SUMMARY OF ANNUAL MEETING.

The twenty-fifth Annual Meeting of the MANCHESTER AND SALFORD BOYS & GIRLS' REFUGES & HOMES & CHILDREN'S AID SOCIETY was held in the Lord Mayor's Parlour, Town Hall, Manchester, on Monday, April 1st, 1895.

The Lord Mayor took the chair at 3 o'clock. Amongst those present were Henry Lee, Esq., J.P., F. Platt-Higgins, Esq., J.P., H. T. Gaddum, Esq., Alex. Forrest, Esq., J.P., W. J. Crossley, Esq., W. J. Galloway, Esq., J. G. Groves, Esq., M. MacLeod, Esq., Mr. Councillor Fildes, Rev. Preb. Macdonald, Rev. E. Hewlett, Rev. A. Parkinson, Oswald Carver, Esq., W. E. Rowcliffe, Esq., &c.

Letters of apology for non-attendance were received from Lord Aberdeen, Lord Ducie, Lord Bishop of Manchester, Archdeacon of Manchester, Rev. Hugh Price Hughes, Wm. Mather, Esq., M.P., W. H. Holland, Esq., M.P., and others.

The Rev. Arthur Parkinson offered prayer.

The Annual Report and Balance Sheet were presented. The Hon. Secretary, Mr. Leonard K. Shaw, gave a summary of the Report, and an abstract of the Financial Statement was given by the Hon. Treasurer, Mr. Henry Charlton.

It was then moved by Henry Lee, Esq., J.P., seconded by F. Platt-Higgins, Esq., J.P., and unanimously resolved:—

“That the Report together with the Financial Statement be adopted, printed, and circulated under the direction of the Committee.”

It was also moved by Mr. Councillor Fildes, seconded by H. T. Gaddum, Esq., supported by W. J. Galloway, Esq., and unanimously resolved:—

“That the Committee for the ensuing year be Messrs. William J. Crossley, John Thomson, Richard B. Taylor, Louis M. Hayes, Gilbert R. Kirlew, James Boyd, Thos. R. Ackroyd, Alfred Haworth, the Honorary Secretary, Leonard K. Shaw, the Honorary Treasurer, Henry Charlton, and the Auditors, Messrs. Theodore Jones, Crewdson, and Youatt.”

Letter was read from Messrs. J. G. and W. G. Groves promising to give a donation of £1000 towards the deficit on the Extension Account on condition the balance was obtained in connection with this Anniversary.

A vote of thanks to the Lord Mayor for presiding and for the use of his parlour, closed the proceedings.

In the evening a large demonstration was held in the Free Trade Hall, when W. J. Crossley, Esq., presided. Lady Henry Somerset, Rev. Canon Fleming, and Dr. Barnardo, addressed the Meeting.

FOR THE YEAR 1894.

IT is with no ordinary feelings that the Committee of the Manchester and Salford Boys' and Girls' Refuges and Homes, etc., meet the subscribers and friends of the Institution on this its Twenty-fifth Anniversary. For a quarter of a century they have been permitted, with ever increasing tokens of God's favour, and of the confidence of the community among whom it has been carried on, to labour in the interests of the poorest, most helpless, and most suffering dwellers in the vast district of which Manchester is the centre.



Miserable on the Streets.

The cause which has thus engrossed their thoughts and energies is still of paramount importance, for of all the questions which claim public attention, none can compare with that of *the children!* those who in the near future will be the men and women, swaying the destinies either for weal or for woe of the land of their birth! What are the influences surrounding them at this all-important period, when character and habits are being formed which will decide their future life? Other questions come and go, they have a passing, and often an exaggerated importance; but this question of the children *abides*, and will continue to claim the first place in the thoughts and care alike of the Christian and the patriot.

Early Years.

