## Summary of Annual Meeting.

---

*The Thirty-Second Annual Meeting of the Manchester and Salford Boys' and Girls' Refuges and Homes, and Children's Aid Society, was held in the Town Hall, Manchester, on Tuesday, March 25th, 1902, at three o'clock.*

The chair was taken by the Lord Mayor of Manchester, who was supported by the Bishop of Manchester, John Thomson, Esq., Mr. Alderman McDougall, Herbert Philips, Esq., J.P., Rev. R. Wallace, (Ontario), Hy. Lee, Esq., J.P., Andrew Boutflower, Esq., Henry Charlton, Esq., Rev. A. Parkinson, Mr. Coun. Fildes, R. B. Taylor, Esq., Louis M. Hayes, Esq., and others.

The Rev. Arthur Parkinson offered prayer.

Letters of regret at non-attendance were received from the Marquis of Northampton, the Earl of Stamford, James Bryce, Esq., M.P., Chas. E. Schwann, Esq., M.P., J. G. Groves, Esq., M.P., W. J. Crossley, Esq., J.P., and others.

The Annual Report and Balance Sheet were presented. The Hon. Sec., Mr. Leonard K. Shaw, gave a summary of the Report, which was taken as read, and an abstract of the Financial Statement was given by the Hon. Treasurer, Mr. Henry Charlton.

It was then moved by the Lord Mayor, seconded by the Lord Bishop of Manchester, supported by Herbert Philips, Esq., J.P., and resolved:—

*"That the Report together with the Financial Statement be adopted, printed and circulated, under the direction of the Committee."*

It was also moved by John Thomson, Esq., seconded by Rev. Robt. Wallace, (Ontario), and resolved:—

*"That the Committee for the ensuing year be, Messrs. W. J. Crossley, John Thomson, R. B. Taylor, James Boyd, T. R. Ackroyd, and Councillor Jas. Fildes; the Hon. Secretary, Mr. Leonard K. Shaw; the Hon. Treas. Mr. Henry Charlton; and the Auditors, Messrs. Theodore Jones, Crewdson, and Youatt."*

A vote of thanks to the Lord Mayor for presiding, proposed by Mr. Councillor Fildes and seconded by Mr. Louis M. Hayes, closed the proceedings.

## THIRTY-SECOND ANNUAL REPORT

Work full of  
Hope.

ANOTHER year of active work amongst the poorest of the juvenile population which surround us has passed away and we meet to-day to present a brief outline of that work, to tell those who have provided the funds by means of which the work has been carried on how the money has been spent, to let our fellow citizens know what a large and effective organization there is in their midst for dealing with the juvenile destitution, orphanhood, neglect, and waywardness, which surrounds them, and thus to encourage each other, those who give and those who spend, those who provide the means and those who undertake the administration of the same. While the work has its disappointments, chiefly owing to the class with which we deal, and its difficulties, due to the surroundings of that class, it is still a work full of hope and full of promise, for it deals with young life, life not yet condemned either to pauperism or crime, though in many cases on the margin of both, but still young life with the highest possibilities before it, possibilities which in many cases are being realized to-day!



The great feature of the Institution continues what it has been from the beginning. Established 32 years ago to deal with the poorest, most neglected, and destitute children surrounding us, who were daily recruiting the ranks of pauperism and crime—the founders soon saw that absolute removal from the streets and from the evil surroundings of their lot, was the only remedy.

In this the work of the Institution differs from Schools, or Children's Missions, which, however excellent,

only have the children under their influence for a few hours in the day or week. These organizations deal with the ordinary poor, we reach down to a lower depth, to a class the bulk of which are a danger to the State, and for whom the one hope lies in their early and absolute removal from the dangers, physical and moral, which ever surround destitution—plant their lives in healthy and hopeful surroundings, not a hot-house life, but

mixing freely in the public schools of the country with children of their own age, teaching them as early in life as they can understand, that the faults or failings of their birth shall not be an obstacle to their advance in life, that for each one brought under our roof there is a respectable living depending on themselves to reach and accomplish, but that for every honest effort thus made they will find abundant help and encouragement!

It is the application of these principles to the daily life of each one in our Homes which has produced, and is producing, the happiest results, and which enables us to-day, while not ignoring our failures, which we in common with other organizations dealing with young life have to deplore, to point to

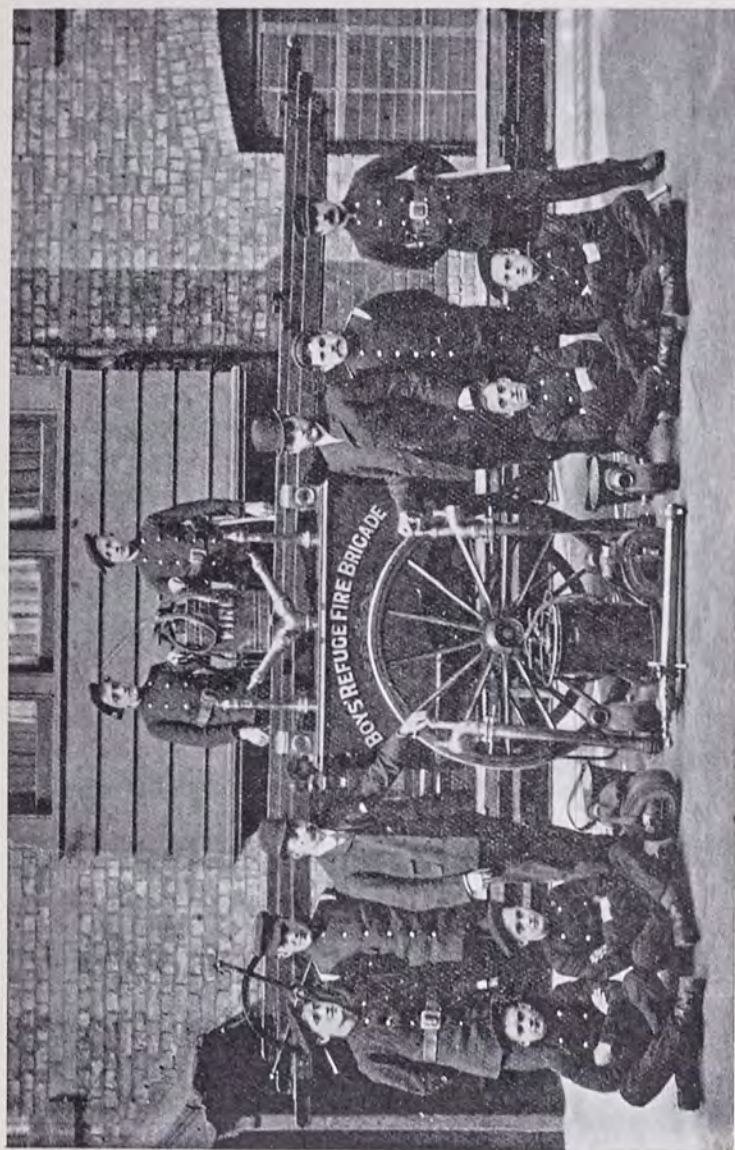
### Extent of the Work.

