Summary of Annual Meeting.

The Thirty-Sixth Annual Meeting of the Manchester and Salford Boys' and Girls' Refuges and Homes, and Children's Aid Society, was held in the Town Hall, Manchester, on Monday, April 2nd, 1906, at half-past three o'clock.

The chair was taken by the Lord Mayor of Manchester, (Councillor J. H. Thewlis), who was supported by The Lady Mayoress, Mrs. W. J. Crossley, Mrs. L. K. Shaw, Revs. J. G. Howson, M.A., John Grimshaw, Mr. W. J. Crossley, M.P., Sir T. T. Shann, Mr. John Royle, Mr. T. L. Farrar, Mr. W. A. Arnold, Mr. Louis M. Hayes, Dr. J. Howson Ray, Dr. Fulton, Mr. Henry Charlton, Mr. J. Boyd, Mr. Councillor Fildes, Mr. Ernest Matthews, and others.

The Rev. John Grimshaw offered prayer.

Letters of regret at non-attendance were received from Sir James Hoy, Principal Hopkinson, Sir William Stephens, Dr. Boutflower, and others.

The Annual Report and Balance Sheet were presented. The Hon. Sec., Mr. Thomas R. Ackroyd, gave a summary of the Report, which was taken as read, and an abstract of the Financial Statement was given by the Hon. Treasurer, Mr. Henry Charlton.

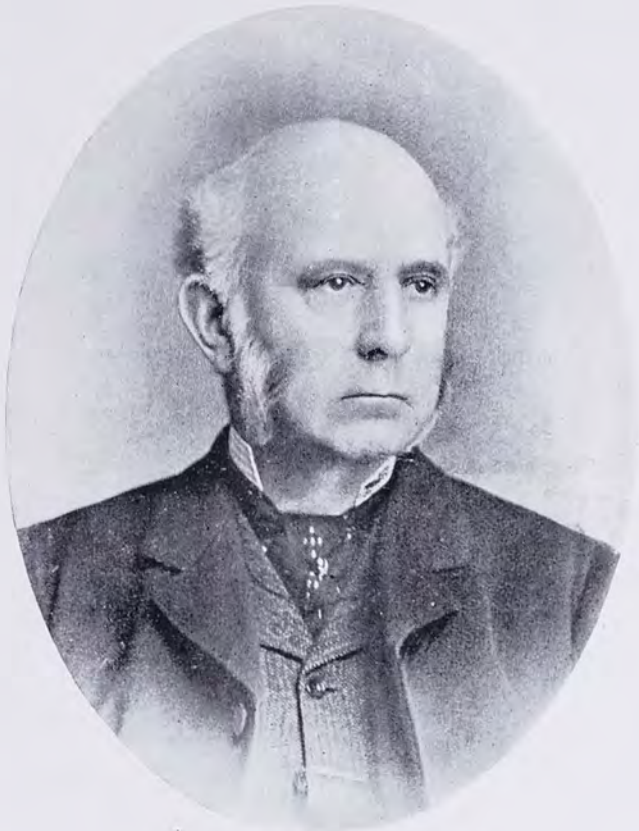

ONCE more it is our duty and privilege to render an account of our stewardship to those who by their generous and continued support make it possible for the Committee to carry on in full efficiency this large work on behalf of poor, destitute, and suffering children. We cannot hope to present more than an outline of the year's operations in the following pages, but trust that what is implied by the facts and figures we are able to give, may be realized by the thoughtful consideration and sympathy of our readers.

We are always dealing with human lives, and with them in that receptive period of childhood and youth, when they are most susceptible to surrounding influences; not only so, but we are dealing with them at a time

when their need is greatest, need of shelter and food, of care and thought, of training and love, and it is of course impossible to convey by the printed page what is involved in such a statement, for it quickly gets into the region of moral results which figures cannot express.

Among all the varied products of this great city of ours there is a comparative value which we are not slow to appreciate. This idea of comparative value is no less true when we think of the objects of the various philanthropic, educational and religious organizations in our midst, and we venture to think that no Institution could have a higher or more noble mission than to take the raw material of orphaned or neglected childhood, and by care and love and training, transform it into a worthy part of a Christian community. While as an Institution we are privileged to have such an aim, we realize that it involves a corresponding responsibility for the Committee and all the workers, who are entrusted with the care and training of the children.

Beginning of the Work.

Thirty-six years have elapsed since out of two facts—the absolute homelessness of some street waifs and the compassion of some Christian hearts, issued the beginnings of this large work for needy children. Since January 4th, 1870, when the Home in Quay Street, as shewn in accompanying illustration, was opened for poor lads, there has been a gradual extension of the scope and benefits of the Institution until the Committee

are now in the happy position of being able to meet all classes of child destitution. It is surely a fact calculated to give comfort to every thoughtful citizen to know that no child or young person up to sixteen years of age need be without a shelter and help in this city of ours.

With a family of nearly 500 children gathered in fifteen Homes, and with the help rendered to thousands of others through the Children's Shelter, Sea-Side Home, Summer Camp, Emigration Branch, and Industrial Brigades it will be seen at a glance that the Committee have a large responsibility. In its financial aspect it has been shared by a large number of kind and generous hearts as our subscription list shews, but we still need a considerable addition to our present ordinary income to meet the large expenditure involved.

Foundation Principles.

Though many of our subscribers are acquainted with the basis of our Institution as set forth in the Trust Deed, we think it well to restate for the information of new friends the foundation principles of our work:—

To receive Homeless and Destitute Children found in Manchester and Salford and district.

To give immediate admission to such without distinction of Creed.

To provide such with suitable food, clothing, and Industrial training.

To educate such in Christian principles based on the Bible only.

This fundamental declaration of the objects of the Charity has proved throughout the years a wise one, and it still remains as the broad yet definite policy of the Committee. All along, the one condition of admission or help has been real need, and as a result of careful investigation we believe no Charity could look back with greater satisfaction on having fulfilled the object for which it was established,—in our case, a generation ago.