The story of the establishing and early years of the work has already been told in the booklet issued in the

first week of the year, for the 'Day of Thanksgiving' which was then held—entitled: "*A Quarter of a Century of Blessing*,"*—alluding to which our leading journal wrote:—"When the history of the philanthropic work of the nineteenth century comes to be written, a prominent place will have to be given to the Manchester and Salford Boys and Girls' Refuges and Homes, and Children's Aid Society." And while this report must necessarily, be chiefly occupied with the records of the work of the past year, it will not we hope be deemed out of place, at a period like the present, if we briefly recall the various steps which have brought the Institution from its one home in 1870, to the eighteen branches which constitute the work to-day; and also briefly review the chief events covered by that eventful period.



Comfortable in the Home.

1870.—January 4th. First Refuge opened in Quay St. Deansgate.
 1871.—Purchase of two houses in Frances Street, Strangeways. Nucleus of the present Institution and removal thereto.
 1873.—First Emigrant band of nine boys sent to Canada, and first boys sent to "Indefatigable" Training Ship.
 1874.—First Home for Working Boys established.
 1876.—First Home for Orphan Children established.
 1877.—Central Refuge enlarged and Second Home for Working Boys established.
 1878.—First Home for Girls established, and Second Home for Orphan Children opened.
 1879.—Third Home for Working Boys, and Third Home for Orphan Children opened.
 1880.—"Christian Worker" Magazine first issued.
 1881.—Boys Rest, Angel Meadow opened. Fourth Orphan Home established and First Christian Conference held.
 1882.—The Six Orphanages, Cheetham Hill purchased and occupied, and Industrial Brigades organised.
 1883.—Seaside Home, Lytham, established. Stone of present Central Refuge laid by the Earl of Shaftesbury.

- 1884.—Central Refuge Building Finished. Prevention of Cruelty to Children Branch established.
- 1885.—Open-All-Night Shelter established.
- 1886.—Girls' Training Home Rosen Hallas established, and Day Nursery opened.
- 1887.—Summer Camp for Poor City Boys established. Prison Gate Mission begun.
- 1888.—Corner-stone laid of Present New Buildings, Great Ducie Street, Strangeways.
- 1889.—Opening of same by Mrs H. M. Stanley, (Dorothy Tennant).
- 1890.—Bethesda Home for Crippled and Incurable Children, opened January 4th.
- 1892.—Land secured at top of Frances Street, and Plans for Final Completion decided on.
- 1893-4.—Central Refuge with its New Workshops, etc., Dining Hall, Reading Room, and Laundry, finally completed and opened.

A Retrospect.

The period thus embraced in the various extensions of the Institution, the bare enumeration of which bring back memories full of interest to very many of Manchester's oldest and best citizens, will ever stand out in English history as a golden epoch full of effort, both national and voluntary, for the relief and elevation of neglected, and suffering childhood. *The Industrial Schools' Act* had recently been passed and was being gradually brought into operation, some of our earliest efforts being in seeking to enforce it. Further much needed developments in succeeding years tending still more to increase its usefulness.

A few months after the Refuge opened its doors saw the passing into law of *The Elementary Education Act*, a measure which, with its various amendments during succeeding years, we hold to be one of the most impor-

tant ever inscribed on the Statute Book of England, and conferring the greatest benefits on the rising generation.

During this period the *Factory and Workshop Acts* received various important amendments, which with the restrictions and regulations as to child and female labour, enacted in 1878, have placed the employment of children, we venture to think, in a fairly satisfactory position.

The Canal Boat and Gipsy Children have not been forgotten, *The Canal Boat Act*, and other measures passed during the 70's, chiefly through the energy of our friend George Smith of Coalville, whose presence at our Annual Meeting in 1880 some will remember, doing much to ameliorate the condition of this shifting class of children.

Amongst the legislative enactments of the period under review, we may not pass over the *Industrial School Act Amendment Act*, which provides for the care and protection of our exposed and tempted girls. We name this Act that we may pay a passing tribute to Miss Ellice Hopkins, to whose energy and devotion we owe it, and to whom the girls of our land, especially our poor exposed girls, owe a debt of gratitude which can never be repaid.

