SUMMARY OF ANNUAL MEETING.

The twenty-ninth Annual Meeting of the MANCHESTER AND SALFORD BOYS AND GIRLS' REFUGES AND HOMES, AND CHILDREN'S AID SOCIETY, was held in the Free Trade Hall, Manchester, on Monday, March 20th, 1899, at Seven o'clock.

The chair was occupied by The Lord Mayor of Manchester, (Mr. W. H. Vaudrey,) who was accompanied on the platform by The Lady Mayoress, W. Goldthorpe, Esq., W. J. Crossley, Esq., J.P., Hy. Lee, Esq., J.P., John Thomson, Esq., Andrew Boutflower, Esq., Henry Charlton, Esq., James Boyd, Esq., and others.

The Rev. Prebendary Macdonald offered prayer.

A letter was read from the Rt. Hon. The Earl of Aberdeen, expressing his deep regret that he was unable to be present, as he expected.

The Annual Report and Balance Sheet were presented. In the absence through illness of the Hon. Sec., Mr. Leonard K. Shaw, Mr. W. J. Crossley gave a summary of the Report, which was taken as read, and an abstract of the Financial Statement was read by the Hon. Treasurer, Mr. Henry Charlton.

It was then moved by the Lord Mayor, seconded by W. Goldthorpe, Esq., and resolved:—

“That the Report together with the Financial Statement be adopted, printed, and circulated under the direction of the Committee; and that the Committee for the ensuing year be Messrs. William J. Crossley, John Thomson, Richard B. Taylor, James Boyd, Thos. R. Ackroyd, Alfred Haworth; the Honorary Secretary, Leonard K. Shaw; the Honorary Treasurer, Henry Charlton; and the Auditors, Messrs. Theodore Jones, Crewdson, and Youatt.

Afterwards a musical programme was rendered by the children from the various homes, and much appreciated by a large audience.

FOR Twenty-nine years it has been the privilege of those who have worked in the interests of homeless, destitute, and suffering children, in connection with the Strangeways Institution, to present to the Subscribers, and all interested, a brief record of the work of the last preceding year. This we now hasten to do, and venture to think that the record, while necessarily brief, and in some respects a very bare outline of work of far reaching importance, will be found to those who estimate aright the wondrous possibilities wrapped up in the future of each young

life dealt with, as full of interest as any which have gone before.

We find that with the lapse of years the work does not substantially change. If fewer rags than formerly there is still much vice; if less apparent misery meets the eye, probably the sum of juvenile suffering and need is not much diminished. The causes which produce homelessness, destitution, and suffering, are as active as ever, and so, while Death, and Drink, and Vice are busy, surrounding us on every hand, the duty of keeping "an ever open door" for those helpless and often sorely tempted ones, who for no fault of their own are their victims, will remain at once the aim and the privilege of the Committee of the Strangeways Homes.

Among the many features of our work one is pre-eminent, and yet, contradictory as it may seem, it is perhaps the one realised only by those who have taken a special and thoughtful interest in the growth of the Institution. We refer to the continuous rescue work, which, though quiet, is vigorously carried on not only day by day, but night and day without cessation the year through.

Gathering large numbers of poor children together in meetings, gifts of free meals, and other temporary help, from which they return to their old degrading surroundings, probably appeals to the popular mind more strongly than the rescuing one by one and entirely removing from the streets those who are being ruined there. But our readers will, on slight reflection, see that the daily effort to seek out the children most needy either through poverty, neglect, or immorality, and to reclaim from vice and misery individual case after case, bringing them into

Homes of safety and under conditions tending to happy and useful lives, must be richer in its results.

The variety and extent of the operations of the Institution have continued the same as last year.

Extent of the Work.

