Summary of Annual Meeting.

The Thirty-Seventh Annual Meeting of the Manchester and Salford Boys' and Girls' Refuges and Homes, and Children's Aid Society, was held in the Free Trade Hall, Manchester, on Friday, March 15th, 1907, at seven o'clock.

The chair was taken by Lord Stanley of Alderley, who was supported by Lady Stanley, Mrs. W. J. Crossley, Mrs. L. K. Shaw, The Very Rev. The Dean of Manchester (Bishop Welldon), Rev. A. Herbert Gray, Vice-Chancellor Hopkinson, Mr. W. J. Crossley, M.P., Sir T. T. Shann, Mr. W. A. Arnold, Dr. Boutflower, Dr. Fulton, Dr. Walker, Mr. Henry Charlton, Mr. J. Boyd, Mr. Alderman Fildes, J.P., Mr. Theodore Crewdson, J.P., Mr. Ernest Matthews, and others.

The Rev. A. Herbert Gray offered prayer.

Letters of regret at non-attendance were received from Sir W. H. Holland, M.P., Sir James Hoy, Rev. Jas. Cregan, Rev. J. E. Roberts, and others.

The Annual Report and Balance Sheet were presented. The Hon. Sec., Mr. Thos. R. Ackroyd, gave a summary of the Report, which was taken as read, and an abstract of the Financial Statement was given by the Hon. Treasurer, Mr. Henry Charlton.

It was then moved by Lord Stanley, seconded by the Dean of Manchester (Bishop Welldon), and supported by Mr. W. J. Crossley, M.P., and resolved:—

"That the Report together with the Financial Statement be adopted, printed and circulated, under the direction of the Committee, and that the Committee for the ensuing year be Messrs. W. J. Crossley, R. B. Taylor, James Boyd, James Fildes, Mrs. L. K. Shaw, Messrs. Robert Shaw, Arthur Taylor, Harry E. Gaddum; The Hon. Secretary, Mr. Thomas R. Ackroyd; The Hon. Treasurer, Mr. Henry Charlton; and the Auditors, Messrs. Theodore, Jones, Crewdson, and Youatt."

During the evening an attractive programme of Songs, Drills, and Instrumental music, etc., was given by the children to an appreciative audience which crowded the large hall. Lady Stanley distributed the prizes to the children.

THIRTY-SEVENTH **ANNUAL REPORT**

OF THE MANCHESTER AND SALFORD

Boys' and Girls' Refuges and Homes,

AND CHILDREN'S AID SOCIETY,

FOR THE YEAR 1906.

IN presenting the record of another year's work on behalf of homeless, illused and suffering children, we wish first of all to give expression to a deep sense of gratitude, that under the blessing of God the various branches of the Institution have had a year of true prosperity. Not simply that through the kindness of a multitude of friends, both old and new, the means of support have been fully provided, but that the supreme and fundamental object of the charity has been carried out efficiently by the cordial co-operation of Committee, the staff, and associated friends.

That object, in a word, is to give the homeless child a home, the friendless one a friend, and to alleviate the lot of the poor, the sad, the suffering one. To this end the orphan child has been received into one of the Orphan Homes, and become a happy member of a family circle; the little maimed or delicate one has been removed from conditions of deepest poverty to the care of nurse

and doctor at the Cripples' Home; the illused child has been received and protected against its oppressor; the widow has been helped by the admission of one or more of her children; the wandering lad or wilful girl has been restored to anxious parents; a holiday has been provided for the poor city lad or delicate girl; the child with demoralising surroundings has been placed in a safe farm home in Canada; and all the Homes sheltering four to five hundred children have been maintained efficiently for these purposes as set forth more fully in the following pages.

Beginning of the Work.

We say a preliminary word as to the beginning of the work for the information of those who read the Report for the first time.

