

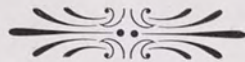

Summary of Annual Meeting.

The Thirty-Third Annual Meeting of the Manchester and Salford Boys' and Girls' Refuges and Homes, and Children's Aid Society, was held in the Town Hall, Manchester, on Thursday, March 26th, 1903, at half-past three o'clock.

The chair was taken by the Lord Mayor of Manchester, who was supported by Dr. Barnardo, W. J. Crossley, Esq., John Thomson, Esq., H. T. Gaddum, Esq., Rev. T. R. Sale, M.A., Rev. Canon Cremer, Rev. James Todd, Henry Charlton, Esq., Mr. Councillor Fildes, R. B. Taylor, Esq., Louis M. Hayes, Esq., and others.

The Rev. James Todd offered prayer.

Letters of regret at non-attendance were received from the Very Rev. The Dean of Manchester, Rev. Canon Hicks, W. J. Emmott, Esq., M.P., W. J. Galloway, Esq., M.P., Dr. Hopkinson, Dr. Goodrich, Sir James Hoy, Herbert Philips, Esq., and others.

The Annual Report and Balance Sheet were presented. The Hon. Sec., Mr. Thomas R. Ackroyd, gave a summary of the Report, which was taken as read, and an abstract of the Financial Statement was given by the Hon. Treasurer, Mr. Henry Charlton.

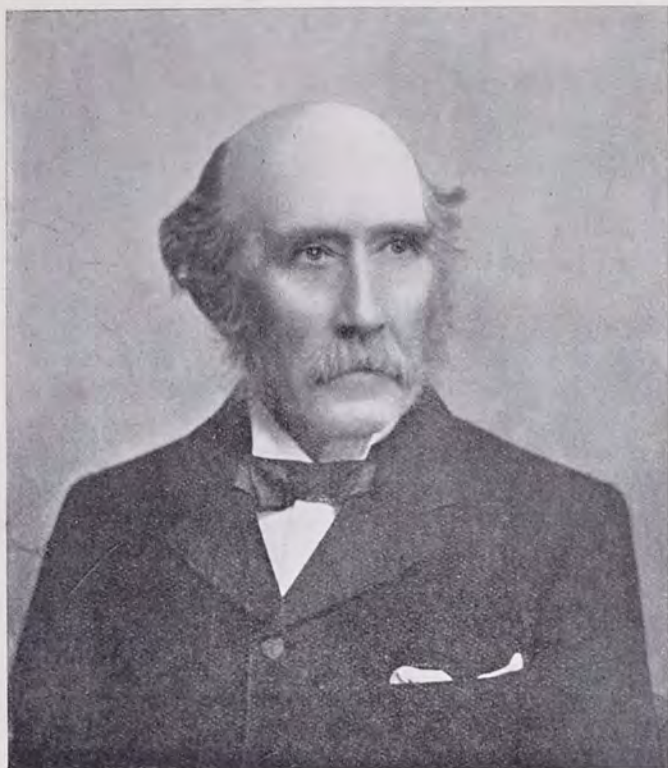
It was then moved by the Lord Mayor, seconded by Dr. Barnardo, supported by W. J. Crossley, Esq., J.P., and resolved:—

“That the Report together with the Financial Statement be adopted, printed and circulated, under the direction of the Committee.”

A vote of thanks to the Lord Mayor for presiding, proposed by Mr. John Thomson, and seconded by Mr. Louis M. Hayes, closed the proceedings.

IN presenting to our subscribers and friends the record of another year's work among poor, homeless and suffering children, we would thankfully acknowledge the continued blessing of Almighty God on the efforts put forth to rescue, reclaim, and provide for this class. For thirty-three years the good work has gone on with ever widening scope and influence, bringing incalculable benefit to the community and making the difference between degradation and self-respect, between misery and happiness, between poverty and comfort, between cursing and blessing, to thousands of young lives.

The Late
Mr. L. K. Shaw. While we recognise with deep thankfulness the Divine guidance throughout the whole history of the Institution, we realise that in that same Providence we have been called during the past year to suffer an immeasurable loss in the death of Mr. Leonard K. Shaw, who was one of the founders of the Institution and an active administrator as Honorary Secretary during the whole period of its existence. His own hand

has written this yearly record for so long, that death itself hardly seems to justify another pen continuing the story of the work done, and we can scarcely yet understand that we shall no more see the familiar figure going in and out in service so beneficent and so untiring. And yet we cannot honour the memory of our friend more than by endeavouring to maintain in the same spirit of devotion the efficiency of the Institution, which in all its branches, provides for every class of child destitution and need.