- 1.—The Central Refuge and Industrial Home, Francis Street, Strangeways, the headquarters, to which applicants come, and where Industrial Training is carried on.
- 2.—Home for Working Boys and Lads' Institute, Great Ducie Street, Strangeways.
- 3.—Brigade Boys' Home, where dwell the Shoeblock Brigade, and others.
- 4.—The Boys' Emigration Training Home, Great Ducie Street, Strangeways.
- 5.—The Homes for Little Orphan Children (Boys and Girls), Cheetham Hill—six in number.
- 6.—The Girls' Domestic Service and Emigration Training Home, and Laundry "Rosen Hallas," Cheetham Hill.
- 7.—The Cottage for Convalescent Children, "Rosen Hallas," Cheetham Hill.
- 8.—"Bethesda" Home for Crippled and Incurable Children, Cheetham Hill.
- 9.—Home for Neglected Motherless Children, Grove House, Tetlow Fold, Cheetham Hill.
- 10.—The Open-all-Night Shelter for Girls and little wanderers, 1, Chatham Street, Piccadilly, City.
- 11.—The Sea-side Home for weak and sickly children, Lytham.
- 12.—Summer Camp for Poor City Boys, Birkdale, Southport.
- 13.—Prison Gate Mission, Great Ducie Street, Strangeways.
- 14.—The Police Court Mission to Lads and Girls.
- 15.—The Boys' Messenger Brigades, Chatham Street.
- 16.—The Book Saloon and Offices of "The Children's Haven," Great Ducie Street.
- 17.—The Training Ship, "Indefatigable," New Ferry, Birkenhead, (in connection with).
- 18.—The Canadian Branch Homes, Belleville, Ontario, and Grenfell, N.W.T.

We claim by means of these various branches to meet the need of every description of child destitution existing in our midst, giving to each case brought to our knowledge the permanent or temporary help which it requires.

During the year a total number of **2859** children have been dealt with.

The Central Refuge Strangeways has had 163 homeless boys.

The Brigade Boys' Home adjoining has had 131 street boys.

The Emigration Training Home has provided for 49 boys more or less fitted for Emigration.

The Working Lads' Institute has cared for 32 youths filling situations in the city.

The Cheetham Hill Homes have had 255 boys and girls, chiefly fatherless and motherless, who are being trained up in family groups.

The Bethesda Home for Crippled and Incurable children has had 43 such during the year.

The Open Day and Night Shelter in the city has received 513 wandering ones during the year.

The Sea-Side Home at Lytham for weak and ailing children has had 199 such during the year.

The Summer Camp for boys has given a week's holiday to 1464 poor lads.

The Training Ship "Indefatigable" has had in training 10 of our boys.

These figures, large as they are, do not include the Messenger Brigade, as they do not sleep under any of our roofs; by means of this useful branch, however, temporary

employment has been provided for 155 boys, of which number 50 have been drafted into permanent situations.

New Applications during the Year 1898.

During the past year **715** *fresh cases* were either brought to us, or applied voluntarily, five hundred and forty-nine being boys, and one hundred and sixty-six girls.

A very wide area supplied some of these applicants, but with very few exceptions they were found in their danger and need on our streets or in our immediate neighbourhood. Thus self interest, as well as the higher motives of human and Divine pity, prompted our aid.

Each of these cases was carefully investigated, with the following results:—

271	were permanently admitted, being found destitute or in grave moral danger.
241	were temporarily admitted for School Board or Police purposes pending investigation or remand, instead of being taken to the lock-ups.
47	received temporary admission, not connected with police.
47	restored to friends.
29	referred to other Institutions.
80	declined as unsuitable.

Total **715**

Our chief concern in this report is with those permanently admitted.

These **271** were divided as follows:—

The monthly pages of *The Children's Haven* which is regularly forwarded to all subscribers, give from time to time the subsequent story of many of these young lives, and of some enumerated in former years. In the nature of the case the annual reports record the facts and figures concerning those dealt with in the year under review only, including the large number who pass out from under the care of the Institution, and are sent forth on life's way equipped, we trust, for the Battle of Life.