In dealing with the figures of the past year we distinguish between the applications and admissions to the permanent Homes of the Institution, and the valuable but temporary help given in the Camp, and Holiday Homes of the Charity, and other branches.

Excluding therefore the numbers dealt with at the Sea-Side Home, Summer Camp, Messenger and outside Brigades, Prison Gate Mission, we confine ourselves to the permanent Homes of the Institution.

The figures for the year stand out clearly. The applicants numbered **685—519** boys and **166** girls. Of this number **484** were ten years of age and upwards.

**201** were children under ten years.

**422** had lost one or both parents. While

**263** had both parents living somewhere.

With the exception of a very few cases—crippled or incurable—which came from adjoining counties and were paid for, all these were found in Manchester and the district.

Each case was carefully considered and investigated, and here the work begins, for not all who apply are admitted! and this is not because any mere technical objection excludes them, such as not being born within certain limits, or, not being within certain ages, but because they could not in any fair sense be considered homeless and destitute.

In many cases, and these sometimes the most neglected, the parents were trying to relieve themselves of their proper responsibilities at the cost of the public, and yet in some of these, under a fair social exterior, investigation disclosed an amount of sorrow, suffering, and sin, which we would fain have relieved! Others were cases of pronounced criminality and vice, needing committal to a Reformatory for a lengthened period, rather than admission to a voluntary home amongst unfallen ones. While others again were run-away cases, or cases of boyish or girlish waywardness, due to the weakness, or entire absence, of parental authority; which, however fraught with evil, the



subscribers of this institution should not be called on to supply; but all this, investigation alone disclosed, and enabled us to apply such remedy as we could, either warning, rebuke, earnest entreaty, or kindly advice.

On looking back over the year, some of these *not admitted* cases afford real satisfaction, because of the results following practical help and advice given to wayward children and their often unwise parents.

But this report has now to deal with the new cases admitted. These numbered 286, which, added to the 446 in the institution when the year began, gives a total of **732** under care and training during the year.

Many of these cases were full of the deepest interest, and much might be written showing 'fact really stranger than fiction,' but the limits of time and space in this report utterly forbid such details, and we therefore simply give the results concerning these 732 children at the year's close.

A few words now regarding the leading divisions of the work.

The Central Refuge and Home, **Central Refuge**. Strangeways, dealt with **173** boys.

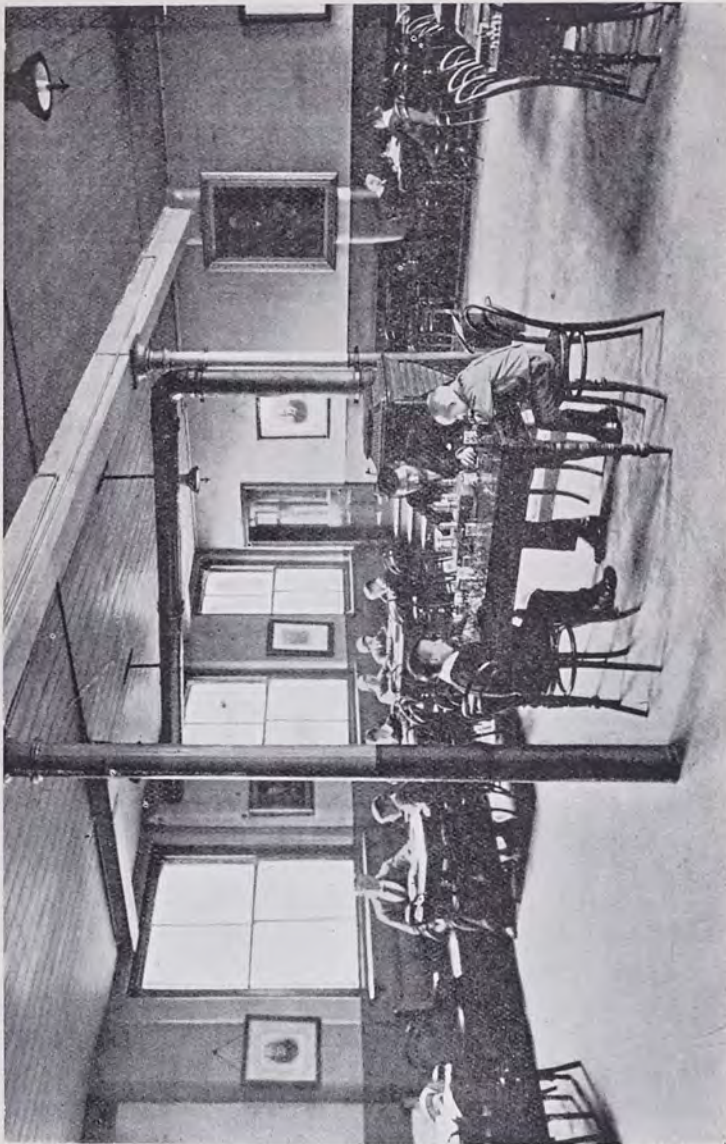
This Central Home, the headquarters of the work continues under the management of Mr. and Mrs. Wood, who still devote unwearied attention to the varied interests which centre round the large building committed to their care, every department of which is maintained in full working efficiency. They are aided by an efficient permanent staff who the Committee believe are animated by the same whole-hearted spirit which has so long moved Mr. and Mrs. Wood, and without which a voluntary work with such high aims could not prosper.

To these headquarters come or are brought all applicants for admission, here their stories are told and their statements recorded, here, if found absolutely homeless and destitute, they receive immediate admission, pending the necessary investigation which immediately follows; and from here each one is placed in whichever branch of the work their age, sex, or circumstances require.