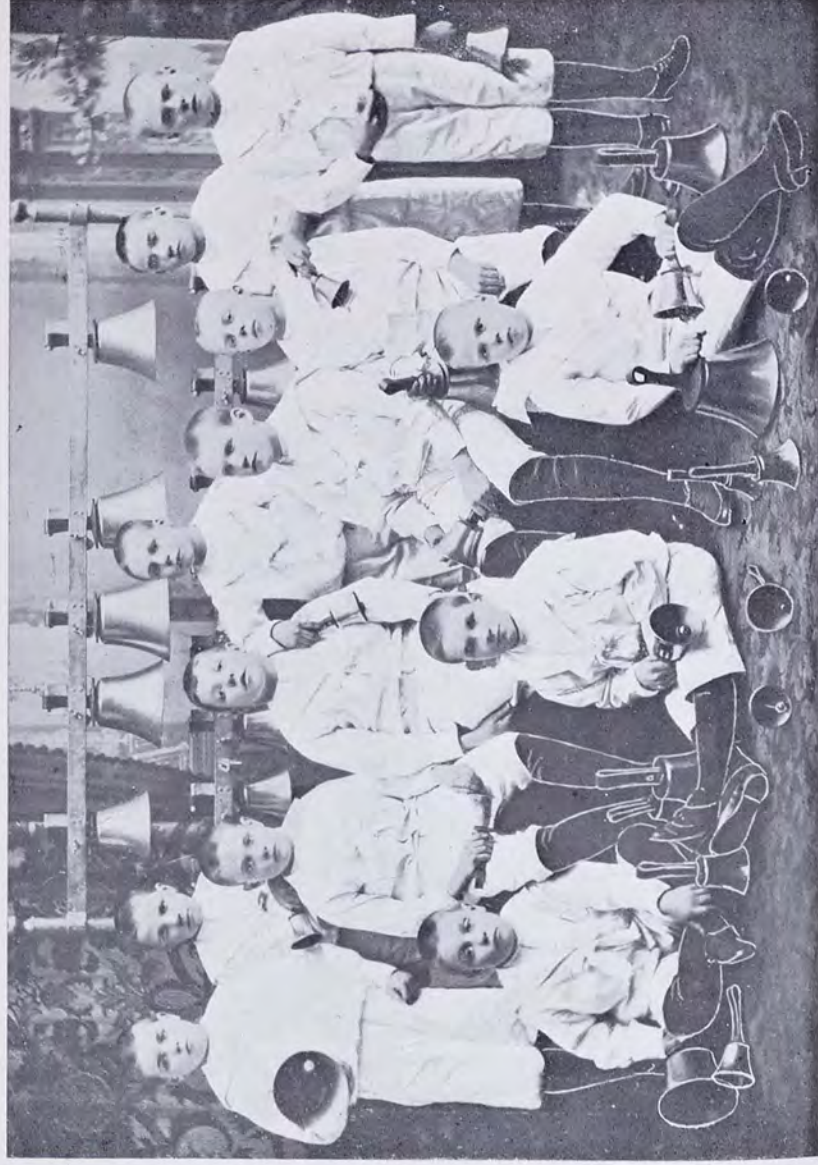
If as an Institution we are gathering some dignity from age and gaining the experience of years, we have to pay the penalty of maturity in the loss of friend after friend, who in the early days and ever since have given personal service and generous support. Among those whose loss we mourn during the past year are two of our Trustees, Mr. Herbert Philips, and Mr. Henry T. Gaddum.

The former had been closely associated with our work from the beginning. He devoted an evening a week during the first year to teaching the poor homeless lads who formed our first family in Quay Street. It was only in April, 1905, at our Annual Meeting in the Town Hall, that he recalled with evident pleasure those memories of thirty-five years ago. All along he evinced the deepest interest in the Institution, fulfilling the duties of Trustee with his characteristic conscientiousness.

Mr. H. T. Gaddum became a Trustee in 1902, filling the vacancy caused by the death of Mr. L. K. Shaw. That was, however, by no means the measure of his interest in, or connection with, the Institution. For over thirty years he had been a generous supporter of the work, and had, with Mrs. Gaddum, enlisted the sympathy of many others.

The vacancies on the Board of Trustees, including the one caused by the death of Mr. Henry Lee, in 1904, have been filled by the appointment of Mr. W. A. Arnold, Mr. Theodore Crewdson, and Mr. Eric Crossley, who have kindly consented to act in that capacity.

Extent of the Work.

The Institution comprises sixteen distinct branches of work and each of these has been in active operation during the past year. The following list gives the number of cases dealt with in the respective Homes and Branches but does not include the very large number who have come to us for temporary help and for advice.

In comparison with the totals for last year there is an increase in most of the above branches.

New Applications.

The figures for 1905 stand out clearly. We have received applications for 671 boys, and 222 girls making a total of **893**; in 1904 the numbers were 619 boys and 209 girls, total of **828** shewing an increase of 65 for the year. Out of these new applications 458 had lost one or both parents, and 435 had a father and mother living somewhere. Each case was carefully considered and investigated and the work which this entails is often difficult and arduous.

Admitted Last Year.

We now deal with the number of cases admitted. These number 402 which added to the 435 children in the Institution when the year began gives a total of **837** under care and training during the year.

It will be interesting to shew how these cases were treated, and so we give the following table:—

The Central Refuge, Strangeways.

This is the headquarters of the work and where all the applications are first dealt with. Here each applicant's story is patiently listened to, and if apparently homeless and destitute they receive immediate admission, pending the necessary investigation which at once follows. All the work of administration of the sixteen branches is conducted from here, and every fortnight the Committee gather to guide and control the many activities of the Institution.

This Central Home has been almost full throughout the year, and 176 boys have been admitted, the average number in residence being 100.