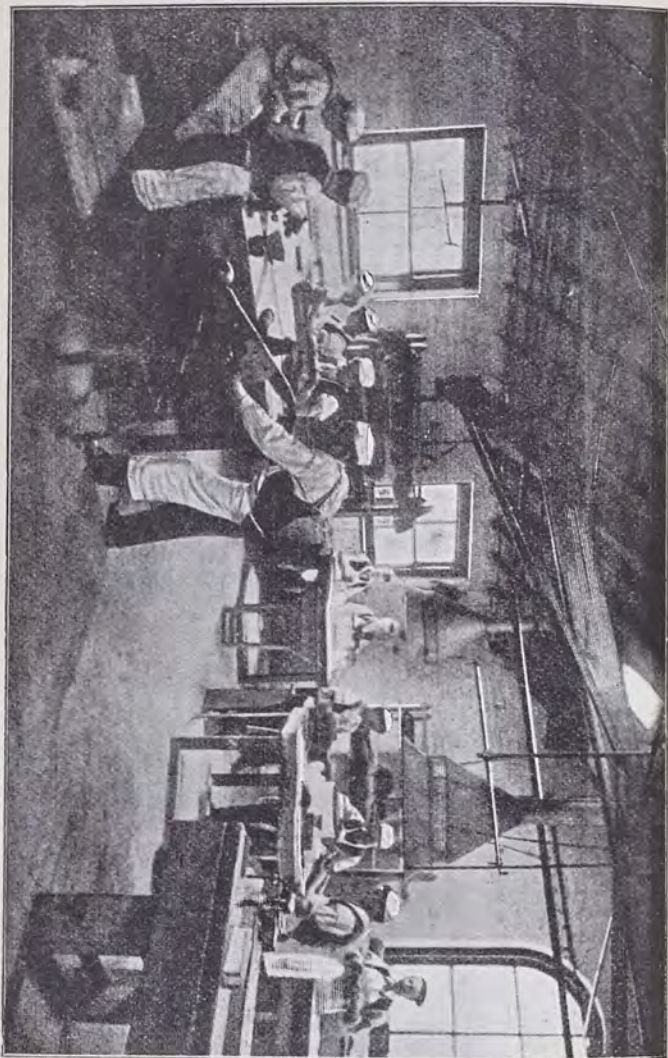
These are followed with fatherly and motherly interest by the heads of the various Homes who have cared for them in their years of helplessness, and the old tie is kept up far on into life. *But each year that number grows*, and with it an ever increasing responsibility, for while naturally wishful to retain their influence over their boys and girls, the increasing number year by year taxes to the utmost the time and strength of the workers. Still the labour involved bears rich fruit.

A letter just to hand recalls the case of three wandering children, the story of whom, as told in the newspapers some years ago, startled Manchester. They were three girls, aged 12, 9, and 3, who made their exit at midnight from a Charter Street Lodging House in order to escape from a vile mother, and reach Scotland to seek for some friends there. The account of how they walked on night and day through Wigan, Carlisle, etc., and at last reached a Scotch town, how the police then communicated with Manchester, the result being that they were received into our Homes, is vividly recalled just now. Months and years of anxious care followed in protecting and training these young lives. And now the bread cast on the waters is seen after many days. One is a nurse in a large hospital, another is married, and the third is in a good home.

Having now given the figures for the year we proceed to say just a word regarding the leading divisions of the work.

Central Refuge and Workshops.

These have continued throughout the year a scene of active work. A family of 107 boys dwells here—those

of school age attending the Board School, Southall Street, where they have made excellent progress, while those of working age are engaged either in out-door situations or are apprenticed in one or other of the six workshops, the busy hum of which is heard on every side.

Before speaking of these however, a word must be said as to the general inner life of this central Home. No day or night passes without some applicants for help being found in the waiting room or lobbies, and their numbers are only equalled by their variety.

Here are a few outlines:—

Dirty and tired, JOHN arrived at the Refuge late one night craving food and shelter. He was 15 years of age, and since leaving the few friends he had in the North, some twelve months before, he had tramped meanwhile through the greater part of the six northern counties. He said "he wanted to see the world," but he found that the world was a harder place for a poor lad than he had pictured. What sights he had seen during those months! herding in common lodging houses with criminals, loafers and life's failures, then seeking the shelter of the tramp ward, then creeping into hovel or barn, or getting beneath a haystack, ever on in restless uncertainty. Of course we gave him a chance, though with many misgivings lest the old life would prove too strong and he should drift off again.....Six months have passed, the wanderer has settled, and seems a changed lad.

About the same time a strong appeal reached us from a magistrate, "can you do anything for a nice little boy

of 14, who was brought before us this morning charged with attempted suicide?" When we saw the boy next day in gaol we could hardly believe it, but it was all true, due to the drinking habits of the friends he lived with, who made his life miserable. When the legal formalities were gone through he was at once received in one of our homes, where he is working amid cheerful surroundings, we trust another young life saved.

Here is a case of restoration to friends. These are most troublesome cases, for the runaway has generally concocted a story which patience and skill are required to unravel. Willie, a fair haired little chap of ten to eleven was found wandering by one of our Shoe Blacks, who brought him to the Refuge. His story was that both father and mother were dead, and he had been living in lodging houses in a neighbouring town, etc., and from this statement he would not move! Of course it involved a journey to this town, and there we found that the parents, who were decent people, had been out seeking him day and night and were much distressed, the joy of the mother when we restored her boy safe and sound will not soon be forgotten.

