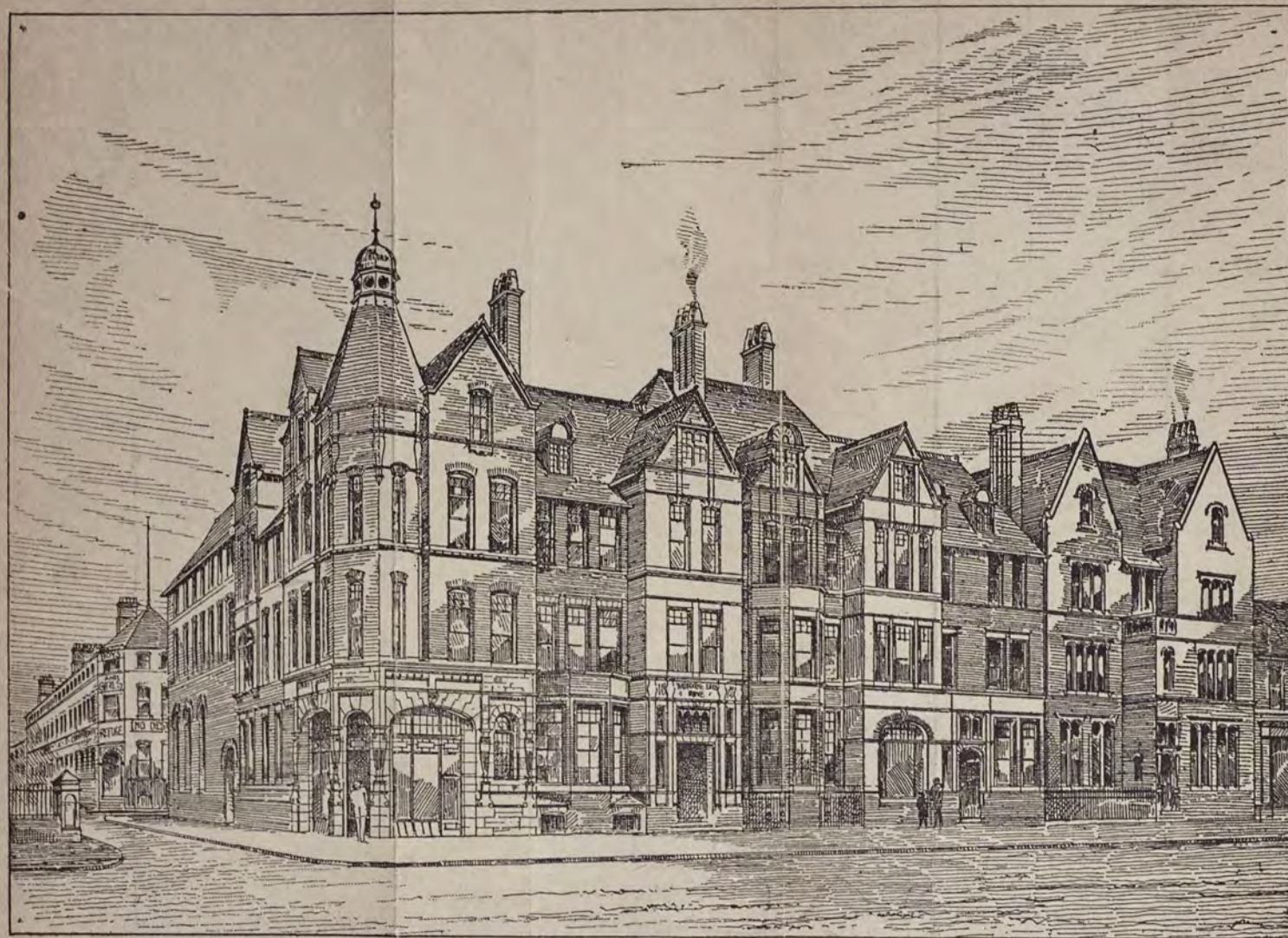

SUMMARY OF ANNUAL MEETING.

The Twenty-first Annual Meeting of the MANCHESTER AND SALFORD BOYS AND GIRLS' REFUGES, AND CHILDREN'S AID SOCIETY, was held in the Town Hall, Manchester, on Monday, April 13th, 1891.

His Worship the Mayor (Alderman Mark) took the Chair at 2-30 o'clock. Amongst those present were the Rev. Canon Woodhouse, Rev. Prebendary Macdonald, Rev. Dr. Goodrich, The Chief Constable of Manchester, Herbert Philips, Esq., J.P., W. J. Crossley, Esq., F. W. Crossley, Esq., J.P., Dr. Meacham, Thos. Rymer, Esq., T. L. Farrar, Esq., Chas. Lister, Esq., J.P., R. Heaton Smith, Esq., and others.

The Meeting was opened with prayer. Letters of apology for non-attendance, from The Bishop of Manchester, Wm Mather, Esq., M.P., Samuel Smith, Esq., M.P., Rt. Hon. A. J. Balfour, M.P., Jacob Bright, Esq., M.P., Oliver Heywood, Esq., J.P., Sir Wm. Cunliffe Brooks, Principal Ward, Henry Lee, Esq., J.P., and others were read.

