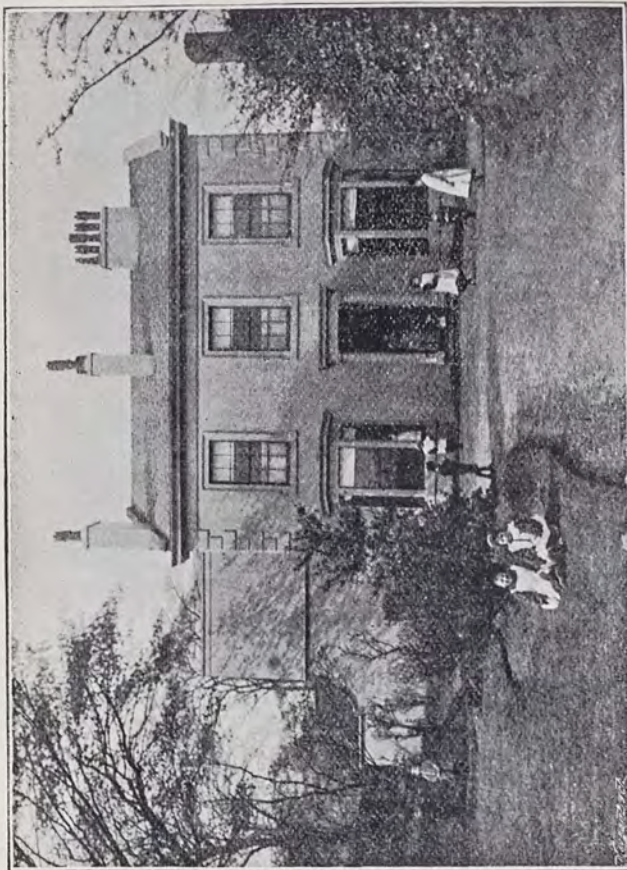

SUMMARY OF ANNUAL MEETING.

The twenty-seventh Annual Meeting of the MANCHESTER AND SALFORD BOYS AND GIRLS' REFUGES AND HOMES, AND CHILDREN'S AID SOCIETY, was held in the Free Trade Hall, Manchester, on Monday, April 5th, 1897.

The Lord Mayor (Mr. Alderman J. F. Roberts,) took the chair at 7 o'clock, supported by the Lady Mayoress (Miss Roberts), the Dean of Manchester (Dr. Maclure), the Rev. Dr. McLaren, the Rev. Arthur Parkinson, Hy. Lee, Esq., J.P., Andrew Boutflower, Esq., Henry Charlton, Esq., John Thomson, Esq., James Boyd, Esq., W. H. Newett, Esq., etc., etc.

The Rev. Arthur Parkinson offered prayer.

The Annual Report and Balance Sheet were presented. The Hon. Sec., Mr. Leonard K. Shaw, gave a summary of the Report, which was taken as read, and an abstract of the Financial Statement was read by the Hon. Treasurer, Mr. Henry Charlton.

It was then moved by the Rev. Dr. McLaren, seconded by Andrew Boutflower, Esq., supported by the Dean of Manchester, (Dr. Maclure), and resolved:—

“ That the Report together with the Financial Statement be adopted, printed, and circulated under the direction of the Committee; and that the Committee for the ensuing year be Messrs. William J. Crossley, John Thomson, Richard B. Taylor, James Boyd, Thos. R. Ackroyd, Alfred Haworth; the Honorary Secretary, Leonard K. Shaw; the Honorary Treasurer, Henry Charlton; and the Auditors, Messrs. Theodore Jones, Crewdson, and Youatt.”

Afterwards a musical programme was rendered by the children from the various homes, and much appreciated by a large audience.

A vote of thanks to the Lord Mayor for presiding closed the proceedings.

Is it not to break to the hungry thy bread, and that thou bring home wandering poor? when thou seest one naked that thou cover him, and that from thine own flesh thou hide not thyself? Then shall break forth like the morning thy light, and thy health shall immediately spring. Yea, go before thee shall thy righteousness, the glory of Jehovah shall sweep thee on."—ISAIAH LVIII, 6-8.