While the majority of our cases are personal appeals for immediate help, and have to be dealt with accordingly, now and then we get a little notice which is always desirable. A Clergyman going through a tramp ward some months ago saw a boy who he thought was worth a helping hand, and asked us if we would give him such! We heard his story and saw the boy and at once gave the help required. Early in life William lost a good mother, and owing to a quarrel with his

father, who told him to go and shift for himself, he went. Then commenced his struggle for existence. The next twelve months found him office boy, page boy, boots at hotel, and fruit picker, all the time working up from London towards Liverpool, where he hoped he could get sent to Canada. After twelve months testing, we have found him a steady lad and a suitable candidate for Canada. Thus the desire of his heart will be accomplished.

And so we might go on, did not time and space alike warn; but in addition to these, there are constant appeals of a different class which cannot always be ignored. Here is a poor broken-down fellow with whom the world has gone hard, he declares if he only could get work he could manage. A letter to some friendly employer is given, and a start has thus been given to one who has never after looked back.

This case has hardly been disposed of, when a poor body in hot haste asks us to send some one to pray beside the death bed of a woman near the end. One of our old workers speedily complies, and the dying one's closing hours are soothed.

The next request is of a different character—a wee mite has been born into the world a few days before and is now dying, will we send some one to baptise it, is the appeal of a drunken woman, who has still some remembrance of a better life. A clergyman is found by one of our workers, and the request granted.

Then there comes an erring sister, who states she wants to lead a better life—all the help we can give in such a case, is cheerfully given.

Following comes an old widow, who finds the struggle for existence too much for her, she knows our work is to help children, but she is in need, and a few shillings a week will keep her from the workhouse. As one who has worshipped at our Sunday Evening Service her appeal is heard and one of "His Stewards," provides the necessary funds, and she goes back to her little room with a grateful heart.

Or, finally, a fond parent comes for guidance, a son is causing great trouble in an otherwise happy home. These difficult and painful cases, (which are not infrequent,) take much time, but have been greatly blest.

While these pitiful stories are being heard the merry sound of one hundred voices in the yard below proclaim that school is over and the workshops closed, and then, after a brief respite for tea, the Brass Band is heard practising in their room, or the Drill team going through their exercises to piano accompaniment; or on certain evenings the Reading Room is occupied by an Educational Class, etc.

Thus the life lived by the large family at the Central Refuge is a natural and healthy one, an excellent spirit prevails, due, the Committee again thankfully acknowledge, to the influence and devotion of Mr. and Mrs. Wood, the General Superintendents, while the health throughout the year has been with occasional exceptions excellent, due to the constant attention of Dr. Boutflower, to whom the Committee are once more under many obligations.

The Workshops.

These, which are within the walls of the Central Refuge, continue six in number, viz:—

Shoemaking.
Tailoring.
Joinery.

Letterpress Printing.
Brush Making.
Firewood Making.

They have been kept well employed throughout the year, with the exception of the Brush Department, for which we should be glad to receive more orders. May we ask our subscribers and friends if they will send a sample order for brushes, addressed to Mr. F. A. Wood. Also office and warehouse brushes are supplied; we think in both quality and price they will bear comparison.

The financial results of our workshops, after paying for all material, also foremen and boys wages, and their share of working expenses, shew a profit to the Institution of £209 11s. 3d.

The Working Lads' Home and Institute

comes next in order in the Strangeways group. This most comfortable Home and Institute for working lads and young men has received 32 such during the year, giving them advantages to be obtained nowhere else at such a low rate. Each youth has his own separate cubicle or bedroom, use of most comfortable sitting room, news room, games room, bath room, gymnasium, etc. Terms 10/- per week inclusive.

Working youths and young men away from home, who cannot afford private apartments, will find here with Mr. and Mrs. Horne truly a Home from Home.

Educational classes of various kinds are held in the evenings.

The Brigade Boys' Home

is situated next to the Working Lads' Institute, and continues under the care of Mr. Beatty and Miss Vaughan, as master and matron. This Home has received 131 boys during the year. Many of those received here are rough and untrained lads, fresh from the streets, who have never known a decent home before. Hence the importance of the work of this Home in giving to these rough fellows their first impressions. Cases such as the following find a place here:—

JIMMY was charged at our Police Court as being "without visible means of support." He had left Liverpool weeks before and tramped to Manchester, seeking work, and being unsuccessful was found by the police in absolute destitution. The Magistrate discharged Jimmy to our officer, and he was at once received at the Brigade Home. He is now an industrious lad in one of our workshops, and it is hard to recognise in the bright, well-dressed lad of to-day, the starved dirty object of a few months ago.

