SUMMARY OF ANNUAL MEETING.

The twenty-fourth Annual Meeting of the Manchester and Salford Boys' & Girls' Refuges & Homes & Children's Aid Society was held in the Lord Mayor's Parlour, Town Hall, Manchester, on Wednesday, March 7th, 1894.

In the unavoidable absence of the Lord Mayor, Mr. W. J. Crossley took the chair at 3 o'clock. Amongst those present were Lady Henry Somerset, the Lady Mayoress, Mrs. Moorhouse, His Worship the Mayor of Salford, Sir F. Forbes Adam, W. H. Holland, Esq., M.P., Henry Lee, Esq., J.P., Chas. Lister, Esq., J.P., J. A. Beith, Esq., J.P., Councillor H. B. Harrison, H. Philips, Esq., J.P., T. L. Farrar, Esq., Councillor Southern, W. H. Newett, Esq., and Dr. Boutflower.

Letters of apology for non-attendance were read from the Very Rev. The Dean of Manchester, Archdeacon Wilson, Canon Lowe, Dr. McLaren, Dr. Mackennal, Sir Ughtred Kay-Shuttleworth, Sir J. J. Harwood, Samuel Smith, Esq., M.P., Dr. Wood, Mayor of Southport, and others.

There was an overflowing attendance. The Rev. F. J. Horsefield, offered prayer,

A Summary of the Annual Report was read by the Secretary, Mr. W. Edmondson, in the much regretted absence through ill-health of the Hon. Secretary, Mr. Leonard K. Shaw. An abstract of the Financial Statement was read by the Hon. Treasurer, Mr. Henry Charlton.

It was then moved by Sir F. Forbes Adam, seconded by Lady Henry Somerset and unanimously resolved:

"That the Report, together with the Financial Statement, be adopted, printed and circulated, under the direction of the Committee, and that this meeting records its appreciation of the work of this institution, and heartily commends it to public support, meeting as it does, all classes of child destitution and need, and so bringing hope into many young lives otherwise drifting into pauperism or crime."

It was also moved by His Worship the Mayor of Salford, seconded by W. H. Holland, Esq., M.P., supported by Henry Lee, Esq., J.P., and J. A. Beith, Esq., J.P., and unanimously resolved:

"That the Committee for the ensuing year be Messrs. W. J. Crossley, John Thomson, R. B. Taylor, L. M. Hayes, G. R. Kirlew, James Boyd, and T. R. Ackroyd; the Secretary, Mr. Leonard K. Shaw; the Treasurer, Mr. Henry Charlton; and the Auditors, Messrs. Theodore Jones, Crewdson and Youatt."

A vote of thanks to the Lord Mayor for the use of his parlour closed the proceedings.

FOR THE YEAR 1893.

THE year 1893, the twenty-fourth year of the Institution now called the Boys' and Girls' Refuges and Children's Aid Society, has been one of mingled success and anxiety. The figures are larger in almost every department than they have ever been before. The buildings in Frances Street are at length completed, though not yet all paid for. The period of extension seems to be at an end. We are possessed of excellent and roomy premises, with appliances and machinery admirably adapted for the purposes of the-

Institution. It is hoped that the work may now enter on a time of consolidation, and that there may be opportunity for perfecting the organization in every direction.

On the other hand, the health of the Honorary Secretary, Mr. Leonard K. Shaw, who has been the heart and soul of this work from the very commencement, has been such as to cause us much anxiety. Mr. Shaw cannot give so much of his time and strength to the Refuge as he has done hitherto, but we are thankful to say he continues to be our Honorary Secretary, and to supervise the Orphan Homes at Cheetham Hill, the Cripples' Home, (Bethesda), and Rosen Hallas, the Girls' Training Home. We trust that with this diminution in the extent of his labours his health may improve, as the experience of the last month encourages us to expect.

The other anxiety which has pressed upon the Committee has been the state of the finances. The deficits are:—on the General Account for 1893, £1,948. 11s. 2d., of which £683. 8s. 4d., has been added during this year; and on the Extension Account £2,721. 5s. 4d. These are serious deficiencies, occasioned no doubt partly by the depression in trade, which has affected directly or indirectly nearly every class of our friends and supporters, and partly by the removal of old and large subscribers, whose places we trust others will step in and fill. The demands of the extension to meet which we have set apart most of the legacies that have fallen in of late, will we trust ere long be satisfied, and then we may hope to see the general account improve its position. But in the meanwhile we appeal very

earnestly to our friends to help to clear off these debit balances.