In the year 1870, when the great Education Act opened a door for the children of the whole country into the domain of knowledge another door was opened in a very humble way for the homeless and destitute children of our great city and centre. It came to the knowledge and heart of some who were engaged working among the children in attendance at the Ragged Schools that after the Sunday evening School there were children of tender age upon whom the School door closed, and no other opened though it was night and winter. At best they might beg a few coppers which would gain them admittance into one of the common lodging houses in the slums, where, if they escaped the cold and dreariness of some hovel or doorway, they came into contact with a moral degradation

calculated to debase their whole life. To make Christianity practical in the direction of helping these waifs and strays became the object of a few who named the name of Christ.

To establish any shelter where the absolutely destitute child might find a home meant funds in the first place and, if it was to be a success and a blessing, it meant also good management, constant supervision, with patience and love and continuity of purpose added. In view of the scope and extent of the Institution to-day, after thirty-seven years' working, it is evident that these essentials of success have not been lacking on the part of those who first gave an ear to the sad cry of homeless children.

But few of those who were at the foundation of the Charity are with us to day. We rejoice, however, that we still have associated with the work Mrs. Leonard K. Shaw and Mr. R. B. Taylor, both of whom were active in its establishment thirty-seven years ago. Mrs. Shaw is still devoted to its highest interests, giving constant personal oversight to the Homes at Cheetham Hill, and Mr. R. B. Taylor is a Trustee and member of Committee, though owing to failing health unable now to do active service.

Those who knew the dreadful condition of the child-life on our streets in those early days will appreciate the vast improvement which has taken place as a result of the various agencies at work for the good of the community among which we are glad to count our own. Our city has now a very favourable reputation in this matter compared with other large centres of population.

Object Lesson to the State.

In this long period of thirty-seven years much has been done by legislation for the child-life of the nation which has come to be more and more valued as the most important national asset. A fact not realised by many who are sincerely interested in the welfare of poor children, lies behind this action of the State, and that is, the splendid pioneer work done by voluntary institutions which has not only been valuable as direct means of help for this class of children, but has also been an object lesson to the State of what can be, and ought to be, done for these neglected ones. For instance, there has been a vast improvement in the treatment of pauper children, the Poor Law Guardians in many cases adopting the Cottage Home principle (in vogue among voluntary Institutions for a generation), instead of herding the children together on a barrack-like plan.

We may be allowed to say perhaps that one of the charms of our work is its voluntary character: the children come gladly without any pressure, without any interposition of magistrate or Relieving Officer, finding a home and friends; they stay voluntarily and become happy, contented members of the family. On the other hand they are, in so far as they cannot support themselves, supported not by a tax, but by the voluntary offerings of those who love their fellows.

Foundation Principles.

For the information of new friends we quote from our Trust Deed the following as shewing the foundation

principles on which the Institution was established and on which it is still conducted:

To receive Homeless and Destitute Children found in Manchester and Salford and District.

To give immediate admission to such without distinction of Creed.

To provide such with suitable food, clothing, and Industrial training.

To educate such in Christian principles based on the Bible only.

Extent of the Work.

The sixteen branches of the Institution continue to be as active as ever, and the following list shewing the numbers dealt with during the year will convey some idea of the extent of the work, though these figures do not include the applications for temporary help and for advice.

New Applications.

The number and condition of fresh applicants during the past year are as follows:—661 boys, and 194 girls, making a total of **855**. 466 had lost one or both parents, while 389 had a father and mother living somewhere. Nearly all these children came from Manchester and the district, and were in need, more or less, of our help.

The Admitted Ones.

These numbered 420, which added to the 437 in the various Homes at the beginning of the year, make a total of 857 under care and training during the twelve months.

The Central Refuge, Strangeways.