This work goes on more or less actively every day and every evening, and is in addition to the care of the permanent family who dwell here; a portion of whom go forth each morning to the Board School, another division to the various situations which they fill in the city, while the remainder and larger portion fill the five active workshops which find their home here.

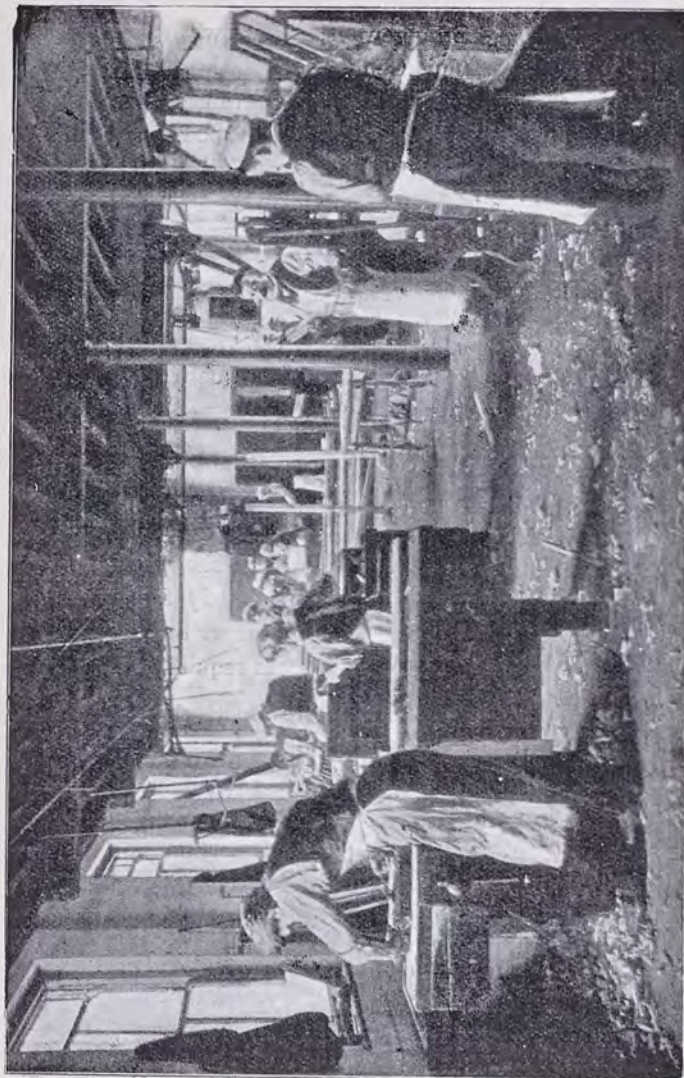
These workshops,—Letterpress  
**The** Printing, Joinery, Tailoring, Shoe-  
**Workshops.** making, and Firewood-making, etc.—

have been kept busy throughout the year, they are conducted on strictly business principles; each shop having its fully qualified foreman, and in

some cases journeymen, and giving employment to a staff of young workmen who are duly apprenticed to the various handicrafts. That they learn their trade properly, the fact that each youth, on the completion of his apprenticeship, finds no difficulty in obtaining employment in the trade, if his services are not required in his own shop, may fairly be taken in proof; while the further fact that after charging every proper expense against each department, and paying a full shop wage to the foremen and apprentices, the result of the year's trading shewed a nett profit of £383 17s. 5d., to the institution! cannot but be considered satisfactory.

These two Homes, which adjoin the Central Refuge, Strangeways, have provided for 102 boys throughout the year, 44 in the former, and 58 in the latter, being chiefly under 13 years of age, they are in regular attendance at the Board School; as age and education admit they are transferred to the Central Home for employment in the workshops, or, if they desire, and are fitted for it, they join the emigration party which goes forth to Canadian Homes each spring.

The other large establishment of the Strangeways group is the Working Youths' Home and Young Men's Institute. This continues under the excellent management of Mr. and Mrs. Horne, and has been well filled throughout the year, receiving 61 members, and continues so to its close. It is chiefly occupied by those for whom it was intended—elder lads who, admitted as boys to the adjoining Refuge in early years, had by steadiness and perseverance in their various workshops won the esteem of the managers, and thus promotion to the Institute.

But it also receives youths coming from the country to situations in our city, who are entirely friendless here, and whose small wages often compel them to dwell in uncomfortable and undesirable lodgings. To such the Young Men's Institute has been a great boon, providing for the young man from home at very moderate cost, every comfort amid healthy and hopeful surroundings.

Before passing to the Cheetham Hill end of the work, the Open-Day-and-Night Shelter,

children of all ages (in the case of girls up to 18 years) in urgent need or in grave moral danger. Of those admitted

283 were brought by the Police,

85 by the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children,

68 were homeless and destitute, and

11 were School Board cases.

The need, as well as the urgency, of the class dealt with here will best be judged by the fact that 161 of the total number were brought in by the police and others between ten at night and four in the morning! But whatever the hour may be they find a welcome from Mr. and Mrs. Taylor who wash, bath, and feed them according to the needs of the several cases, for this door is never shut day or night.

The importance to the whole community to have in the centre of our city a well-appointed house with doors open day and night as an immediate "Place of Safety" for neglected and suffering children, and for girls up to 18 years of age, who from whatever cause find themselves

destitute and in grave moral danger on our streets, cannot be over-estimated. It is a fact of the highest importance and cannot be too widely known. The cases thus admitted are investigated the day following, when friends are communicated with when there are any, or the children received into our Homes if they are homeless.

### CHEETHAM HILL HOMES.

An important part of the operations of this Institution, is work amongst girls which is carried on at Cheetham Hill, where there are ten Homes of various kinds, meeting the need of girls of all ages up to 18. First there are

#### Seven Orphanages

or family homes for fatherless and motherless children :

The Langworthy Home, girls.

The Higgins Home, boys.

The Garnett Home, boys.

The Atkinson Home, boys.

The Crossley Home, boys.

The Schoolgirls' Home, girls.

The Convalescent Cottage.

Each Home has its own mother, who with the helper and the children dwell together as one family. In this way the family life is more truly carried out than in any other, the result of which is seen in the after lives of those who are brought up therein. As each boy or girl reaches the age of 14 to 15, they enter some tradesman's family as an apprentice, or fill a place of service. In each case the mothers of the various Homes keep up a personal interest by correspondence with their former children, many of whom gather once a month at the old home. 145 fatherless and motherless ones have thus been under care and training during the year.