The Emigration Training Home

completes the Strangeways group. This Home continues under the care of Mr. and Mrs. Binns, who give true fatherly and motherly care and oversight to the boys committed to their charge; 49 boys have been under care and training here during the year, a certain proportion of whom will go forth to farm homes in Canada in the spring. They will be received at the Marchmont Home, from whence, under the experienced guidance of the Rev. Robert and Mrs. Wallace, they will be placed out in selected farm homes in the Dominion and regularly visited and reported on there.

Open-Day-and-Night Shelter

comes next in order. No less than 513 children of all

ages and of "all sorts and conditions," have been received at the "Open Door" during the past year; the nature of the cases, and the needs of those brought, may be judged by the fact that no less than 157 of *this total number were brought in by police and others between 10 p.m. and 4 a.m.*, but whatever the hour Mr. and Mrs. Taylor have been found ready to help; washing, bathing, feeding, comforting, according to their need, for *This Door is never shut.*

The value of this branch lies in the fact that it is an immediate "place of safety" for those (especially elder girls up to 18,) who, from whatever cause, find themselves friendless, destitute, and in grave moral danger on our streets. To have in the centre of our city a well appointed house with doors open day and night for the reception of such, is a fact of the highest importance, and cannot be too widely known. Two or three outlines will indicate the class of cases.

EMMA, a strong rough girl of 15, is seen one evening by a well known worker in company with a prostitute in Angel Meadow. He at once stepped across the street, separated the two, and with a word of warning to the elder one, took Emma by the hand and led her to the Shelter. With a good honest face, she was nevertheless what they called at the Shelter, "*A regular rough 'un.*" She had a father who, so he said, was afraid to have her at home, and that she had better go away. She took him at his word and went. At Chatham Street no one thought she would stay, and to leave was certain ruin. Time and God's blessing have wrought wonders, she *has stayed*, and now after six months, Emma is in one of our permanent Homes being fitted for a situation.

The next case is a type of many to whom this branch of our work has been an untold blessing. Many girls who every year in response to enticing advertisements in Cheshire and Staffordshire papers of good places and high wages for girls of 15 to 20, leave their homes and arrive in Manchester utterly friendless. After paying the Registry Office fees, they go to their places, which are often unsuitable, and sometimes dangerous, for no character is required: if sent away they have absolutely nowhere to go, and having perhaps left home in a temper, are afraid to write.

MARY was a case in point. A fine, tall girl of 17 she had got a place on arrival from Stafford, and during the few days had formed the acquaintance of a young man, who asked her to meet him in town; judging from the quarter, we believe it was a plot to ruin the girl. Owing to Mary's ignorance of the town, they did not meet, and after waiting long, she, afraid to return, begged for lodgings somewhere, thus she was brought to the Shelter and in due course returned to an over-joyed father.

The Police and the School Board authorities have used this branch largely during the year. So also has the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children, some hundreds of young lives have thus been saved from the contamination of the police cells.

Cheetham Hill Homes.

And now having said a word explanatory of each of the city branches, we have little space left to speak of the ten Cheetham Hill Homes, nor is there much need,

for they are already widely known. These homes consist of

Seven Orphanages

for fatherless and motherless children—boys and girls.

The Langworthy Home, girls.	The Higgins Home, boys.
The Garnett Home, boys.	The Atkinson Home, boys.
The Crossley Home, boys.	The School Girls Home, girls.
The Convalescent Cottage.	

These orphanages have dealt with **141** children during the year, each house is under the care of a separate mother, and the children are being brought up in a very natural family life, in each home the mother, children, and helper, dwelling together as one family. At the close of the year every home was full, and accomplishing very efficiently its object.

Adjoining them is the

Girls' Training Home, (Rosen Hallas,) & Laundry.

Here **73** girls of ages varying from 10 to 18 years, have been dealt with. The girls of school age attend St. Mark's National School, and the elder ones are receiving a very efficient and complete training for domestic service either at home or abroad. Thoroughness pervades this household, each girl having her regular share in the various departments of household service, and a certain number given a complete training in ordinary laundry work; their efficiency and industry are being proved by the fact that instead of having to send the washing for the ten Cheetham Hill Homes to a public laundry at a considerable cost to the committee, the chief part is done every week by the girls: thus a training to them and a saving to the Institution.