Mention must also be made of other and more recent measures, such as that commonly known as *The First Offenders' Act*, which we have welcomed, and by receiving many such cases into our Homes have enabled the magistrates successfully to put in force. *The Custody of Children Act*, which enables magistrates to remove children from the custody of improper parents and to appoint other guardians having full control in their stead.

And last, but not least, *The Prevention of Cruelty to Children Act*, with which the name of Benjamin Waugh must ever be associated, which by gathering under one Act, various forms of child neglect with which we and similar organizations had long been battling, and rendering them illegal and punishable, has greatly simplified the effective dealing with such cases, and thereby greatly diminished the sum of juvenile suffering.

But any record, however brief, of the period under review, would be incomplete and unworthy of its great theme if it omitted the splendid voluntary achievements of christian philanthropy which have marked the last quarter of a century, and which to a large extent have created that enlightened public opinion which rendered legislation not only possible but easy.

In this connection the first place must be given to that magnificent and now world-wide institution known as *Dr. Barnardo's Homes*. Begun by him whose name it bears in 1868, it has under the same guidance advanced with giant strides, receiving homeless and outcast children from all parts of the kingdom without distinction of creed and without condition as to payment, until the last recorded statistics shew that last year 2,279 fresh cases were admitted; 6,673 children were in residence for a longer or shorter period during the year, while from the beginning of the enterprise up to February 28th. last, the total number received was 26,473.

Then we have George Müller's work of faith at the Ashley Down Orphanages, Bristol, where thousands of

children have received christian care and nurture. Scotland has not been behind in this work of child rescue and blessing; as the *Orphan Homes of Scotland testify*, arresting the eyes of all travellers, as they stand a splendid group at the Bridge of Weir, near Glasgow, God's answer to the faith and prayer of William Quarrier. Next we must name the work of *Dr. Stephenson of Bonner Road, London, and Bolton-le-Moors*, chiefly connected with the Wesleyan body, but receiving children of all denominations. Nor may we omit the "*Church of England Homes for Waifs and Strays*," with its wide reaching organization. There is also Miss Macpherson's and Miss Rye's work, chiefly Emigration, but really the pioneers of many others. These and an ever increasing number of smaller efforts throughout the country, all having the rescue and care of poor and suffering children as their object, have combined to swell the river of blessing into wider and ever deeper flow, until it is not too much to say that beneficent as undoubtedly has been the juvenile legislation of the last five and twenty years, it has been far exceeded by the voluntary christian achievements of the same period.

Extent of the Institution and Work of the past year.

Recurring now to the work of this institution. The various extensions detailed on pages 7 and 8 none of which were forced, but rather were *open doors*, into which it would have been a lack of faith and courage not to have entered, have resulted in the present extent of the institution, which is as follows:—

1.—The Central Refuge and Industrial Home, Frances Street, Strangeways, the headquarters, to which all applicants come, and where Industrial Training is carried on.

2.—Home for Working Boys and Lads' Institute Great Ducie Street, Sirangeways.

3.—Brigade Boys' Home, where dwell the Caxton, and Shoeblock Brigades.

4.—The Boys' Emigration Training Home, Great Ducie Street, Strangeways.

5.—The Homes for Little Orphan Children (Boys and Girls), Cheetham Hill—six in number.

6.—The Girls' Domestic Service and Emigration Training Home, and Laundry "Rosen Hallas," Cheetham Hill.

7.—The Cottage for Convalescent Children, "Rosen Hallas," Cheetham Hill.

8.—"Bethesda" Home for Crippled and Incurable Children, Cheetham Hill.

9.—The Book Saloon and Offices of "Christian Worker," Great Ducie Street.

10.—The Open-all-Night Shelter for little wanderers, 1, Chatham Street, Piccadilly, City.

11.—The Police Court Mission to Lads and Girls.

12.—The Sea-side Home for weak and sickly children, Lytham.

13.—The Day Nursery, Carruthers Street, Ancoats.