We feel that no tribute we could pay to the memory of Mr. Shaw in connection with this Charity, would be adequate to convey the sense of admiration called forth by his personal service on behalf of the children. Those who knew him best, could alone realise the devotion which he displayed night and day in the interests of the work. No labour was too arduous, no time too precious, no amount of strength too costly an offering to present on what was to him an altar of "pure religion and undefiled," to visit the fatherless and widows in their affliction.

There is no question as to the powerful and beneficent influence of his life on the children themselves, for their testimony has been received through many years and specially since his death. It has come from many now in the thick of life's battle, men and women occupying positions of honour and responsibility in various parts of the world, from the Minister of the Gospel, the Missionary to the Indians, the student in the University, the nurse in the Hospital, the farmer in the Far West, the soldier on Africa's battle-field, the teacher in the Mission House in China, and hundreds nearer home. He was to so many young lives the exemplification of a passage in the Scripture he loved so well—"A man shall be as an hiding place from the wind, and

a covert from the tempest ; as rivers of water in a dry place, as the shadow of a great rock in a weary land."

His work

If he thus served the children, it is no less true that the service he rendered to the city in this work for nearly a generation is inestimable. For while having no official connection with its government his labours were ever conducive to its highest interests, and Manchester is to-day reaping the benefits of his strenuous and devoted life. The diminution of juvenile vagrancy and crime is in no little degree due not only to his personal work among the waifs and strays, but to his wise advocacy of legislation in the children's interests, before Municipal and Parliamentary authorities. The city does well in holding his memory in honour as that of one who served her faithfully in matters of highest moment.

With this brief testimony to his worth and our loss we proceed to give some particulars of the year's work.

Extent of the Work.

The sixteen branches of the Institution continue to be as active as ever, and the following list, showing the numbers dealt with during the year, will convey some idea of the extent of the work, though these figures do not include the applications for temporary help and for advice.

In recording the figures for the past twelve months a distinction is made between the applications and admissions to the Strangeways and Cheetham Hill Homes, and the temporary but very real help given at the permanent Sea-Side Home at Lytham, the Camp at Southport, the Prison Gate Mission, the Messenger Brigade, and other branches of the Charity.

Excluding therefore the numbers dealt with by these departments we for the moment confine ourselves to the Homes giving permanent admission.

The number and condition of fresh applicants during the past year are as follows:—495 boys and 173 girls making a total of 668. 391 had lost one or both parents, while 277 had both parents living somewhere. Nearly all these children came from Manchester and the district, and upon careful investigation were found in great moral danger and need.

Every case which has come before us has been most carefully considered, and upon enquiries being made many have proved unsuitable for admission into the Homes. In several cases the parents have tried, by neglecting their offspring, to be relieved of their responsibilities at the expense of the community. Others—only a very few

we are thankful to say—were cases of criminality and vice too pronounced to be dealt with by any voluntary institution, and needing the strict discipline of a Reformatory. Some were those of children who had run away from home for various reasons and who were in no sense destitute or needy, and only required kindly dealing and special words of advice, warning or rebuke.

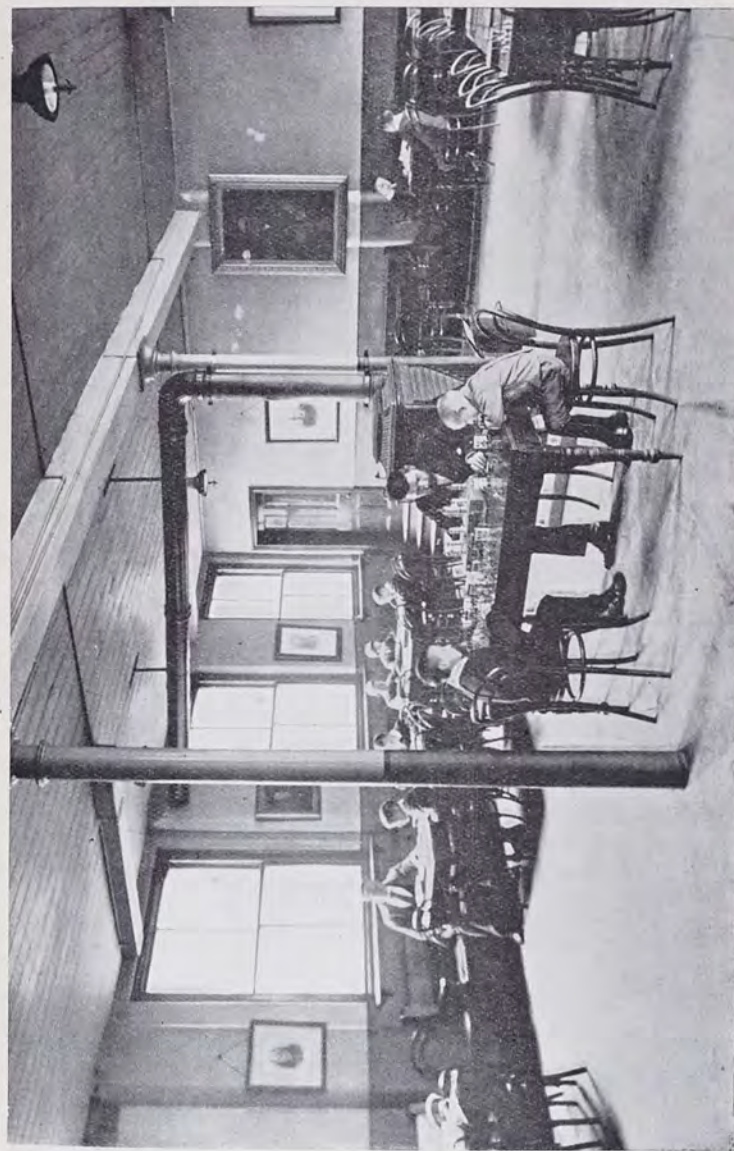
All the attention and thought to these unadmitted cases have taken up much time, but the results which have followed the practical help we have been enabled to render have given us very real satisfaction and encouragement.