The following is a typical case of the class helped here:—

A. M. was a Workhouse boy put out to work on a farm, but not feeling comfortable he left and went to live with his aged grandmother, who being unable to maintain him the youth went on tramp finally gravitating to Manchester where he found himself destitute. He then tried to join the Navy but being too young was rejected and a good Samaritan sent him to the Refuge where he was admitted and careful investigation proving the truth of his story he was given a chance. A year's careful training saw him anxious to try his fortune in the "New England" across the seas. There he has proved himself a good, honest, Christian young man. He has kept his situation and is a member of his Church doing well. He does not forget the Old Home and sends a contribution.

In his last letter he says: "I received your letter and the paper alright. How many boys are you sending out to Canada this year? They are coming to a grand country. I shall ever be in debt to the Refuge for what it has done for me: every boy that comes to Canada has a splendid chance of success in life and they will get on well if they conduct themselves right. I have been in my present place three years and should have been in my first place now only for my master retiring from Farming, it is almost four years since I came out. I expect to be in Belleville this spring to see the boys. I hope everybody connected with the Refuge and its grand work are well."

The Workshops.

Work has always been a feature of the Institution, and from the earliest days the motto—"We help those who try to help themselves"—has been kept well before the minds of all the children. We have now five workshops—**Carpentry, Shoemaking, Tailoring, Letterpress Printing, and Firewood Making.** Each shop has its fully qualified foreman and constant employment has been given to **60** boys throughout the year. The result of the year's trading after charging every proper expense to each department and paying boys' and foremen's wages shows a net profit of £691 19s. 10d., to the funds of the Institution. This cannot but be considered most satisfactory. A very pleasing feature in connection with our apprentices is to frequently find they are very grateful for the help received in these workshops. This gratitude is sometimes expressed in a very practical manner, and now and again we receive letters expressing their obligation to the training received here.

Working Youths' Home and Institute.

We consider this a most important branch of our work, and it is constantly proving the wisdom of past years in providing such a place for our older lads. **59** youths have passed through the Home during the twelve months, the average number in residence being **49**. These young fellows, most of whom were admitted into the Refuge in their early years, are employed in various occupations

THIS poor laddie came to us in a wretched condition—barefoot, dirty, starved, and utterly neglected—seeking help. He was admitted, pending enquiries, the result of which was the following report from our visitor:

"I have made enquiries into the case of J.S. and find that both father and mother are living. The father is a cripple, he walks with two sticks, and earns his living by begging. The boy has never lived anywhere but in common lodging houses and furnished rooms. Both parents are of a very low type, and have been about Deansgate for a great number of years. The boy was born in Deansgate, and brought up under the most vile surroundings—parents being separated from each other. I think he will require close watching but if he can be got to settle down it will be a blessing and will save him from becoming a criminal."

IT was evident if the lad had to have a chance of being anything better than his parents he would have to be removed from their influence. So he became one of our family, and rapidly changed for the better though he suffered from deafness to some extent. He was clearly a case to send to Canada, out of reach of his degraded relatives. We have received a report from the Inspector which runs as follows:—"The boy's master says Joshua is a splendid boy. He has a good home and makes himself very useful, being constantly at his work. He is still deaf, but thinks he can hear somewhat better. Attends Church and Sunday School."

It does not require much imagination to realise the benefit of the change to this poor Manchester waif and that the £12 emigration expenses was a good financial investment for the community as well as for him.

in the city, and in this comfortable, homely Institute have been helped in many ways. For a sum of ten shillings per week each member has full board, a separate cubicle or bedroom, use of sitting-room, reading-room, gymnasium, baths, etc., and the place is greatly appreciated by the young fellows who are in residence. This is the top of the ladder for the boys and youths of our Institution. Many here have started with us as little fellows going to school, passing on to the workshop, serving their apprenticeship there and taking up their residence in the Institute as young men, in many cases being employed in workshops, warehouses, or offices in town. They leave here for homes of their own or go into lodgings able to fight their own battle in life.

Through this branch of the work we are able to keep in touch with many of our old boys after they have left us and one of the most enjoyable of the many gatherings held at Strangeways is the annual re-union of former inmates. Many of them are now happily married and comfortably settled in their own homes, an honour to the Institution and a credit to themselves. As we have met them at their annual gathering—many of them with their wives and little ones—we have felt amply rewarded for all the practical help we have been privileged to give to them.

The Street Boys' Home.

This is specially for lads under 13 years of age found homeless upon our streets, and no less than 110 such have received a shelter here during 1905, the average in residence being 33.

The Boys' Emigration Training Home.

There is always a great deal of change in this Home as every year a certain number of the inmates are prepared for emigration to Canada. Out of the **140** boys dealt with here **63** were sent to our Marchmont Home at Belleville, Ontario, in April last. The average number in residence has been **36**.

This Home, as well as the Refuge and our Rosen Hallas Girls' Home, at Cheetham Hill, is certified by the Local Government Board for the reception of children from the Poor Law Unions. During the year we have been able to take a number of boys and girls from the Boards of Guardians, and they have been emigrated with our own children to Canada.

All these children have been received by our representatives, the Rev. Robert and Mrs. Wallace, and by them placed in carefully selected farm homes in the Dominion. The children are regularly visited and reported on to us.

The Ever-Open Door.

This useful and important branch has been an active centre of work amongst children of all ages throughout the year, **425** being dealt with, **340** of this number were brought by the police, and **28** by the officers of the Society for Prevention of Cruelty to Children. When

we state that of the total received no less than **135** were brought by the police and others between ten o'clock at night and four in the morning, the need and the blessing of this *Ever-Open Door* will be apparent.

We would again emphasize the importance to the whole community of having in the centre of our city a well-appointed house with its doors open day and night as an immediate "Place of Safety" for wandering and homeless little ones, and for friendless and destitute girls up to 18 years of age. The cases admitted here are investigated the day following, when friends are communicated with, where there are any, or if the children are destitute they are received into one of our Homes.