The Annual Report was read by the Hon. Secretary, Mr. Leonard K. Shaw, and the Financial Statement by the Hon. Treasurer, Mr. Henry Charlton.

It was then moved by His Worship the Mayor, seconded by Herbert Philips, Esq., J.P., and supported by Rev. Dr. Goodrich, and resolved:—

"That the Report together with the Financial Statement, now read, be adopted, printed, and circulated, under the direction of the Committee."

It was also moved by W. J. Crossley, Esq., seconded by Chas. Lister, Esq., J.P., and resolved:—

"That the Committee for the ensuing year be, Messrs. W. J. Crossley, John Thomson, J. C. Stuart, R. B. Taylor, L. M. Hayes, James Boyd, T. R. Ackroyd, Gilbert R. Kirlaw, and Leonard K. Shaw. That the Treasurer be Mr. Henry Charlton, and the Auditors be Messrs. Theodore Jones, Crewdson, and Youatt."

The Meeting closed by the singing of the Doxology.

A Public Meeting in support of the Institution was held in the evening of the same day in the Central Hall, Oldham Street. W. J. Crossley, Esq., presided, and commended the Institution to the support of the community. Dr. Barnardo, of London, and Mr. Leonard K. Shaw, delivered short speeches on the work of the Institution. The proceedings were interspersed with selections of music and singing by the Refuge Handbell Ringers, and the "Tiny Choir," from the Orphan Homes.

FOR THE YEAR 1890.

THE year which closed with the 31st December, 1890, was in many respects an eventful one in the history of the Institution, of which Strangeways is the centre. It saw the majority reached of a work which beginning very quietly, has developed into an Institution which if not as large is perhaps as complete as anything in the kingdom, whose various agencies both at home and abroad meet the need of almost every class of child destitution and suffering existing in our midst.

It saw the completion of an Extension Scheme, which had been for the previous two years in progress, by the opening and occupation both at Strangeways and Cheet-ham Hill, of new buildings which the Committee

venture to think are not unworthy of one of Manchester's great thoroughfares, and are pleasant objects for the eye to rest upon, not only because of the work of mercy carried on within.

It saw the establishment of a new industry, that of Letterpress Printing, which bids fair to become as successful as any of those already in active operation.

It saw a larger number of children rescued from lives of sorrow, suffering, and grave moral danger, than in any previous year.

It witnessed at the year's close, notwithstanding these extended operations, a clean balance sheet, shewing that our needs had all been met, and enabling us to face the enlarged operations and as a consequence the increased needs of another year, if without a handsome credit balance, at least without debt.

For all this and more which cannot be expressed, the Committee invite the friends of the Institution everywhere to join with them in raising one loud note of praise to "The Father of the Fatherless," whose good and gracious Hand has been so manifest from the beginning even until now.

The Institution now comprises the following distinct branches. We find it important to name these for the sake of new friends constantly arising as well as old ones, who otherwise do not realise the extent of the work:—

1. The Central Refuge, Strangeways, the headquarters to which all applicants come, and where Industrial Training is carried on.
2. Home for Working Boys and Lads' Institute, Great Ducie street, Strangeways, filled with elder work-

ing lads, who have passed through the Refuge.

3. Brigade Boys' Home, where dwell the Caxton, and Shoeblack Brigades.
4. The Boys' Emigration Training Home, Gt. Ducie-street, Strangeways.
5. The Homes for Little Orphan Children (Boys and Girls), George-st., Cheetham Hill—six in number.
6. The Girls' Emigration Training Home, "Rosen Hallas," Cheetham Hill.
7. The Cottage, "Rosen Hallas," for Convalescent Children, Cheetham Hill.
- 8 "Bethesda" Home for Crippled and Incurable Children, George-street, Cheetham Hill.
9. The Girls' Industrial Home, Heathfield, Lower Broughton.
10. The Open-all-Night Shelter for little wanderers, 1, Chatham-street, Piccadilly, City.
11. The Sea-side Home for weak and sickly children, Lytham.
12. The Day Nursery, Carruthers-street, Ancoats.
13. Summer Camp for Poor City Boys, Ansdell, Lytham.
14. The Prevention of Cruelty to Children Society, Offices, 1, Chatham-street, Piccadilly, City.
15. The Out-door Industrial Brigade, Chatham-street, Piccadilly.
16. Prison-gate Mission, Gt. Ducie-street, Strangeways.
17. The Training Ship, "Indefatigable," New Ferry, Birkenhead (in connection with).
18. The Canadian Branch Home, Belleville, Ontario Canada West (in connection with)

By means of these various branches (excepting the

Prevention of Cruelty to Children branch, the Day Nursery, the City Messenger and Parcel Brigades, and the Prison Gate Mission, which we enumerate separately because we do not deal with them domestically—they do not dwell under our roofs), the Institution has dealt with a total number of **1641** children in various degrees of need and suffering during the past year, as follows:—

While in addition to these the number of cases investigated and children protected by the Prevention of Cruelty to Children Branch, was **740**;

The number of boys working in the Messenger and Parcel Brigade was **150**;

The number of attendances at the Day Nursery was **2,928**;

The number of discharged prisoners who accepted the invitation given each morning at the *Gate*, and came to the Mission Room, was **10,044**;

Leaving these large figures shewing the total number which were either entirely provided for or helped, throughout the work during the year, we come now to the new cases *which sought our aid*, and with those actually admitted to the Institution during the same period.