The Elder Girls' Training Home and Laundry adjoins the Orphanages. Here 77 girls, chiefly from 12 to 17 years of age, have been under the excellent care and training of Miss Smethurst and her helpers during the year, many of whom have been rescued from the worst possible surroundings, and need much prayer and faith, and patience. Notwithstanding the doubtful early surroundings of many in this Home, the results obtained in after life concerning them give much cause for thankfulness. A very efficient training for domestic service is given here, where the chief part of the laundry work for the Cheetham Hill Homes is done, thus providing an excellent training for the girls and effecting a large saving to the Institution.

A small band of girls, whose surroundings are such that remaining in Manchester would be highly dangerous, go forth from this Home each year to Canada, where they are placed in excellent farm homes with the happiest results, and where many have risen to prominence and usefulness in the Dominion.

The Home for neglected motherless girls is near at hand where a total number of 38, who have been gathered from the common lodging house and other low surroundings, have been cared for and are being educated and trained for domestic service. If the doubtful relatives and surroundings of these girls can be kept at bay a very useful future awaits this large family.

The Cheetham Hill group is completed by the Bethesda Home for Cripples and Incurables. 42 little suffering lives have dwelt during the year in this bright, beautiful home, under the loving care of Miss Campbell and her nurses. The

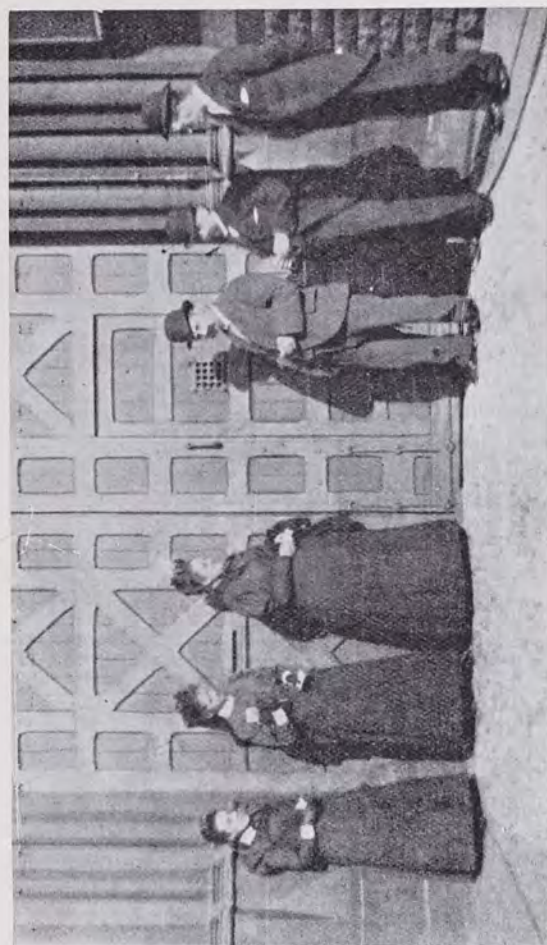
Angel of death has visited "Bethesda" during the past year more frequently than in any previous one, and no less than six have been called away, leaving vacancies in the cots, which have soon been filled, but also leaving voids in the hearts of the mother and nurses, which will not soon pass away.

Admission to this Home is not by voting but by application to the Secretary who personally investigates each case and then the Committee admit the most needy and suffering. Notwithstanding the fact that the inmates are all afflicted and full of suffering, the merry sounds of childhood prevail over every other, and it is a happy thought to the Committee and to every thoughtful visitor that these young lives, denied the earthly pleasure of health, are here being fitted for that Home where there will be no more pain.

Holidays for poor children has become a recognised branch of Christian and philanthropic work, and in connection with this Institution has been more active during the past year than ever. The Sea-Side Home at Lytham, which has been so successful for many years, has been enlarged, and will, in future, be able to receive a larger number. Its permanent and invaluable character as a Home of Rest and Restoration for weak and pale-faced girls, partakes in the summer months to a large extent of a Holiday Home.

247 little girls during the past year have had an average stay of 16 days, under the motherly care of Mrs. Hindle, which has been the means of adding lengthened days to many young lives.

The Summer Camp at Birkdale has had the most active season of its existence. Thanks to the energy and devotion of the Sub-Committee who manage this branch, it gave a week's holiday under canvas, to 1923 boys and 120 girls, or a total of **2043**. It was an experiment having girls under canvas, and was very successful. The girls, chiefly from our own homes, just filled the Camp for ten days, and returned the pictures of health and happiness.

**The Police Court Mission to Lads and Girls** has been active throughout the year. Each Court is attended every morning, our officers rendering efficient service in the **60** cases referred to them by the Bench.

**The Messenger and Shoeblack Brigade** continues its useful course, and has provided steady employment for **230** boys, drafting 41 of them into permanent situations.

**The Prison Gate** when it was not so unusual to see boys and girls issuing from the gaol gate as, thank God, it is to day, is

continued because of the close proximity of the Institution to the prison, and of the continued blessing of God on the work. During the past year 'The Gate' has been attended every morning in all weathers by our workers, and the invitation given to our Mission Hall has been accepted by

While a simple breakfast is being given at the Mission Hall earnest helpful words are spoken, and special cases of need relieved, 1291 voluntarily signed the total abstinence pledge before leaving the Mission Hall,

### Emigration.

The last branch of the work that we say a word about is that of placing hopeful young lives, who have dangerous surroundings here, in selected farm homes in the rich province of Ontario.