An important appointment during the year has been the promotion of Mr. W. Edmondson, who has been connected with the work for 15 years, to the position of Secretary.

We have before us as we write, the report of the first six months' operations of this Society. It was opened under the name of the Boys' Refuge and Industrial Brigade, at 16, Quay Street, early in 1870, under the management of a committee consisting of Messrs. R. B. Taylor, James Chapman, and our Hon. Sec., Mr. L. K. Shaw. At the end of 1870, a second report was issued, shewing the numbers entered in the admission book for the year to have reached 110 of whom 40 remained as inmates. Two other of the old reports are before us. The eleventh annual report (1881) marks a period of extension, there were then ten homes in operation, and that year closed with 201 children in them. The fourteenth annual report (1884), tells of the completion of the first block of buildings in Frances Street, and gives the sum of the boys and girls then in charge of the Society as 254. Ever since the beginning of the work, new needs have become visible; Mr. Shaw, Mr. Kirlew, and the others associated with them, have felt that they dare not hesitate to step into one after another of these opened doors. At length we believe we have carried the extension far enough, and we trust that we may be able to concentrate our energies on working the large and complicated machine, which now stands before us complete.

The scope and dimensions of the work to-day may be judged from the following list:—

r.—The Central Refuge and Industrial Home, Frances Street, Strangeways, the headquarters, to which all applicants come and where Industrial Training is carried on.

2.—Home for Working Boys and Lads' Institute, Great Ducie Street, Strangeways.

3.—Brigade Boys' Home, where dwell the Caxton, Shoeblack, and Parcel Brigades.

4.—The Boys' Emigration Training Home, Great Ducie Street, Strangeways.

5.—The Homes for Little Orphan Children (Boys and Girls), Cheetham Hill—six in number.

6.—The Girls' Domestic Service and Emigration Training Home, and Laundry "Rosen Hallas," Cheetham Hill.

7.—The Cottage for Convalescent Children, "Rosen Hallas," Cheetham Hill.

8.—" Bethesda " Home for Crippled and Incurable Children, Cheetham Hill.

9.—The Book Saloon and Offices of "Christian Worker," Great Ducie Street.

10.—The Open-all-Night Shelter for little wanderers, 1, Chatham Street, Piccadilly, City.

II.—The Prevention of Cruelty to Children Society, I, Chatham Street, Piccadilly, City.

12.—The Police Court Mission to Lads and Girls.

13.—The Sea-side Home for weak and sickly children, Lytham.

14.—The Day Nursery, Carruthers Street, Ancoats.

15.—The Out-Door Industrial Brigades, Chatham Street.

16.-Summer Camp for Poor City Boys, St. Anne's on-the-Sea.

17.—Prison Gate Mission, Great Ducie Street, Strangeways.

18.—The Training Ship, "Indefatigable," New Ferry, Birkenhead, (In connection with).

19.—The Canadian Branch Home, Belleville, Ontario, Canada, (Inconnection with).

By means of these various branches the Society has, during the past year, received and dealt with a total of 2,595 children.

It must always be borne in mind that we consider our regular and most important work that of rescuing the poorest, most destitute and neglected children, and placing them in homes under Christian care, where they may be trained and educated to fit them to lead useful lives. All other parts of our work are secondary to this the original and main object. It is not necessary to go over each branch in detail; we shall merely make a few remarks where specially called for.

The Strangeways group of Homes.

We shall be glad if our friends will take an early opportunity of calling to see the extensions and improvements here. The workshops where some of the elder boys learn joinering, shoemaking, tailoring, letterpress printing, and firewood making, are now very

complete, and the dining hall, reading, and play rooms and dormitories are roomy and well lighted. These new and improved buildings at the Central Refuge are now on a par in point of completeness with the Working Lads' Home and Institute facing Strangeways, and together we do not believe them to be surpassed by any buildings of the kind in or out of London.

