Summary of Annual Meeting.

The Thirty-Fourth Annual Meeting of the Manchester and Salford Boys' and Girls' Refuges and Homes, and Children's Aid Society, was held in the Free Trade Hall, Manchester, on Monday, March 28th, 1904, at seven o'clock.

The chair was taken by the Lord Bishop of Manchester, who was supported by W. J. Crossley, Esq., Rev. Samuel Pearson, M.A., Henry Lee, Esq., Captain Bremner, Dr. Boutflower, Dr. Walker, Dr. Fulton, James Boyd, Esq., Mr. Councillor Fildes, and others.

The Rev. Samuel Pearson, M.A. offered prayer.

Letters of regret at non-attendance were received from Sir W. H. Holland, M.P., Lees Knowles, Esq., M.P., Principal Hopkinson, Sir James Hoy, Herbert Philips, Esq., T.L. Farrar, Esq., H.T. Gaddum, Esq., Henry Charlton, Esq., R.B. Taylor, Esq., and others.

The Annual Report and Balance Sheet were presented. The Hon. Sec., Mr. Thomas R. Ackroyd, gave a summary of the Report, which was taken as read, and an abstract of the Financial Statement.

It was then moved by the Lord Bishop, seconded by W. J. Crossley, Esq., J.P., and resolved:—

"That the Report together with the Financial Statement be adopted, printed and circulated, under the direction of the Committee, and that the Committee for the ensuing year be, Messrs. W. J. Crossley, R. B. Taylor, James Boyd, James Fildes, Mrs. L. K. Shaw, Messrs. R. Shaw, Harry E. Gaddum, and Arthur Taylor; The Hon. Secretary, Mr. Thomas R. Ackroyd; the Hon. Treasurer, Mr. Henry Charlton; and the Auditors, Messrs. Theodore Jones, Crewdson and Youatt."

During the evening an attractive programme of songs, drills, and instrumental music, etc., was given by the children to an appreciative audience which crowded the large hall. Mrs. Knox distributed the prizes to the children.

A vote of thanks to the Lord Bishop for presiding, proposed by Mr. Councillor Fildes, and seconded by Dr. Boutflower, closed the proceedings.

FOR THE YEAR 1903.

T is again our duty and privilege to present to our subscribers and friends the record of another year's work on behalf of poor, homeless, and suffering children. In some respects it must necessarily be a record similar to many which have preceded it, for it is a great satisfaction to the Committee to be able to say that for several years the Institution has been in a position to meet any local case of child destitution and homelessness. It is thirty-four years since the first door was opened and accommodation found for about twenty poor, homeless, street arabs; now the Institution has in its various Homes nearly five hundred children under care and training. So in the present developed and well organised form of the work the Annual Report cannot but year by year repeat itself in respect to the main features of its operations.

Growth during thirty-four years.

> While this is so, as evidenced by the references to the various Branches and numbers of children dealt with, it is all the more important that we, with our

subscribers and friends, should make an earnest effort to keep our minds and hearts in touch with the common human facts which underlie the necessarily brief statement of a year's work.

The figures may approximate year by year, but we must remember that they represent a constant flow of young life into and out of the Institution. Each child

Constant stream of young life. admitted, and each applicant who receives temporary help or is found ineligible, has surrounding circumstances more or less differing from those of every other, and we have to learn and investigate these before deciding the case. A little consideration on these lines will help us to realise more fully how essentially our work is one of individual dealing, a fact so easily obscured when the work of a year has to be summarised in a few pages and in a great measure by dry statistics.

Individual Investigation and care. Again, if admitted after careful consideration of each individual case, it is no less necessary to results, happy for the child, and satisfactory to those in charge, that each boy and girl should have individual care and training in the hope that in many cases the bad influence of the past may be eradicated and an ambition implanted which shall lead on to a good and useful life. If the

figures that are given in the following pages are viewed in the light of all that is implied in this personal dealing with the children before and after admission they will be much more eloquent of what a year's work means among poor, homeless, and suffering children. It is well that in our annual report we should restate the foundation principles of our Institution as expressed in the Trust Deed.