The number and condition of the *fresh applicants*, and of those *actually admitted* during the past year, are as follows:—The figures are full of interest, as throwing considerable light on the state of the lowest class of the population among whom we are living.

We deal first with the applicants.

Adding these 320 children thus permanently admitted to the 326 in the Refuge and Homes when the year began, it gives a total of **646** under permanent care and training during the year 1890.

(These figures, of course, do not include the children dealt with by the Prevention of Cruelty to Children Branch, the City Messenger Brigade, the Day Nursery, and the Prison Gate Mission, which we have dealt with separately on pages 19 and 20, as they do not dwell under our roofs).

We have on former occasions described in more or less of detail the work carried on at the various branches and divisions. It will only be necessary therefore, on the present occasion, in briefly alluding to each, to say a word on any new or special feature which the year's work has called into prominence.

The Central Refuge, Strangeways, which continues the head quarters, has pursued its busy

active life throughout the year. No day passes without some case of sorrow, suffering, or need, seeking its ever ready aid, while on some nights its waiting rooms are full. The industries carried on here, Joining, Shoemaking, Tailoring, Printing, and Firewood making, and which give employment to 65 of our boys have been actively employed throughout the year, and after paying the boys and foremen's wages and bearing their share of working expenses, have added £267 1/- as net profit to the funds of the Institution.

Our last report spoke of the need of a new industry. This has been established during the past year, as part of the extension scheme. The Committee after very anxious consideration decided that Letterpress Printing would be most suitable. The shop commenced work in September under the care of a steady, active foreman.

It already employs *eight* boys, and whether we look at the quality or the quantity of the work which is being turned out, it bids fair to become as prosperous as any of the trades already in operation. Since this year began it has produced our monthly magazine, *The Christian Worker*. It is now engaged on *this 21st Annual Report*, a very complicated and difficult job on which some of the best shops in the trade have been engaged, but the Committee have every confidence that when finished it will not be behind any of its predecessors.

In asking, *as we do*, the public to support our various industries we do not promise to undersell the trade, but we do promise a good article at a moderate price.

The Working Lads' Home and Institute as its name implies, provides for our elder youths and

young workmen a safe and comfortable home, combined with the educational advantages of an institute, and linked with these by means of its well appointed Gymnasium and Game Room, &c., are some of the features of a young workmen's club.

Classes for Arithmetic, Shorthand, Singing, Geometry, and Bible Class have been conducted during the winter months and several very creditable papers on various social, scientific and religious subjects, shewing both thought and culture, have been read at these meetings by lads who owe all they are to the adjoining Refuge.

The New Mission Hall

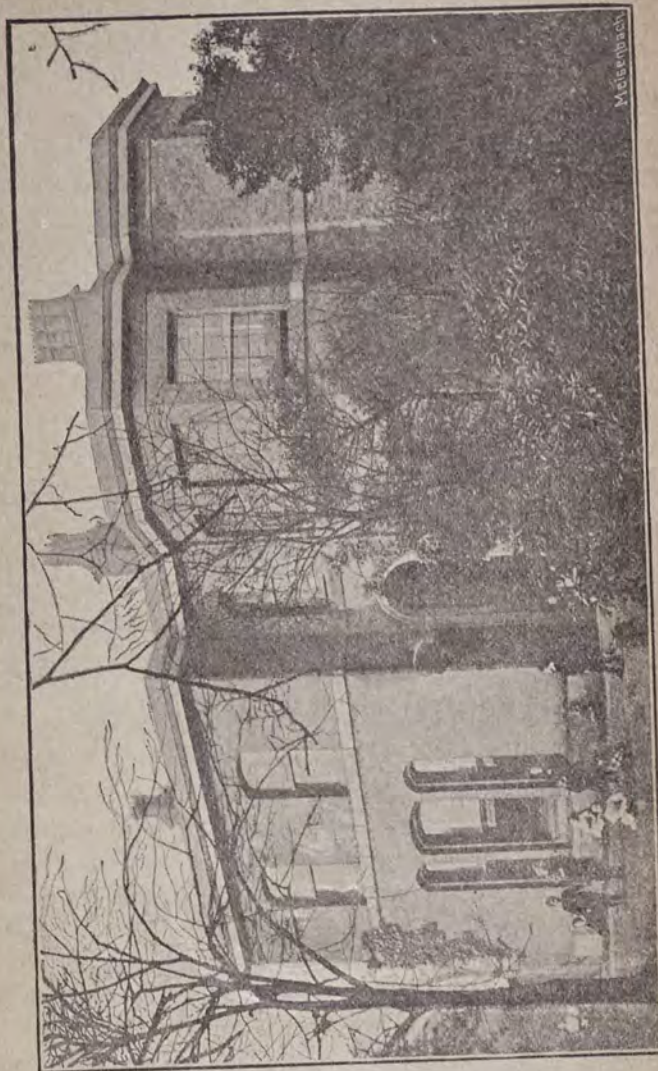
which forms part of this building is a great boon and has been much used throughout the year, not only by the Prison Gate Mission, of which we shall speak presently, but also by the Christian young men connected with the Institute, who hold weekly a large children's service, and also have temperance and evangelistic meetings for Lodging House men and others.