This is the headquarters of the Institution, and all applications for admission and help are first dealt with

Two and a half years ago Eliza and Willie came to us from sad and dangerous surroundings. Father and mother were dead, and stepfather, who was partially paralyzed, sent them out in the early morning as "Knockers up." The end of such a life would have been degradation and ruin. Removed to Canada, they are now happy in comfortable homes and treated as members of the family. Willie writes among other things:—"My sister was down to our farm a week ago, and stayed a week, so while she was here we had our photos taken, and I am sending one to you."

here. Every story is listened to patiently, and all particulars carefully recorded. If apparently homeless and destitute the children are at once admitted pending the necessary investigation, which always follows. After the enquiry the boy or girl is placed in whichever branch of the work their age and circumstances require, or are restored to friends.

All the work of administration of the large organization is directed from here, and every fortnight the Committee gather to guide and control the various activities of the Institution.

This central Home has dealt with 206 lads, the average number in residence being 96.

This is a typical case of the class admitted here:—

J.T.—This lad, aged 14, had drifted from an adjacent Lancashire town to Manchester, and was sent on to the Refuge by a friend, who in his work among street lads came into contact with him. The lad's story was a sad one shewing very clearly how loafers, ne'er-do-wells, and criminals are made. His father was dead, and his mother and he had been in workhouses and tramp wards, filling the intervals with singing on the streets, and getting a precarious existence by begging. There was a stepfather, who had deserted them, and for whom there was a police warrant issued. There were three other children, one dragged about by the mother on tramp, and two younger ones in workhouse. It was decided to give J. a chance at the Refuge, where after several months of testing he is doing well, shewing, like many another case, that these poor lads are more sinned against than sinning.

The Workshops.

These Workshops:—**Letterpress-Printing, Carpentry, Shoemaking, Tailoring, and Firewood-making** have been kept busy throughout the year. They are conducted on sound business principles, and each shop has its own fully qualified foreman. The boys on

the completion of their apprenticeship find no difficulty in obtaining situations in their own trade, and some of the lads who have passed through these workshops are now in business on their own account.

The result of the year's trading, after charging every proper expense to each department and paying boys' and foremen's wages, shows a net profit of £563 16s. 10d. to the funds of the Institution.

Working Youths' Home and Institute.

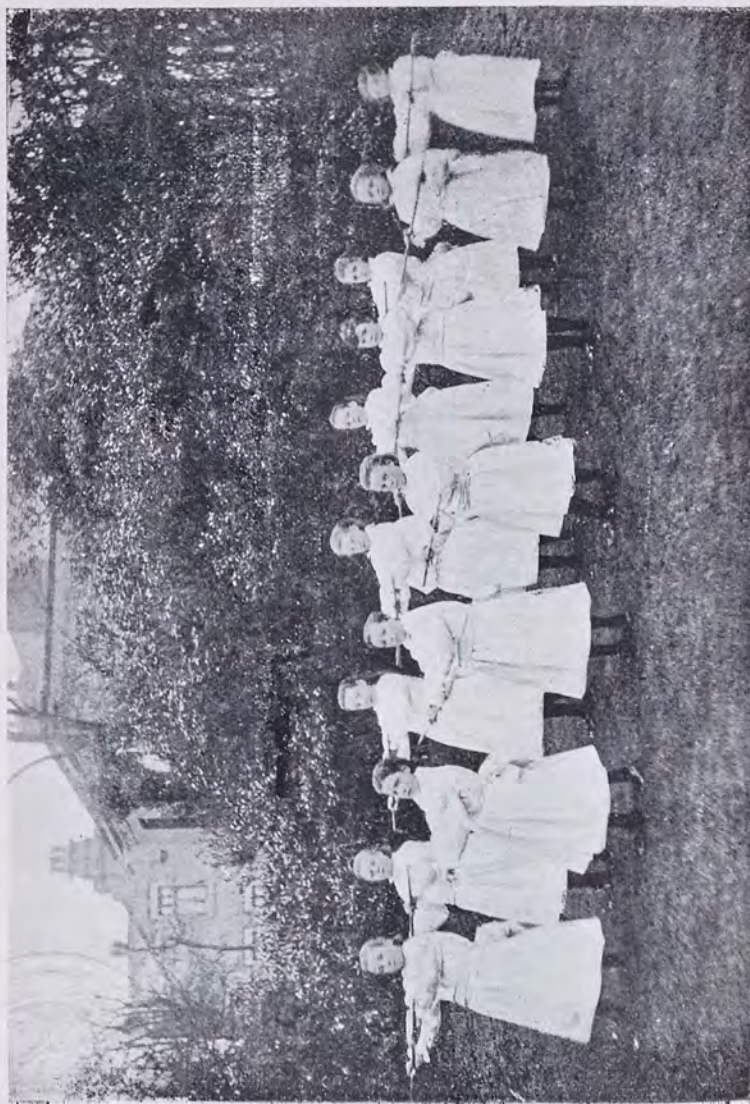
The other large establishment of the Strangeways group is this branch of our work, and one of the most important. It is occupied chiefly by the elder boys who have passed through the Refuge, and are now engaged in various occupations in the city. Each member has full board, a separate cubicle, use of sitting room, reading room, baths, gymnasium, etc., and the whole cost is ten shillings per week.