Mr. and Mrs. F. A. Wood, the Superintendents at the Refuge, have very patiently borne with much discomfort while the alterations have been in progress and are now at last comfortably settled, with the work manifestly prospering in their hands.

Out of the number of Refuge cases admitted during the year, we give three specimens:—

PROMPT HELP.

Late one Saturday night, an intelligent boy came to the Refuge, and begged admission. There was something about the lad which denoted that he was above the ordinary level of the "slums," though his clothes were very ragged and he was very dirty. His story was very touching. He had been through many changes, for "]'s" father had been in a good way of business in Manchester, and the lad had known the comforts of a good home, and a good mother in his early days, but the father had taken to drink and the worry caused the death of the mother, and the respectable man of business degenerated into a drunken sot, living in common lodging houses, and dragging this wee lad about with him, "doing up and down" in the words of the boy. The father got tired of him, and got someone in a neighbouring town to take him, but his new home was one where he was only wanted for what he could earn, and so he ran away. He slept out and finally tramped into Manchester to get into a Home. One can never forget his earnest pleading to be taken in, and when he was asked about his father, he said so pathetically, "Father is a drunkard, and has run through all his money and land, we could have been in a proper big house if not for the drink." Such had been " J's" almost hopeless past, drifting down, but that night was the turning point. We took this lad in, and to-day he is one of the brightest. most intelligent and willing of our large family in the Central Refuge.

TRAVELLING JACK.

Jack when 12 years of age found himself an orphan lad upon the streets of Manchester, and with only the Workhouse before him. He somehow got attached to a man who travelled about the country from fair to fair with a van, and catered for the public with "cocoanut shying appliances." The lad used to fetch the balls, and assist in getting up the sticks, and at night slept under the van. He ran away from this hard life and tramped about the country, and at length drifted back to the Manchester streets, where we rescued him. With such antecedents there is much to undo in Jack, but notwithstanding his roving disposition, a great change has already been brought about in him, and we hope and pray for still better things.

ARAB JCE.

No father, only a mother who was too poor to maintain him when we got hold of him. He was just a mass of rags and filth a regular street arab. He did not know even a letter of the alphabet, and had been getting his living by stealing from the market, selling papers, wax-lights, etc. When unable to get his lodging-money, he had slept in a lurry box. He is an adept at turning cart wheels, and has earned many a copper this way. Never shall we forget the sight of the lad when he had a brand new suit of clothes and a pair of boots given him. He never before had had such luxuries. He walked about eyeing his treasures, and we feel sure there was no prouder being in Manchester than our young friend on that memorable occasion. The change in this lad has been very marked, and from this raw material we have hopes of training him into a useful member of society.

The Cheetham Hill Group.

Here there are six homes for orphan children, in which 164 fatherless and motherless boys and girls have been cared for during the year.

THE GIRLS EMIGRATION TRAINING HOME AND LAUNDRY, Rosen Hallas, has received 103 girls.

The Bethesda Home,

(view of which is given), for crippled and incurable children, boys and girls, is a most touching sight. Those who have sympathetic hearts might well visit it, and see how happy the poor little sufferers are under the motherly care of the good matron. The number under care during the year in this true "House of Mercy" has been 42.

As a specimen of the work of the Orphan Homes and Bethesda, we select the case of the "B family,"

Some few months ago, a clergyman in a neighbouring town wrote us respecting a family of five children, just left fatherless and motherless, and in great distress, applying for the admission of two or three. Their ages ranged from 12 years to 2½ years, all of them being in a half-starved and neglected condition when visited; one, age 5, a cripple, and the youngest very deligate and unable to the


age 5, a cripple, and the youngest very delicate and unable to walk.


When we saw "Annie," age 12; "Richard," 10; and "Minnie,"
7; in a miserable state—though all the family had been carefully brought up—poor little crippled "Eva," and the baby-boy "Herbert," looked up so wistfully, as much as to say "Oh do take us as well," we could hardly refuse to do so; and after careful enquiries which consumed some little time, we ascertained that these bereaved little ones had no grandparents, and only two aunts, one in the workhouse, and another helped by parish relief; it was evident that there was no other place but the "Big House," for them, unless we admitted them. This we are thankful to say we were able to do, and all the family are now united together under our roofs, where they can see and associate with each other, and the not long since half-starved appearance has now given place to healthy, happy and glad faces.