We began the year with 445 children in our various Homes, and these, together with 272 fresh cases admitted, make a total of 717 under careful training in the various branches during the last twelve months. The following table gives the results for 1902.

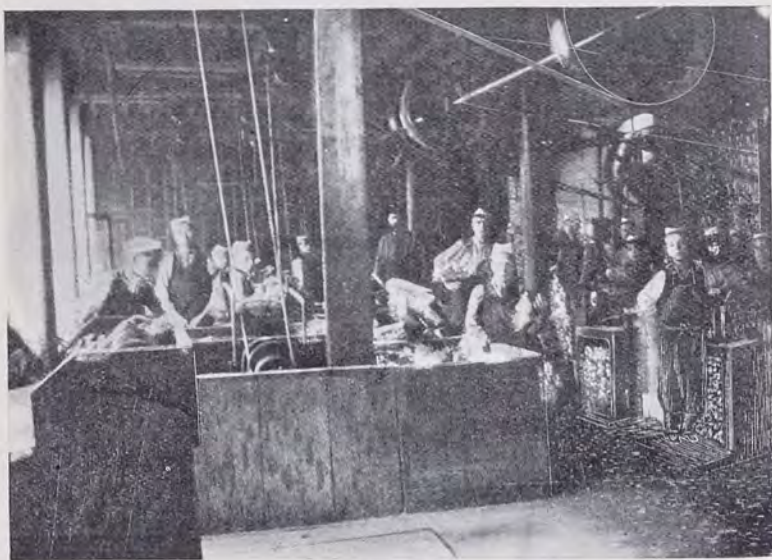


Reading Room, Central Refuge.

And now we proceed to say a brief word respecting the various departments of the work.

Central Refuge. The Central Refuge at Strangeways, which is the headquarters, has dealt with **149** boys, and throughout the year it has pursued its busy active life. It is here that all applications for help are received, and every day stories of sorrow, suffering, and sin, are listened to. A patient hearing is given to every applicant, all the particulars are carefully noted, and the necessary investigation follows without delay. Should the case be one of absolute homelessness or destitution, immediate admission is given.

It is here too that the large work of administration is carried on, and every day finds the machinery in full swing.



Firewood-making Department.

The Workshops. The five workshops, *i.e.*, Shoemaking, Tailoring, Joinery, Printing, and Firewood-making, have been kept at full work during the year. These are conducted on strict business lines, and find employment for a large number of our lads, who are properly apprenticed to the various trades. Each department is under the care of a fully qualified foreman, who takes a personal interest in each of his young workmen. Whilst full trade wages have been paid, there is a profit of £454 13s. 6d., which we think our friends will consider to be most satisfactory.

Working Youths' Home and Institute. This Home, as its name implies, provides for our elder youths, and it is chiefly occupied by those, who admitted as boys to the Refuge in early years, have by industry and perseverance in their various employments won their promotion to the Institute. When there are vacancies it receives youths coming to situations in our city from the country, and other towns. Very frequently these youths are quite friendless when they arrive here, and their small wages compel them to seek uncomfortable and undesirable lodgings. This Home has provided for **61** youths during the year, and has proved to be of inestimable value to the young fellows. Each youth has full board, a separate Cubicle, use of comfortable Sitting Room, News Room, Games Room, Baths, Gymnasium, etc., at a cost of 10/- per week, all inclusive.