14.—Messenger and Parcel Brigades, Chatham Street.

15.—Summer Camp for Poor City Boys, Birkdale, Southport.

16.—Prison Gate Mission, Great Ducie Street, Strangeways.

17.—The Training Ship, "Indefatigable," New Ferry, Birkenhead, (In connection with).

18.—The Canadian Branch Home, Belleville, Ontario, Canada, (In connection with).

The number of boys working in the Messenger and Parcel Brigades (who do not live in our Homes), was **188**.

The number of attendances at the Day Nursery was **3,345**, fees paid by the mothers £25. 17s. 2d.

At the Prison Gate Mission, the number of discharged prisoners who accepted the invitation given each morning at the gate, and came to the Mission Room, was **12,384**.

Having on former occasions described in more or less of detail the work at the various branches, it will only be necessary on the present occasion in briefly alluding to each, to say a very few words on any special feature which the work of the year has called into prominence.

The Central Refuge, Strangeways,

which for so many years was the scene of frequent alterations rendered necessary by the growing needs of the work, is now complete, and with its new workshops, Dining Hall, Reading Room, Dormitories, Infirmary, Play-room and ground, Steam Laundry, etc., is in all respects fitted for carrying on the important work of which it is the centre; has continued full and active throughout the year, under the care of our excellent Superintendents Mr. and Mrs. F. A. Wood; no day passes without some cases of sorrow, suffering, or need, seeking its ever ready aid.

One feature of the work carried on here demands a special word, viz., *The Workshops*: These five shops, Joinering, Shoemaking, Tailoring, Letterpress Printing, and Firewood Making which together give employment

to 70 of our boys have been specially active throughout the year, and after paying boys and foremen's wages, and bearing their share of working expenses, have added no less than £523 8s. 7d. as net profit to the funds of the Institution! The boys in the various shops (except the Firewood) are regularly apprenticed and learn their trade under the teaching of efficient foremen; in addition to the work which comes through the Institution, the shops receive outside orders, which they undertake to execute in good style and at fair and moderate prices.—(Orders and enquiries to be addressed to Mr. F. A. Wood, Superintendent.)

The other Homes which comprise the Strangeways group, viz:

The Working Lads' Home and Institute.

The Brigade Boys' Home, and

The Boys' Emigration Training Home,

have each been fairly active during the year, fulfilling the end for which they were established; especially has this been so with the latter, where a large family have been in training for the Canadian life which they have chosen, and to which they will go in a few weeks under the care of the Rev. Robert and Mrs. Wallace. We will say more of this under the head of Emigration later on.

The Cheetham Hill Group.

Here is quite a colony of Homes which should be visited after leaving Strangeways by all who desire to form any just conception of the extent and variety of the work. They are situated in George Street, Cheetham Hill, and comprise the following.

Six Orphan Homes.

For Fatherless and Motherless Children, Boys and Girls.

Eighteen children, the mother, and young helper, constitute each household, wherein a very real family life is lived.

The Rosen Hallas Training Home and Laundry.

For girls, both for emigration and for home domestic service. The elder girls at this house do all the washing and laundry work for all the Cheetham Hill Homes.

The Convalescent Cottage

in Rosen Hallas ground, which has been well filled during the year with weak and ailing children from the adjoining Homes. And finally

The Bethesda Home for Crippled and Incurable Children

whose beneficent object is declared to be—"To provide for crippled, maimed, paralysed, and generally incurable poor children, whose cases are unsuitable for the ordinary hospitals of the district." With such this beautiful Home has been well filled throughout the year.