The Cheetham Hill

Orphanages and Homes.

These form quite a colony of Homes and provide accommodation for a large number of boys and girls. They are situated in George Street, Cheetham Hill, and comprise the following, named after the donors :—

- No. 2.—The Langworthy Home, girls.
- No. 4.—The Garnett Home, boys.
- No. 6.—The Crossley Home, boys.
- No. 8.—The Higgins Home, Motherless Children.
- No. 10.—The Atkinson Home, boys.
- No. 12.—The Schoolgirls' Home, girls.

These Orphanages have been full of fatherless and motherless ones, **113** having been carefully trained and tended, the average number in residence being 93. Each Home has its mother, helper, and eighteen children, and a very true family life exists in every household.

The Elder Girls' Training Home and Laundry.

The results obtained in this branch, which deals with elder girls who have been rescued from grave moral danger, give cause for thankfulness. During the past twelve months **75** girls from 12 to 18 years of age have been received and the average number in residence has been 38. A very efficient training for domestic service, either at home or abroad, is given to every girl, and the chief part of the laundry work for the Cheetham Hill Homes is done each week by the girls. The work here calls for much patience, prayer, and faith, but notwithstanding the doubtful early surroundings of many in this Home, the results seen in their after life have been full of encouragement and blessing.

A small band from this Home sail every year for Canada and in May last **24** girls were sent to our Home in Belleville. These girls, whose surroundings are such that remaining in Manchester would be highly dangerous, have been placed in excellent farm homes with the happiest results. We subjoin the following letters which prove the wisdom of this work.

"Another year has gone and a New Year come, with it may happiness be yours. I just love to be in Canada it is a healthy country where everything is very pleasant. I sing in the choir and have been taking music lessons. I sang twice alone at Christmas and we had a very nice time. I got lots of presents and had everything to make me happy. Dear "Mother," Mrs. Wallace said you would perhaps be able to come over this spring, which I hope you will. I would just love to see you. I am going to have my photo taken and will send one to you. It was very cold the first winter I was in Canada, I thought I would freeze, but this is an open winter, the moon is shining brightly across the snow, it looks very pretty. Well mother, don't forget to come out if possible this spring." M. R.

Our Girls on Holiday

"I suppose that you would like to hear from me, as I would from you, being so many miles away from you. I have seen my brother since I wrote last, while at Marchmont Home, three or four times. I spent Christmas with him and had a very happy time. The first time he saw me he did not know me at all, and asked me who I was. He was so astonished to see how big I had grown. In the country we don't have postmen to go from door to door with the mail, but we have a post office here and there, away from each other. Our post-office is in the part of the house where we don't live, and my master's brother takes care of that. So about five minutes after the mail comes to the post office I get it, if I don't go before for it. I still go to the Methodist Church. At the Church I go to now we don't have any choir like you and it has been such cold weather that we haven't had more than twelve people together at one time. Therefore we have it in the vestry. Two of us lead in the singing, one is a Scotch girl, the other is a Rosen Hallas girl (that's me). I can now make bread, biscuits, buns, and butter. It seems jolly fun for me to go hunting eggs. My master has a cheese factory of his own so he buys milk from the other farmers and has it made into cheese. My brother is quite well and strong." S.A.G.

The Home for Neglected Motherless Little Ones.

Here 23 children have been cared for and the Home has been a great blessing to these little ones. The average number resident for the year is 20.

The Convalescent Cottage.

This is in the Rosen Hallas grounds and has been very well occupied throughout the year. It is here that the weak and ailing ones belonging to our large family at Cheetham Hill get the special nursing and nourishment which their cases need.

A delightful feature in all our work is the personal interest which is kept up between the "Mothers" in the various Homes and their former children. Frequently these young people come to their old Home at the week-end for tea and often attend the monthly service which is held at Cheetham Hill.

Bethesda Home for Crippled And Incurable Children.

This is indeed a very happy place notwithstanding its "crippled, maimed, paralysed, and generally incurable inmates." Its beneficent object is to provide for such poor children, whose cases are unsuitable for the ordinary hospitals of the district, and during the year 81 boys and girls have been received into this beautiful "House of Mercy," the average number in residence being 63.

Where health permits school life, such as the children are capable of, is combined with hospital care and treatment, suitable employments have also been introduced, not as a toil but as a pleasure and a relief. The combination of Hospital treatment, Home care, and School training, is preparing many of the inmates to earn, either entirely or in part, their own living in after life.

All the children are most lovingly cared for by the good Matron and the staff of nurses, and Bethesda is a Home in very truth to these little crippled and incurable children. Everything is done to ease the lives of these unfortunate little ones and as far as may be to fill them with brightness and with joy. Many are led to have a simple Christian Faith and to anticipate the rest which awaits them in the Father's house.

Thirty-five of the 70 cots are endowed and bear on a pretty shield placed over the cot, its name or that of the donor. Four others are provided for by friends who contribute the yearly amount necessary. Thirty-one are still unendowed and the Committee will be glad to hear from any friends who desire by the gift of £600 to provide in perpetuity for a cripple or incurable case. Some friends have done this as a thankoffering, others to perpetuate the memory of some loved member of the family.

The Sea-Side Home, Lytham.

Holidays for poor children have become a recognised branch of Christian and philanthropic work, and in connection with our Institution this department of the work has been more active during the past year than ever. The Sea-Side Home, at Lytham, has received 102 little boys and 231 girls—making a total of 333—from Manchester and district. The average stay of these pale-faced and delicate children at this happy holiday home has been fourteen days. The house is open all the year round, and has been the means of restoration to health of many a poor, weakly city child.

The Summer Camp for Poor City Lads.

The Camp at Birkdale, Southport, has had the most active season of its existence, and has provided a week's holiday, under canvas, for 2929 boys and 80 girls; a total of 3009. The Camp, which is open from May till

September, is now one of the most popular branches of our work, and is recognised as a very important organization in our midst for giving a week's change and happiness to the lads of the city.