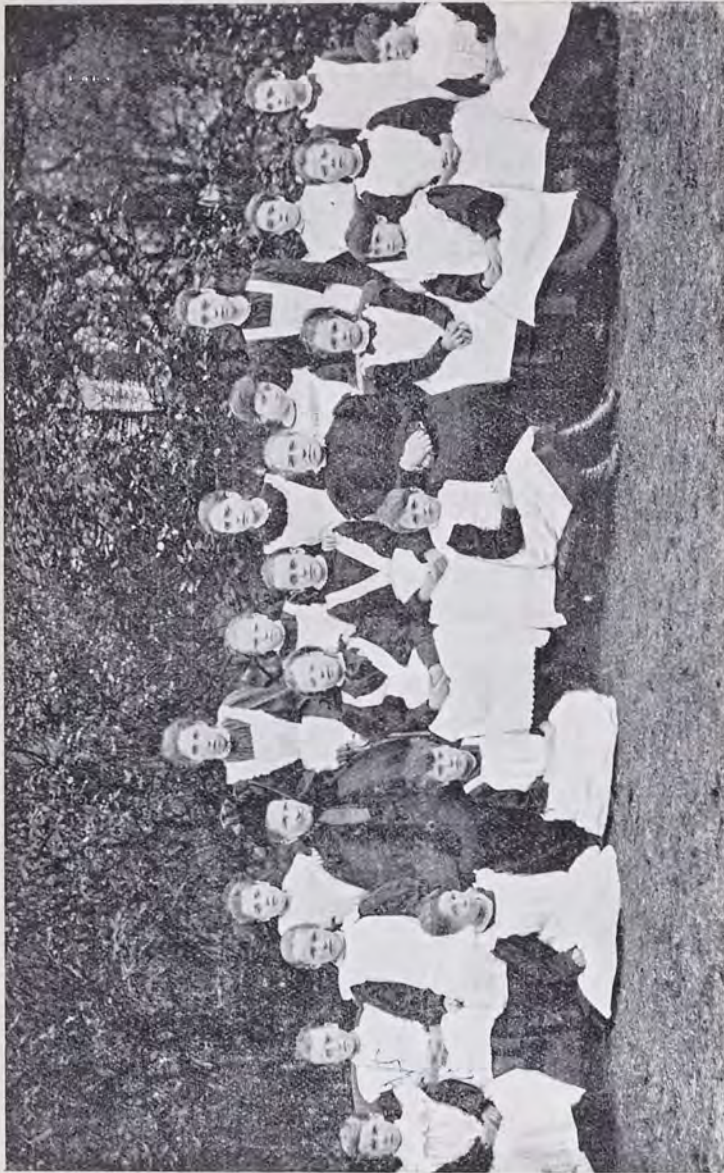
As the years roll by, and the results of the work of early years become apparent, no branch of our operations affords the Committee more satisfaction than the Emigration Work. For fifteen years or more, we have sent forth each spring parties of boys and girls in numbers varying from 40 to 90. Hopeless lives owing to pauper and vicious surroundings if left here, hopeful lives if given a chance in the broad lands of the New Dominion. Over a thousand boys and girls have thus been saved for life and are now growing up healthy, hopeful, strong. A large number of them are now married and in homes of their own, many of them remitting regularly towards the expenses of the old Home in Manchester.

For less than the cost of *one year's* support at home, either in workhouse or institution, we have been enabled to *provide for life* for those who otherwise would have been a burden to the mother country! Suffering, as we are, at home from the ills of pauperism, and from the evils of overcrowding, well directed emigration is the best cure for both. We say *well directed* emigration, for we claim the work as done by this Institution to be in point of organisation perfect. The young people are not sent forth, however well fed and clothed, and dumped down on Canadian soil to fend for themselves, but go out to homes already inspected and prepared to receive them. Under the excellent arrangements of Rev. Robert Wallace, whose well appointed House, Marchmont Home, Belleville, Ontario, is the headquarters of the work, the children are placed out, regularly

inspected and reported on, and they are taught to look to him for advice in case of need or change. We commend this branch to increased sympathy and support.

In view of the very full and complete balance sheet submitted by the Treasurer, and attached to this report, we do not say much about finances.

We began the year with the large debit **finances** balance of £1,197 2s. 6d., which, however, notwithstanding some exceptional yet necessary expenditure, was reduced at the close of the year to £506 14s. 5d.

This improved financial position is due mainly to increased income during the year from legacies which, though most acceptable in enabling the Committee to meet the deficit on ordinary account, is of course exceptional income, a fact which points to the necessity of increasing our ordinary and regular list of subscriptions. An interesting item in the accounts is the amount contributed by the elder lads and girls in earnings and profit on their work, which amounts this year to £2,969 os. 4d., or nearly one-fourth of the total expenditure of the whole Institution. It will also interest all friends of the Institution to know that the sums following the word "Thankoffering" in the subscription list, are in nearly every case contributed by former inmates.

'Ere this report closes the Institution has **A Great** one great need for which the Committee **Need.** have no hesitation in pleading very earnestly, and that is a *Recreation Ground*! All these years the work has been carried on without this, which is so important to young life. They believe the time has come when this great accessory to the work

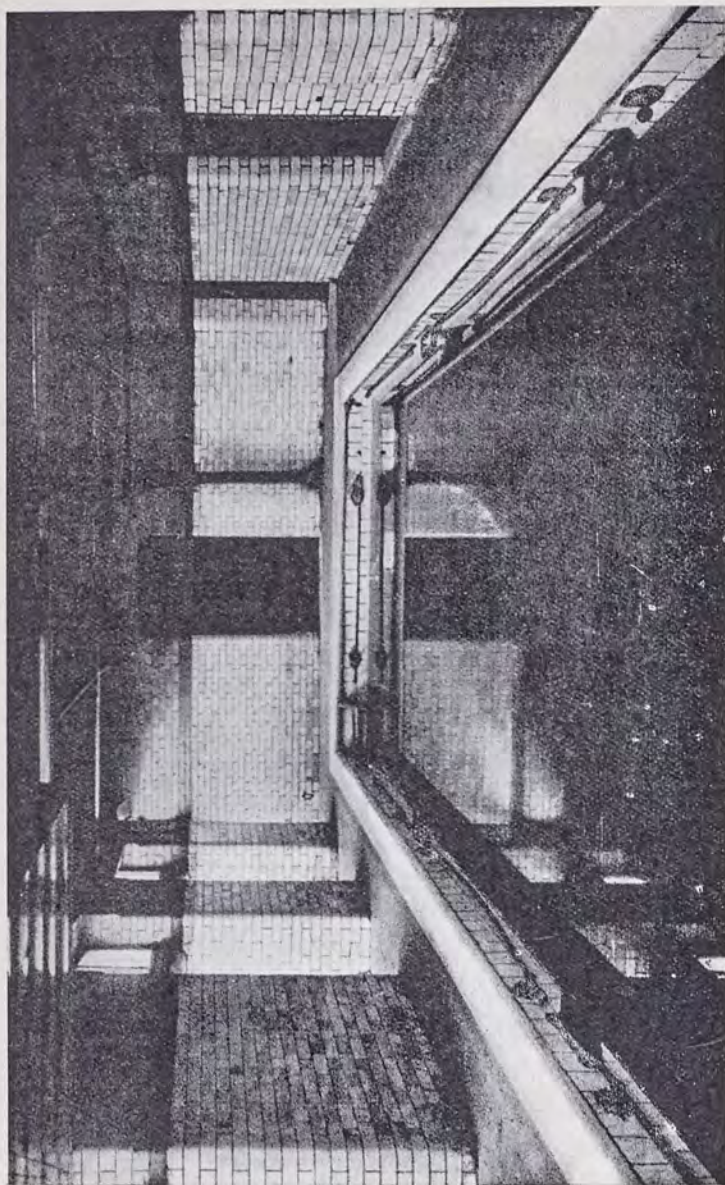


Tetlow Grove House, Cheetham Hill,

should be supplied. An opportunity now occurs of securing land for the purpose within fifteen minutes of the Strangeways Homes, and they think no time should be lost in doing so—but they need £2,000 in addition to some special donations promised, 'ere they can complete.