To receive Homeless and Destitute Children found in Manchester and Salford and district.

To give immediate admission to such without distinction of Creed.

To provide such with suitable food, clothing, and Industrial training.

To educate such in Christian principles based on the Bible only.

The broad humanitarian basis of our work commends it to the sympathy of the community and we gratefully acknowledge the sincere and practical interest taken in our effort to ameliorate the condition of the most needy and helpless class in our midst, by so many friends, from those in the highest station to the most humble of our fellow citizens.

We are also glad to feel that ours is a Christian work, having as its basis the highest motives and as its


Christian basis. ultimate aim the implanting of Christian principles in the minds of the young people. We have many testimonies to the success of our workers in this worthy ambition, and we thank God for continued guidance and blessing in a work which is an effort at applied Christianity.

Reference is made at the close of this Report to the Emigration work, the Bethesda Extension, Finance, and other matters; but here we would give a summary of the work done during the year in each of the branches which comprise the whole Institution.

Extent of the Work.

The sixteen branches of the Institution continue to be as active as ever, and the following list, showing the numbers dealt with during the year, will convey some idea of the extent of the work, though these figures do not include the applications for temporary help and for advice.

In recording the figures for the past twelve months a distinction is made between the applications and admissions to the Strangeways and Cheetham Hill Homes, and the temporary but very real help given at the permanent Sea-Side Home at Lytham, the Camp at Southport, the Prison Gate Mission, the Messenger Brigade, and other branches of the Charity.

The number and condition of fresh Mew applicants during the past year are as Applications follows: -632 boys and 193 girls making a total of 825. 422 had lost one or both parents, while 403 had both parents living somewhere. Nearly all these children came from Manchester and the district, and upon careful investigation were found in need, more or less, of our help. Every case which has come before us has been carefully considered.


The year began with 459 children Admitted under our care and training, and to this Last year. number must be added 319 fresh cases admitted, making a total of 778 dealt with in the various branches during the last twelve months.

The head-quarters of the Institution has dealt with 156 boys, and has continued Central almost full throughout the year. Here Refuge. also are the Offices, small Hospital, and Conference Hall, Boardroom, and here come all the

applicants in the first instance. This central Home with its reading and games room, swimming bath, bandroom, etc., is now fully equipped with everything requisite for the training into good and useful men, the boys who dwell beneath its roof.

The following cases will illustrate the class admitted to the Central Refuge and Street Boys' Home.

J.H.C., 15 years, admitted recently. He was a good specimen of the raw material with which we have to deal. Mother dead, father a degraded character who has been in the hands of the police for fighting, etc., and who lives in common lodging-houses in our city and other places. The lad was charged at the City Police Court with sleeping out, and after being remanded for a few days was handed over to our Police Court Mission Officer, and brought down for admission to the Refuge. His condition was one of indescribable filth, -almost intolerable-head filthy, and eyes sore through utter neglect, and suffering badly from ringworm. He had been sleeping out more or less for some time. He has rapidly improved in physical condition under proper treatment, and we hope he may be a permanent case of rescue.

L. C., II years. A case of a bright intelligent lad, fatherless and motherless, and who had become an insupportable burden

to a sister. Our Inspector's report is as follows:

" I have made enquiries into the above case and find the lad is living with his married sister, who is a widow with five children, and is receiving six shillings per week from the Guardians. The boy's father died three years ago and the mother has been dead seven years. Since the father's death he has been living with this married sister, but she lost her husband a few months ago and having a large family of her own cannot keep him any longer. She looks a decent hardworking woman.'

We hope to give the helping hand which this poor lad so

much needs.

