The Thirty-first Annual Meeting of the Manchester and Salford Boys' and Girls' Refuges and Homes, and Children's Aid Society, was held in the Town Hall, Manchester, on Friday, April 12th, 1901, at half-past three

In the absence of The Lord Mayor of Manchester, the chair was taken by John Thomson, Esq., who was supported by the Bishop of Hereford, W. H. Holland, Esq., M.P., Rev. Preb. Macdonald, Hy. Lee, Esq., J.P., Andrew Boutflower, Esq., Henry Charlton, Esq., Rev. J. Grant Bird, R. B. Taylor, Esq., and others.

The Rev. J. Grant Bird offered prayer.

Letters of regret at non-attendance were received from the Marquis of Northampton, the Earl of Shaftesbury, James Bryce, Esq., M.P., Herbert Philips, Esq., J.P., W. J. Crossley, Esq., J.P., and others.

The Annual Report and Balance Sheet were presented. The Hon. Sec., Mr. Leonard K. Shaw, gave a summary of the Report, which was taken as read, and an abstract of the Financial Statement was given by the Hon. Treasurer, Mr. Henry Charlton.


It was then moved by John Thomson, Esq., seconded by W. H. Holland, Esq., M.P., supported by Rev. Preb. Macdonald, and resolved:—



THE opening year of the New Century finds us writing with a grateful heart the 31st Annual Report of The Manchester and Salford Boys and Girls' Homes and Children's Aid Society. The year under review stands out, notwithstanding an exceptional amount of anxiety and difficulty owing chiefly to sickness amongst the workers, as one which has been filled, more than any previous year, with tokens of prosperity and blessing of the highest kind. Never have we received from former inmates, either by personal visits or letters, so many evidences as to the reality and stability of the work which has been quietly going on all these years.

Tokens of Blessing.

It has been a great joy to receive letters from many at home and abroad now living faithful, honest lives, who gratefully acknowledge their present position to the helping hand given them at the "dear old Refuge"; greater joy still to have been permitted to grasp the hand of many once ragged, neglected, and troublesome ones, for whose future we feared, who have loved to come back

"clothed and in their right mind," to show that the labour and patience bestowed on them have not been in vain; and greatest joy of all to have been privileged to sit down in the happy comfortable homes of those who once "ran the streets" of our city, and were rapidly becoming candidates for the union or the gaol!

But old things have passed away, "the bread cast upon the waters" is being found after many days; the patient seed sowing of former years is bearing fruit in abundance, and while we are now surrounded by others who need the same care and prayer and patient love-for our Homes never were more full of young anxious lives than at present—we have the stimulating assurance, most helpful in hours of depression, that the same watchfulness, and faithfulness, and prayer, will in God's own time, produce in them the same results.

These reflections gain added force when the class we deal with is remembered. To quote from our last report—" while other organizations deal with the ordinary poor, we reach down to a lower depth, and those who visit the well ordered Homes of this Charity will see that silently but surely influences are at work, moulding into useful lives, those who otherwise must have drifted into pauperism or crime."

Thus with much thankfulness for the past, and full of hope for the future, the Committee present the records of the work of the past year.

While last year's report, gathering up the statistics of 30 years, dealt largely in figures, we desire this year, of this Report, as far as time and space will permit, to allude to details of the work hitherto little noticed, and where possible, allow former inmates who have passed through the various stages of the Institution to speak; but first the figures for the past year claim some attention.




HOMES AND BRANCHES.

By means of these seventeen branches—omitting the P.G. Mission, which deals chiefly with adults, and also the outside Brigades and P.C. Mission, where only outside help is given-no less than 2569 Boys and Girls have during the year received the help their varied cases required.




Applicant for Help.

Excluding those dealt with at the Sea-Side Home, Summer Camp, and other temporary help cases, we now confine ourselves to the fresh applications for Applications. permanent admission, cases which either applied voluntarily, or were brought to us, during the past year.

They numbered 631-467 boys and 164 girls.

Of this number 187 were under ten years of age, while 444 were ten years of age and over.

As regards parentage, 366 were without one or both parents, while 265 had both parents living somewhere.

With few exceptions all these were found in their need or danger on our streets, or in our immediate neighbourhood.

Each of these cases was carefully investigated, with the result that—

- 276 were permanently admitted, being found destitute or in grave moral danger.
- were temporarily admitted for School Board or Police purposes pending investigation or during remand.
 - 20 received temporary admission, not connected with police.
 - 49 restored to friends found for them.
 - 26 passed on to other Institutions.
 - 73 declined as unsuitable.