Is not this far better than separating—perhaps never to see each other again—the members of so young a family? We are always filled with joy when we are able to receive such little ones, who might otherwise be bereft not only of their parents, but also of each others company.

The Open-All-Night Shelter

has received during the year for longer or shorter periods, 516 children, of whom 140 were brought in between 10 o'clock at night, and 4 o'clock in the morning. The beds were occupied 2032 times. Meals provided were 5999. This Shelter is the headquarters of the







It is sad to report that this Society has had to deal with 540 cases during the year, involving the welfare of 1834 children. Of these cases we carried 65 into court, and obtained 62 convictions.

HAROLD GRIMSHAW, 2 years.—
Inspector Ashley visited and found
the child in a very good condition,
both with regard to clothes and
nourishment, although the mother
was a very drunken woman,
and it was quite clear what would
happen unless she improved.

Nothing more could be done at that time than caution her.

Another report came to the shelter, the Inspector again visited, and found the child untidy, very dirty, and not so well clothed, the mother was summond to attend Shelter, where she was severely reprimanded. A further report came on August 30th, when the Inspector again visited, found the mother drunk, and the child in a very neglected condition, it was brought to the Shelter, and found to be very ill, removed to the Clifford Street Hospital, where the doctor said its condition was due to neglect.

A summons was taken out against the mother (the father being a steady, hard working man.) The mother appeared before the magistrates on the 30th day of August, and was sent to prison for three months hard labour.

COOKSON FAMILY, ages IT, 9, 7, 4, and I year.—The first time this family was brought under our notice, a lad (aged 9 years) was seen playing in an entry, he had only one leg to his trousers. Inspector Taylor took him home and found the house filthy, also two other children who were dirty and neglected, the mother was cautioned. The house was revisited when a slight improvement was found, another revisit revealed a falling back to the old state and the mother was again cautioned. The Inspector called several

weeks afterwards and found them in a worse condition than ever, the husband had lost his employment, inquiries made, revealed the cause of father leaving his situation, to be-Loss of time. Neglect, and Drunkenness, his wages were 34/- per week, they had two lads (16 and 17) working who lived with them earning 10/and 7/-, the house was almost void of furniture and very filthy, the children in a pitiful condition, one child (aged 7) who is deaf and dumb sat shivering on the door step, another (4) lay on an old wooden sofa very ill from bronchitis, covered with a piece of flannel (the only covering in the house). The mother was told to take the child to the doctor at once, but neglected to do so, there were two bedsteads and mattresses but no bedding or bed clothes, the other children were also in a very neglected state. Both parents had given way to drink. Summonses were taken against father and mother. The father was sent to prison for four days, the mother for one month's hard labour.

The Emigration of Boys and Girls.

Our experience, now extending over a period of ten years, during which we have sent out to Canada 700 children, leads us to the conclusion that for the class we send out there is a real demand, and far better openings than can be found in this country. The children have in nearly every case been well and kindly treated by the farmers who engage them. The per centage of failures has been barely 5%. A boy can be furnished with an outfit, and sent out for £10. From the time he is settled on a farm he earns his own food and a small wage, and if he is steady and industrious he rises much more quickly than in the old country. Where the home surroundings are bad, a change to a new country gives a chance of a good and useful life, practically impossible in England.

SPECIMEN CANADA CASES.

From a large number of reports we give the following because they are fair samples of the whole.

F. w.—A bright little lad, the child of superior parents who had unfortunately quarrelled then broken up their home and separated.

Frank was sent from one to the other and robbed of all love and care. In the midst of this the mother died and we took the lad and then within a few months the father died. The little lad was included in our Emigration party of 1893, and our last report of him says:—

"Frank seems likely to do well. He likes his Canadian home and tries to make himself useful in it. He will go to school during the winter. A nice looking boy, truthful, and honest."

The boy himself writes to Mr. Kirlew.

Ontario, December 21st, 1893.

Dear Mr. Kirlew.