The Street Boys' and Emigration Homes. The two homes which are situated in Strangeways, have been unusually busy this year. No less than **147** have been provided for, 72 in the former, and 75 in the latter. These boys are all under 13 years of age, and daily attend

the Board School close by. The inmates, when old enough, are transferred to the Refuge for employment in the workshops, or in the city; or if they desire and the Committee deem it advisable in the best interests of the lads, they are specially prepared for Emigration to Canada in the Spring.

The most useful and important of our departments. Opened sixteen years ago, its door has never been shut night nor day, and the Police, School Board authorities and many others constantly find the great value this Shelter is to the community. Last year **351** children of all ages (in the case of girls up to 18 years) in urgent need, and grave moral danger, were received. Of this number 288 were brought by the police. 57 were homeless and destitute, and 6 were School Board cases.

The need and importance of this "Place of Safety" in the centre of the city, will be fully realized, when we state that **131** of the total number were brought in by the police and others, between ten o'clock at night, and four in the morning. Every case thus admitted is investigated the day following, when friends are communicated with if any are discovered, or the child received into one of the Homes if found to be destitute.

CHEETHAM HILL HOMES.

These form a very important part of the work of the Institution, and altogether there are ten Homes of various kinds.

Each Home is under the care of a separate 'mother' and helper, 16 to 18 children all dwell together, and a very real family life is lived.

When the children reach the age of 14 or 15 they are sent to a situation. As a rule the boys enter a tradesman's family as apprentices, and the girls become domestic servants. A personal interest in all these cases is kept up by the "Mothers" through correspondence with their former children, many of whom once a month visit the old Home. 136 fatherless and motherless ones have been cared for and trained in these Homes during the year.

The same principle is carried on at **The Elder Girls' Rosen Hallas Training Home and Training Home**. Laundry, and here a very true and natural family life is always evident. 71 girls, chiefly from 12 to 17 years of age, many whose early life has been sadly neglected, and some of whom have been found in the most dangerous surroundings, have been carefully and efficiently trained for domestic service at home or abroad. Truly the work here is one calling for much patience, prayer, and faith, but the gratifying results in after life give cause for much thankfulness and encouragement.

A small party of girls from this branch, whose surroundings are such that remaining in Manchester would for them be very undesirable, go forth each year to Canada. In the new country they are given a fresh start under most helpful influences, being placed in selected farm homes, and the happiest results have followed.

This Home has been kept full **The Home for Neglected Motherless Girls** throughout the year, and has proved a great blessing to the 45 neglected little ones who have been lovingly cared for.

This Bethesda of our city, despite all the suffering of the children, is, we believe, one of the happiest and brightest of homes. During the past twelve months, 45 little lives, so full of need, have dwelt beneath its roof, and have been the objects of the tenderest care and love of the "mother" and the nurses.

The daily life of Bethesda is full of interest, and though there are all the evidences of pain and disease, there is an atmosphere of brightness, joy, and peace, which makes it a real "Home of Mercy." Every day these patient little sufferers are taught to know the "Great Physician," and are being prepared for that Home where pain is unknown.

Many of the children when admitted have been beyond the reach of human skill, and the only thing that could be done was to make the closing days of their young, sad lives bright and happy with the sympathy and love, which had been denied them in their own wretched homes in the slums.

During the year we have again experienced the great need for extension, but with the additional accommodation which the "Leonard K. Shaw Memorial" Wing will provide, we shall be able to admit 24 more poor, needy children. The Home, which has the distinction of being the first of its kind in the North of England, will then be able to greatly increase its usefulness.

Our Home at Lytham has again proved itself to be a great blessing to many weakly, pale-faced girls. It is indeed a house of rest, and the holiday spent at this pleasant watering place

has brought health and vigour to many young lives. **197** children during the past year have had an average stay of 15 days.

This branch has again had a most successful season. The Camp provides a week's holiday on the sea coast at Birkdale and 1865 boys and 123 girls a total of **1988**, were sent during the summer months. The experiment last year of giving the girls from our own Homes a holiday under canvas was so successful that it was repeated this year. They occupied the whole of the Camp for ten days in August, and after spending an ideal holiday in the fresh sea air, they returned the pictures of health and happiness. All the boys from the Refuge and other Homes also spent a week at the Camp, and every one of them thoroughly enjoyed the change from Manchester, and were greatly benefited in body and in mind. We are much indebted to the members of the Sub-Committee who so heartily interest themselves in this branch.

The Messenger, Parcel, and Shoebblack Brigades have long ago passed the trial stage, and are now recognized as a great convenience to the public. **200** boys have been provided with steady employment, and this organization is serving a most useful and important purpose in saving poor lads from drifting on the streets. **36** boys have been passed on to permanent situations, and we are constantly receiving tokens of the good work going on.