This branch of the work enables the Committee to keep in touch with many of the old boys, and during the year frequent opportunities are provided of bringing them together. One of the most enjoyable of these gatherings is the annual re-union of former inmates with their wives and little ones.

67 youths have passed through the Institute during the twelve months, the average number in residence being 44.

The Street Boys' Home.

This Home is set apart for, among others, little boys found destitute upon the streets, 105 have been cared for here, 30 being the average number in residence.

The Boys' Emigration Training Home.

This is the training home for boys who are likely to go some day to Canada. Every year a certain number of our children are emigrated to Ontario, and last year we sent 72 boys to our Marchmont Home at Belleville. 121 boys were dealt with at this Home in Strangeways, the average number in residence being 36.

This Home, as well as the Refuge and our Rosen Hallas Girls' Home, at Cheetham Hill, is certified by the Local Government Board for the reception of children from the Poor Law Unions. During the year we have been able to take a number of boys and girls from the Boards of Guardians, and they have been emigrated with our own children to Canada.

All the boys of the Strangeways Homes of school age attend the Broughton Street Day School, which is close by, and there receive an excellent education.

On Sunday morning they attend one of the places of worship in the neighbourhood, in the afternoon all are at School, and in the evening they gather in the large hall where a bright hearty Service is held.

The Ever-Open Door.

This day-and-night Shelter, which is at No. 1, Chatham Street, Piccadilly, has been open over twenty years, during the whole of which period its door has never been shut. Every day its value and importance are being proved, and we are constantly realizing the need and the blessing of this "place of safety" for wandering and homeless children, and for friendless and destitute girls up to 18 years of age. During 1906, 385 cases have been dealt with, 298 of this number were brought by the police, and 12 by the officers of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children. 132 of these children were brought here by the police and others between 10 o'clock at night and 4 in the morning. All the cases admitted at this Shelter are at once investigated, where there are friends they are communicated with, or if the children are destitute they are admitted to one of our permanent Homes.

The Cheetham Hill

Orphanages and Homes.

These form an important part of our work and provide accommodation for as large a number of children as do the Strangeways Homes.

First there are the Homes in George Street, named after the donors :—

- No. 2.—The Langworthy Home, girls.
- 4.—The Garnett Home, boys.
- No. 6.—The Crossley Home, boys.
- No. 8.—The Higgins Home, Motherless Children.

Our Family of Orphan Children.

Each Home contains 16 to 18 children, a mother, and a helper, and a true natural life is lived. 105 little ones have been carefully trained and helped, and the average number in residence has been 86.

The Elder Girls' Training

Home and Laundry.