THE record of the work of the Strangeways Institutions for orphan, homeless and suffering children, for the year which ended with December 31st 1896, being the twenty-seventh year since its foundation, does not differ materially from many of those which have gone before. The numbers dealt with have been in most departments rather in excess of the previous year, but the raw human material we work upon remains the same. The object set before us in the original Trust Deed,—To Reclaim, Reform, and Evangelise homeless and

destitute children, knows no change, while the means used to attain this great end are substantially what they have been. But amidst this unity of design there has been infinite variety of operations. Owing to great difference in the characters dealt with, they require corresponding differences of treatment, and this, not only at the time of admission, but also in the subsequent dealing with each case.

The daily care, oversight, guiding and training carried on in the sixteen Homes, which comprise the institution, with their corresponding large families, has been a large work of itself; while in addition, no day has passed without fresh applications for aid either permanent or temporary, each one of which needed and received prompt attention and careful investigation.

For the sake of new friends who have never realised the extent of the work; as well as for the sake of old friends who are liable to forget it, we just briefly name the various branches, all of which are in active operation to-day.

- 1.—The Central Refuge and Industrial Home, Francis Street, Strangeways, the headquarters, to which all applicants come, and where Industrial Training is carried on.
- 2.—Home for Working Boys and Lads' Institute, Great Ducie Street, Strangeways.
- 3.—Brigade Boys' Home, where dwell the Shoeblack Brigade.
- 4.—The Boys' Emigration Training Home, Great Ducie Street Strangeways.
- 5.—The Homes for Little Orphan Children (Boys and Girls), Cheetham Hill—six in number.
- 6.—The Girls' Domestic Service and Emigration Training Home, and Laundry "Rosen Hallas," Cheetham Hill.
- 7.—The Cottage for Convalescent Children, "Rosen Hallas," Cheetham Hill.

- 8.—"Bethesda" Home for Crippled and Incurable Children, Cheetham Hill.
- 9.—Home for Neglected, Motherless Children, Grove House, Tetlow Fold, Cheetham Hill.
- 10.—The Open-all-Night Shelter for little wanderers, 1, Chatham Street, Piccadilly, City.
- 11.—The Sea-side Home for weak and sickly children, Lytham.
- 12.—The Day Nursery, Carruthers Street, Ancoats.
- 13.—Summer Camp for Poor City Boys, Birkdale, Southport.
- 14.—The Book Saloon and offices of "Children's Haven," Great Ducie Street.
- 15.—The Police Court Mission to Lads and Girls.
- 16.—The Boys' Messenger Brigades, Chatham Street.
- 17.—Prison Gate Mission, Great Ducie Street, Strangeways.
- 18.—The Training Ship, "Indefatigable," New Ferry, Birkenhead. (in connection with.)
- 19.—The Canadian Branch Homes, Belleville, Ontario, and Grenfell, N.W.T.

By means of these, which meet the needs of almost every description of child destitution existing in our midst, a total number of **2879** children have been dealt with during the year, (these figures include those given a week's holiday at our camp,) as against **2787** in the previous year, and these figures, be it remembered, do not include those aided by the Messenger Brigade, and the Day Nursery, as they do not dwell under our roof.

The fresh applications for admission to our permanent homes numbered during the past year **493**, of whom 399 were boys, and 94 girls, of these

A very wide area supplied some of these applicants; they came from London and Dartford in the South, to Durham and Bishop Auckland in the North; Liverpool and Leeds sent us several, and Sheffield, Doncaster, and Rotherham contributed a few; they came from Chester and Birkenhead on the West, and Scarborough and Sunderland on the East coast, seeking admission. Stafford and St. Helens, Birmingham, and Wrexham, Halifax and Nuneaton, Burton-on-Trent and Belper; each sent one or more applicants seeking our aid. While cases from Dublin and Belfast shewed that the Emerald Isle had claimants for our help.

Not—let it be clearly understood—that we received applications from these various and distant places, and admitted children direct from there. We are a local Institution, and find ample scope for our efforts within the limits of Lancashire; but boys and girls from the foregoing towns being found in our midst, homeless and friendless upon our streets, at once by that fact become eligible for any help the Institution can give, and we thus prevent the temporary wanderer from becoming a confirmed vagrant and street idler.