There will be a small band from this Home for Canada sailing in the month of May, they will again go forth under the care of Miss Smethurst. After depositing her charges with Mr. and Mrs. Wallace at Belleville, who have good homes awaiting them, she will again visit as many as possible of those sent out in former years.

Our readers will understand the class of girls we send to Canada: in the large demand existing for our girls at Home there is no need to send a single one away, and if those we send had good surroundings here, we should not do so. But alas, long experience has taught us, that if we are to complete the work of rescue in the case of many of our elder girls it can only be done by complete separation from former surroundings.

The annual gathering of the old girls in connection with our Cheetham Hill Homes, was held Feb. 16th, 1899, when nine of those formerly with us, who had held their first places with credit, received prizes. Not only once a year, but sometimes once a month those who have gone forth, revisit the old Home, generally on the first Sunday in the month, to have tea with the Mother, and confer with her as to their hopes, fears, and difficulties, and attend the Bethesda service.

Just as we go to press the sum of £100 has come to hand to be invested for the purpose of providing annually "The Nadin Memorial Prize," for faithful service. It will consist of a silver watch (suitably inscribed) and chain, with badge, and be presented to one of our girls out in a situation, who is deemed most worthy.

We cannot take leave of this branch of the work without thanking God for the large measure of success which has attended those boys and girls (now young men and young women) who in former years we have sent forth.

Home for Neglected Motherless Girls.

Tetlow Grove House.

This Home has been kept well filled throughout the year, and has proved a great blessing to the neglected ones who have sought its shelter, a total of forty-one children have been dealt with during the year.

Perhaps the most interesting branch in the whole group of Cheetham Hill Homes remains,

Bethesda Home for Cripples & Incurables.

Forty-three children have been dealt with in this bright

and beautiful Home during the year; being a mixed home the ages for admission are generally as follows:—

Little boys up to the age of eleven.

Little girls up to the age of fourteen.

Perhaps no home in Manchester does so much for those it receives as this Bethesda Home for Suffering Children. Admission is not by voting, but by application to the Secretary, who personally investigates each case, and then the Committee admit the most needy and most suffering. These become at once the objects of the tenderest care on the part of Miss Owen and her nurses, which, if possible, increases as the end of the suffering life approaches.

We cannot pass from the Cheetham Hill group without placing on record the debt the Committee feel to Dr. Rodger and Dr. Fulton, the Honorary Medical Officers of these homes, for their unwearied attention.

The Sea-Side Home at Lytham, which has been for many years indeed a haven of rest to weak and ailing children from our city, has during the past year received **199** of such. They have had an average stay of eighteen days, under the motherly care of Mrs. Hindle.

We have to record with much regret, the death of Dr. Fisher, who since the opening of the Home at Lytham in 1883, has been the Hon. Medical Officer. His valued services rendered so cheerfully to poor and suffering children, will be long held in grateful remembrance by the Committee, the Matron, and many of the children themselves.

The Summer Camp at Birkdale, Southport, has been an active branch during the summer months, no less than **1464** boys from the poorest parts of the city have had a week's holiday under canvas, amidst the healthiest surroundings, and under good moral influence.

The Messenger Brigade, 1, Chatham Street, has given useful employment to 155 boys who otherwise would probably have drifted on to the streets. During the year 50 of the total number were drafted into permanent situations.

The Police Court Mission dealt with 52 cases of elder lads, chiefly first offenders, who were referred to our Officer by the Magistrate.

The Prison Gate Mission has been carried on with unvarying regularity throughout the year; 5478 men and boys, 2882 women and girls, or a total of **8360**, accepted the invitation to the simple breakfast at the Mission Hall; 1805 voluntarily signed the temperance pledge, and were personally urged to begin a better life.

It is a fact to be remembered with gratitude by Manchester citizens, that early every morning, often in darkness and dreariness, a little band of faithful men and women, are found at that prison gate, seeking, without fee or reward of any kind, to aid, in their hour of deepest need, the most degraded of our fellow creatures.

In the middle of the year under review, the Committee deemed it inadvisable to continue the **Day Nursery**, Ancoats, as the need of it in that neighbourhood seemed to grow less and less during the last two or three years.

Finances.

The cost of carrying on a work at once so large and so varied as that which is only barely outlined in the foregoing pages, must necessarily be large. The total expenditure on Maintenance Account has been £12453 9s. 4d. But this, our readers will see, has exceeded the income by £1549 8s 10d., leaving this large balance as a deficiency on the year's working, which however, would have been larger, but for a special effort put forth at the close of the year. We would call attention to the fact that this shortness of funds does not arise from lack of interest, (this is more widespread than ever,) but that the death and removal during the last few years of a number of large annual contributors, has seriously diminished the annual income. An increased number of annual subscribers, as well as additional help from present ones, is much needed.