The Refuge motto has been from the The foundation of the work :-- "We help those Workshops. who try to help themselves," and this motto has always been kept well before the minds of our boys and girls. We have now five workshops, i.e., Shoemaking, Tailoring, Joinery, Printing, and Firewood Making, and all have been kept at full work during the year. Each shop has its own qualified foreman, and employment has been found for 64 boys throughout the year. The result of the twelve months trading after deducting all proper expenses, and paying a fair wage to the masters and apprentices, shews a net profit of £458. This amount is added to the general funds of the Charity, and we consider it eminently satisfactory.

This Home has received a total of 71 youths during the year, and has proved to Working Doutbs' Thome be a great blessing to many of the young and 3nstitute. fellows. Each youth has his own separate little cubicle, use of cosy sitting room, news room, games room, bath room, and splendid gymnasium, and all at a cost of 10/- per week, including excellent board and washing. We know of no other place in the city where such advantages are provided at so low a rate. It just meets the needs of our own working youths, and many a young man who has come into our city a stranger has found a home here.

The Street Boys' Home. This Home has received 103 lads during the last twelve months, and it has pursued its course of quiet usefulness during the year.


The Boys' Emigration Training bome. Strangeways group, has been busy throughout the year receiving and preparing the large family who dwell here, for their new homes in Canada. III boys have been dealt with and 30 out of this number were emigrated in April to Ontario.

All the boys of the Strangeways Homes of school age attend the Southall Street Board School, and receive an excellent education there.

On Sunday morning the boys from the Central Refuge attend St. Clement's Church, Lower Broughton,

and those of the Street Boys' and Emigration Home attend Gravel Lane Wesleyan Chapel. In the afternoon all the inmates attend Sunday School, which is held at the Refuge, and in the evening they gather in the Conference Hall, where a Gospel Service is held, and to which the public are cordially invited.

This Shelter has again been a very busy centre of work throughout the year,

The receiving no less than 399 young people



Door. this number 341 were brought by the police, and 17 by the officers of the Society for Prevention of Cruelty to Children. Out of the total number received, no less than 135 were brought to this "Place of Safety" by the police and others, between ten o'clock at night and four in the morning.

The immense value of this branch lies in the fact that it is an immediate rescue Home for wandering boys

and girls, (the latter up to 18 years of age) who from various causes find themselves destitute, and in grave moral danger on our streets. To have in the centre of a great city like ours, a well-appointed Home, with doors open day and night for the reception of such, as well as for poor and suffering children of younger ages, is, of itself, a fact of the highest importance, and one which should appeal to the judgment and sympathy of all who know the condition of life in our great centres of population.

Having spoken of the branches in the city, we now have to say a few words The Cheetham Will about the Homes in Cheetham Hill. Orphanages They form a very important part of our and Homes. work, and are very widely known.

THE SIX ORPHANAGES

named after the donors, are :-

The Langworthy Home, girls. The Garnett Home, boys. The Higgins Home, boys.

The Schoolgirls' Home, girls. The Crossley Home, boys. The Atkinson Home, boys.

Each House contains 16 to 18 children, a mother, and a helper, and a true and natural family life is lived, the results of which are seen in the well doing of the children in their later years. 125 fatherless and motherless ones have been cared for and trained in these Homes during the year.

and Laundry

The Rosen Hallas Home which The Elder Girls' adjoins the Orphanages, receives home-Training Home less and destitute girls, and also those in grave moral danger, and gives an excellent training in all household and

laundry work. Last year 66 girls, chiefly from 12 to 18 years of age, were dealt with, and fitted either for emigration or domestic service.

A girl admitted to the Homes some years ago after being turned into the street at midnight by a drunken mother Emigrated to Canada, and now happy and prosperous as the wife of a young farmer, who owns his own farm.

The following is a sample case of the class dealt with here. Our Inspector reports:—

"I had reported to me the case of a young girl 17 years of age. I made private enquiries and found that the girl was steady and industrious, and working with her stepmother who always drew the girl's wages. The girl was trying to live a good Christian life, and taught a class of boys in one of our Ragged Schools, and though she had only the clothes she worked in, she would have been content but for her father's drunken habits, and abominable language. The stepmother is almost as bad as the father. The girl left home on one occasion, and obtained a place of service, but after a few weeks the father found her, and made her return home, when there was a repetition of the abuse, and the father had told the girl her wages were not enough, so she must go on the streets. The poor girl was getting so desperate that she threatened to commit suicide if not helped to get away. I arranged to meet her the next morning, and obtained her admission into a good home, and her whereabouts is now unknown to the father or relatives.'