The Prison Gate Mission continues **At the Prison Gate.** its most useful work. The Refuge workers, assisted by one of the Sisters from the Central Hall and a Deaconess of the City Mission, have carried on this truly Christ-like

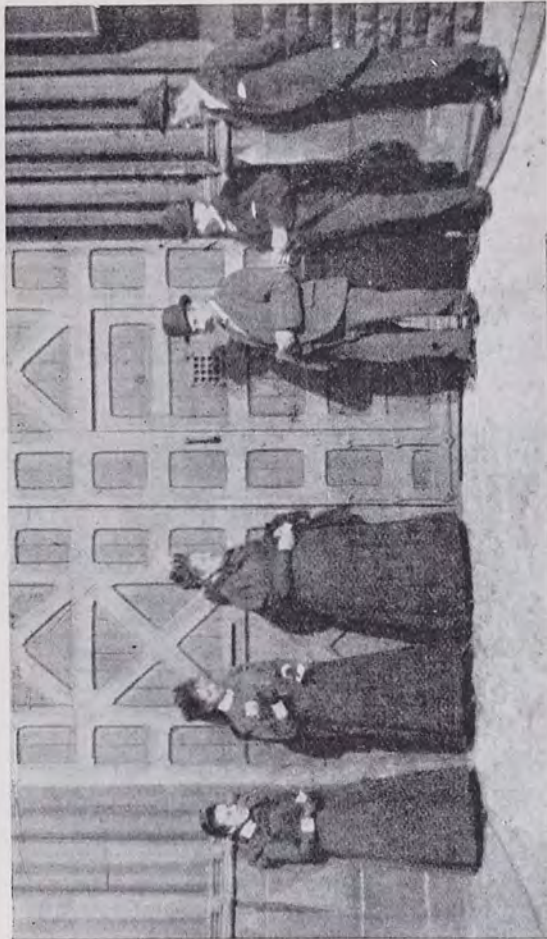
work, during the year. At seven o'clock, morning by morning, whatever the weather may be these devoted workers gather outside the gaol door to welcome the discharged prisoners.

Out of a total number of **13,606** met during the year, **10,237**—6115 men and boys, 4122 women and girls—accepted the invitation to our Mission Hall, which is so near the Strangeways Gaol. During the simple breakfast, which is provided for all who care to partake of it, earnest helpful words are spoken and special cases of need relieved.

A very encouraging feature in this work is the desire of many of the prisoners to sign the Temperance Pledge and make a fresh start in life; **1508** of these pledges were taken at the Mission Hall.

The Police Court Mission to Lads and Girls has been most active throughout the twelve-months. Our officers attend the Courts each morning, and they have been able to render valuable help to **75** young prisoners.

In many and various ways these friends are helping us to carry on the great work of the Institution, and we would pay a tribute to their self-denying labours and offer them our heartiest thanks.

Emigration.

For many years past the Committee have felt that Emigration to Canada was the very best thing for a certain class with which they have to deal. Every year a number of children are rescued from the most dangerous surroundings, and if they remained in England, owing to vicious and pauper relatives, they would always be in danger of peril and ruin.

Every child sent out to Canada through the excellent agency of Rev. R. and Mrs. Wallace of the Training Home at Belleville, Ontario, is placed in most carefully selected farm homes in the Dominion. We would assure our subscribers that the greatest care is exercised in this particular branch of our work. The children are regularly visited and full reports sent to us periodically. The children are taught that they can at all times apply to Mr. Wallace for advice and help in case of need or change.

Through this agency hundreds of boys and girls have been saved for life and are now growing up healthy, hopeful, honourable members of society. Many rescued in the early years of the work are now married in comfortable homes of their own and have prospered exceedingly. Last year 49 boys and girls were thus emigrated and the letters we have received from them are most cheering.

Sleeping Out.

A large number of cases have been dealt with during the year of youths up to 18 years of age, and every year many youths of this age find their way to Manchester, in the hope and belief that employment for them is certain.

Most of them reach the city, sometimes after days of weary tramping, only to discover their mistake, and without any means of support or money for lodgings. When they appeal to the police or cabmen as to where they can find help for the night they are sent to the Refuge. Here they are helped by the provision of a free supper, bed for the night, and a breakfast on the following morning, and put in the way of getting back to the country or their own town again. Sometimes they are helped to get to sea or to join the army. In this way

we are certain many a youth has been saved from the alternative of having to spend the night on one of the brick-fields of the city only to be arrested and sent to prison for simply "sleeping out"

This "sleeping out" problem is a very serious one and we are glad the authorities of our city have determined to face it before next winter. For years past however, this Institution has been dealing with the question as far as it concerns young people and it cannot be too widely known that every destitute and homeless boy and girl can find a shelter and food under our roof.