In many cases the children who were 'Declined,' or 'Restored to Friends,' occupied more time and attention than those who were admitted; but it is with the 276 cases permanently admitted that we have now to deal.



Explications seen that while the applications last year were not quite so numerous as in the previous year, the number actually admitted was larger; two hundred and seventy-six fresh children being admitted last year, as against two hundred and fifty-seven the year before.

Two Hundred and Seventy-six fresh children admitted. Homes, and these, together with the 276 fresh cases admitted throughout the year, made a total of 720, under the daily care and patient training of our various heads of houses for the last 12 months.


Bearing in mind then that the various branches enumerated on pages 11 & 12 are all in active operation, we proceed to give our readers some particulars of the work daily going on which no mere recital of bare figures can give. At the same time we would give each subscriber a very cordial invitation to visit any of the Homes and see the work for themselves, specially recommending, with this in view, the Central Refuge, Strangeways, the Cheetham Hill Orphanages, and the Bethesda Home for crippled and incurable children.

Central Refuge

The Central Refuge and Home,
Strangeways, is the headquarters, with
Mr. and Mrs. Wood in charge, where
183 boys have been under care and
training during the year, and where the ceaseless
activity and manly spirit shewn, act as a key note to
the whole work.

Work has always been a feature of the Institution, and from the earliest days the motto "We help those who try to help themselves" has had a prominent place on our walls and has been kept well before the minds of all the inmates. The seed corn thus planted has borne fruit in succeeding years, and has had its natural development in the five active workshops, which form an attractive feature of the Central Refuge. Each shop has its fully qualified foreman and gives constant employment to 74 boys throughout the year, who are duly apprenticed to the various handicrafts, viz., Carpentry, Letterpress Printing, Shoemaking, Tailoring, Firewood-making.

The result of the year's trading, after charging every proper expense to each department, and paying a fair shop wage to the foremen and apprentices, shews a net profit of £281 to the Institution, which although exceeded in some previous years, cannot but be considered satisfactory.

At the completion of apprenticeship
at the age of 21, no difficulty is experienced in obtaining employment in
the city if the young tradesman is not
retained in the Refuge workshop, and

now it is no uncommon thing in passing the Monthly Accounts of the Institution to find bills, for goods supplied or repairs done, from those who learnt their trade in the Refuge Shops.

Nor are they ungrateful for the help received in former years. A young tradesman, recently married to one of our former girls, writes from their own comfortable little home:

"Please accept the enclosed cheque for 20/-, enter as anonymous, a small thankoflering for the dear old place from which we both got such benefits in time past, we become from this day annual subscribers to the noble work."


Another steady young fellow who is living in the country subscribes regularly, and this year increases his subscription to 30/-, which he sends with the usual good wishes. Another, which will serve as a specimen of a number says:

" I am so pleased to be able to send you 5/- out of $\,$ my $\,$ earnings, $\,$ I $\,$ hope always to do so," $\,$

While a fourth, who subscribes himself "your affectionate son," and who at one time we thought would not live into his 'teens, has so prospered at his work that he writes from a neighbouring town:

"You'll be glad to hear that I have now started in business for myself, and am doing well. I have taken three words as my motto in business—Temperance, Punctuality, Civility, and I am sure if I act up to them I shall not go far wrong. I wish all the boys in the Homes would take the same motto through life."

These letters are just specimens of a large number, and together with the facts stated above, will suffice to

show the spirit which pervades the whole institution regarding self-help and employment.

In this connection we cannot pass by a growing feature of the work—the desire on the part of those who have left, to help the Homes in which they have been brought up. Both in point of numbers and of amount, this is steadily growing, each year.

The letters which accompanied these gifts breathe a healthy as well as a grateful spirit. We quote a few out of a large number:

 $^{\circ}$ I have now commenced the third year at K.M.'s., and am getting 10/per week. I am glad to send you 5/- and I hope to send you some more later on."

One who was with us many years, writes:

"I received your kind letter for which I thank you. I am ever reminded of the past years spent at the Home. I thank you for that care you gave to me when I most needed it. I have great pleasure in sending you the enclosed P.O., for the Home. With love and every good wish." C.D.

Another who was rescued from great misery writes:

"Just a few lines in answer to your kind letter and to thank you for the nice motto. I will try to follow that which you would like me to do. I am very happy in my situation. I am sending 2/6 of my month's wages and will send another next month."