The Brigade Boys' Home.

Adjoining the Institute is this Home where dwell the boys of the Shoeblack Brigade, and also the Caxton or Book Brigade, who day by day disseminate pure literature in the homes of the people. The handsome **Book Saloon** in front finds its appropriate home here, and as it becomes more known will we doubt not be more widely used.

The Emigration Training Home (for boys).

Though only occupied in the closing months of the

better, and they are only amazed that the country generally, and especially Manchester, does not see more clearly the importance of it.

With a population already congested, growing at the rate of nearly half a million every year, how is it possible to find employment, food, and clothing for them all? Well might Lord Derby, not an enthusiast on any subject, say recently, after careful examination of the question,

"We are, we must be an emigrating country, with our small area and with our growing population we have no choice in the matter, and I do not hesitate to say that to dispose of the growing swarms of the poorest class is not a matter of humanity only, but one also of public safety."

But alas, some of our authorities at home are blind to this. A very thoughtful member of Parliament who has given much attention to social and educational questions, Samuel Smith, M.P. for Flintshire, and who has himself been to the Colonies and investigated the subject there, on a recent public occasion said,

"Though the emigration policy had been before the public for twenty years, and had worked with most perfect success; and though the testimony was unanimous that it was the most effective means of saving destitute children that could be discovered, yet they were still persisting in this country in bringing up masses of children under the poor-law authorities in the most vicious and wasteful manner. Fifty thousand children were herded together in workhouse schools throughout the country and many thousands more were in industrial schools, and were costing the country annually for their maintenance a large sum of money. The children were kept in these institutions for five years at the expense of the community, and were at the end of that time turned out into the large cities as domestic servants or placed as apprentices and put in employment in various ways, and a great proportion of them were drawn back again into the Slough of Despond from which they had originally been taken. These facts had been several times brought before Parliament, and had been laid before successive Presidents of the Local Government Board, and had been acknowledged to be perfectly true. Mr. Ritchie, the present President, had acquiesced in the truth of all that he (Mr. Smith) had said, and had made certain concessions in the matter of regulations with a view to making it easier for poor-law guardians to emigrate children. But he (the speaker) was sorry to say that, practically owing to the amount of red tape that surrounded all official departments, matters remained just as they had been for years past. Only a few hundreds of children had been emigrated by the poor-law authorities."

It is because the views of the Committee of this Institution are in accord with those distinguished men that they have given for some years now juvenile emigration of destitute children a place in their year's work. We do so from motives of economy, as well as of pure philanthropy: for a single payment of £10 a boy or girl can be well outfitted, carried to Canada, placed on a carefully selected farm home there, and periodically visited, in fact provided for for life.

Then we say, is it not marvellous, nay is it not shameful that with this fact before us, thousands of children should be costing the country some £15 a year say for an average of five years, or a total of £75 in our pauper schools, and many of them turning out badly at the end.

We ask with confidence for more liberal support for this branch of our work. We need £900 for our emigration work this year, so far we have only received £226.

Orphan Homes, Cheetham Hill.

(For Fatherless and Motherless Children.)

next claim a word. 44 fresh cases were admitted to this branch during the year, which added to the 113 in the Home on 1st January gives a total of 157 under support and training at this branch during the 12 months. Each home has continued over full all through the year, notwithstanding that 39 of the elder ones have been placed out and permanently provided for during that period.

There has been abundant token of God's blessing on this branch of the work, though we are not able to point to the same remarkable immunity from sickness which marked former years. This latter fact has brought into greater prominence the usefulness of

The Cottage

for Convalescent Children, which adjoins these Homes; it has been well occupied throughout the year, and a great help to this large branch of the work, where the frequency of children's complaints render separate nursing or isolation a necessity. Close to the Orphan Homes stands the

Bethesda Home

for Crippled and Incurable Children. Its object is declared on the forms of application to be:—

"To provide for crippled, maimed, paralysed, and generally incurable poor children.

Those who have friends able to provide for them proper care, nourishment, and medical attendance are NOT eligible; nor are those whose cases are suitable for admission to the ordinary Hospitals of the district."