For many years this Institution has taken a very active interest in the question of "Juvenile Offenders," and in several ways has helped to gradually bring the law into harmony with the public conscience on this matter.

Whilst there is still a need for considerable amendment in the law relating to this subject, we rejoice at the advance which has recently been made. One of the wisest Acts passed by the Government is that which came into operation last year, giving to the Magistrates the power to remand any person under 16 years of age brought before them, to a voluntary home

instead of committing them to prison as was previously the case. As soon as this became law, we communicated with the Police Court authorities and expressed our great desire to co-operate with them as far as possible in the carrying out of this beneficent Act, and offering to take all such cases at our Institution. We are thankful to report that this power has been largely used by the bench, and last year 47 children were handed over to us on remand, the youngest being seven, and the oldest fifteen, while the average age was twelve.

We are in a position to say that compared to some other cities, Manchester is making good use of the provisions of this Act to save the children from gaol or workhouse pending investigation.

We have a representative in each of the three police courts every morning, who is prepared to afford such assistance as may be required.

We are still constrained to ask if some better way cannot be found than bringing these very young children into the precincts of the Court at all.

LEONARD K. SHAW MEMORIAL.

Recreation Ground and Bethesda Home.

In our last Annual Report Mr. Shaw wrote of one great need of the Institution, and pleaded earnestly for means to provide a suitable recreation ground for the many children and young people gathered in the various Homes. With his characteristic earnestness he sought to interest friends in a proposal to purchase an available plot of land on the Derby estate within easy distance of Strangeways, and obtained nearly £1,000 in donations towards that object. The land was secured, and will cost, including wall, laying out, &c., about £4,000.

Recreation Ground.

The need also of an increased number of beds at the Home for Crippled and Incurable Children has been felt for some time, and was painfully realised during the visits paid to the homes of poor crippled children in view of the Coronation Feast arranged for them by Mr. Shaw in the last few weeks of his life.

It was therefore felt by the Committee a fitting thing in considering what form a memorial to their honoured Secretary should take, to suggest the carrying out of these two projects—the purchase of the Recreation Ground and the addition of a new wing to the Bethesda Home, to be called the Leonard K. Shaw Memorial Wing. The latter would cost about £2,000, making the amount required for both objects about £6,000.

A memorial fund was therefore opened, and at the time of writing £3,305 has been received from 335 contributors. The Committee are sure the double object in view, to extend the usefulness of the Institution and to commemorate so noble a life, has only to be brought to the notice of other friends to ensure the contribution of the amount necessary.

While referring our readers to the full **finances** financial statement accompanying this Report, we would say one general word as to ways and means.

We commenced the year with an adverse balance of £506 14s. 5d., and this has been increased to £684 16s. 3d. at the close. With a total expenditure on ordinary account of some £13,000, we are thankful to record that the income for a year which has seen so many appeals from public institutions, has covered the amount within £180. At the same time we would again

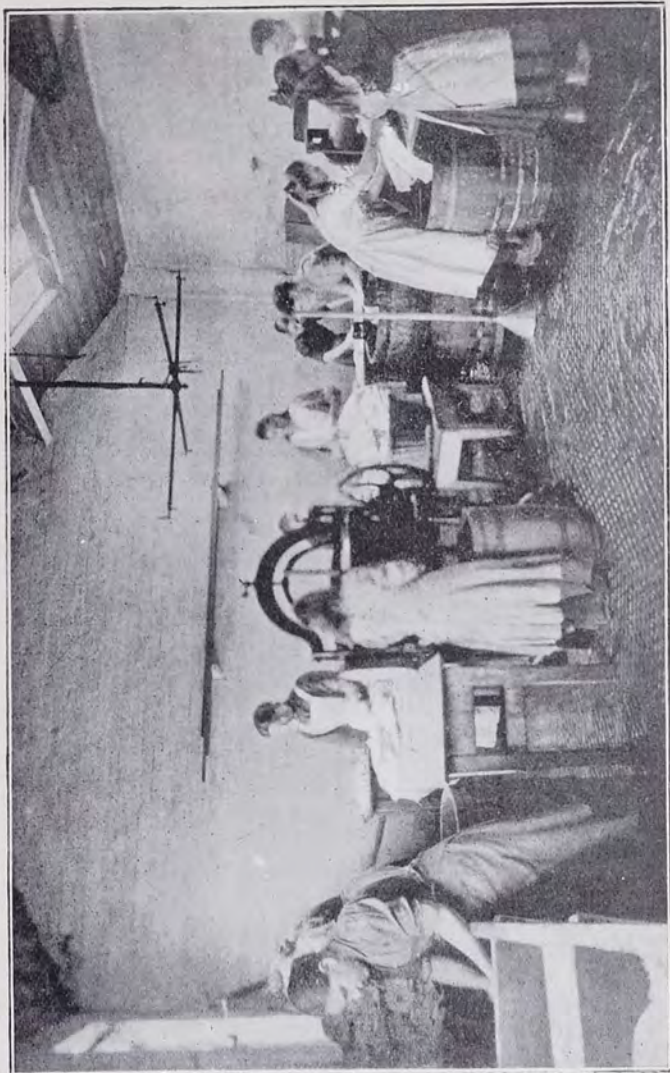
remind our friends that this is not done without applying some legacies, received during the year, to current account, shewing that our ordinary regular income is some £2,000 short of our requirements. An effort on the part of those interested to introduce new subscribers would be much appreciated. The most effective way of doing this is to invite them to pay a personal visit to one or more branches of the Institution.