In appealing thus for increased income, perhaps the strongest plea we can urge, is that during the year the

Earnings of our own Boys & Girls and profit on their work, amounted to £2362 17s. 2d.

Closing Words.

And now this record of work which we trust will bear fruit in all the years to come, must necessarily close. The Committee send forth the Report with the earnest prayer that it may help to deepen the interest of the community in those who are amongst us to-day in all their need, and who will be with us to-morrow, either as a strength or a weakness according as we now care for

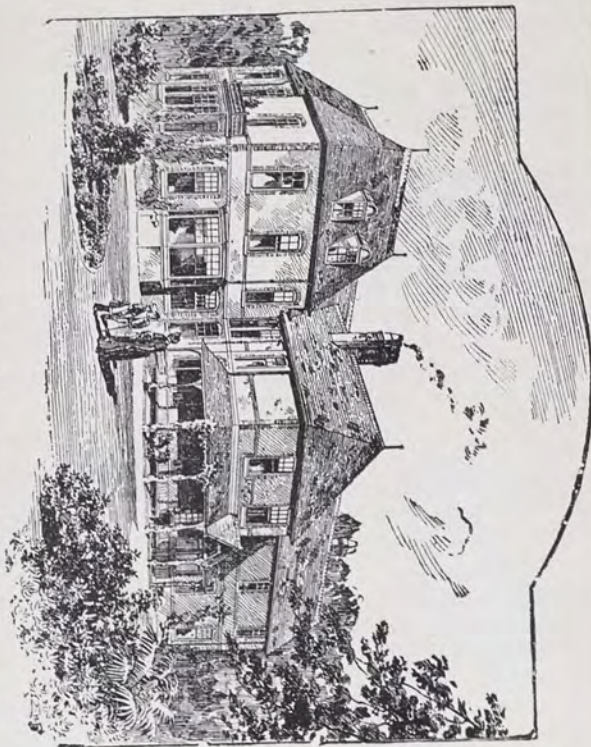
their welfare or treat it with indifference. With this closing word, they commend the cause of the children to each reader of this Report.

They would also name with gratitude the many friends at Lytham and Birkdale, who have shewn continued sympathy and help in connection with the Sea Side Home and Summer Camp, specially the Committee of the latter.

To the ladies and gentlemen acting as Collectors, Teachers of the Sunday and week evening Classes, members of working parties, and also to those who carried to a successful result the Annual Sale of Work, they desire to express very warm thanks.

And to all, who by their generosity, their active service, or their loving prayerful sympathy, have contributed to the success of the work, the Committee tender their thanks, not forgetting the continued devotion of the regular staff, upon whose loyal co-operation so much of the good attained has depended.

MEDICAL REPORTS, 1898.

(CENTRAL REFUGE AND GREAT DUCIE STREET HOMES).

The Medical Report for the Refuge and adjacent homes during the past year is highly satisfactory. We have had no serious cases of illness, no deaths to record. The food, clothing, and sanitary arrangements are all that could be wished, and all the boys are vigorous, healthy, and well contented.

(CHEETHAM HILL HOMES).

With the exception of three mild cases of Measles occurring in Tetlow Grove Home, all the other Cheetham Hill Homes have been entirely free from Infectious Disease during the year 1898.

At the Orphanages there have been three cases of Pneumonia, two of them proving fatal from heart complications; one case of acute and fatal Heart Disease; one case of Rheumatic Fever, and two serious cases of Tubercular Disease, one dying, and one lingering hopelessly.

All through the year the number of trifling ailments was rather below the average, and considering the antecedents of so many of the little inmates, the Institution is to be congratulated upon the small number of serious cases.

The Cripples' Home had only one of its little hopeless sufferers "Called Home," in other respects, the year's experience has been a happy one.