In this connection the goodly number of boys and girls which appear in our table of results as “Placed with Friends,” forms a not unimportant part of our work.

Educationally their condition was as follows:

These **303** boys and girls thus admitted, being added to the **405** in the Refuges and Homes, when the year began, gives a total of **708** under care and training during 1896.

In former reports the work carried on at the various branches and departments has been explained in detail, and it will not be necessary to do so on this occasion. As we name them in their order a very few words concerning each will suffice.



WALTER.

It is about thirteen years since Walter came to us, a weak puny child of ten, having lost both parents some years before. After some years in the Cheetham Hill Homes he much desired to be a sailor. He spent three years on the "Indefatigable" Training Ship with credit, and to day is third officer in the merchant service.



ALFRED

Came to us about fifteen years ago fatherless, motherless, and absolutely friendless, without shoes to his feet, or cap on his head, a complete little five year old arab!

This is his photograph to-day, a strong, hopeful young fellow in a good situation abroad.

The Central Refuge,

which is the headquarters of the work, has continued practically full throughout the year. Here are the offices, and here come all the applicants in the first instance, excepting those who come, or are brought to the Open-day-and-Night Shelter, Chatham Street, Piccadilly.

This central home, with its large open yard or playground, reading and games room, swimming bath, band room, etc., is now equipped with all that is requisite for the training into good and useful men, the boys who are brought under its roof.

All those of school age attend the Southall Street Board School, and the Committee can testify to the excellence of the education given there; while those of working age find their place in one of the five workshops, the busy hum of which is heard on every side.

Again we have to report a year's fair health, good conduct, and excellent arrangements, as regards cleanliness, sanitation, and order, all of which, reflects infinite credit upon the excellent superintendent and his wife, and has called forth the warm approval of the Government Inspector.

The following cases will illustrate the class admitted to the Central Refuge.

"Jimmy" came to us one winter's evening, ragged, dirty, and destitute, craving shelter. We took him in, and the investigation of his case which gave considerable trouble, showed that he had had a very varied life. His early years had been spent roaming about the country with his mother, who gained a living by hawking, and becoming careless, she gave him to some people who agreed to bring him up.

After a short time his early training began to shew its results, and he became a wanderer, leaving his home for short periods, until his adopted parents became tired of him, when he left a busy town in the far north of England and went on tramp, and for six months he wandered about, supporting himself by begging. He was completely run down when he reached Manchester, and some street lads told him of the Refuge, where he came in a sad condition.

He was absolutely destitute and friendless, but the open door of the Refuge welcomed him to the commencement of a new life. There for thirteen months with special care, he was trained in habits of truthfulness and industry. His animal spirits peculiarly fitting him for a seafaring life, and after careful consideration, it was decided to gratify his ambition to become a sailor. He is now one of the Refuge boys on a training ship, where he still retains an excellent character.

Our needy applicants come to us in various ways.

"George's" case was brought under our notice by one of the visitors in the slums of Salford. He was an orphan whose mother had been buried "by the Parish" some three weeks previous, and the lad had been sheltered and fed by the poor neighbours in this wretched slum. The lad, however, with no one to control him, was gradually drifting to swell the number of lads who infest our streets, making a scanty livelihood by selling papers, waxlights, and carrying parcels; and sheltering themselves at night, among the vicious surroundings of a common lodging house.

George required special supervision and care, and at the present time is working in our Homes, proving himself grateful for the chance given him to become a respectable, God-fearing man.

The Workshops

have continued busy throughout the year, the sales reaching a larger amount than ever before. The net result to the institution, after paying foremen and boys' wages, and bearing their share of working expenses, is a profit of £298 8s. 8d.

The Working Lads' Home and Institute

has done a quiet but useful work throughout the year.

The advantages offered here at a very moderate rate to working youths, who are strangers in Manchester and unable to afford private apartments are great indeed, and only required to be more widely known in order to be more largely used. Each youth has his own separate little bed-room, use of reading room, games room, and fine gymnasium, etc.

The Brigade Boys' Home

has received a total of 187 boys during the year. The following specimen cases will show the class helped at this home. Both boys came to us about six months ago.