All the children in our various Homes are given a week's holiday at the Camp during the summer, and the change is of the greatest benefit to them.

We would here express our high appreciation of the devoted services of the Sub-Committee, who carry on the work of this special branch, and offer to them our warmest thanks.

The Messenger, Parcel, and Shoeblack Brigades.

These Industrial Brigades have had another successful year and have provided useful employment for 161 boys during the year. The object of this department is to save poor lads who have reached the limit of school age, from drifting on the streets, and we are thankful to record it has been very successful in all its operations. A very pleasing feature of this branch is the fact that 51 boys have been placed in permanent situations.

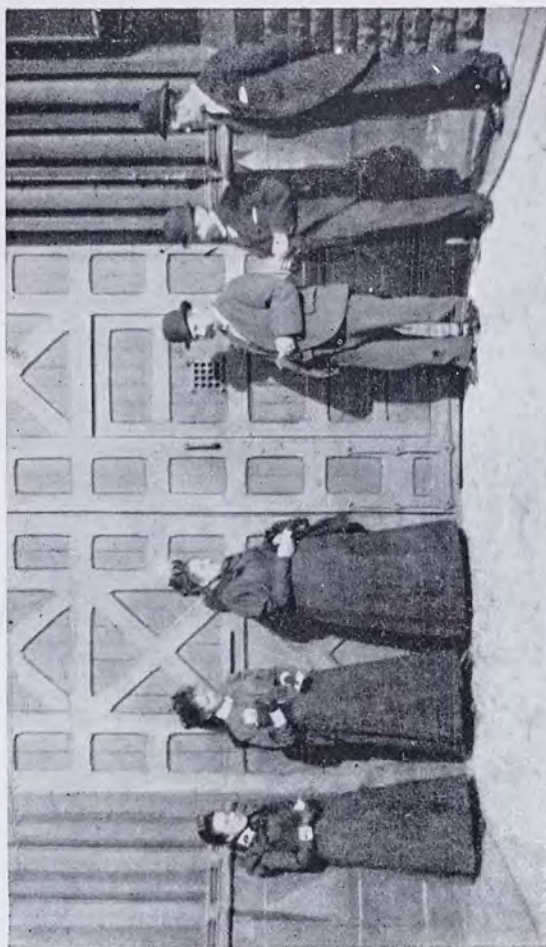
Help at the Police Courts.

The Police Courts' Mission to Lads and Girls involving the attendance of our representatives at the three courts in the city, has been much appreciated by the Bench when dealing with juvenile offenders. Sixty-eight boys and girls have been specially helped by our officers at the Courts.

We would again express our gratitude to the magistrates sitting at the Manchester, Salford, and County Courts, for so largely availing themselves of the Act of 1902. The Bench now have the power to remand any person under 16 years of age, brought before them, to a voluntary home instead of sending them to prison as was formerly the case, and we are glad to record that during the year we took into the Refuge 141 children, handed over to us on remand. The youngest of these children was seven, and the oldest 16, the average age being 12.

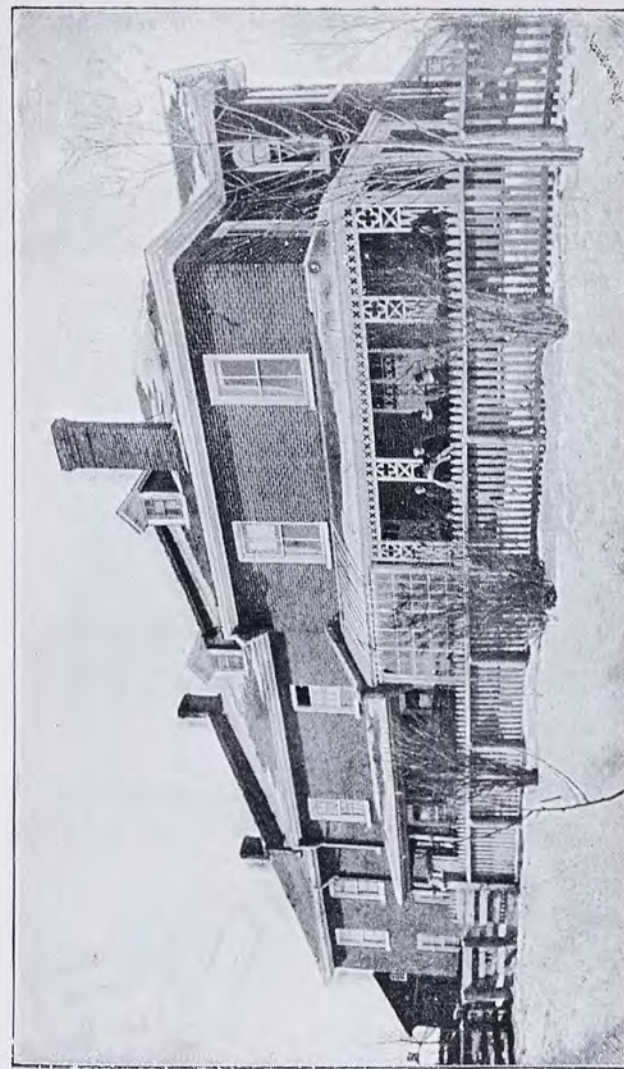
We know of no work which is more truly Christ-like than this special branch, and throughout another year it has carried on its beneficent mission amongst discharged prisoners. During the past twelve months "The Gate" of Strangeways Gaol, which is in close proximity to the Refuge, has been attended by our own staff of workers, one of the Sisters from the Central Hall, and a Deaconess of the City Mission. At seven o'clock each morning, all the year round, these devoted workers have been found at the door of the gaol, to welcome the prisoners on their discharge. 14,419 have been met, and out of this number 7,477 men and boys, and 2,909 women and girls—a total of 10,386—accepted the invitation to the plain breakfast of hot coffee and bread and butter, provided at our Mission Hall. Whilst this simple meal is being given, earnest, helpful words are spoken, and special cases of need relieved, and 1324 voluntarily signed the total abstinence pledge before leaving.