A small band of girls, whose surroundings are such that remaining in Manchester would be highly dangerous, go from this Home to Canada every spring, where they are placed in excellent farm homes, and the best results have followed.

The very decided Christian influence exercised in this Home, as in all the others, has been owned of God to the lasting blessing of many who were on the brink of ruin when received here.

We subjoin two letters received, amongst many others, from girls, now in respectable situations, who were formerly admitted into this Home in great need.

Dear Mrs. Shaw,

I hope I shall not be troubling you too much, but if you would be so very kind as to send me a Bible, such as you sometimes sell to the girls, I should be very grateful. There are plenty of Bibles in the house, still I do like one of my own. I gave mine to one of the patients at Bowdon, and have not bought one since. I have wanted many times to thank you very much for sending me just here to Mrs. D. I feel that I owe it entirely to your kindness that I came here, and with Mrs. D'.s patience with my weakness, but I am quite well and strong now, and I am very thankful to you.

I did not like it at first though, but now I would not go to England unless I knew I could come back to Canada. I like my dear old country though just the same, but everything is so nice out here. I have been greatly blessed while I have been in this country; God ble-sed me by sending me into a good Christian home first. I was there for over three years—it was on a farm, and Mrs. Walsh was so nice and kind to me and she trained me so well, but it is not going to be done in vain, I am going to be a credit to her.

I got quite a few Christmas presents; I got nine. My Sunday School teacher gave me a lovely big Bible. I have made quite a few friends out in Canada. I am glad to say I am a Christian and I am really happy.

The Convalescent Cottage.

This Cottage, which is in the Rosen Hallas grounds, has been kept well-filled throughout the year. It is a most useful branch of the work as among the large number of children

who live in the adjoining Homes, a certain number of weak and ailing ones are found. They are placed in this Cottage for a time, where they receive the special attention and nourishment which their cases need.

Thome for Meglected Motherless Children This Home, which forms part of the Cheetham Hill group, has been kept quite full during the past twelve months. It has been used for specially neglected little children, and 40 have

been under care and training, but the house being somewhat unsuitable for our needs, the Committee have moved most of the children to the George Street group.

Bethesda Ibome for Cripples and Incurables. This beautiful "House of Mercy," provides for "crippled, maimed, paralysed, and generally incurable poor children whose cases are unsuitable for the ordinary hospitals." Here, the most suffering of all God's suffering ones find

brightness, joy and love, and throughout the year 48

little lives have been most tenderly nursed and lovingly cared for.

Those who have sympathetic hearts might well visit this Home, and see how happy the poor little sufferers are under the motherly care of the good matron and her staff of nurses.

Principle of admission.

Admission to this Home, as to all the others, is not by voting. Application is made to the Secretary, each case is carefully investigated, and then the Committee admit the most needy and suffering.

The Angel of Death has visited "Bethesda" during the past year, and as the little ones have been taken from us we have been so glad to believe that whilst committed to our charge they were led to know the Great Physician and Healer, and prepared for that Home where it is always bright, and where there is no pain.

During the year, 217 children have



summer a recognized branch of Christian and philanthropic work. It is with some degree of satisfaction that the Committee remembers they are the pioneers of Holiday Camps for Poor Children, and they rejoice to know that this special kind of work is now carried on by various organizations in our own neighbourhood, and

in many parts of the country. Last year, from May to September, 2007 boys and 131 girls spent a week under canvas at Birkdale.

All the boys from the Refuge and other Homes, as well as the girls, had a week's holiday at the Camp; and it is scarcely necessary to say they received great benefit, both in body and in mind, whilst there.

We are much indebted to the members of the sub-Committee, who have charge of this department, and who so efficiently manage this important and popular branch of the Institution.