Our recent extension scheme has given us this beautiful Home, which is universally acknowledged to have supplied a long felt need. Standing in its own ground on the edge of Broughton Park, its well kept grassy lawn and asphalted avenues without, and its varied appliances for the comfort, relief, and restoration of its suffering family within, proclaim it a true "House of Mercy," eminently adapted to accomplish its beneficent design. 27 little sufferers were admitted during the year, of which 3 died after sharing for many months the skilful and loving care of the excellent matron and nurses. The Home has accommodation for 40 inmates, and the Committee are glad to report that there are now *nine* cots endowed, bearing the names of "The Henry and Emily," (a thank offering for a silver wedding), "The Helen Cot," "The Bishop Fraser Cot," "The Willie Galloway,"

"The High Bank Cot," "The Daniel Procter," "The J. A. Finney Cot," "In Memoriam of J. and A. Crompton," "Grannie's Cot," while we have intimation of two others as coming, so there is ample room left for those who desire thus to consecrate a portion of the wealth which God has given them.

In fixing a moderate sum—£400—as the cost of endowment, the Committee felt that they were acting wisely, there being many families who would thus desire to link the name of some dear one either living or passed away, with the relief of the most suffering of all God's suffering children.

The Girls' Home, Heathfield,

has pursued its quiet useful course throughout the year dealing during that period with 29 girls, of which 18 remain under further care and training.

The Sea-Side Home, Lytham

has received a total of 239 weak, pale-faced children, to whom an average stay of two weeks was granted. Of the 239 sent there were 69 boys and 170 girls; while no less than 226 of those sent were outside cases: children in no way connected with the Institution, but from the courts and alleys of our city, recommended by Ragged School Teachers, Missionaries, and District Visitors.

The Open-all-Night Shelter

(now in Chatham Street, Piccadilly),

for children and young persons found wandering either by night or by day, commonly known as *The Open Door* has been very active and has received 243 children during

the year. When we add that 66 of them were brought in chiefly by the police, between 10 o'clock at night and 4 o'clock in the morning, the need of such an agency will be apparent.

The new premises for this useful branch which our extension scheme has given us, have proved a great help.

The beds were occupied 2459 times and 7284 warm meals were provided.

The Day Nursery

situated in Carruthers Street, Ancoats, had a total number of 2928 attendances and the fees paid by the poor mothers amounted to £22.12s.2d. This is an increase on last year's attendances and on the amount of fees and the Committee are glad to note the improvement; but the nursery, so well appointed in all respects, is capable of doing more, and they trust that all the poor mothers of the neighbourhood will be led to see what an enormous benefit it is to those who use it. Twopence per day is only charged for food, care and nursing.

The Prevention of Cruelty to Children Branch

whose offices are in connection with the Open-all-Night Shelter in the centre of the city has been actively engaged during the year in protecting suffering children from the cruelty of those who ought to love and cherish them, in exposing cases of hidden and shameful neglect, in all cases seeking to *prevent* rather than prosecute and punish, but not hesitating sternly to enforce the law against those brutes—whether parents or not—who wilfully torture a helpless child. The better premises so long desired and needed have been supplied as part of the

extension scheme, and during the past year the cases of **740** cruelly treated and neglected children have been investigated and dealt with, 71 of whom have been entirely removed from these unfortunate surroundings, while **46** cases have been carried into court and the parents or other guardians prosecuted and punished, the details of some cases being utterly unfit for publication.

The Outdoor Industrial Brigade

which includes the *City Messenger* and the *Parcel Brigades*, next claims a word. This branch which is entirely self-supporting, gave employment to 150 boys. The lads have delivered 54,871 messages, and during the winter months a Bible Class is held every week, which is quite voluntary, and the average attendance has been 36. During the year 44 boys have obtained through this agency good permanent situations.

The Camp for Poor City Boys

At Ansdell, near Lytham, gave a week's holiday under canvas to 529 boys taken from the poorest districts of

our city. Tents were pitched early in June, and struck 1st September, and during all that period not a single serious complaint reached the Committee of misconduct on the part of the boys.

We must pass by other branches of work and say a closing word about

The Prison Gate Mission.

Our summary of the year's work stated that 10,044 discharged prisoners accepted the invitation given at "The Gate," and came to our Mission Room. We need hardly say that a very great deal of work lies behind these figures, 6746 men and boys, and 3298 women and girls, have passed through our hands, of whom 4,154 signed the temperance pledge before they left our mission room.

This branch, begun three years ago in order to rescue from lives of crime those young persons who may for the first time have gone astray, lends a helping hand in that hour of need to all repentant ones. We could tell of deeply touching cases, some of thrilling interest. We could point to many young girls now living useful modest lives who have been met by the devoted band of workers, who morning by morning, all the year round are found at the gate. We abstain from trying to give figures as to the good done. The records of the work are on high, but it claims the sympathy of all who bear the name of Him who came to seek and to save the lost.