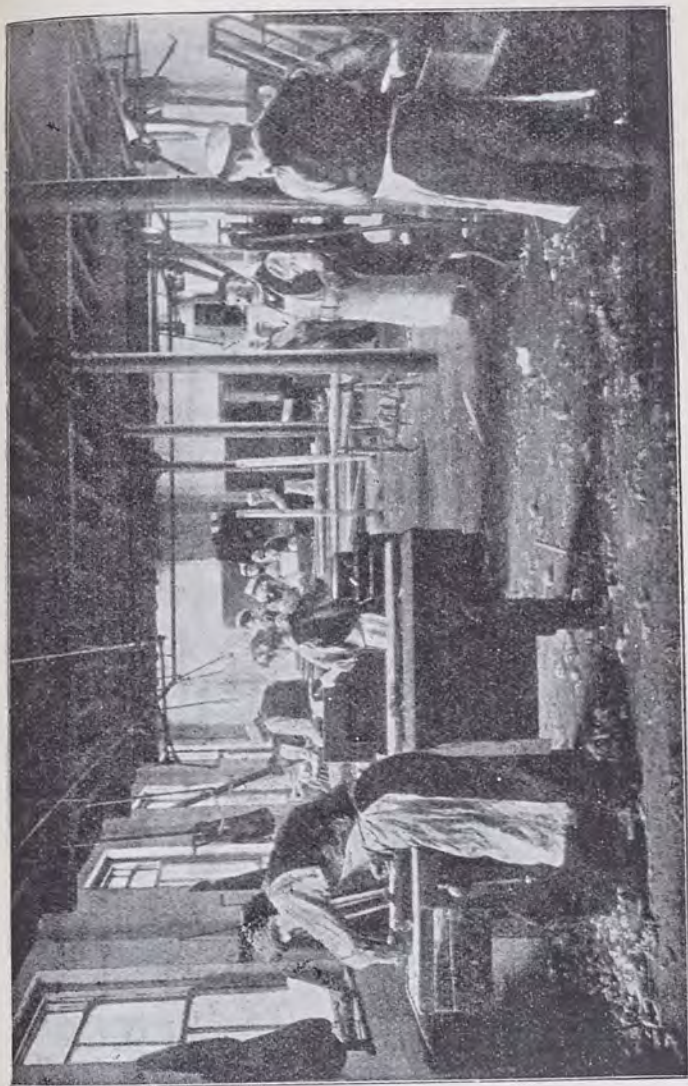

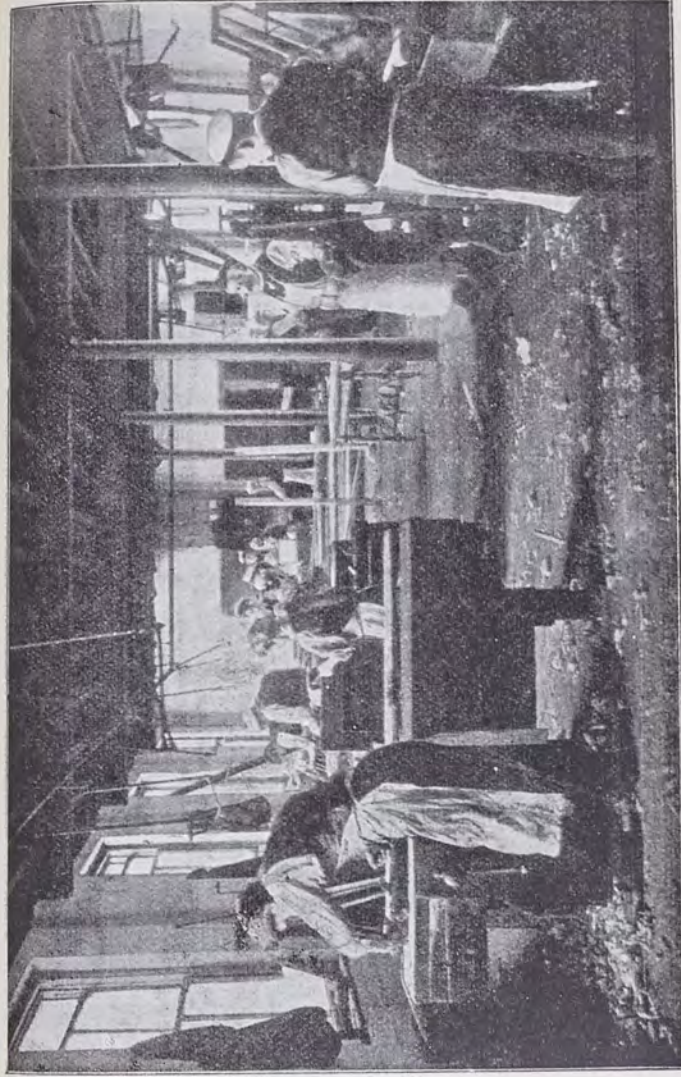