I am now in my place and like it very well, I forgot to write before. I am now going to school in the country and have a pretty nice walk, I have been going to school for a month and am acquainted with all the boys. I have seen my brother Alfred and we are pretty good friends. We have had snow for this last two weeks, and we have some pretty cold days. The country is not so nice as England. Give my love to all the boys. Yours truly,

F. W.

One of the bigger lads sent to Manitoba, W. H., was a strong fellow of 17 who seemed to drift about simply because he could not get work. He would very soon have swelled the number of the criminal classes had we not laid hold of him.

He writes most hopefully to our Mr. Beatty, and we extract the following from his last letter:—

"I hope you are getting another lot of big lads ready for spring, I was surprised to see Joseph Swallow out here, but I am glad all the same. I would like to know how many boys you intend to send out this year, and when they are coming out. I often think how patient you was with me while I was in the home, how many scrapes I got into with Rollinson, but you pulled me through them all, I would never have been where I am now had it not been for you and my good mother Miss Vaughan. I hope to earn 15 dollars a month this spring to make up for last spring. I have learned how to plough and harrow, which are the chief things on a farm. I would like you to send me the "Christian Worker" from June, which will be about seven papers altogether. I will take the Worker monthly till it comes to one dollar, and then I will send the money all at once and pay postage on the same I would also like a few subscribers cards as well to try and get new subscribers for the Home, I will start it myself and then others will follow. I hope I am not putting you to any trouble but I know you are patient and kind. I send my best love to all."

Girls' Emigration.

We sent out 35 girls from the Cheetham Hill Home, Rosen Hallas, (see view) during the past year, a more hopeful band we never sent forth, as the results concerning them show; and yet there was not one we could safely have kept at home.


Thus-

- 1. We permanently saved the child from relapsing into the perils of her former lot.
- 2. We relieved our own overcrowded population where the struggle for existence is growing fiercer every day.
- 3. We supplied our own Colony with her greatest need—healthy, honest labour.
- 4. We provided room in our Homes for the reception of other rescued children.

HERE ARE OUTLINES OF A FEW CASES:

"B. S." came to us when 15 years of age. She had for two or three years earned a precarious living by hawking on the streets, and going out cleaning steps, etc., all the time living in one part or other of Angel Meadow with a drunken, brawling mother who had more than once narrowly escaped goal. There was no father. Late one night because B. would not join with others in getting in a gallon of beer, the mother already the worse for drink struck the girl with the poker and threw a block of wood, inflicting a wound on B's head. She ran out of the house, vowing she would never return, and with another girl got a temporary lodging for the night. Next day she applied for admission to our Homes, where she was at once received; with a nice figure and a bright intelligent face it was a miracle to us that B. had not been ruined.

After a couple of weeks the mother and some old companions found out where she was, and then commenced one of the fiercest struggles to get a girl away we ever remember, every possible means was used extending over a period of some months—B steadily resisting them all. Some of the most painful scenes we ever remember was when the girl went to see the mother to tell of her resolve to go to Canada. After appeal failed, the mother then in drink, cursed the girl by all the terrors of the church, and in the foulest language. B. has now been twelve months in her first place in Canada, a valued helper in a minister's family. She writes to her mother and younger sister, carefully keeping her exact address from them lest

they should disturb her, and wanting the younger sister (for whose moral safety we are in great fear) to go out and share the good home she has.

The gain to this country and to Canada by the Emigration of this girl has been great. The gain to herself who can estimate?

"E. H." came to us in 1891. Mother dead, father a confirmed drunkard. After she came home from the mill she had to go out to sell wax-lights, etc., and on Sunday mornings selling sporting papers. If money sufficient was not brought back, the girl was illused by the father, and she and younger sisters given little to eat.

Such was E's life at 16 years of age, no wonder therefore she left the miserable home as soon as she could after the mother's death, got into bad company, and lived in common lodging houses. We heard of her through our P.C.C. officers, who persuaded her to seek admission to our Home. The case was a most difficult one after admission, it required two years patient, persevering training, with many breakdowns ere E could be sent forth, but prayers and pains at length triumphed.—E meanwhile seeking out a younger sister.

Both are now in good homes in Canada, and letters just to hand from E, now 19 years of age, tell of her marriage. Very suitable and properly expressed letters they are.