The Messenger, Parcel, and Shoeblack Brigade has provided useful employment for 207 boys, and has

drafted 39 of them into permanent situations. The object of this branch is to find employment for poor respectable lads, and save them from drifting on to the streets. The Brigade has now proved to be of great public convenience, and we are glad to have it recognised by the authorities of the city.

The Prison Gate Mission has continued its most beneficent work, and during the Prison Gate. last twelve months, 14,294 prisoners were met at the Gate. Out of this number, 6501 men and boys, 3566 women and girls—a total of 10,067—accepted the invitation to our Mission Hall, which is close by the Strangeways Gaol. At seven o'clock each morning, in all sorts of weather, our workers, along with a Deaconess of the City Mission, and a Sister from the Central Hall, long associated with us in the work, have invited the prisoners to the simple breakfast provided for them at the Refuge. During the meal, which is so much enjoyed, earnest helpful words are spoken, special cases of need are relieved; and last year 1542 total abstinence pledges were taken.


The Police Court Mission to Lads and Girls has carried on its active operations as in previous years. The three Courts, City, Salford, and County, are attended every morning by our representatives, and they have rendered invaluable help to the Bench, and to the children in various ways. 70 boys and girls were specially dealt with in this way by our officers at the Courts.

YOUNG PRISONERS.

Juvenile Offenders and Police Courts.

For many years the Committee have taken a very active interest in the question of "Juvenile Offenders," and in several ways have helped to gradually bring the law into harmony with the public conscience in this

matter. We are devoutly thankful that the Magistrates in Manchester and Salford have so very largely availed themselves of the beneficent Act of 1902, which gives them the power to remand any person under 16 years of age brought before them to a Voluntary Home instead of committing them to prison, as was formerly the case. It is very gratifying to us to report that last year 141 children were handed over to us on remand; the youngest being 7, and the oldest 16, whilst the average age was 12.

In America, the police authorities having found that the ordinary Police Court system has disastrous effects on the children's character, have established in most of their large cities a "Children's Court." A room is set apart, where every effort is made to do away with the appearance of a Court of Justice, and the magistrate sees the children with the one great desire of helping them.

Young Prisoners.

These boys and girls are made to feel that they are not regarded as criminals, and the judge is looked upon as a counsellor and friend. Last year, in Manchester alone, 530 juvenile offenders were arrested, and of this number 66 were under 10 years of age, and 435 were from 10 to 16 years of age. Many of these were brought before the Court, not

for the committal of any crime, but for begging, sleeping out, or selling on the streets without the Corporation licence.


As a nation we are beginning to realise that our boys and girls are our most valuable asset, and these children of the poor, who get into the hands of the police, have a high commercial value, as well as a great moral and spiritual worth. With a view of diminishing the number of those who become the inmates of our workhouses and gaols, we venture to ask if our police authorities could not arrange for some of the magistracy to see these juvenile offenders privately in one of the rooms of the Court or Town Hall instead of bringing them into contact with all the demoralizing atmosphere of the ordinary Police Court. We believe that such a procedure would prove most beneficial, and would save many of the children to good citizenship, who are more to be pitied than blamed. What most of these need is a word of sympathy, encouragement, and help, and there are many magistrates in our city who could do all this with very beneficial results if they could only see these prisoners in a "Children's Court."

Why not adopt it in England

EMIGRATION.

In view of the interest which is again being aroused in this country in connection with the subject of the emigration of deserted and orphan children by Poor Law Guardians, it is a satisfaction to know that our Committee have been for many years convinced that the best thing for a certain class of children is emigration to Canada. The children are selected on grounds which we feel sure will commend themselves to our friends if rightly understood.

Preference is given to those children, who, while hopeful in themselves, have undesirable, and often



Marchmont Home, Belleville, Ontario.


degrading connections. We have had sad experience in some cases of children, especially girls, on whom much loving care has been bestowed for years to say nothing of money, who have been influenced by unworthy relatives and dragged down again to the debasing surroundings from which they had been rescued. In some cases nothing but emigration removes the possibility of this danger.