COST

The cost of so great and manifold a work barely outlined in the foregoing pages, must of course be considerable. But the economist's view, that money is of no

value only in virtue of what it represents, is one by which, we venture to think, the work of the Institution may well be tested. What contrasts might be made as to the expenditure of £12,000 in other directions! Each of us would say that this was not too much to save *one* child from a life of misery, degradation and sin, if it came home to us by being "*my child*." It represents, however in our case five hundred children provided for as only a home with fatherly and motherly influence can do; and also hundreds of children benefitted or protected by the various agencies in operation. *The exact cost has been £11,727 17s. 6d., of which £8,947 11s. od., has been contributed by the public, in sums great and small, the ratio of value not always been in proportion to the amount. £521 6s. 7d., has been received in interest on investments, and the balance has a special significance for it is made up of £2,258 19s. 11d., actual earnings of the children and profit on their work.*

For full details of the income and expenditure, we would refer our readers to the full financial statement which follows.

Conclusion.

In our 20th Annual Report, that of last year, when reviewing the period covered by the lifetime of our Institution, we briefly recalled the principal efforts, both legislative and voluntary, which the previous 20 years has called forth for the relief and reformation of suffering and neglected children. Beginning with *The Elementary Education Act of 1870* and ending with the act for *The Better Prevention of Cruelty to Children*, rightly called the Children's Charter of 1889, we saw that it was a period which will stand out brightly on the page of history as one full of

noble self-sacrifice, when movements were set on foot and seed sown which will bear a rich harvest for our children's children.

But while much has been done, much still remains to do; and if in closing this record of another year's work in the service of neglected and wayward children, we allude briefly to some of the impediments which still hinder and impede all efforts in their behalf, it is with the hope of helping to form a healthy public opinion which alone can secure wise legislation on admittedly difficult questions.

And first we allude to the question of *Parental Rights and Control*. All who work among neglected children, whether in state aided or voluntary schools and institutions differing widely it may be in their mode of working, yet agree in this: that one great obstacle with which they have to contend in all their plans for the children's reformation, which meets them at every turn and in the end too frequently defeats all their efforts, is the influence of vicious, careless, and drunken parents.

The beneficent working of our Elementary Education Act, of the Industrial School and Reformatory Acts, as well as the best laid plans and efforts of our Voluntary Institutions are in many cases rendered nugatory by a worthless parent.

Here is a typical case.

A and B are a man and wife whose vicious drunken habits have made them a bye word in every place they have lived. Their children have led miserable lives, their poor little half-starved and worse clad bodies, bear the hideous marks of drunken kicks and blows, which in

the great majority of cases they dare not tell of as their poor frightened faces too truly shew. Dragged about from town to town, or from one lodging to another, often footsore and weary, their young lives a burden, they for a time manage to evade the School Board officer, but at length their condition attracts attention and A and B are duly warned that further neglect will bring punishment; but the inducement to evade the law is strong, for will not the school money thus saved enable them to spend so much more in drink, and so a vagrant wandering life is continued to the certain ruin of the children. At last the School Board's hand is laid upon the boy, who has now reached 10 years of age, and the character of parents being notorious, he is committed to the Industrial School as being "Under Improper Guardianship." Shortly after a friendly hand finds out the girl, turned out into the streets late at night, in a drunken fit by these same "guardians," and a neighbouring voluntary Home opens its door to her and thus saves her from physical and moral ruin. Of course the managers of the said *Home* are sensible people and they insist upon these "legal guardians" signing their form, undertaking in consideration of the girl being received, educated and provided for, that they will in no way interfere or seek to remove her, and giving the managers full power to find her a home either in the United Kingdom or abroad, as they shall think fit.