"Joe" was a typical street lad, when he made application for admission. All through the summer he had been following race meetings, and had supported himself by cleaning boots, selling race cards, and waxlights, and as the season was now at a close, he had drifted into our big city, and had been for four or five weeks living in different common lodging houses and picking up a precarious living. His face already showed the degradation and cunning associated with the racecourse, and it was with considerable difficulty that we could gain his confidence, and so get him to give a truthful account of himself.

He had been a wanderer for some considerable time, attributing his first start on the downward path to his father, who habitually got drunk and thrashed him. As far as we could learn, he had been honest amid these terrible surroundings, and having proved himself worthy, and been carefully trained, we hope, ere long, to give him a fresh start in the new land, where we have every confidence, that the love and care bestowed on this once waif, will be amply repaid.

The other was a South country lad, who had wandered to Manchester seeking work.

"Tom" was brought to the Refuge one night by a Police officer, who found him cold and destitute in the streets of Manchester. His very early years were spent among fair surroundings,

but after the death of the mother, the father began to drink and contracted loose habits. Some three years since he was turned out of doors by the father's "housekeeper." He complained to a neighbour of illusage, and the neighbour sheltered him for some time. The father got into debt and finally went off with the woman.

The lad then got casual employment with a contractor, and for some time jobbed about at different stables. He then tramped into the Midlands, and got work in a brick yard, and worked there part of the summer, but at the end of the season, he had once more to begin his wanderings, and arrived in Manchester, footsore and hungry. His story upon investigation was found to be true, and he asked for a chance to be given him.

Needless to say, this was granted, and he has proved himself worthy of it. He shortly sails for the new land, where, amid new surroundings, we trust he will do credit to himself and to the Homes in Manchester.

Emigration Training Home.

This Home, the fourth of the Strangeways group, has been busy throughout the year receiving and preparing the large family who dwell under its roof for their new homes in the West, to which 'ere long they will go.

The Committee feel increasingly the importance and value of this branch of their work, and would commend it very earnestly to the support of the inhabitants of this district. In no way can a boy or girl be provided for so cheaply. One single payment of £10 provides a complete outfit, and the ocean and railway journey, to Mr. and Mrs. Wallace's large and hospitable distributing Home in Belleville, Ontario, from whence they are at once placed in selected farm homes, where they are regularly visited and reported on, until their position in life is permanently assured. Thus for ten pounds there is a life provision for those who would otherwise be an

annual cost and might be a source of weakness to the old country.

The benefits of wisely conducted emigration are well summed up in a letter which appeared in the *Manchester Guardian* of March 22nd. Our attention had been called to a paragraph in the *Guardian* from the Ottawa correspondent of the *Times* respecting the "importation of English waifs into Canada." The proposed legislation will not affect in any way this branch of the Strangeways work. Juvenile emigration as conducted by the Committee of this institution, has always carefully guarded the very points which the Canadian Legislature calls attention to. We give an extract from the letter, which shews the special class we desire to emigrate, and the benefits which thus result, both to the old country and to the new.

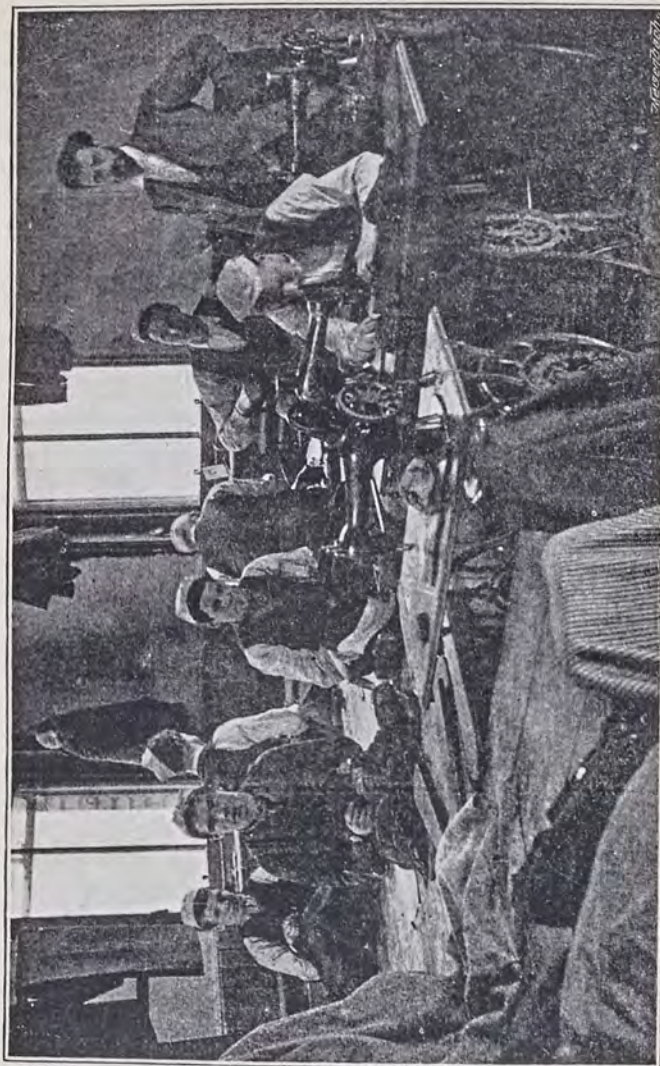
"Each year the subject of emigration assumes greater importance, not only because it relieves our own congested population, but also because it opens a 'door of hope' to many, who, through no fault of their own, find that door closed against them at home.