To Miss Smethurst she writes 6th January, 1894.

Mother Dear,—I must tell you in this letter that I am married.

I am living in Madoc Village. I must tell you that I like my mother-in-law first rate, she is very kind to me. They are English people and my husband was born in London in England. He is very good and kind to me, he neither drinks nor smokes, and I thank God for that. We got quite a good start in house-keeping. My husband had quite a few hundred dollars in the bank, he is a stone mason by trade.

To Mr. and Mrs. Shaw she writes 7th January, 1894,

I hope you and all the homes are doing well. I have not helped you yet, but by the help of God I will by and by. If you come to Canada I want you to come and visit me.

The letter closes with the words:—"As for me and my house, we will serve the Lord."

"K. P. came from Ireland, arriving in Manchester utterly friendless and penniless. She told a strange story of losing her box on the way, and other statements which we doubted the truth of and which we afterwards found untrue; but a good looking girl of 19 in absolute destitution and helplessness just arrived in our city constituted a claim, which we dared not refuse. We at once received K—but it was long ere we got to know the whole truth.

The previous five years had been a sad and chequered story, drunken parents, bad companions, frequent falls, once locked up, etc. Gradually under the prayerful influence of our devoted home-mother, K was led to real penitence and became a truly christian and useful girl in the Home. Then came the desire for Canada, which we felt it wise to gratify and now she is respectably married and in a home of her own.

We extract the following from K. P's letter to Miss Smethurst, dated 21st January, 1894.

"If you come out this year be sure and come here and I will drive to the station to meet you. My little boy is growing very tall, he can talk a little. How I wish I was amongst you all once more, for those were happy days that I spent in the dear old home. Although I have everything to make me happy, I often wish I could see the dear old place and people that first made me happy and what I am now. Whatever my trials or troubles may be, I can take them to the Lord Jesus and get comforted."

The Sea-Side Home and Summer Camp

have again been the means of the restoration to health of many weak and sickly children. At the Home, Lytham, 210 have been received, and have had from two to four weeks at the sea-side. The Camp is open during the Summer months, and has afforded a week's healthy and happy holiday to no less than 1122 boys from the poorest districts of our city.

Our workers have attended at the gate of the Prison, every morning, wet or fine, to invite the discharged prisoners to the Mission Room, where a simple breakfast is provided.

Efforts are made to deal individually with those who come, to win them to a better life, and where they are children, to place them, if necessary, in some of the branches of this Institution.

The Conference Hall has been well filled on Sunday afternoons and evenings, with occasional meetings during the week. Here also are held monthly meetings for the Deepening of Spiritual Life, which have been well attended throughout the year and which are very highly valued by many earnest Christians of all denominations in our city.

These latter meetings, it will be understood, are not the work of the Boys Refuge Society, but are conducted by an independent Committee of which the Rev. Prebendary Macdonald, and Mr. L. K. Shaw, are joint secretaries.

Finances.

The total cost of carrying on these various agencies during 1893, has amounted to £13,054. os. 6d., and the total income for the same period has been £12,370. 12s. 2d. This leaves a deficit on the year's operations of £683. 8s. 4d., which added to the deficit at the end of 1892 (£539. 11s. 7d., for that year, and £725. 11s. 3d., for 1891) £1,265. 2s. 10d., amounts to a total debit balance of £1,948. 11s. 2d.

It must be explained that this large deficiency is greatly owing to the necessities of the Extension, to which the Committee have been passing such legacies as have come in lately. That extension is not yet fully paid for, shewing at the moment a deficiency of £2,721. 5s. 4d. But against this sum there is yet to come in £1,000 legacy from the late Mr. James Jardine, an old friend of the Refuge, whose death we deeply deplore; and the buildings and land formerly occupied by the Cornbrook Orphanage managed by Mr. William Birch, Jr., which the trustees have handed over to us, and which will probably realize a considerable sum, we hope more than sufficient to clear the balance of building account, and all further claims on that score.

It may be of interest to give the letter of the Trustees of the Cornbrook Orphanage, and our reply.

Mr. T. R. Wilkinson, writes:

January 24th, 1894.