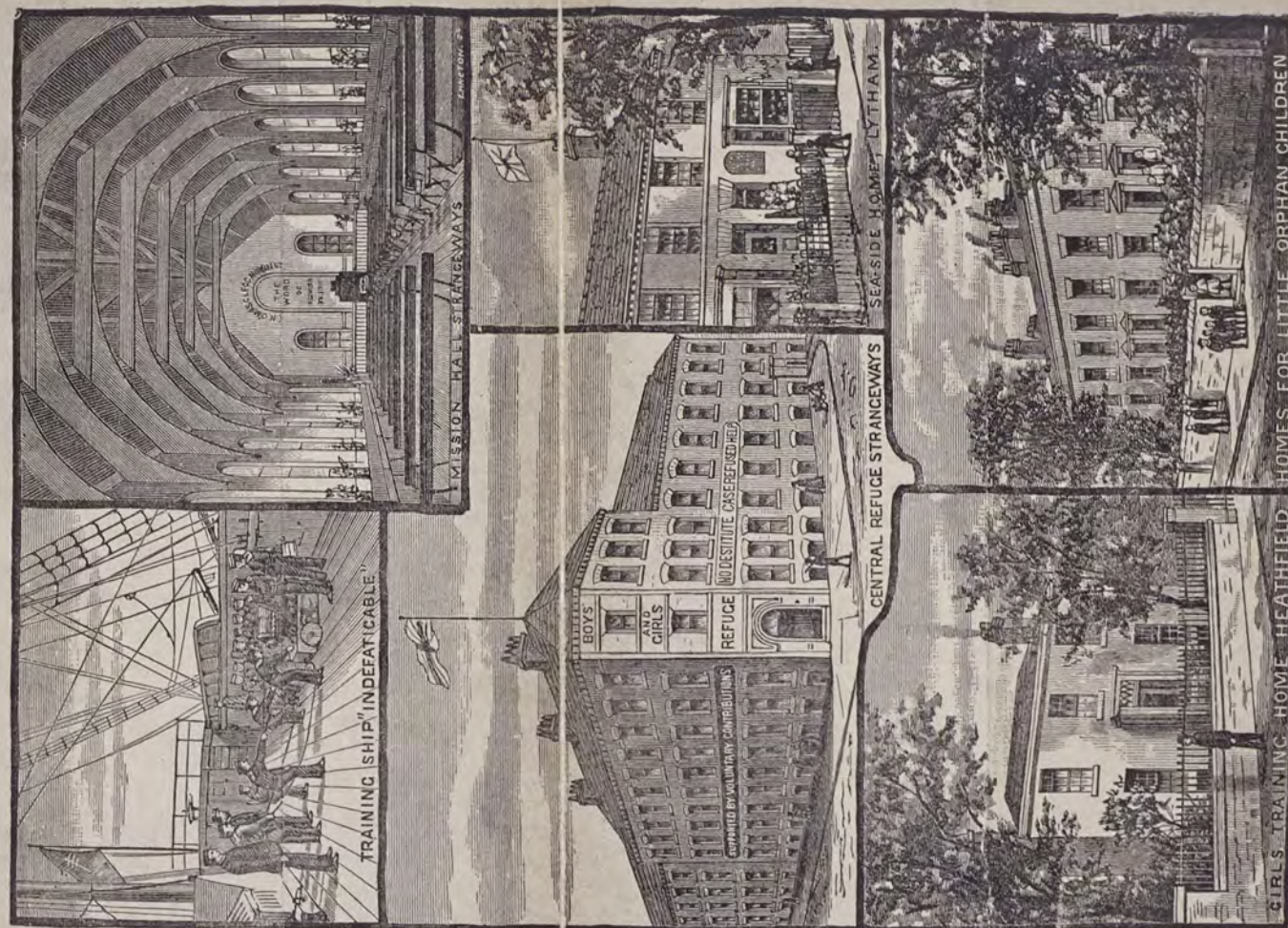
These parents go their way, nothing is seen of them for two or three years, indeed they find it profitable to clear out, for their presence might suggest to the managers of both the certified and voluntary Institutions their contributing to their children's support; but as fourteen years

of age draws nigh, they are heard of generally in the old neighbourhood, then they venture to call "just to see how the children are going on." The next step is the children are met when out, and taken back to the old surroundings. Now the managers grow alarmed for the safety of their young and hopeful charges, they see that complete separation from the vicious surroundings which had almost ruined them before is the one hope, and so remembering the paper duly signed three years before, a Canadian farm home is arranged for the boy, and a place of service in the South of England for the girl. But ere this can be done, too frequently the parents step in and block the way and the children on whom a large amount of money, and a much larger amount of anxious loving care has been spent are removed, go back to old surroundings, and their last state is worse than the first, for ere very long the one stands in the dock and the other is seen on the streets.

We are thankful to know that by an Act which has received the Royal assent while this report was in preparation, a big step has been taken to remedy this state of things. We hope "*The Custody of Children Act, 1891*," will become widely known and well used, of course it explodes the old fashioned theory of parental rights and control.

The tendency of legislation for the last twenty years has been in this direction and always with beneficial results. What is the Elementary Education Act but an interference with parental control; what is the Prevention of Cruelty to Children Act, but a stern word to the English savage that he shall not treat his child worse than he would treat his dog, and that shameful neglect will result

in another guardian,—another parent, being appointed until the age of fourteen or sixteen is reached; what is the Industrial School's Act; but an interference with parental control for a limited period. Let the principle thus granted be extended only a little further; let parents *of known bad character* who by their voluntary act have handed the care of their child which they had long shamefully neglected and abused to another, and thus abnegated their parental duties, forfeit there and then their parental control, and *not* be allowed to prevent those who had become parents indeed to the child from providing for that child's future welfare.

Time and space only allow of a word on another point. *The treatment of juvenile offenders against corporation by-laws and police regulations.* This subject engaged the attention of many in Manchester during the past year, and this Committee took some part in the discussion of the question, arranging an important deputation to the Watch Committee when some of our local M.P.'s and leading magistrates endorsed the views we held. At that deputation we shewed the Watch Committee from the statistics of our three police courts, that out of a total number of 1358 *children under sixteen years* who had been brought up by the police 857 had been guilty of no crime! 501 of the total number had been arrested for felony, but the larger number, 857 were only charged with offending against bye-laws and regulations framed by the Corporation and police for the public convenience. Yet the larger number had been practically dealt with in the same way as the 501 young criminals. Now in every man's conscience there is a *wide* distinction between the boy who loiters on the footpath or trespasses on enclosed

land, and the boy who stealthily enters your shop and robs the till, yet the law makes no distinction in its initial dealing with both cases. Can we wonder that, having dealt with the former as a criminal, he soon becomes one?