Need we explain again the class we emigrate? Not the idle, vagrant pauper, still less the vicious and semi-criminal; our colonies will not have such, and they are quite right. Whom, then, do we emigrate? The class is clearly defined—hopeful boys and girls, sound in body and mind, *but who would probably be dragged back by their surroundings to their former state if they remained here.* Give such children fair play, let them not be handicapped in life's race by the dead-weight of vagrant, drunken, or vicious surroundings, and we accomplish three most important things.

First.—We permanently save the children from relapsing into the misery of their former lot.

Second.—We relieve our own overcrowded population, where the struggle for existence grows fiercer every day.

Third.—We supply our own colony with her greatest need, healthy, honest labour."

The actual experience of over fifteen years confirms the wisdom of these principles; failure is a rare thing with those we emigrate. During these years we have placed in Canadian homes over 1,000 children, the vast majority of whom have done, and are doing well, and with the majority of whom we are still in touch. The continued demand for our boys and girls in Ontario is a further proof of the success of those already sent. It is entirely misleading to call them "English Waifs." Whatever some of them may have been in the past, the period of careful training which they have received has changed all that. Every mail brings letters and reports, telling of the well-doing of those sent out in previous years, who, in many cases, have sent money to enable us to send others.

Any reader who desires to be the means of providing for a homeless child, can have a photograph of the boy or girl thus adopted, on receipt of £10, by the Hon. Secretary.

Before going to Cheetham Hill we must mention the

Open Day & Night Shelter.

1, Chatham Street, Piccadilly.

This has been a busy centre of work throughout the year, receiving no less than 488 young people between the ages of 3 and 18 years within its widespread arms, and under its sheltering roof. Of this total number 117 were brought in by the police and others between the hours of 10 p.m. and 4 a.m., in an absolutely homeless and sometimes perilous state.

The immense value of this branch lies in the fact that it is an immediate rescue home for wandering boys and girls (the latter up to 18 years) who from various causes find themselves destitute and in grave moral danger on our streets. It is amongst elder girls specially that the chief value of this home is seen. Of the total number received during the past year 105 were girls between the ages of 12 and 18 years. To have in the centre of a city such as ours a well appointed house, with doors open day and night for the reception of such, as well as for poor and suffering children of younger ages, is of itself a fact of the highest importance, and one which appeals to the judgment and feelings of all who know the conditions of life in our great centres of population.

The Police and School Board authorities have used the Shelter largely during the year, and instead of taking their court cases to the 'lock-ups' have brought them to Chatham Street for the night, thus sparing the young people the contamination of the police cells.

The Cheetham Hill group of Homes,

ten in number, now claim a word. They are situated in George Street, Cheetham Hill, adjoining Broughton Park. They comprise

Six Orphan Homes,

For fatherless and motherless children, boys and girls.

These, as formerly, have continued very full throughout the year. They are named after the several donors.

The Langworthy Home (girls). The Higgins Home (boys).

The Garnett Home (boys). The Atkinson Home (boys).

