agency good permanent situations.

The Caxton Brigade,

In which an average daily number of 11 boys were employed throughout the year. They sold 92,992 magazines and books, and their sales amounted to £503. 12s. 9d.

The Camp for Poor City Boys,

which gave last year a week's holiday under canvas, at Ansdell, near Lytham, to 503 poor lads recommended by ragged schools, and taken from the poorest districts of our city.


The Emigration Branch.

By means of this we have placed in good homes in Canada during the past year 96 children—71 boys and 25 girls, making a total of 360 emigrated during the past five years.

Prison-Gate Mission.

We have received at our Mission Room a total number of 10,864 discharged prisoners—7,035 men and boys and 3,829 women and girls, out of which 3,942 temperance pledges have been taken, and by this means a considerable number of girls have been placed in Rescue Homes, restored to friends, helped into situations after temporary training, and in many ways aided to lead a better life. To Miss Slater, Mrs. Prescott, Mr. Eadson, Mr. Pownall, and other devoted fellow-labourers, who are found each morning at the prison gate, prayerfully and lovingly seeking to win the poor discharged prisoner to a better life, our heartfelt thanks are due.

In each of these branches we could give most interesting details did our time allow.

COST.

The total cost of this large work of rescue, clothing, feeding, training, and emigrating has been **£10,343. 0s. 11d.**, of which £7,760. 1s. 5d. has been contributed by the public, £564. 3s. 8d. interest from investments, and the balance **£2,018. 15s. 10d.** has been provided by the earnings of the boys and girls.

FINANCES.

One or two words about money must suffice. For details on this subject we must refer our readers to the Financial Statement which follows this Report. It is a document full of interest, and shows that although our annual expenditure for general purposes now amounts to £10,000 per annum, that this amount has substantially been received, the deficiency at the year's close being only £92. 7s. 7d.

This is cause for much thankfulness, especially when it is remembered that there has been a large Extension Fund in progress, which always affects general income.

That Building or Extension Fund now amounts to £18,068. 12s. 11d. (actually received); £3,500 promised, but not yet received.

The total cost of the new buildings and additions, &c. at Strangeways, together with the cost of the Home for Crippled and Incurable Children at Cheetham Hill, is estimated at £23,500.

Thus a balance of about £2,000 is still wanted. We trust those friends who have not yet contributed to this Fund, will give us the joy of being able to declare, when our new buildings are opened, *that they are free from all debt.*

REVIEW.

We cannot close this 20th Annual Report without casting a backward glance over the period covered by the lifetime of this Institution. The history of the past 20 years is one full of effort, both national and voluntary, for the relief of neglected and suffering children, and of undertakings to ameliorate the unfortunate condition of their lives.

The period under review began with the passing of the Elementary Education Act, a measure which, with its various amendments during succeeding years and especially its compulsory clauses, we hold to be one of the most important ever inscribed in the statute book, and we make bold to say one of the greatest blessings ever conferred upon the poor of this country. It asserts in unmistakeable fashion that the well being of the child must no longer be left to the will or caprice of the parent, and that parental rights and control have their limits, and that those limits the law of the land decides.

We thank the framers of this Act for the assertion of this great principle, which the country has unanimously endorsed, a principle which only needs carrying out in other directions to prove of inestimable benefit to the rising generation of this country.

The same period has seen the development of the Industrial Schools Act, which had been passed a few years previously, an Act, which fully and heartily worked, provides for the removal from low and dangerous surroundings which would make for their degradation multitudes of young and hopeful lives. This Act, which is being worked every day to the incalculable benefit of the country, is worthy of still further development, of which the clauses establishing Day Industrial Schools is an illustration.

It will be remembered that during this same period various amendments were introduced into the previous

Factory and Workshops Act, and in 1878 all these measures were consolidated, and various restrictions and regulations as to the hours of child and female labour were enacted, which, we venture to think, have placed the employment of children, so far as workshops and general in-door labour are concerned, in a fairly satisfactory position.

The canal boat, gipsy, and show children have, during this period, not been forgotten, though something remains yet to be done in their behalf; but through the energy of our friend, George Smith, of Coalville, the Canal Boat Act and other measures were passed, whereby through registration and other means the condition of this shifting class of children have been to some extent ameliorated.