A former girl, now a nurse in an hospital, writes:

"Please accept cheque enclosed, 21/- the little I am able to give for the dear old Homes, and believe me, yours gratefully."

One now in service in a neighbouring town says:

Dear friends,

"I now write a few lines to you hoping you are all well. I was so sorry when 'mother' wrote to me and told me about the Sale of Work. I had quite forgotten about it being in December or I should certainly have sent a garment, but I hope you will accept the 5/- in its stead. I will try and send some more soon. I will now draw to a close, with love to all my old friends. Thanking you very much for all you have done for me."

The following from another in service:

"I have much pleasure in sending you five shillings of my earnings to help the dear old Home which has and hope always will be a dear Home to me."

This is from a boy learning the baking trade:

"Many thanks for your kind letter and for your Motto Card, and for what you have done for me. I am sending five shillings to you, it will be a little help to the Home."

The following from one now married:


" I send you my best wishes and 20/- to help you in making a bright Christmas for some little ones. From one of your old girls." K.

Mork and Play Another feature, both at the Central Refuge and at the other branches of the work, is the healthy occupations and amusements of the evening. At half-past

five the busy hands which have been closely 'at it' all day are free, and come pouring out of the five workshops; shortly after they are joined by the goodly number who work in the city. The younger ones have already got home from the Board School and are just finishing a wash, and soon the large yard is filled by a busy excited crowd who for a full half hour play just as hard as they have worked; but hark! the tea bell is ringing; a call which for many reasons brooks no delay, and the stillness of the Dining Hall forms a marked contrast to the noise of the playground. But both form a needful preparation for the work of the evening, and so half an hour after tea is over finds the Bandroom filled with some thirty young fellows who are practising for their weekly engagement with the Corporation to discourse sweet music at one of the parks.


Evening Occupations.

Turn into another room where a quieter group is occupied with Draughts, Dominoes, and Bagatelle. On another evening in the week a very active Musical Drill team, which has attained considerable proficiency, occupies the room: the piano accompaniment is taken by one of the boys. Band of Hope and Educational classes occupy another evening, while in a smaller room adjoining, about a score of the elder lads are gathered and enjoying under a friend's guidance a quiet Bible talk. If it does not happen to be Friday evening, when the Swimming Bath is in full swing and greatly enjoyed, there will probably be a Fire Brigade practise, for both at Strangeways and Cheetham Hill there has been formed an amateur Brigade, which has done good service on more than one occasion in checking fires which might otherwise have proved serious.

Handbell Ringers. As we leave the yard after witnessing this display, the sweet sounds which attract our ears are caused by the Handbell Ringers, a most attractive team, which under the lead of an old friend who conducts, gives entertainments for the benefit of the institution: alongside, and in addition to all these, are the permanent attractions of a well furnished Gymnasium, and in both the Central Refuge and the Working Youths' Institute a bright and well supplied Reading Room. Thus the evenings are

spent happily and healthily, of course in summer outdoor games take the place of some here named. Everything is done to make each of the sixteen Homes a real home, the largest amount of personal liberty, consistent with good conduct, being allowed.

We have given prominence to the self-help and working element, as we desire this report should reveal as much as possible of the inner life of the Institution




The Shelter, Chatham Street, Piccadilly, Open Day and Night.

and of the spirit which prevails throughout; but it must not be supposed for a moment that elementary education is given a secondary place; a full half of the total number in the Institution at any given time are of school age, and remembering the state of neglect in which they have lived before coming to us, the importance of a strict attention to school duties cannot be over estimated; something like 250 boys and girls turn out every morning from our homes for the various Board Schools, and we venture to state that for regularity and punctuality of attendance, they will compare favourably with the same number of children from any other district in Manchester, while regarding standards, with few exceptions, which may be classed as feeble minded, they are fully up to the average for their age. The number of prizes and certificates which they bring home from both Day and Sunday Schools are very practical proof of this.

The Working Youths' Home and Working Institute for working youths of from Poutbs' Home. 17 to 21 years of age, filling various situations in the city, the great majority of whom are without friends in Manchester, has received 44 such during the year, for whom Mr. and Mrs. Horne, who are the heads of this house, have exercised constant care and solicitude, seeking very truly to be the "young men's guide through life to immortality."

The Street Boys' Home, for young Street Boys' street boys under 13 years, has, under and Emigration the care of Mr. Beatty and Miss Bomes Vaughan, provided for 42 of such.