The auspices under which they go and the conditions of their life in Canada are all that could be reasonably desired, and are such as to make them eventually the most satisfactory class of colonist. They are first received at the Marchmont Home, (view of which will be found on another page) and ever after know it as the place to which they can return in any time of difficulty and where they can make sure that their needs and wishes will receive the wise and sympathetic attention of Mr. and Mrs. Wallace and the other friends there.

The homes to which the children go, are carefully selected, being those of well-to-do farmers of good character in the district of Belleville. The respectability of the employer is vouched for by a Justice of the Peace, and a Minister of Religion. The conditions of farm life are very happy, as so many letters from the children themselves testify: they are seldom treated as servants but fall into the family circle and become one of a household where everyone has some duty to perform.

Another great advantage in this scheme of emigration, is not only the benefit to the child with dangerous surroundings here, but the gain from an economical point of view. For the sum of £12 (considerably less than the cost of one year's maintenance at home), a boy or girl can be started on a career which practically means provision for life. This amount

Economy of Emigration. provides a good outfit, pays passage, and provides for the child's supervision in Canada until 17 or 18 years of age.


We have just received from the Commissioner of Emigration in London, copy of a letter which has been sent to him from Mr. J. J. Kelso, the Superintendent of the Department of Neglected and Dependent Children of Ontario, and in view of the fact that by the help of many of our subscribers we have been able to send a large number of poor children to the Dominion, the following extract from the letter will be specially interesting:—

Canadian Testimony. "There are several of the Receiving Homes that could easily handle twice the number of children particularly (among others) the Marchmont Home at Belleville, under the management of Rev. Robert Wallace, and working in connection with the Manchester Children's Refuges. I am pleased to be able to say that this department of Government work was carried on during the past year in a very satisfactory manner, and owing to the extensive educational work carried on in the interests of nomeless or neglected children, there are very few cases of ill-treatment or overwork of English boys and girls reported."

Last year 51 boys and girls were thus emigrated, making over 1400 children provided for in this way since this branch was established.

SLUMS.

It has been our lot recently in connection with the Work of the Institution to visit many of the most congested districts of Manchester and Salford where the poorest of our poor crowd together, and we are more and more convinced that it is asking too much of human nature to expect lives of health, decency, and morality, under the conditions which prevail in districts like the one shewn in the photograph. The City Corporation has done much to improve some parts but a great deal still remains to be done. What chance have little children born and reared in such surroundings; a narrow, squalid court with high buildings almost shutting it in from the sky

Where the Children come from, itself, flanked by a public house if not two, a single room for the whole family, and the little life at the mercy of sights and sounds which would appal the great majority of our readers. We may deplore the high mortality of children in these localities, but we can scarcely expect any other result under the conditions which prevail. It is bad enough for men and women

"But these others—children small, Spilt like blots about the city, Quay, and street, and palace wall, Take them up into our pity."

The tragedy in which drink, poverty, and sickness

play the leading parts, is being performed night and day with our great city for a stage, and we get a sight of some of the acts in the course of our work on behalf of poor children. Here is one.

A family of four children living with their father in a small house in a crowded neighbourhood: we had great difficulty in gaining admittance as we were thought to be the bailiffs, who had already been and were again expected. On the door being opened we were met by a blinding cloud of smoke, which was a consequence of the landlord trying to smoke the family out of the house by blocking up the chimney! As a result of our inquiry the girl of 12, whose picture we give, was taken to our shelter. Her condition was so filthy that her clothing had to be destroyed and her hair cut off and the change was so great that, the following morning, her father at first did not recognise her. The boy of 14 was admitted to one of our branches and the youngest child of 8 taken by a relative. The sad sequel is that the father on the following Saturday fell down stairs in a state of intoxication sustaining injuries from which he died at the infirmary a few days after.