It is most important that this should not interfere with the ordinary income, which is already too small, and so they appeal to the larger givers and wealthier friends of the Institution to supply this special need.

And now the Committee send forth this brief record of a work of far reaching and ever increasing importance, with the prayer, in which they trust every subscriber will join, that the young lives thus gathered from want and suffering into our Homes, and thus going forth whether at home or abroad to fight life's battle, may in the days to come prove that the labour of love and patient prayer bestowed upon them has not been in vain.

## First Fruits of Harvest.

THE numerous letters we receive from boys and girls who have passed out to situations at home and abroad are in many cases most interesting and give welcome evidence of the change wrought in condition and character. They would add too much to this report to publish, but we give brief extracts from some as first fruits of, we hope, a rich harvest.

One who needed a helping hand as a poor boy and got it at the Refuge, is now helping others in a very practical way as surgical instrument maker to a London Hospital. He has great skill in his work, as this extract shews:—

You will be pleased to hear that I was awarded a Diploma of Honour at the Turin exhibition for my exhibit of surgical and physiological instruments, and that it was also commercially successful.

George was a cripple, and came to us some years ago from a country town. He learnt a trade in our workshop, and has now gone back to his own locality where he is now employed:—

I like my new shop very well, and I think I shall have a good chance to get on, and also benefit myself. I thank you and Mrs. Wood for what you have done for me during the time I was in the Refuge.

We were glad to learn the other day of the heroic act of one of our old Refuge boys being recognised by the Royal Humane Society. The Society's medal was presented a few weeks ago to Joseph Johnson by the Lord Mayor of Manchester for saving a young boy from drowning at Reddish Bridge. He learned to swim



in the Refuge swimming bath and we trust also learned something of that brave and unselfish spirit which was so manifest in this act of rescue.

One day a poor lad applied for admission. He was an orphan, and in a very dirty and neglected condition. He had been attached to some travelling show and was a very rough specimen of humanity. After twelve months polishing in the Refuge mill he went to Canada, and now writes:—

I was glad to receive your motto card and letter on Christmas day. I am getting on with the farm work better every day; this fall I ploughed 35 acres. I advise any boy to come out. I enclose you one dollar bill for the benefit of the home. I will have a little more next time.

William who was formerly in the Refuge is now, with a few other old lads, with the army in South Africa:

I shall be glad when I am once more able to attend the Sunday Services of the Refuge, but am afraid it will be a few more years yet, as we are for India after this.

"The great ambition of my life is to be a successful worker for God, I am more than ever convinced that I am in the right place," are the words of one once homeless in our city.

A Yorkshire lad who had tramped to Manchester applied for help. He was found to be an orphan and friendless, and was in a very poor condition. After a time he went to Canada and writes:

I have a fine place here, and have got a rise in my wages. I thank you very much for your kind advice. You may depend upon it that I shall never forget the home from which I got my start in life.

Another Canadian lad who was formerly in one of our Workhouses says:—

I am getting along very well and have a good home. I am now seventeen years old and go to Sunday School. I am going to try and be a better Christian.

One who has done himself great credit on the Training Ship—on one occasion saving a comrade from drowning—and is now in the Navy, writes:—

I received your kind and welcome letter for which I thank you very much. I will never forget the old home, it did me a world of good, but the "Indefatigable" put the finishing touch on me, now this one is making the polish. If it is possible, the next time I come I will stay with you at the old home.

Robert came to the Refuge in a very neglected state, had run away from a father who had ill-treated him. After being at the Refuge a while he went to the Training Ship from where he writes:—

I shall never forget the old home, and when I go to sea I will send some money towards keeping me while I was at the home.

The next is from one who was a typical street lad living in common lodging houses. He was admitted in a very neglected state. He writes from his Canadian home, and wishes his little brother to have a similar chance

I received your letter, and was glad to hear all the other boys were doing well. I am glad you see my brother once in a while. I hope you have got my small brother in the home, if you have, please let me know.

A lad who came from perhaps the lowest slum of our city, now sends passage money to a chum to go out to him in Canada:—

Just a few lines to let you know that I am still in the land of the living, and enjoying the best of health. I am going to Manitoba to take up land as it offers a better chance for young men. I have sent a friend of mine his passage, he is coming to Canada in March, so you will know what good there is in sending a boy to Canada. I bless the day I ever went into the Boys' Refuge, and will some day repay the home for its kindness to me.

"I send you some money for my poor mother and for the Home. Do not think, dear Sir, I want to go back to the old country, if I did go back I would not stay, but I do wish you would get my younger brother to come out."

This poor girl was hawked all over England by degraded parents.

Some lads choose a Sailor's life, and go to the Training Ship, *Indefatigable*. They write home with news of themselves:—

I received your letter and I hope you are quite well and happy. I am getting on with my schooling, and am learning all I can. I have nearly learnt the compass. I am in Standard six at School. I like the ship very well, and have many friends aboard.

Annie and her sister went to Canada over four years ago, they were both placed on good farm homes by Mr. Wallace and 'ere long came the best proof to us that the Canadian life and prospects were good, in the desire to have the brother out as well. This we were able to accomplish the following year and just recently Annie writes—"I thank you so much for the Motto Card and your beautiful letter. I am now twenty years of age and still in the same place and am getting good wages, so is my sister, and as for my brother he loves Canada very much and would not return to the old country for anything. Sometimes I wish I could see the dear old home, Rosen Hallas, again. Still I am very well and happy, and do hope that the Saviour is giving you strength to do His work."



Another who has gone to sea:

Just a few lines to let you know that I am getting on. You will see by the above address that I have left the Ship and gone to sea. It is pretty rough at sea now, and it would do some of the boys good to go up and stow the topsail in a gale of wind. I should like to be remembered to all in connection with the Refuge.