The Emigration Training Home for Boys under the care of Mr. and Mrs. Binns, has had 61 boys in



children of the Institution, during the past year 485 children of all ages (in the case of girls up to 18), in urgent need or in grave moral danger have been received. The nature of their cases and their needs will best be judged by the fact that 172 of the total number were brought in by the police and others between 10 o'clock at night and 4 o'clock in the morning! but whatever the hour and whatever the condition, the care of Mr. and Mrs. Taylor is promptly and freely rendered.

Of the 485 cases, 306 were Boys, 179 Girls,

In this connection we cannot but express the regret felt by the Committee, in company with the great majority of Young Children the citizens, that it should be found necessary, as shewn in the Chief Constable's report, to bring to the police court with all its demoralizing influences no less than 587 juveniles, all under 16 years of age and in many cases only 7, 8, or 9 years old; and especially so, seeing that 302, more than one-half of the total number, were either discharged or only nominally fined. We are constrained to ask if some better way cannot be found of dealing with such very young children.

However that may be we are thankful that by means of the Shelter, many young lives have been saved from the contamination of the police cells; and that it has again proved a haven of rest and safety to friendless girls from country homes, who from various causes have found themselves in need and danger on our streets.

The Cheetham Hill Orphanages and Homes

next claim a word, though it can only be a brief one. Here is quite a colony of Homes. Ten in number, each under separate management, the total number supported is quite as large as at Strangeways, only more sub-divided

and so the family life can be more truly carried out. 302 children, chiefly girls, have been provided for here during the past year.


Fatherless and Motherless. The Seven Orphanages have been full of fatherless and motherless ones, 149 such have been carefully trained and tended. As a boy or girl has left to enter some tradesman's family as apprentice, or fill a place of service, another needy one has taken the vacant place; those who have thus gone forth during the year continue to give satisfaction. The 'Mothers' in the various Homes keep up a personal interest by correspondence with their former children, many of whom gather on the first Sunday in each month, at the old Homes to have tea with "Mother" and attend the Bethesda service.

This is also true at the Rosen Hallas

the year. The results obtained in this home, which deals with elder girls whose early life has been sadly neglected, and who are found at from 12 to 17 years of age in the worst possible surroundings are cause for much thankfulness; but truly the work is one of patience, and prayer, and faith. A very efficient training is given for domestic service either at home or abroad; the various departments of household service are filled by the girls in regular order, and the chief part of the laundry work for the Cheetham Hill Homes is each week done by them, thus providing a training for the girls and effecting a large saving to the Institution.

Girls' Emigration Party. A small band for Canada from this home will sail (D.v.) early in May, and the Committee rejoice that Miss Smethurst's health, which last year forbade the journey, is so far improved that she hopes to accompany the party, and visit once more amongst her old girls in the new land.

Cripples and Incurables. The Bethesda Home for Cripples and Incurables is a bright and beautiful home, where **40** children have been under the tender and loving care of Miss Campbell and her nurses. The inner life of this home

is full of interest, and notwithstanding the fact that its inmates are afflicted and full of suffering, the merry sound of glad childhood prevails over every other. The happiest reflection of all to the thoughtful visitor must be, that these young lives, denied the earthly blessing of health, are being led to know the great Healer and prepared for that Home where there shall be no more pain.

The Home for Neglected Motherless Children has cared for a total of 43 who, while not entire orphans had been sadly neglected by the surviving parent. The disturbing influence of outside relations is much felt at this home, which nevertheless has accomplished excellent work throughout the year, under the direction of Miss Bennett.

The Sea-Side Home, Lytham, has received 165 weak, pale-faced children chiefly girls, who have had an average stay of 16 days under the motherly care of Mrs. Hindle.

The Summer Camp, Birkdale, had an excellent season, giving no less than 1,605 boys from the poorest parts of our city a week's holiday under canvas.

Messengers and Shoeblacks. The Messenger Brigade and Shoeblack Brigade has provided useful employment for 204 boys, and has drafted 36 of them into permanent situations. Many tokens come to the managers of these Brigades of the good work going on, here is one from a letter recently received.

Dear Sir,

On August 4th I employed one of your boys to clean my boots. His number is 2, and he is stationed at London Road. By accident I gave the boy what I thought to be two pennies and went on. The boy however discovered I had given him a two-shilling piece and a penny, and immediately made his way to the platform and returned the money. This I consider worth recording. It is delightful to think that a boy in such a position was capable of withstanding what was undoubtedly a temptation. May he continue steadfast and strong, and some day meet his merited reward.