This is indeed a work of much faith, and needing great patience, but we have often been cheered by the remarkable results of the kind word spoken, and the special help given to these poor unfortunate people, as we have met them at the prison doors.

EMIGRATION.

The Emigration branch has been carried on actively during the past year, the results being in respect to the welfare of the children as satisfactory as any other branch of the Institution. In the spring two parties of children were sent out to Ontario, the boys sailing on April 6th in charge of the Rev. Robert Wallace, of the Canadian Home, and Mr. W. Edmondson, Secretary of the Institution, the girls' party sailing a month later under the care of Mr. and Mrs. Ashley. Of the 63 boys emigrated 24 were from Poor Law Union Schools, the Guardians of Chorlton and Oldham realizing that some of the children under their care would have a better chance of a successful career in a new land. We are glad to know that many of our Boards of Guardians are seeing with us the wisdom of removing certain of the children under their care out of the reach of degrading connections, the influence of which is so inimical to the highest interests of the young people at the most susceptible period of their lives. This is done very effectively by emigration to Canada.

The children go to our Marchmont Home at Belleville, which has been established over thirty years, and from there pass out to good farm homes, selected by Mr.

Wallace out of a large number of applications, and after production of satisfactory credentials as to the character of the employer. The children can always return to Marchmont in any time of sickness or difficulty, and are regularly visited by our representative at their own homes. Several of our Committee and staff have visited Canada, and have seen for themselves the actual conditions under which the children live when placed out, and unanimously testify to their contentment, and to the interest for their welfare shown by the farmer. They become one of the family, and are treated as such in the ordinary round of domestic life.

It may be of interest to some of our friends to state Mr. Edmondson's impressions of his visit to Canada last April.

"We arrived at Marchmont early on Sunday morning, after journeying by sea and land for ten days, and were indeed glad to find a resting-place, and a floor that did not move. The hospitality of Marchmont will remain as a pleasant memory with all of us; for me it had an added quality by virtue of its comforts as contrasted with the discomforts experienced on board ship. It was, as the Scriptures have it, the coming into 'a large place.' After a few days sojourn here, I set off on a tour among the farm homes, visiting boys and girls who had been placed out one or more years ago. I took train to Brighton, 25 miles west of Belleville, and taking it as a centre drove in a buggy about sixty miles in and out among the farms of that district, and saw twenty of our old boys and girls under the ordinary conditions of their daily life. Let me now in a word give my general impression of the work which I had heretofore only known through the words of others.

First, the advantages of an open country life were realized very vividly as we drove in the cold but exhilarating air of the hills, among which nestled the comfortable farms; and the benefit, on

the score of health, compared with the crowded condition of our town life, was very manifest. Driving up to the farmsteads (my visit, of course, quite unexpected), I was received very cordially, and welcomed as one having an interest in the boy or girl living there. Hospitality was offered in several instances, of which I and my driver in some cases gladly partook.

One night during my tour I was constrained, by the kindness of Mr. and Mrs. S., to stay the night at their house. They have one of our boys. He is as a son in the house, and hopes to pass the entrance examination for the High School in June; (since then I learn he has passed this examination). A lad in happier and more promising circumstances it would be difficult to find. On the walls of the drawing room—and they have large roomy houses in Canada—hangs the portrait of another boy who had been cared for by these good Christian folk. He is now minister of a city church, and the holder of a good college degree.

I found the people were quite willing to give me every facility for seeing and talking with the children, and in some cases I went into the fields and found the youth busy on the land, working with the farmer. The prevailing impression was their contentment, indeed, attachment to their surroundings. Without exception, among the boys I visited, there was no disposition to return to 'the old country,' as they call it, unless it be just for a visit. There is an unmistakable preference for Canadian life on the part of those who have been there twelve months or more. So decided was the settlement of the children that one of the most uncongenial tasks possible would have been to have been sent to remove one of the lads from his home. In the natural life of the Canadian home the boy or girl becomes one of the family, and sits at the same table, shares the same comforts, as well as the work, for everyone does something on the farm. The solicitous way in which some of the mothers spoke of the adopted one was quite touching, and the legitimate pride evinced when they could point to the appearance and character of a boy or girl, as being a result of their training, shewed a true interest in their welfare. This was remarkably so in the case of one girl, who when I saw her was taking part in a social function at their church along with her mistress.

Extension of Bethesda Home for Crippled and Incurable Children :

Judging from what I saw, there was little likelihood of ill-treatment, for there is not only the Marchmont Home to return to in any such case, but I found that the farmers, though on isolated farms, are well known to each other, and would resent as a class any treatment of a boy or girl which would bring discredit on the district. The case of the farm work being too heavy for a delicate child might occur, as in our own country, and Mr. Wallace would be able to find a more suitable home. One feature, which I did not see, but which I can easily imagine must be trying, and with which I had profound sympathy, was the inevitable home-sickness which must be the lot of some of the children in the first days. This would be the case in any new situation, but it certainly soon passes away, and contentment takes its place.

To sum up; certain of our rescued children need to be cut off for their own sakes from degrading influences which may be reasserted any time here; in Canada they can be found positions of self-maintenance under healthy conditions and careful supervision; the results have been in the past as satisfactory, to say the least, as those placed in situations at home; and the cost of emigration is less than that of one year's maintenance here.

RECREATION GROUND AND BETHESDA EXTENSION.

(LEONARD K. SHAW MEMORIAL FUND).

These two additions are now in full use, the Recreation ground being a great boon to the young people from the many Homes; and the extension at Bethesda, with its accommodation now for 70 poor cripple or incurable children, has indeed been an extension of mercy to a number of very needy cases.