This lad was taken about by a blind man (no relation) for begging purposes and was going straight for workhouse or gaol:—

I received your letter and photo of which I am very proud. It was my birthday on the 11th of this month, and I am 19 years old, and am still at my old place. I have a very good home. I attend the Sunday School. I have only missed three times in the past year, it is a nice walk of three miles.

"I am living with really nice good people, writes Gertrude, and we have a beautiful house, I have everything I need and the people all round are very kind to me. Give my love to the girls, and the mother, who I used to know at Cheetham Hill."

From low lodging-houses in Manchester, and selling papers on the streets, utterly neglected by drunken relatives, this lad went to Canada:—

I received your letter here (Ontario) not long ago and was very pleased with the card "for Christ's sake," and I hope when I am tempted I shall remember it. I have a very good home and all I want.

A dear girl who was brought up in the Home becoming afterwards a valued helper and who is now in China in training for Missionary work writes:—

I was very thankful indeed for Mrs. Shaw's letter and will keep it as my first letter in China. Oh! when I think of the way God has been present and think of the prayers of Home I cannot thank you enough but I will try to love and bring praise and glory to God for giving me such good friends, and more than friends.

"Thank God I am prospering. I hope to take my B.A. at College this year," writes an earnest student at one of the leading Institutions in the new Dominion, who went out from the Strange-ways Refuge a few years ago.

One of the old girls who was helped in her time of need and who was well known and valued at our Shelter says:—

Although I am a few miles away from you I often think about you and of the home where I had so much kindness shown to me and I feel thankful to God for His goodness. I received your beautiful motto card and I have placed it in my bedroom and I shall value it much indeed. I will try my very best to carry out the good advice which you have given to me.

The writer of the following has been in the old country on a visit. He has returned to Canada.

You will think that some of us boys have forgotten the old Home and you, but we can never forget the kindness that we received in the Home. We are hard at work threshing in the N.W., and I hope that as soon as the fall's work is over I will be able to make a trip to the Old Country.

A. R. and M. R., brother and sister, some years ago used to sell fusees and papers on the Manchester streets. Their condition as they stood shivering and cold at the corner of Brown Street was pitiable. The girl writes recently:—

"I have had a beautiful home all the time I have been in Canada. When my foster parents died they left me some money so if any of my relations are living and are poor I would like to help them. Do let me know. My brother also has done well, he now owns two farms and has built two houses on them."

One who is now in a London Hospital writes to one whom she calls "Dear Mother,"

I heard the day before hearing from you, that I had come out all right at my examination, and so shall have a certificate from here, won't it be nice.

Dr. Openshaw from London was the examiner; he was most pleased with the result, but I can tell you more about it sometime when I see you.

The following came at Christmas time accompanied by the sum of £2 18s. od., from eight of our orphan boys who have recently gone to situations.

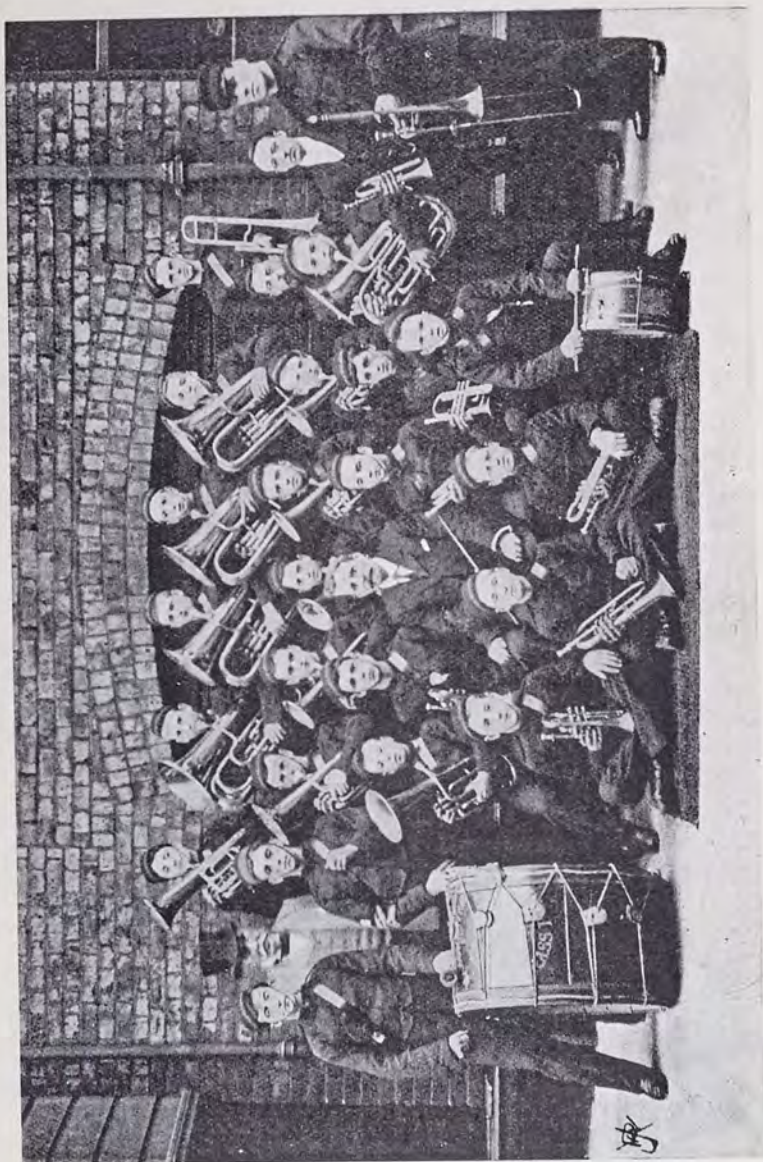
We are looking forward to Christmas. The best way to have a happy Christmas is to try to make others happy. We join together and send you a donation to help you at this time.

The annual gathering of old girls at Rosen Hallas was held on February 16th. Fifty-five old girls were able to accept the invitation. Several handsome prizes were presented to those girls who had held their situations longest, testifying to their good character and steadiness. The silver watch and badge, which is now the annual "Nadin Memorial Prize," was awarded to Ellen Bird for five years of faithful service.

"I was glad to have your letter. You will be glad to know that I am in good health and am learning quite a lot about farming, for instance, I ploughed 180 acres of land myself this last summer!"