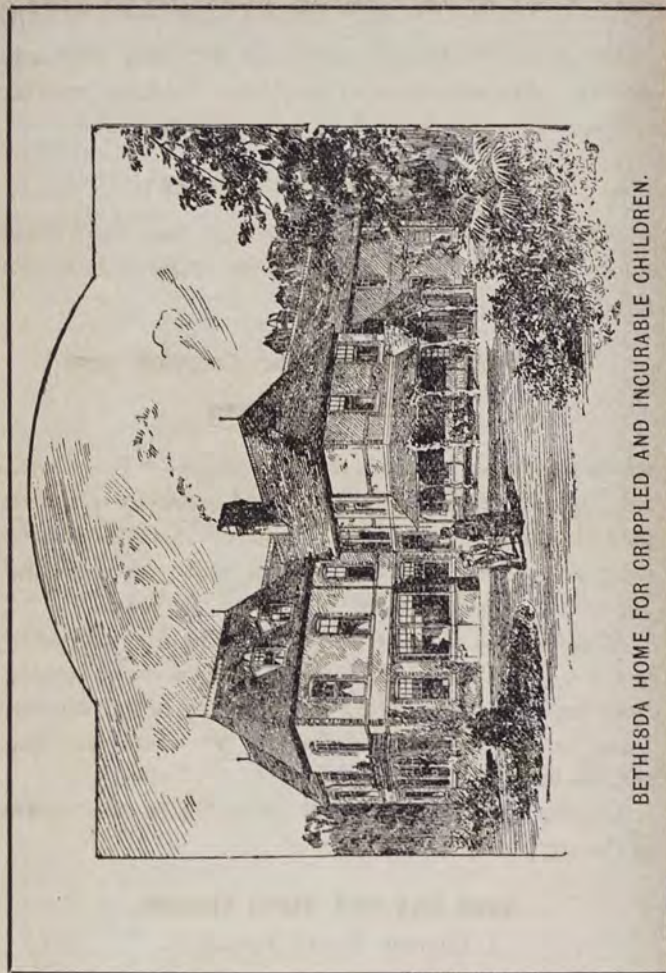
Altogether an average number of **200** are supported in these Cheetham Hill Homes, the vacancies arising from boys and girls leaving for situations or for service, being almost immediately filled by cases awaiting admission.

Leaving Cheetham Hill and returning to the centre of the city, we come to the

which for many years has kept an ever open door for all cases of juvenile suffering and need; during the past

year no less than **656** children were received, of which **187** were brought in by the police and others, between ten o'clock at night and four o'clock in the morning! These figures speak eloquently as to the usefulness of this branch. It has been specially and increasingly useful to friendless and exposed elder girls, who from various causes are found so in a great city like Manchester. Many such now under our care have cause to thank God for our ever open door.

Sea-Side Home and Summer Camp

next claim a word. The former at Lytham, has received **218** weak and sickly children, chiefly girls, during the year; while the latter, now at Southport, has given a week's healthy and happy holiday to **1511** boys from the poorest parts of our city, the largest number yet reached.—Mr. T. L. Ellwood and Mr. J. P. Ellison, both old friends of the work, giving valued assistance, as they have for many years past.

The Manchester and Salford Society for Prevention of Cruelty to Children,

has had an active year. The number of cases dealt with being **705** involving the welfare of **2542** children. Of these **705** cases we carried **100** into court and obtained **94** convictions! An enlightened public opinion, the result of years of agitation, having given force to the provisions of the recent Act which rendered parental neglect cruelty, and therefore punishable, enabled us to carry these cases to a successful issue.

The National Society of London, having some two years ago established a Branch in Manchester, it was anxiously considered at the close of last year whether it would not be wiser to join forces with them rather than continue two organizations working for the same end, and with exactly the same means.

The Committee decided that on the whole it would be for the good of the work if the Manchester and Salford Society as a separate organization ceased to exist from January 1st of this year, three members of the old Committee joining the local Committee of the National Society. This arrangement has now been carried out, and the Committee trust that this action on this difficult subject will meet the approval of the great body of the subscribers; it in no way affects or limits

our work in behalf of homeless, neglected, or suffering children, it merely hands over the enforcing of the law in cases of cruelty to the National Society.

The Messenger and Parcel Brigade.

In this Branch we have to report a year of useful work with increasing numbers.