It is about twenty years since I collected the funds required for the purchase of this property, which has subsequently been vested in trustees, having unrestricted powers of dealing with it. Several hundreds of young children of both sexes have been brought up and provided for at the orphanage under the care of William Birch, Jun. Upon his leaving this country for New Zealand, it was found that the work had languished, and could no longer be efficiently carried

on; and the institution has been practically closed for several years past. In considering what was the most useful and practical way of disposing of the property, it was concluded by the trustees that its presentation to an institution with kindred aims, that of helping the young and helpless, would best fulfil the original intention in its acquisition. In this view Mr. Birch, who joins in the conveyance, concurred. The property, containing 3,600 square yards of land, has therefore been conveyed to you as a gift to the Boys' and Girls' Refuge, unencumbered with any conditions or liabilities beyond the payment of a small annual chief rent of £25. 178. The land is at present valuable, being within a few minutes' walk of the Manchester docks, and it will become of increased value as the traffic on the Ship Canal is developed. In the hope that this 1894 New Year's gift may be the means of efficiently aiding you to carry on and, if needed, to extend the useful work of the invaluable institution for which you have so long earnestly and successfully laboured, I am, dear sirs, yours sincerely.

The following reply has been sent to Mr. Wilkinson:

Central Refuge, Frances Street, Strangeways,

February 10th, 1894.

To T. R. Wilkinson, Esq., and the Trustees of the Birch Orphanage, Cornbrook,

Dear Sirs.—On behalf of the Committee and trustees of this institution, we beg to tender you our very hearty thanks for the handsome gift of the land and buildings formerly occupied as the Birch Orphanage, the conveyance of which to the trustees of this charity was laid on the table at our Committee meeting on February 5th. The Committee are very sensible of the importance of this gift, especially at present, when the enlarged operations require an increased and more permanent income. Whatever the property may realize, and we trust it may be a handsome sum, you will have the satisfaction of knowing that the proceeds will be applied to the relief and training of orphan and destitute children in Manchester and Salford, and will fulfil the original intention of the donors. For all the trouble you have taken in this matter, and for its satisfactory termination, pray accept our very hearty thanks.

It will therefore be seen that we may hope the extension account will be covered from sources within view, and that we have only to consider the balance of the general account, viz:—£1,948. 118. 2d.

We make a very earnest appeal to our friends to do what they can to relieve the Institution from this heavy debt.

The income for 1893 was greater than that for 1892 by £170. 128. 5d., but the expenditure was also unavoidably greater by £314. 98. 2d. The difference between these sums £143. 168. 9d., accounts for the increase of the deficiency of 1893, as against that of 1892. The children have contributed a total of £2,389. 168. 1d., to the income out of their earnings as follows:—

We close by repeating Mr. Shaw's final words in last year's report:—"It is ours by God's blessing to change the course of these young lives, to implant such principles within them, that they may go forth on life's way strong in character, and bright with hope, and thus in the days to come, be a source of strength and not of weakness to the land of their birth."

MEDICAL REPORTS.

(CENTRAL REFUGE AND GREAT DUCIE STREET HOMES.)

Our medical report this year has to record the deaths of two of our boys—one due to secondary cancer after amputation of the arm, the other due to an invasion of Fever which rapidly proved fatal: otherwise, with perhaps the exception of five or six serious ailments, the amount of sickness has been extremely small.

We are fortunate in having a master who has a good knowledge of practical Hygiene, and he is able to assist me very much in the prevention of disease.

At the Young Men's Institute we had a good deal of Influenza, but happily of a mild type: the Brigade Boys' Home has been almost entirely free from sickness: at the Emigration Home we had a case of Pneumonia.

So far as I have been able to judge, the clothing, food and sanitary arrangements are quite satisfactory.

With the exception of the one death from Heart-disease, in the case of the child Sarah Heywood, (whose admission to Bethesda put wonderful brightness into the brief remainder of her hitherto suffering life,) no single case of illness worth recording has occurred in all the Cheetham Hill Homes during the past year:—not even the Epidemic of Influenza was permitted to touch one of these children; and all this while the capacity of the Homes has been fully taxed.

Surely we may well praise God for such manifest tokens of His favour to the orphans that have always been the special object of His compassionate care.