We must not pass from this part of our Report without a reference to the interesting fact of the amount earned by those children who are over school age. This, including profit on their work in the trading departments, amounts to **£3,082 16s. 11d.** or nearly one-fourth of the whole cost of the Institution. It will also be of interest to know that the amounts in the subscription list shewn as "Thankoffering" are in nearly every case contributed by former inmates.

We might enlarge, if we had space, from the economist's point of view, and endeavour to shew the value of the £10,000 contributed by the public: contrasting it with the same amount spent in some other directions. But we would, at least, wish every contributor to realize that their contribution helps to the noble result outlined here, and that it is changed into shelter and food, into comfort and cleanliness, into education and virtue, into gratitude and godliness, by Faith and Hope and Love.

Closing Words.

In closing this brief record, so inadequately representing the year's work, the Committee would commend it to the thoughtful consideration of all interested in the welfare of poor children, and the social advancement of

the community. We end, as we began, with a reference to the great loss we have sustained, which will make the year ever and sadly memorable, in order to earnestly appeal for the continued help of all our friends, so that by their prayers and service and gifts, the good work may go on—a memorial to its founder, a blessing to the children, and an honour to the Most High.

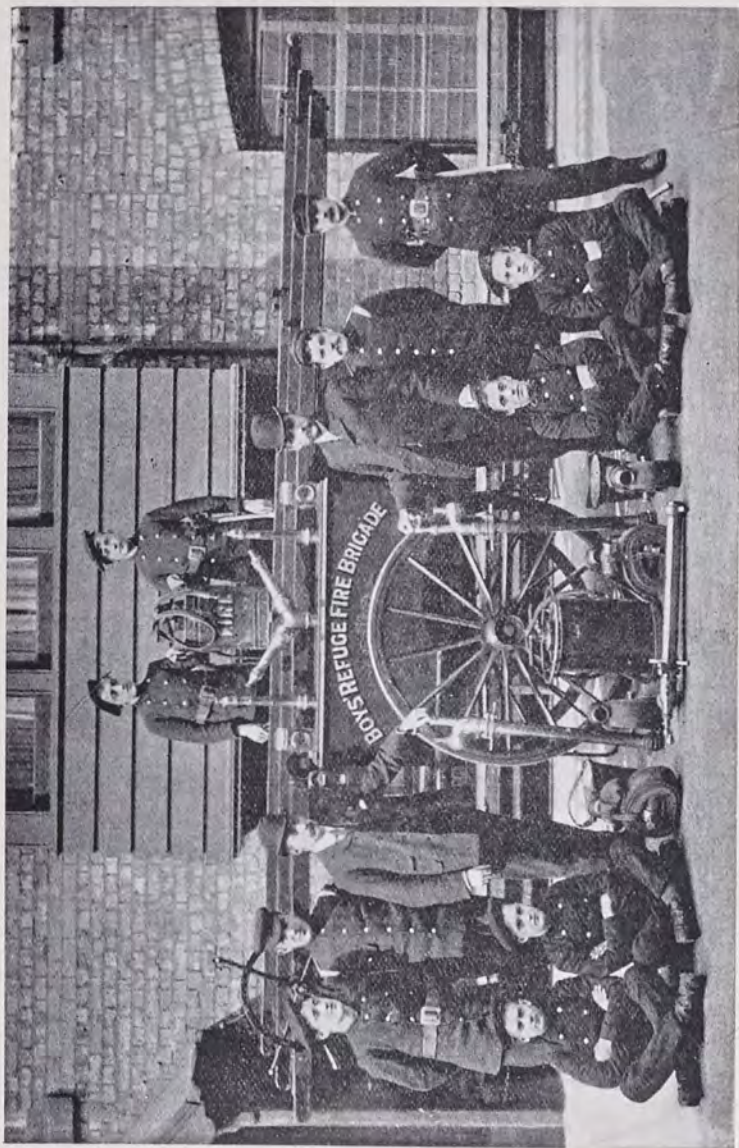

To all who in any way, either by gifts, active service, loving interest, prayerful sympathy, have contributed to the success of another year's work, the Committee, in sending forth this report, tender their heartfelt thanks, ever remembering the loyalty and devotion of the regular staff, to whose labours so much of the good accomplished must be attributed.