The subject found voice in Parliament on December 5th, when Mr. W. Mather asked the Home Secretary a series of questions based on the statistics we had laid before the Watch Committee. The chief one being, was the Home Secretary aware that *three-fifths* of the total number of children, under sixteen years, who had been brought up at the three Manchester Police Courts, had been *guilty of no crime*! but merely of offences against Police and Corporation regulations, yet in the initial stages they have been dealt with in exactly the same way as the *two-fifths* who had committed felonies?

The reply of the Under-Secretary for the Home Department in the absence of his chief really grants the whole question for which we have been contending—that there is a distinction between criminal and non-criminal offenders is a fact patent to every man's conscience. The boy or girl who has caused inconvenience by obstructing the foot-path we would receive readily into our houses should we require their services; whereas we shun as a scorpion the young thief who has stealthily entered our premises and robbed our till. But, says the Under-Secretary, this distinction, this God-implanted distinction, "has no foundation in law." He does not say, in equity and in justice, he means, has no foundation in British law, all must be treated alike—the thief and the thoughtless loiterer! It is a mournful admission, and ought to awaken in every right-minded

man the resolve never to rest until our law in this matter is brought into harmony with equity, justice, and righteousness.

One other question which we think is a great hindrance to juvenile reclamation is that of *juvenile idleness* and we would ask, is it wise, after spending millions on educating the poor, and insisting (properly) that whether parents like it or not, their children shall not grow ignorant, to take no effective steps to prevent that expenditure being lost by allowing those same children when they leave school to drift on to the streets and grow up in idleness, and yet thousands do so.

Who shall say that juvenile *idleness* is not a greater danger to the state than juvenile *ignorance*? This question will come up some day, the sooner the better for England.

Meanwhile let us unite more than ever in hearty co-operation in this great work to which God has called us of caring for and rescuing from misery and hopelessness the young lives which surround us on every hand; to be the means of changing the course of one such life with all its wondrous possibilities from vice to purity, from sin to righteousness is a joy which no human arithmetic can calculate; thank God it is still true that

"Righteousness exalteth a nation,

While sin is a reproach to any people."

Let us by His blessing roll away the reproach, and our children's children shall rise up and call us blessed.

To our Honorary Solicitors, Medical Officers, Dentist etc., we are increasingly indebted, for our extended work necessarily means greater demands on their valuable and indispensable services.

To the ladies who by their earnest and self-denying efforts have again made a handsome contribution to the funds through the Annual Sale of Work and supplementary fund our thanks are due, and hereby cordially offered. The value of this effort may be more fully realised perhaps if we think of it as being for several years past practically equal to an endowment of £10,000, being equal to the interest on such an amount.

We would not fail to acknowledge the very practical sympathy which our friends at Ansdell and Lytham have shewn in connection with our Summer Camp for poor boys and our permanent Sea-side Home.

The Committee tender sincere thanks also to all who in various capacities whether as Teachers, Collectors, members of Working Parties, Branch Committees etc., have rendered hearty and efficient help.

MEDICAL REPORT.

(CENTRAL REFUGE, AND GT. DUCIE STREET, HOMES.)

I am very glad to be able to state that the health of the Boys of the Refuge and adjoining Homes during the past twelve months has been exceptionally satisfactory. In previous years we have had to record a considerable number of cases of Pneumonia. This year we have had only one case, who I am sorry to say succumbed to his attack in the Salford Royal Hospital.

With the exception of this case and a case of Fever which we removed to Monsall and did well, we have really no serious cases to record.

The necessary conditions of good health are attended to, very good food, warm clothing, and avoidance of overcrowding.

MEDICAL REPORT.

(CHEETHAM HILL ORPHAN AND CRIPPLED CHILDREN'S HOMES.)

The Cheetham Hill Homes have suffered exceptionally from sickness this year, owing chiefly to causes unavoidable. Five cases of Scarlet Fever have occurred; they were all promptly removed to Infectious Hospital and recovered. Seven cases of measles were treated in our own Cottage Hospital—the value of which becomes every year more manifest. One case only of Gastric Fever occurred.

We have had three deaths—one from Tubercular Meningitis; one from Syncope during Rheumatic Fever; and one from Tabes Mesenterica through perforation of bowel. Another case of this disease is slowly recovering under treatment.

Considering the antecedents of so many of the Children the wonder is that the list of mortality has not been much greater, and that the condition of the children generally, has been so good—indeed the improvement that takes place in the appearance of the children after some few weeks residence in the Homes is remarkable—the “Mothers,” one and all, vieing with each other in their loving efforts to contribute to their children's health comfort and happiness.

Our Home for Crippled and Incurable ones (Bethesda) has been entirely free from infectious disease since its opening. There have been three deaths here, two of them our own elder girls who had been sufferers for a long time; their well known faces must be fresh in the memories of the many who have shewn such kindly interest in this Home. But for the untiring devotion of both mother and nurses, these two sufferers must have passed away from us many months sooner. On the whole the health of our Crippled Children has been remarkably good considering their infirmities and the wretched surroundings from which so many of them have come. Their faces tell how bright and happy they are made in this Home, which is itself admirably adapted to accomplish its beneficent design.