> City Mission, has continued morning by morning its benevolent work. Seven o'clock a.m., whatever the weather may be, finds these devoted workers at the Prison Gate. Out of a total of 10,629 discharged prisoners met during the year 7198-4151 men and boys, and 3047 women and girls,-accepted the invitation to the Mission Hall adjoining, where a simple breakfast is provided during which, earnest helpful words are spoken, and help of various kinds afforded, 1253 voluntarily signed the temperance pledge before leaving.

. The Emigration work of the past year Emigration the Committee look back upon with great satisfaction; 45 children-25 boys and 20 girls—were most carefully placed in good homes in Ontario, the garden of Canada. The accounts of them which have come to hand, as well as the reports from the Canadian visitors of those who have gone out in previous years, are full of encouragement.

For the past 15 years this Institution has sent forth each year some 50 to 100 boys and girls drawn from the poorest parts of our city, children, who while hopeful in themselves, were, owing to their dangerous surroundings, in imminent peril of ruin here. These we have placed, through the excellent agency of Mr. and Mrs. Wallace, the heads of the Canadian Training Home, in most care-

fully selected farm homes in the Dominion. To have thus placed these hundreds of trained children in good homes, each outfitted with their box of warm clothing, is a truly excellent work, and one that will bear reflection. But this is not enough! The Committee are very sensible that having done this their responsibility has not ceased; and so included in the cost of each child's emigration is a certain amount to provide for the regular visitation of each one, and for the upkeep of the Canadian Home should circumstances or illness require, as it frequently does, a child's return thereto. We desire our subscribers should realise the extreme care with which this Emigration work is carried on; and this extreme care pays! for notwithstanding the difficult class dealt with, no part of the work yields better results, numbers of our boys and girls-rescued lives here!are now married and in comfortable homes of their own. Their letters, from which we append a few extracts, are most satisfactory.

Continued

Inspection and Oversight.

The reports of the visitors, which we regularly receive, confirm them. It has been no uncommon thing from Canada. during the past year to find a well dressed young man calling at the Refuge and asking if we did not know him? and on confessing our inability to recall him, saying "I am so and so, I went to Canada in such a year!" Such was John, -who had sold his farm and was over for the winter, was returning in the Spring to buy another.

> Thomas M. - Went out in 1891, came back a few weeks ago, and said "I came straight to the old Home." He had only been in two places in the ten years! Is a Christian young man, had saved money, and was on his way to join his brother, who has a farm in South Africa.

> Herbert and James .- Two fine, well dressed young men who had saved money and were over for the winter, and

return in the Spring. They both were formerly shoeblacks in connection with the Refuge!

Arthur.-A nice respectable young fellow, over for a holiday, and returning in a few weeks. He is manager of a farm, and doing well.

With a specimen of the letters which we frequently receive we must leave this most important branch of the work, and commend it to the support of our readers.

Two sisters and a brother were made happy and safe from bad surroundings by being sent to Canada some three years ago. Annie writes last Christmas:

from Canada.

Dear Mr. & Mrs. Shaw,

"Hoping that you are all quite well and happy I thought I would like to write to you to let you know how we were all getting on. Charlie has got a very nice home, he likes Canada very much, Florence and I went to see him this summer. Florence lives just facing my place she has got quite a nice home and we are so close together that we are very happy. We had great times this summer when we were all three together, we have grown quite a lot since we came out here. My old master is very sick in bed, he is 83 years of age and so is getting old, but he is very nice. I got a nice book from Miss Dawson in England, it is called the Pilgrim's Progress, it is very nice. I wrote back and thanked her for it. Mr. Shaw, are there any boys or girls coming out next year. In the old home where there are so many girls I am sure they must be happy. I think I will close my letter now hoping to hear from you soon."

This is the country to get good men, everybody wants to go out here. I guess there is quite a change in the Home now. 
Another from the South of England says:-

They looked smart "handy fellows" and did credit to the old home. Two more have lately joined the navy. Another 'Indefatigable' boy writes:—

Our Soldier At one time we felt that we could not encourage the enlistment of any of our boys; but of late years the conditions surrounding youths joining the army have greatly improved, and during the past year we have had several examples of steadiness, courage, and Christian character, from old Refuge boys at the front. The Refuge had more than one representative in the memorable siege of Ladysmith, another of our lads in the Highland Brigade who fought in all the engagements from Belmont up to Pretoria, and only received one wound, gave us a graphic account of that terrible day at Magersfontein where the Highlanders were so much cut up. At Paardeberg one of the gallant Canadian Contingent was an old Refuge lad whose early days were spent at Strangeways, and who volunteered from Canada when the call to arms came, while James T., an old Cheetham Hill boy has written most graphic letters to the Home mother, in the last of which he says at the close

January, 1901.