Another measure which has been passed during the second decade of the lifetime of our Institution, commonly called "The First Offenders Act," we have welcomed and have been thankful for. We have received several such cases from our Police Courts. It has been the means, and we believe in the future it may be more so, of rescuing many a youthful offender from the acquaintance of the gaol, and probably a future life of crime.

Another feature of the period we are dealing with may not be passed over, though it can only be lightly touched upon. We mean the various Acts and voluntary associations of manifold kinds for the care and protection of our exposed and tempted girls, and if we name one measure, "The Industrial Schools Amendment Act," it is that we may render a passing tribute to one whose name must ever be associated with the initiation of these various efforts. The girls of our land owe a debt of gratitude to Miss Ellice Hopkins which can never be repaid by them, but which the rescue and protection of thousands of our girls from lives of degradation and shame, and the number of associations to promote these blessed objects which owe their origin to

her indomitable energy, must be an untold joy and reward to her.

Towards the close of the first decade of which we are speaking, a pamphlet was issued from this Institution, entitled "Street Arabism: its cause and cure," which had much to do with the formation of a healthy public opinion respecting the evils of Street Hawking and its dangers, physical and moral, to our poorest children. The City and County Bench of Magistrates, both of Manchester and Salford, the Board of Guardians, and other public bodies, met to consider its statements, which were the result of the personal investigation of the Committee of this Institution. Attention was also called to its statements and facts by the public press. All these resulted in a movement which gathered force every month, and when in 1881 the Corporation was passing a bill through Parliament, a large and enthusiastic Meeting in the Town Hall, followed by similar Meetings in the Cheetham, Ardwick, Chorlton, and other Town Halls, decided by overwhelming majorities that some limits must be put to the wholesale sacrifice of child health, life, and morals, which this pernicious practice encouraged, and demanded that clauses to limit the employment of young children on the streets should be inserted in the bill. In 1882 this bill was passed. The well-known street children clauses, drawn up with much care, were it is true somewhat mutilated, but the righteousness of these clauses were never seriously questioned, and the one point of importance, the prohibition of children under 10 years of age from street hawking or employment, which the Select Committee to whom the bill was referred then refused, Parliament has since granted in the recent Act for the better Prevention of Cruelty to Children, which Act we are now, by means of our Prevention of Cruelty to Children Branch, actively engaged in putting into force.

Street hawking for children of 10 to 14 years of age, even within defined hours, is still allowed, but is a great evil and a fruitful source of juvenile vagrancy, vice, and crime, and we shall still cherish the hope that the force of philanthropic public opinion will remedy this; meanwhile we rejoice that the little half-clothed, half-fed, and shivering bodies are no longer by law allowed to toil at all hours in our public streets.

This brief review is full of encouragement, and now, as we stand upon the threshold of further effort and further development, we look forward to the future full of hope.

We, as well as all other kindred Institutions labouring for the rescue and salvation of young lives, are engaged in work on which God has put a blessing. It is not His will that one of these young lives growing up around us should perish.

Of all the questions which claim and press their claims upon English men and women to-day none, we believe, can compare in importance with that of the children; the millions of Britain's children whose characters are now forming for weal or for woe. If we rise to the importance of this question, and amid all the efforts that sanctified Christian energy are putting forth to relieve and elevate suffering humanity we give it the place which its supreme importance demands, then the seed we now sow shall bear a glorious harvest, and the day is coming when they that have sown and they that reap shall rejoice together.


The Annual Sale of Work was this last year specially successful, and to those ladies who by their hearty coöperation and liberal gifts made it so, we offer our heartfelt thanks.

MEDICAL REPORT.

The general health of the boys during the past twelve months has been most satisfactory. Notwithstanding the almost certain visitation of the influenza epidemic which might have been predicted, I believe not a single case occurred here. One boy has died from consumption at the Lytham Hospital, and we have had two cases of rheumatic fever and two of pneumonia, which practically exhausts our list of severe sickness.

From a medical point of view, the opening of the new Infirmary and the concentration of the Homes in the new Buildings, will add much to the general health of the inmates.

The food, clothing, and sanitary arrangements are excellent.

FORM OF LEGACY.