MEDICAL REPORTS, 1902.

(Central Refuge and Great Ducie Street Homes.)

I have much pleasure in stating that the health of the boys both at the Refuge and adjoining Homes has been most satisfactory during the past twelve months; indeed I ought to say more satisfactory than it has been for several years past. There has been little or no sickness, none of a serious nature, and entire freedom from epidemic Disease and Pneumonia—and I am glad to add that we have no deaths to record. I attribute this happy condition very largely to the excellent way in which they are looked after by those in authority over them, and to the care taken in providing healthy surroundings and good clothing and diet.

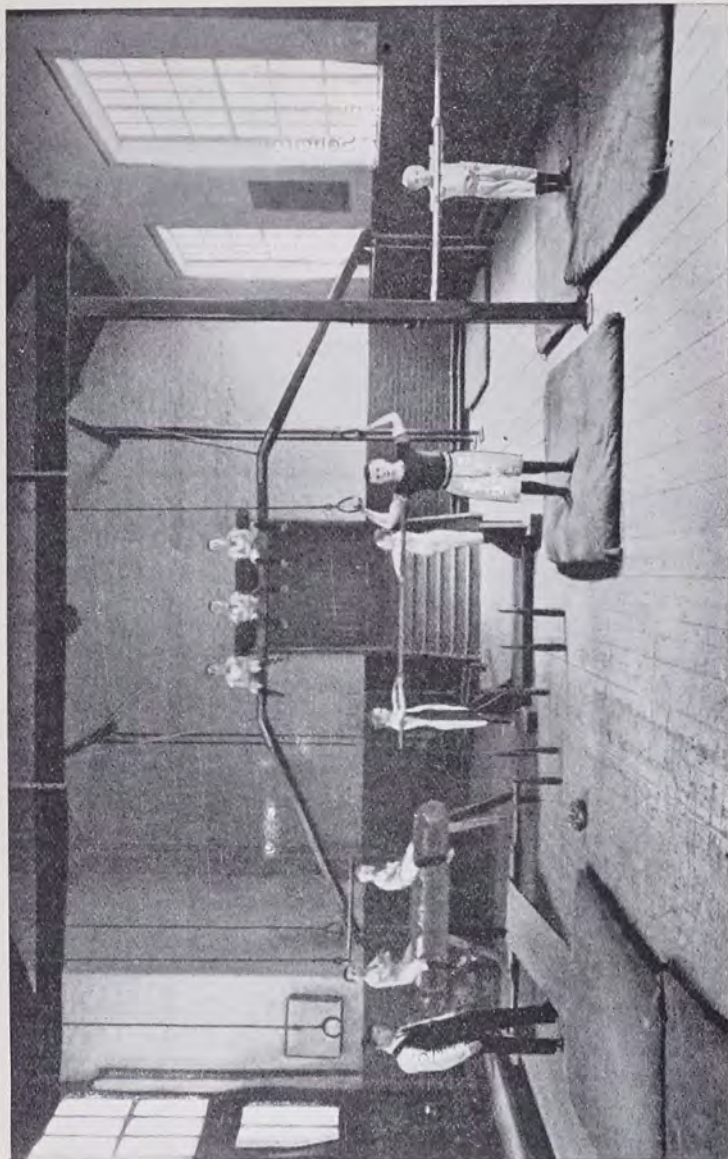
Our average sickness at these Homes, I am glad to say, has considerably lessened during the last twelve months. The most intractable disease we have still to contend with, is that fell scourge of our country—Tuberculosis—no fewer than four of our inmates succumbing to its ravages in brain and lung. These were our only deaths, if we except one little sufferer who was admitted to "Bethesda" with heart disease, and who was admitted solely that he might pass away in comparative comfort. The other infectious diseases were represented by three cases of Diphtheria, three cases of Measles, one of Erysipelas, one of Mumps, and a host of mild Influenza.

This Report, it seems to me, would not be complete without a reference to the immeasurable loss sustained by the Homes through the sudden, indeed tragical, death of our loved and revered head, Mr. Shaw. Mr. Shaw literally sacrificed his life through over-work for these Homes, and the crippled children of Manchester generally. May his rare example remain ever before us, and his memory live ever green in ours.