"We received the sad news of the Queen's death, it was a great blow to all her soldiers out here, and I don't think anyone in the world will miss our Queen more than her soldiers, she was the mother of her Army and Navy, and beloved by all who served her, she did so care for the sick and wounded. And now the world is in mourning for her."

These sentiments reflect credit on our old boy.

The year opened with a financial deficiency finances of £449 6s. 7d., which has been, we regret to report, increased at the close of the year to £1,197 2s. 6d. This is not owing to increased expenditure, for the amount expended is £400 less than in the previous year, nor is it to be attributed to a diminution in number of subscriptions, but to a smaller amount from special donations and legacies. A word will show our general financial position and needs.



The total annual cost of the whole work is from £12,000 to £12,500, of which sum £2,500 is contributed by the children of working age, being their earnings and profit on their work. Of the remaining f. 10,000, which must come from voluntary sources, we have some £7,500 assured in regular contributions, over £500 of which is annually provided by the Sale of Work held in the Refuge Hall every December. It will thus be seen that we need over £2,000 additional yearly income. On the average, one year with another, this has been provided by legacies or special donations in response to personal appeals, but this is of course to some extent an uncertain quantity and often entails much labour at the end of the year when the administrative work is heaviest.

Additional Income needed.

It is the earnest desire of the Committee that the regular income should be increased so as to obviate the risk of deficiency and the need of special efforts in respect to ways and means at the close of the year. With a view to this they ask the co-operation of those who are already interested, in making the work known and enlisting wider and deeper sympathy in the effort to save the children.



Our The Committee cannot close this report Queen. without expressing in a word or two their feelings of deep thankfulness to God for that wonderful reign which has recently closed, and which will ever be remembered as an era of blessing for poor and suffering children. The statute book is inscribed with Acts, among others to relieve and protect little Chimney Sweeps, Canal Boat and Barge Children, Gipsy and Van Children, the children so cruelly used at Fairs and Wakes, etc., while the Education Act, Industrial Schools Act, and Prevention of Cruelty Acts, stand out as the more recent trophies of the reign. They passed no formal resolution of sympathy and condolence, but they desire to be the medium of recording in this first report issued after her death, the gratitude of poor and suffering children every where for such a reign; and with it they would express the earnest hope that ere long in a very real and thorough Act to limit and reduce drinking facilities, our children will be protected from the contamination of the public house and beer vault.

Closing In sending forth once more this very imperfect record of another year's work amongst the poorest and most suffering of the children who surround us, the Committee can only again commend it to the thoughtful reading of those who have so long and so liberally extended their support. It is truly a work

for God and The Christian duty of rescuing these little our Country sorrow-stricken ones from the misery, hopelessness and vice which surrounds them, and fitting them by God's blessing for a better life is undoubted; the wisdom of doing so for our country's sake is even more apparent,

This is the work which the Manchester and Salford Boys' and Girls' Homes and Children's Aid Society has been doing for 31 years. The need is still great, for drink and vice and crime are still busy amongst us, but in the confidence that the blessing which has rested on the past is only an earnest of greater things to come, we ask for your continued sympathy and support.





MEDICAL REPORTS, 1900.

(Central Refuge and Great Ducie Street Homes).

During the year the health of the boys at the various Homes in Strangeways has been extremely good, and much above the average. We have had a succession of 3 or 4 cases of Scarlatina, but prompt discovery, and equally prompt removal to Monsall, prevented any further outbreak.

For about the first time, I have but one case of Pneumonia to record, which ended in death, our only death. All the Hygienic conditions are satisfactory, and the boys well cared for.

The sickness throughout these Homes for the year 1900 has not been greater than for the previous year.

Considering the homes from which our inmates are drawn, the everyday sickness remains no more than normal. Altogether sixteen cases of Scarlet Fever of a mild type appeared in the George Street Homes, one of the cases unfortunately being that of the Matron of No. 2 Home.

Pneumonia afflicted one little sufferer, and Erysipelas another. Surgically, we have a fractured arm to report, and several cases of Adenoids, treated by operation, all of them doing well.

Our Health Report then for the year 1900, I consider fairly satisfactory; and Mr. and Mrs. Shaw are to be congratulated on their very excellent management.