The Crossley Home (boys). School Girls Home (girls).

Each home contains eighteen children, a mother, and a helper, and a very true and natural family life is lived, the results of which are seen in the well doing of the children in after life.

The Rosen Hallas Girls' Training Home and Laundry.

This home receives homeless and destitute girls, and also those in grave moral danger, and gives an excellent training in all household and laundry work, and thus fits them either for emigration, or home domestic service. It dealt with 88 cases during the past year, of which 35 went forth in the spring to Canada, excellent reports being subsequently received of each of them. Once more the home is full, and a similar band are looking forward to sail for Western homes in a few weeks.

The very decided christian influence exercised in this home has been owned of God to the lasting blessing of many who were on the brink of ruin when received here. Marvellous changes have been, and are being wrought. It is the Lord's blessing on the faith, and love, and care of Miss Smethurst and her valued helpers. We subjoin a few letters recently to hand from girls now in respectable situations, who were formerly received into this home in great need.

"A. H.," who came to us about three years ago, aged 15 years, writes :

October, 1896.

Dear Mr. Shaw,

"I hope this will find you in good health. Out of gratitude for all you did for me, both at home and in sending me to Canada, I have much pleasure in sending you a dollar. It may perhaps help

you to send other poor girls out. I have got a good home, and like my place, and master, and mistress very much. I go to Sunday School with Martha and Amy, who came out with me, and who are in situations near to. I am trying to be a good girl, and live a better life. Please excuse me for not sending more, but I will next time. Please give my love to mother and the girls at Rosen Hallas, so no more.

The next is to Miss Smethurst, from one who had a very bad mother, well known at the Police Court.

November, 4th, 1896.

Dear Mother,

"I write these few lines to you, hoping you are well. You will, I know, be glad to hear that I have got a very good home, and that I like the country very much. Give my love to all the girls in the home, I hope they are good and that there is no more wrong things done to grieve you, like I used to do. Dear mother, I gave my heart to God at Mr. Clarke's mission, but still at times, I give way to an evil temper, and it is a very hard battle to fight, and if it was not for the Divine help that holds me up, I should fall again and again, but thanks be to God that giveth us the victory over sin. I wish I had turned to God before. How often would He have covered me with His wings, as a hen gathers her chickens, but I would not let Him. But this could not last for ever. It is a pleasure to know that He holds me with own right hand and will not let go. Give my love to all the girls. I hope to send you a longer letter next time.

The following is from the eldest of a family of three, who came to us in great destitution three years ago.

December 27th, 1896.

Dear Mr. Shaw,

I was glad to get the letter and card you so kindly sent me, telling me, that though you do not see my face, and hear my voice, still I am not forgotten at the old home. I can never thank you enough for all the kindness visited on me and my sisters, and ever in my prayers I thank God for using you to fit me for this country. I have not got anything to send this year, but I can answer the question on the card you sent me, for God brought me one day to see my sins as I had not seen them before, and I know Him now as my personal Saviour. I have not forgotten the meeting we had the last night at Ro-en Hallas about "Thy people shall be my people, and thy God my God," and mother's (Miss Smethurst) last Bible Class

on the lawn for us girls on the 30th Deut., and also the Bethesda meetings.

My sister and I are very happy in our Canadian homes. I wish Mr. Ashley would try and find out where my aunt lives, and tell her we are getting on well. Please send me your and Mrs. Shaw's photos if you can, I did not get one when I left. Please write as soon as you can.

The next is from a girl born and reared in Angel Meadow, and rescued from the very worst surroundings.

December 25th, 1896.

Dear Mr. Shaw,

I now write you a letter telling you about my new home. It is a good one, and I go to Sunday School every Sunday, and see Annie and Mary very often. I send you a dollar to help the girls to come over next year. I got your letter, book, and cards at Christmas, and was very pleased with them. It is much colder here than in England, but we have lots of nice fruit and flowers of all kinds.

Wishing everybody a happy Christmas and a glad New Year, and with love to all,

The following is to Miss Smethurst, from a girl who had a very bad Mother, and whose ruin was almost certain had she remained here.

January, 1897.