When we remember the active part taken by our Committee, under the direction of the late Mr. Leonard K. Shaw, for over thirty years in calling public attention to the evils of juvenile street hawking, it is gratifying to know how great an advance has been made

in ameliorating the condition of these children through the various public authorities. Striking evidence of this is given in the testimony of the police and School Board to the beneficent operation of the new powers under the Corporation Act of 1901. Under this Act the Corporation have power to issue regulations controlling trading in the streets by children under sixteen years of age. The following regulations, among others, are in force:—

That children trading on the streets shall be licensed by the Corporation.

No licence to be granted to any child under twelve years of age.

They must not be unfit to trade through any physical or mental infirmity.

They must have the consent of parents or other guardians.

Girls under fourteen must not trade in the centre of the city.

No child must trade in the streets after eight o'clock in winter, or nine o'clock in summer.

Must be decently and sufficiently clothed.

Shall not trade in public houses or places of entertainment,

The number of juvenile traders has been reduced, and the oversight of those who are licensed has been well and judiciously done by the officers appointed to the specific duties of the department by the Chief Constable. Children in some cases have been introduced to permanent situations, thus removing them from the street life altogether, and we have been able to find employment for a number in our Messenger Brigade.


LEONARD K SHAW MEMORIAL. Recreation Ground and Bethesda Home.

Our friends and subscribers will remember that the Committee decided, in seeking to perpetuate the memory of the late Mr. Leonard K. Shaw, to complete two projects, which it was his great desire to have carried out, viz., the purchase of a permanent Recreation Ground for the four to five hundred children in the Homes, and the addition of a number of beds at the "Bethesda" Home for crippled and incurable children,

Extension of Bethesda Home for Crippled and Incurable Children Leonard K. Shaw Memorial Wing.

During the year good progress has been made with the scheme, and we have now a fine recreation ground in Cheetham, the opening ceremony of which it is intended to hold sometime in June next. In respect to the new wing at "Bethesda" to be called "The Leonard K. Shaw Memorial Wing," very careful consideration has been given to the matter, the Committee finally deciding to adopt the larger of two proposals and provide accommodation for 32 additional children. The number of cripple and invalid children in circumstances of extreme poverty is painfully realised by the many applications we receive, and we hope to do much in relieving several deserving cases as soon as the extension


Extension of Bethesda.

is completed. The erection of this building is now in active operation; the memorial stone will shortly be laid by Mrs. Shaw, and we hope the end of the year will see the new wards ready for occupation.

An interesting development in connection with this extension took place during the year. The Broughton Park Estate, which abuts on to our grounds, is being opened up for building, and our good Solicitor,

Mr. Farrar, approached the landlord of the adjoining plot, Captain Clowes, with a view to securing it for "Bethesda." Captain Clowes very generously offered the land, valued at £700, to the Committee for £200, at the same time giving a donation to the new building fund. The way was further cleared by the generous gift of this amount by our Chairman; and so we have come into possession of land which enables us to give a much finer position to the new building, and doubles the amount of garden space for the children, to whom it is so necessary in the fine days, seeing they can seldom go beyond the precincts of the Home. The accompanying engraving shews the new wing which, in its use, will be at once a great blessing to many a poor little sufferer and a worthy memorial of a good life.

A word remains to be said in respect to the cost of the whole memorial scheme. This, owing to several causes, will be more than was originally estimated. Several hundred pounds will be required to meet Corporation charges in connection with both the recreation ground and Bethesda in respect of paving, etc., of adjoining streets. The total expenditure will probably be about £8000. The amount already subscribed by over 400 donors is £5199 11s. od., and we trust the object will so commend itself to other friends that the Committee's appeal for the balance may meet with a prompt and generous response.

The late Mr. John Thomson.