We regret, however, that there is still a heavy debt on this account, as shewn in the special balance sheet. The amount still owing is £3,031 17s. 4d., in addition to some street paving accounts yet to come in. The total expenditure up to date has been £9,334 2s. 1d., considerably more than was at first contemplated, but as explained in our last report certain contingencies arose which made it undesirable, and to some extent impossible, to keep within the limits at first proposed. We acknowledge with much gratitude the hearty response of more than five hundred subscribers to this memorial fund, amounting to £6,300. May we now appeal to some of our wealthy citizens to help us to extinguish the deficiency and so complete this memorial.

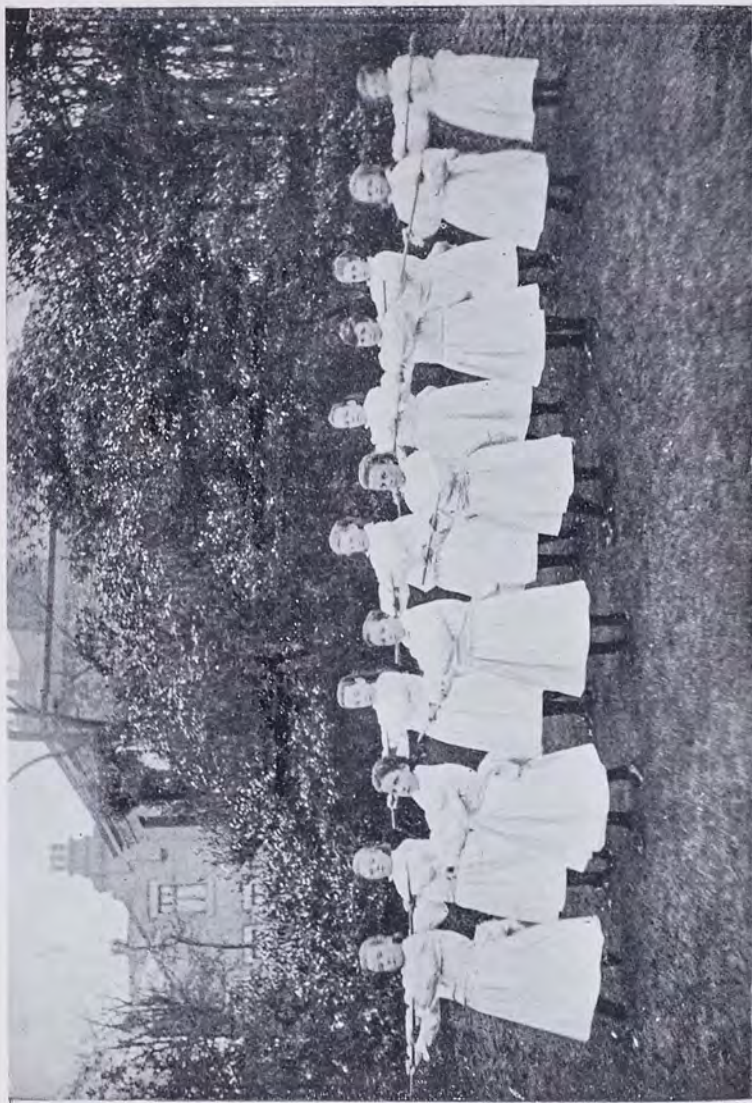
Finances.

The financial statement which is appended gives details of the income and expenditure of the past year. It will be observed that the debit balance at the close of the year has been reduced to £130 1s. 1d., but this has not been accomplished without the appropriation of £1300 from our reserve fund to the general maintenance account. We earnestly appeal for additional subscriptions so that our yearly expenditure may be met by an assured income.

We do this the more confidently as the principle of self-help is inculcated throughout our various branches. It is an interesting feature of our income that no less a sum than £3,434 9s. 1d., or twenty-five per cent of

the total cost of the Institution was contributed by the children themselves during the year under review, being the earnings of the boys and girls over school age, and the profit on their work. In addition to this we receive many thankofferings from former inmates as an expression of gratitude for benefits received in days gone by.

During the year three additional cots have been endowed at Bethesda, two by the executors of the late Manassah Gledhill (making four cots endowed from that estate) and one by the executors of the late Mrs. Peacock.

Words of Appreciation.

The Committee cannot close this record of another year's work without expressing their sincere appreciation of the devotion of every member of the large staff to the work of the Institution.

The responsibilities of the Board in connection with the many and various operations of the charity have been greatly lightened by the loyalty and earnestness which have characterized the work of the masters and matrons and every official belonging to the Institution.

The constant aim of the Committee is the highest welfare of every boy and girl gathered into the Homes and we are thankful to know that all the workers are in the fullest sympathy with this one object.

We would also take this opportunity of acknowledging the very real and practical sympathy given to us during the year by a large number of voluntary workers. The Institution is most fortunate in having such a large circle of friends who willingly render so many services. They have helped in numerous and varied ways, and we are greatly indebted to them for all they have done. As we thank them for another year's service we would express the earnest hope that they will continue to us their interest, their support, and their prayers.

Closing Words.

We started the year with great hope and confidence in Him who for all these years has so richly blessed this Institution and we close it now with hearts full of praise to our God for all His guidance and grace during another twelve months.

With all the varied branches we are able to deal with every phase of child suffering and need, and our hearts are full of gratitude as we remember all the comfort, brightness, and joy which have come to the sad and destitute children of the city and district through our Institution. As we realize our privilege of rescuing and saving the little ones from the sorrow and the sin which surround them and gathering them into our Homes of safety and of hope, we are conscious of our constant need of the spirit of Jesus Christ, so full of sympathy, patience, and love.