As far as the large numbers will permit efforts are made to deal individually with those who come and lead them to a better life, and where they are juveniles to place them if necessary in some of the branches of the Institution.

We have reserved this subject until the close of the report as we desire to say a special word about it. The late Lord Derby, not an extreme enthusiast on any subject, whose presence and earnest words at our Annual Meeting of 1873 will be remembered by some, when speaking on this subject, said:—

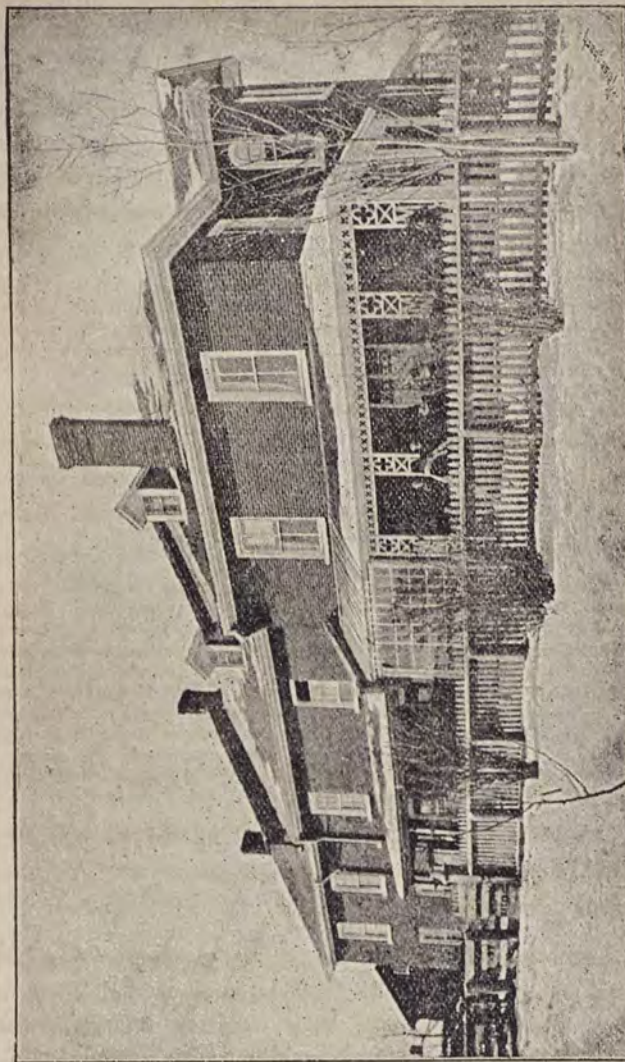
“We are, we must be an emigrating country; with our small area and with our growing population we have no choice in the matter; and I do not hesitate to say that so to dispose of the growing swarms of the poorest class of juveniles is not a matter of humanity only, but one also of public safety.

A very thoughtful Member of Parliament who has given much attention to social questions—Samuel Smith, M.P. for Flintshire—who has been to the Colonies and personally investigated the subject there, said recently on a public occasion:

“Though the emigration policy had been before the public for 20 years, and had worked with the most perfect success; and though the testimony was unanimous that it was the most effective means of saving destitute children, yet they were still persisting in this country in bringing up masses of children under the poor law authorities in the most various and wasteful manner. Fifty thousand children were herded together in Workhouse Schools, many thousands more in Industrial Schools, and were costing the country annually a large sum of money for their maintenance, with the result that a large proportion of them drifted back into the slough of despond from which they had originally been taken.”

We feel that these two important utterances will fitly introduce the subject and speak more powerfully than words of our own.