Dear Mother,

I begin the New Year by writing you a letter, and hope it will find you quite well, as it leaves me at present. I am now in my new home on a farm, where they have cows, calves, sheep, horses, hens, and all sorts of things. I can milk cows, and churn. I am sorry to hear that Emma is so ill, and I hope and pray that she may be spared yet, to come out here. I send my love to Miss Cooke, and Miss Beaumont, and all the children. Tell them what a fine country this is. You never go hungry whilst there is a friend in Canada. There is always someone to support you if you do your duty, and they will teach you to do anything if you are willing to learn.

When you fetch the girls out next year, I hope you will come and see me. I must now conclude with love.

An Orphan Home girl who came to us many years ago, and is now in a good situation near Manchester, writes :

I have got a very good place, and I believe with God still keeping me as He has done before, I shall keep it. I am so thankful that I can own you as my friends. I must say good-bye for the present.

Want of space prevents our giving many more similar letters, but our readers will not fail to be struck with the very sensible way in which these girls express themselves, as well as with the practical proof which many give of their gratitude.

We give portraits of the following, which will doubtless interest our readers.

A. H., (age 17). Rescued from the lowest surroundings. Since entering the homes A. has resisted every inducement from without, and they have not been few, to return to the old, bad surroundings. She has steadily grown in all that is good and useful, has become a member of a Christian Church, and goes forth to a new home with many prayers.

A. P., (age 16). About twelve months ago word reached us that a family of girls were left friendless and destitute in Gorton. Our Inspector at once went up, found the father dead in the house and three children, of which A. was the eldest, the only living relative known being an Aunt. We at once received the three into one of our homes. A. has grown up a useful, happy girl, and now goes forth into respectable domestic service. (*See portrait opposite page 26*).

The Convalescent Cottage,

in Rosen Hallas grounds, has been kept well filled throughout the year, as in the large families adjoining a certain number of weak and ailing ones are found, who get here the special attention and nourishment which their cases need.

The Bethesda Home for Crippled & Incurables, which provides for "crippled, maimed, paralysed, and generally incurable poor children, whose cases are unsuitable for the ordinary hospitals," has pursued its course of quiet usefulness. Three of the little sufferers have passed away during the year, among whom were "Bertie and Jimmy." They were pleasant in their lives, lying side by side in their cots, a happy sight to all visitors, and in their deaths they were not divided, passing away within a few hours of each other. One cot has been endowed by our old friend and subscriber, Mrs. Barlow, making the total number of cots endowed twenty, while we are glad to be able to add "The Wilmslow Cot" to our named cots, some ladies there having undertaken to provide £20 a year for this purpose.

Home for Neglected Motherless Children,

Tetlow Grove House, George Street.

This, the tenth Home of the Cheetham Hill group, has

just been added at the year's close. It is intended for cases of specially neglected little children, many of whom have recently been brought before us, but who, having one parent living, were not eligible for the Orphan Homes. The house is very suitable for its purpose, standing in its own ground; and the Committee trust that it will fulfil their hopes, and prove a real blessing to a confessedly difficult class to help permanently.

The Sea-Side Home.

This cottage by the sea at Lytham has received **183** weak and ailing children during the year, who have had an average stay of twenty days, and who have returned with evident tokens of the good air of Lytham, and the good care bestowed on them at the home.

The Summer Camp

Birkdale, Southport

has received a total number of **1517** boys from the poorest parts of our city, giving a week's healthy and happy holiday to such on the Birkdale sands at Southport. The Committee desire to acknowledge with many thanks the valued assistance of the Manchester friends who have for so long assisted in this branch, and to many Southport residents who have shewn practical sympathy.

The Day Nursery,

Carruthers Street, Ancoats,

has had a total number of **2971** attendances of little children during 1896, and so fills a useful place in our network of organizations. The fees paid were £22 15s. 4d.

The Police Court Mission to Lads,

AND

The Prison Gate Mission,

complete the chain of useful and blessed effort, which has its centre at Strangeways.

In the *former* of these two, our officers attended the police courts, and **68** cases of elder lads were referred to them by the presiding magistrate, and were either restored to friends, provided with employment, or received into the Refuge, etc., as their cases required.

In the *latter*, as in all previous years, each morning our workers have attended at the gate, and in response to the invitation given,

6,754 men and boys.