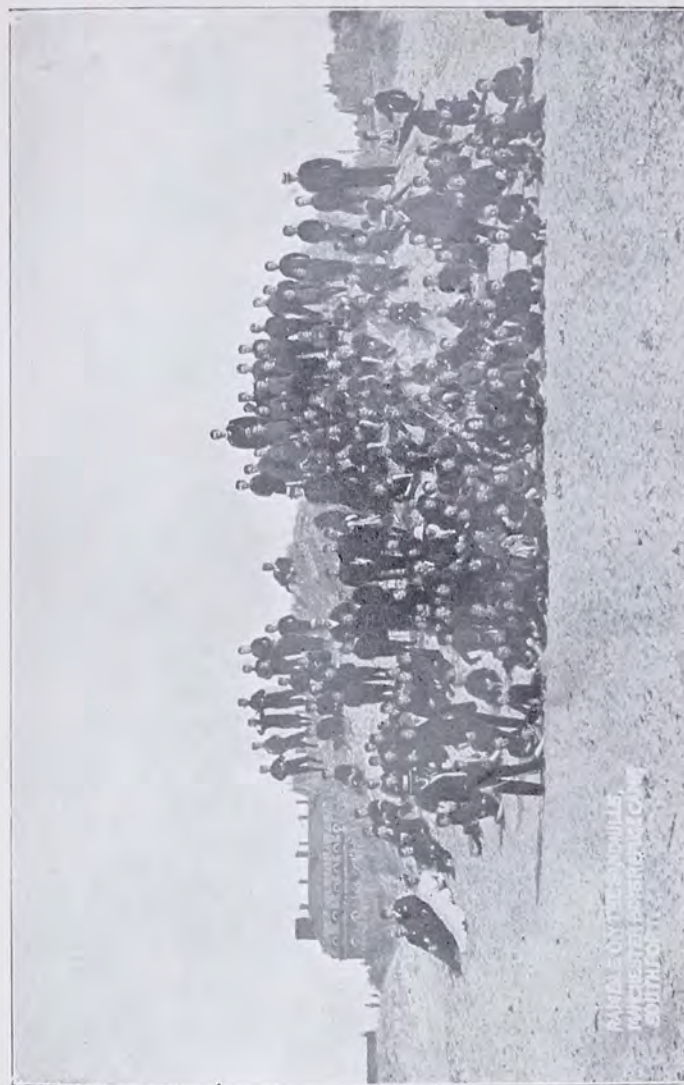
ADDENDA.

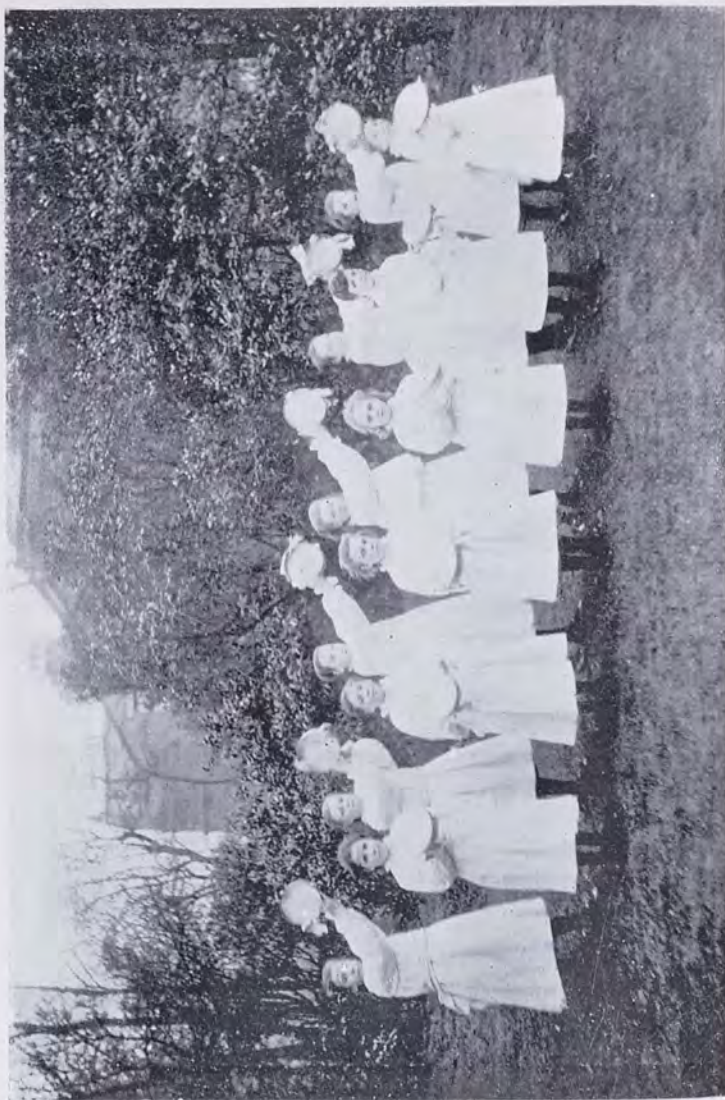

MEDICAL REPORTS.

(Central Refuge and Great Ducie Street Homes).

I am glad to say that the very satisfactory report which I was able to give last year has been well maintained. Our list of sick cases has been quite infinitesimal, and there has been an entire absence of all infectious and contagious disease. The boys are thoroughly well cared for, the food and clothing, and sanitary arrangements are all that could be wished. I have no complaint of any kind to record, and we have had no deaths.

Our annual record for the year just finishing is pretty much that of previous years. A good many children have had slight ailments, and required a good deal of attention. We have had no serious injuries. By surgical means Mr. Howson Ray has very considerably improved some ten of our badly crippled little people. Of the infectious diseases the following is our list:—Tuberculosis, six cases with five deaths; Measles, four cases; Whooping Cough, two cases, and Chicken Pox, two cases. Rheumatic Fever attacked one little patient, but without leaving any permanent damage, and Pericarditis claims one of the "Rosen Hallas" inmates at present. The general appearance and bearing of the children and homes leave little to be desired, and I consider the little folks happy and fortunate in their respective "mothers."