A reference to our statistics will show that we sent 108 boys and girls to Canada during 1894, placing them in farm homes which had been carefully selected, thus raising the total we have so provided for to over 800,—

the cost per head, which includes good outfit of warm clothing, ocean and railway journey on both sides, and also cost of oversight and visitation from the head quarters in Canada for three years or more after arrival is £10 to £11. Thus for a single payment of say ten guineas, a child is provided for for life, and all our experience during many years proves,—*well provided for!* Each of these 800 children, if left at home, would have cost the country, either in Workhouse Schools, or in Charitable Institutions say £15 per annum, and taking their average stay in such at four to five years, A TOTAL OF £60 TO £75! Thus from a monetary standpoint emigration for our homeless and destitute children is an enormous saving, and it is a marvel that guardians of the poor do not more largely avail themselves of it. By so doing we believe they would shew themselves truer guardians both of the best interests of the poor, and also of the pockets of the ratepayers!

But we claim for emigration more than mere monetary advantage, we urge it because—*First.*—It permanently saves the children by removing them from old degrading surroundings, which frequently causes them if left at home to relapse into the misery of their former lot.

Second.—It relieves our overcrowded population at home where the struggle for life is every year growing more fierce.

Third.—It supplies the greatest need of our own colony, *viz.*, healthy, hopeful labour, which must bring a reflex benefit upon the mother country.

For these reasons we venture to ask for juvenile

emigration, a larger measure of support than it has hitherto received.

With the view of developing still further this branch, as well as investigating the present condition of those emigrated in former years, a member of our Committee (Mr. G. R. Kirlew) visited Canada and the North-West Provinces during the past year with entirely satisfactory

results. He found the large number he was able to visit of those sent out in years gone by *prospering*, (out of 189 either actually visited or heard directly from, only 2 were actual failures), and on proceeding to the North-West, to which we had already sent some elder lads, he found a large demand and good openings for youths from 15 to 18 years, and was enabled to establish at Grenfell, N.W.T., a temporary agency pending more permanent arrangements for the reception of such.

A Need Still Unmet.

But on all hands it is recommended that some preparatory farm training should be given at home; that it is too much to expect boys fresh from street and city life,

to settle down to the entirely different and almost opposite life of a Canadian farm. There is no doubt that a small home farm within easy distance of our city, where the simple elements of farm life could be acquired, would be a great help in the work of Emigration, and by cultivating therein the vegetables, etc., required at the various homes, it could to some extent be made self-supporting. Might we suggest to the supporters of the Refuges that in no way could they mark this Twenty-fifth Anniversary more suitably than by providing the Institution with these two equipments for the more effective carrying on of the work, viz., a Receiving Home in North West Canada, and a Farm Home in England.

Now 'ere we close, a word about finances.

Finances.

We are glad to be able to speak hopefully of the financial position of the Institution; a reference to our very full and interesting Financial Statement will shew that although there appears a debit balance of £1213 19s. 5d. on the General Account of the year, that is entirely owing to the deficiencies of the three previous years. The actual expenditure of the past year £11,802 5s. 6d. has been more than met by the year's income, viz., £12,536 17s. 3d. This satisfactory result we hope, through the liberality of the friends of the Institution, to be able to repeat this year: still the debit balance alluded to does exist, and seeing it was chiefly caused through the removal by death of some large donors, the Committee feel that the best way of providing for it, as well as to prevent its recurrence, is by *a large increase of small and*

moderate subscribers. They would put this point very earnestly before every reader of this Twenty-fifth Report, and ask them to secure this year, at least one new guinea, two guinea, or five guinea subscriber. While the work carried on by the Institution is a work for God, it is no less one in which every citizen has an interest and shares a direct benefit; perhaps the most powerful argument that we can use in this direction, is the fact—and it is a fact full of significance not only financially but morally,—that these boys and girls thus rescued from the streets, contributed during last year, towards their own support, no less than £2,920 6s. 2d. Thus is maintained one leading feature of the work which met every boy's eye on entering the first Refuge in Deansgate,—“*We help those who try to help themselves.*”

Closing Words.

We would gratefully acknowledge with much appreciation the voluntary services of many friends, among whom are Messrs. Farrar & Co., the Honorary Solicitors; Drs. Boutflower and Rodger, the Honorary Medical Officers; Mr. Simms, the Honorary Dentist, and the large staff of Collectors, Teachers, Members of Working Parties, etc.