3,195 women and girls.

or a total of **9,949** came to the mission room, of this number 1767 signed the Temperance pledge.

The opportunities here of usefulness are very large, only limited by the time and strength which our workers have to bestow. Their efforts are of course chiefly devoted to the younger prisoners, and many have been restored to friends, helped to employment, and won to a

better life. Cast-off clothing of all kinds is much wanted, many leave gaol in clothes utterly unfit to seek employment in, and thus they are prevented obtaining what they most need. Parcels of clothing addressed to Mr. Horne, Working Lads' Institute, Strangeways, will be gratefully received and acknowledged.

A few words on

Finances

must bring this necessarily imperfect record of a year's work to a close.

The total cost of a work so large and so varied, as that which is only barely outlined in the foregoing pages, is of course considerable. The total expenditure on maintenance account was £13,222 7s. 7d., which, with the debt from the previous year, made a liability of £14,362 os. 2d.

This, we are thankful to record, has been met, not however, without applying special amounts, legacies, etc., which have been received during the year. Such special income we cannot of course rely upon, and in view of the fact that during the last few years we have lost several large annual contributors through death and removal, it behoves the Committee and friends of the Institution to make up this loss by increasing the number of annual subscribers, so that the annual income may meet the cost of maintaining efficiently the beneficent operations carried on.

An item of income, £2,512 7s. 7d. is of special interest, being the earnings of the children and profit on their work.

Closing Words.

The Committee cannot close without placing on record their sense of the loss which this institution, in common with every other good work in our midst, has sustained in the passing away of Mr. F. W. Crossley. Since his attention was first called to the work at Strangeways, nearly fifteen years ago, he has taken the deepest interest in its progress; aiding the various developments liberally with his purse, and giving to those on whom the active management fell, his wise counsel and his earnest, loving sympathy. His official connection with the institution was as a member of the Board of Trustees, numerous engagements preventing him taking a more active part; but his name will long be held in loving remembrance in every branch of the work.

Referring to the reports of our two excellent Honorary Medical Officers, it will be seen we have much cause for thankfulness in the general good health of the children, due in a large measure to the attention given to cleanliness, sanitation, etc., by the heads of the various Homes, upon whom it reflects great credit.

And now in conclusion, however lengthy this record may appear to some, those who know most of the extended operations of the charity, and of the daily work which is involved in the care and guiding of its eighteen branches,—all that is involved in the receiving, and investigating, and dealing with, and placing out, both at home and abroad, of the hundreds of children of all ages, who seek our aid,—will realize that it conveys but a poor and imperfect idea of a work, at once absorbing

in its interest, and far reaching in its results. To implant within young minds, (having all the possibilities and responsibilities of life before them, but who have hitherto been under low and degrading influences,) desires after something better, something that will make life a new thing, in other words to "Teach them to live," is the object and aim of the work.

Who is sufficient for these things?

We can only answer, "*Our sufficiency is of God.*"

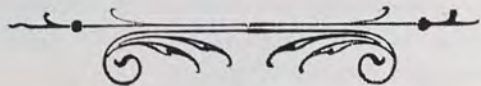

MEDICAL REPORTS,

1896.

(CENTRAL REFUGE AND GREAT DUCIE STREET HOMES).

Our Medical report for the past year is almost entirely satisfactory. We have got rid of the outbreak of Ophthalmia which invaded us, and credit is largely due to the vigilance and circumspection of Mr. and Mrs. Wood.

We have to record three deaths, a very unusual occurrence. Our usual, and most formidable enemy, pneumonia, has not forsaken us, but minor ailments have largely diminished, and there has been an entire absence of infectious disease.

The sanitary condition of the buildings remains good, and the food, clothing, and hygiene, all that could be wished.

(CHEETHAM HILL HOMES).

During the year in the Cheetham Hill Homes, there have been three cases of scarlet fever, and three cases of measles, and all made good recoveries. One case of sudden death occurred at Rosen Hallas through brain abscess, the result of old standing ear disease, and one case of pneumonia at the cottage proved fatal, otherwise the usual good health generally in the Homes has been maintained.

At "Bethesda" Home three of the little Incurable Cripples have been called home after patient suffering.