It is easy to see that this young fellow who had rather a sad early life in Manchester, is going to be a prosperous farmer.

## MEDICAL REPORTS, 1901.

### (Central Refuge and Great Ducie Street Homes.)

The health of the boys of the Strangeways Homes during the past year has been exceptionally satisfactory. There has practically been an entire freedom from acute diseases of every kind. We have had three deaths, all unavoidable, two of them being from Consumption, and the other from Tubercular disease of the Brain. The Sanitary arrangements, food, and clothing, are all quite satisfactory.

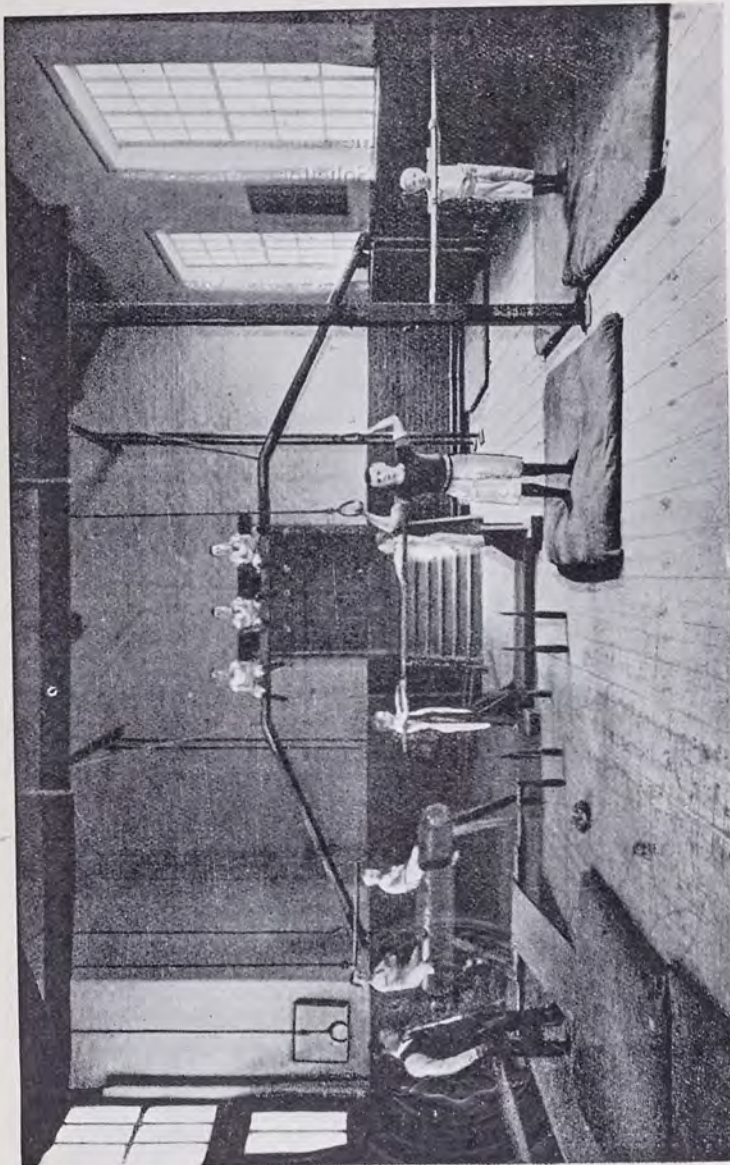

### (Cheetham Hill Homes.)

I consider we have had an altogether exceptional year in these Homes, exceptional as regards the sickness and deaths. That fell scourge—Tuberculosis—carried off no fewer than five of our Bethesda little ones and one from Rosen Hallas. Of four cases of Pneumonia three made good recoveries and one died from Heart failure. We have had rather more than our usual number of Infectious Diseases—Scarlet Fever, Measles, and Diphtheria, but all of them have done well. The Sanitary arrangements and general management are all that could be desired. As bearing on the management and particularly the nursing, I have been struck with the length of time many of the little Bethesda sufferers clung to life when nothing but the merest flicker remained.

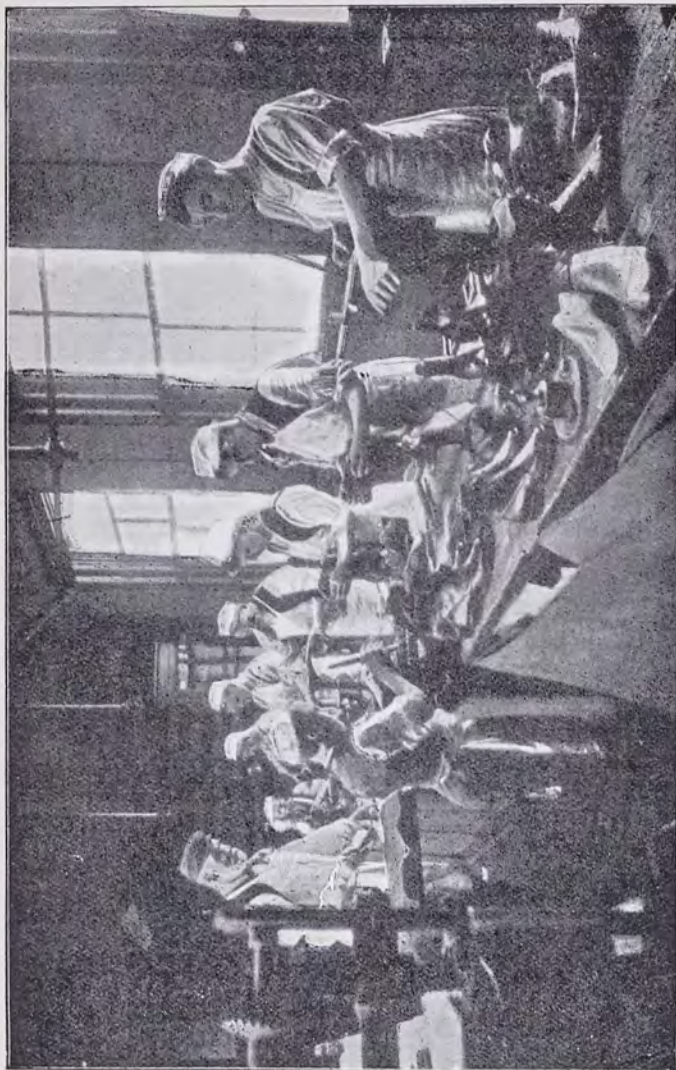