While in the midst of preparing this Report we are greatly distressed by the news of the death of our vice-chairman, Mr. John Thomson, and are deeply grieved at the great loss thus sustained by our Institution. Mr. Thomson joined the Committee in 1890 and has been a devoted member ever since. He took a deep practical interest in the objects of the Institution and by his wise

counsel and sound judgment rendered valuable service in the administration of the work. He was greatly interested in the welfare of the poor children under the care of the Committee and it was a revelation of a good heart to see how his face kindled with sympathy as a poor street lad applied for admission or as he went round the wards at Bethesda, among the little cripple and incurable children. His place will not be easily filled and we, with many another Manchester Charity, will more and more realise his worth and our own loss.

We may be allowed to supplement finances. the full financial statement which accompanies this Report, by a few words in emphasis of one or two interesting features of the year's finance.

We are very thankful to record that the year's income slightly exceeds the expenditure. An adverse balance of £684 16s. 3d., was brought forward from the previous year, and this has been reduced to £632 8s. 9d. While some friends have passed away recently, who were generous supporters for many years, we gratefully acknowledge liberal contributions from some new subscribers. An effort on the part of those interested in our work to introduce fresh subscribers would be much appreciated.

To those who value the principle of self-help it will be interesting to know that the children and young people over school age contribute, through their work, a very handsome sum towards their own maintenance. This amounted last year to £3219 4s. 3d., or nearly one-fourth of the whole cost of the Institution. It is also gratifying to know that many of the former inmates now in situations outside, contribute gratefully, the



Children's Earnings. Shoemaking Department, Central Refuge.


amounts appearing in the subscription list as "Thank-offerings," are in nearly every case such contributions.

During the year two cots have been endowed at Bethesda at a cost of £500 each; these amounts have, of course, been invested for the purpose named. One endowment is by the Trustees of the late John Harling, and the other by Mrs. F. B. Benger; for both of which the Committee are very thankful, especially in view of the extended operations at this Home.

The Committee have once again with two of great satisfaction to express their sincere thereciation, appreciation of the devotion of every member of the large staff to the work of the Institution. The spirit of loyalty and earnestness which has characterized the work of the masters, matrons, and every official identified with the charity has helped in a very large measure to make the year's work so successful.

The Committee are devoutly thankful that they have in their officers men and women who are in the fullest sympathy with the work, whose hearts are filled with love for the children and whose aim is the physical, moral, and spiritual welfare of every boy and girl.

We cannot but acknowledge also, the very real and practical help we have again received from a large number of voluntary workers. It is a source of great encouragement to us to know that we have so many who willingly and cheerfully render service which is most valuable. These friends are helping us in many and various ways, and we are greatly indebted to them for all their sympathy and service. We tender to them our sincere thanks for their constant labours, and would express the earnest hope that we may rely upon their continued interest and support.

Our work has been committed to us by God as a solemn trust. We believe that He who has so wonderfully led us in the days gone by, will continue to guide us, and our faith is strengthened as we remember "cur sufficiency is of God."

This is our confidence as we enter upon another year's work.


ADDENDA.

MEDICAL REPORTS, 1903.

(Central Refuge and Great Ducie Street Homes.)

I have much pleasure in recording a very satisfactory year at the Refuge and adjoining Homes. We have had scarcely any real illness and our one great enemy, Pneumonia, has almost entirely disappeared. One young man attached to the Institute, who developed Meningitis, has passed away. The boys are for the most part healthy and strong and I am quite satisfied with all the Hygienic conditions, which are so large a factor in promoting the health of the inmates.

The general health of our Homes for the past year has been decidedly better than that of any of the previous five years. This is true not of one but of all the Homes-the average sickness both of the simple every day character and of the more severe forms being decidedly under our usual average. We had two deaths during the year, one hopelessly bad with tuberculosis in Bethesda, the other in the Clinical Hospital after operation. What struck me most while classifying the diseases for the year, is the fact that the infectious diseases-Measles, Whooping Cough, Scarlet Fever, etc., have been limited to two cases in two of the Homes and one in all of the others. This means that the "Mothers" have been quick to recognize the illnesses, and that early isolation and thorough disinfection have thus been possible. With the sanitary arrangements, the cleanliness, and tone of the children generally, I am abundantly satisfied.







HOW TO HELP THE WORK.