The Committee cannot close this Twenty-fifth Annual Report without acknowledging the hand of God in all the past and laying at His feet the praise in respect of all that has been done. The health and strength of body and mind, the wisdom and discretion so constantly required, the silver and the gold so needful for the support of the evergrowing numbers, the faithful and devoted staff of helpers,

without whom little could have been accomplished, all have been freely given, and all have been from Him.

The old subscribers also, as well as the general public, will be glad to know that the principles which lie at the foundation of the Institution which are incorporated in the trust deed, and which the Committee cherish more than ever, still guide the work, viz.,

First.—To receive only practically homeless and destitute children.

Second.—To receive such at once without the delay and expense of election, and irrespective of creed.

Third.—To give to each one thus admitted a sound, mental, religious, and industrial training, and so fit them for a life of honest labour.

So long as these principles guide the work we have no fear for the future.

We end as we began—of all the questions which press their claims upon English men and women to-day, none we believe can compare in importance with that of the children. If we rise to the claim which it makes, and give it that place which its supreme importance demands, we shall be sowing seed which will bear a harvest of blessing not only for ourselves but for our children's children in days to come.

ADDENDUM.

While the foregoing pages, written by Mr. Leonard K. Shaw, the Hon. Sec., give the report of the year, noteworthy as the completion of the twenty-fifth year of work, the Committee feel that they must add a page to the history of the Institution during the past quarter of a century.

No one who knows anything of the executive power by which the Institution has been guided from its inception until now, will deem it unsuitable that a personal reference should be made in this connection. To write a full history of the Charity would be to write the life of Mr. Shaw for the same period. It has often been called "Shaw's" Refuges, and the law of association has not been strained, much less violated by the title. He it was, who planted and carefully tended the seedling now grown into the great tree with many branches. The true law of growth has been well exemplified in the slow and gradual increase of the extent and scope of the Institution, and in the abiding character of its work. The confidence and support of the community has been gained in the same way, gradually and steadily. To say that Mr. Shaw's own personal character, patient perseverance, unremitting attention, and labour, have, combined, been the principal factor in the so successful establishment of an Institution in which the city has a legitimate pride, is scarcely necessary. And though the subject of these remarks may deprecate the reference made to himself, yet our subscribers and friends will not think it unfitting on

this important anniversary that honour should be given to whom honour is so eminently due.

The Committee cannot hope to adequately convey their estimate of Mr. Shaw's labours on behalf of the poor and homeless children of this district, but they would at least bear testimony as those who are in a position to know, to a life devoted to the service of this Institution in a spirit of obedience to the two-fold command of love to God and man. And this is no less true of Mrs. Shaw who has so worthily seconded her husband's efforts in promoting the real interests of the children throughout the whole twenty-five years. The Committee earnestly pray that they both may long be spared to give that counsel and direction which so rich an experience has made invaluable to the cause they love so well.

(CENTRAL REFUGE AND GREAT DUCIE STREET HOMES).

During the past year there has been very little real sickness at any of our Strangeways Homes; the serious list comprises one case of Typhoid, and one of Rheumatic Fever; and several cases of Pneumonia. I am thankful to add without any deaths. All the boys are thoroughly well looked after, the sanitary condition of the buildings satisfactory, and the food and clothing all that could be wished for.

(CHEETHAM HILL HOMES).

At Bethesda Home, last year has been one of exceptional trial. Beside the outbreak of Scarlet Fever some months ago, causing the death of one girl previously seriously crippled from Heart disease, no less than eight other sufferers have passed away from us. Most of these had suffered from incurable disease of Spine, and having been admitted only that what remained of their short lives might be brightened—this was notably so in the case of "Daniel," (*Spina Bifida*).

In the other Cheetham Hill Homes, the health of the many inmates has been very good on the whole during the year,—only few serious cases and only one case, (*Bright's disease*) proving fatal.

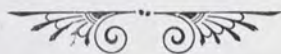