The Rosen Hallas Home receives homeless and destitute girls as well as those in grave moral danger. A very efficient training for domestic service is given here, and the Laundry work for the Cheetham Hill Homes is done by the girls in this Home. Notwithstanding the sad early surroundings of many of those admitted here the results obtained in after life give cause for much thankfulness. During the year 85 girls have been received, the average number in residence being 37.

Each Spring some of the girls in this Home are emigrated to Canada, and last May, 31 were sent to our branch in Ontario. We would again make it clear to our subscribers that the girls sent to Canada are only those whose early surroundings are such that if they remained in Manchester they would be exposed to great temptations and dangerous risks. On their arrival in Canada they are placed in excellent farm homes, and the most gratifying results have followed.

We venture to give two letters which we have recently received from girls who were formerly rescued from vicious surroundings.

N.N.—No doubt you have almost forgotten who I am, but there is no danger of me forgetting who you are. You will remember that I have never wrote to you since a little while before last

Christmas, so I have got quite a lot to tell you. Well first of all I must thank you for being so kind in sending my brother to Canada, he says he likes Canada fine, he can milk, cultivate, horse rake, dish, harrow, and drive a team of horses. He rode horse-back to Sunday School last summer, but I guess he won't come this winter on horse-back as it will be too cold by far. I am enclosing one dollar to you for a Christmas box. I can milk as well as any one on the farm now, I used to milk five cows every night but I have milked six once. I can bake bread, puddings, and cakes, and I can cook a breakfast, dinner, or tea. I will close and try and be a credit to you and all those that have helped me to get out to such a fine country as Canada.

* * *

F.J.—After I had been here a few months, Mr. Locke told me if I liked I could save money enough for a cow this fall and he would keep it this winter for the present, so I then set to work to make my money go the farthest and after 18 months of hard working I have got enough for a cow. I can tell you I have wasted no money but now I feel quite a millionaire all to myself, by this time next summer it will have brought me 18 or 19 dollars. Mr. & Mrs. Locke are both very good to me and Mrs. Locke helps me a lot about the things I don't know. I am a fortunate girl.

The Home for Neglected Motherless Little Ones.

Here 30 children have been nursed and cared for, and the Home has again proved its great usefulness to a sad class of child need. The average number resident for the year is 21.

The Convalescent Cottage.

This small house, which is in the grounds of Rosen Hallas, has been a blessing to many of our weak and delicate children belonging to the large family at Cheetham Hill. They are sent here for a period where they receive special nursing and nourishment as their cases need.

In all our work very much is made of the children coming into personal touch with the masters and matrons,

Was formerly in Workhouse Schools, then was admitted to our Rosen Hallas Girls' Home. Her mother took her out and placed her as servant in a low lodging house amid most degrading surroundings. The woman in charge advised her not to stay. She came to us a second time, and sailed for Canada in 1897. She has now a comfortable happy home of her own and two bonnie children.

Nothing known of father. Mother died in Workhouse and child was adopted by a labouring man and his wife, latter became a drunkard, and eventually at nine years of age B. came to us. She was sent to Canada six years ago, and is now the adopted and the cherished only daughter of a retired farmer and his wife, between whom and the girl there is a very strong mutual attachment.

and a delightful feature of it is the constant interest which is kept up in the various Homes with the children who have left. At the week end it is very pleasing to see how many of these young people are glad to come to their old Home for tea and to join in the Sunday evening Service.

Bethesda Home for Crippled and Incurable Children.

During the year 83 boys and girls have been received at this very important branch of our work, and the average number in residence has been 64. Here boys from two years of age to eleven, and girls from two years of age to fourteen are received, and perhaps no home in the district does so much for those it receives as this Bethesda Home for suffering children.

Notwithstanding the fact that many of the inmates are afflicted and full of suffering the life here is one of interest and hope. The children are wonderfully patient and contented, and all the surroundings of the place are full of brightness and joy. The combination of Hospital treatment, the teaching in the School, and the loving care of the good matron and the nurses are fitting many of the children to earn in part, if not entirely, their own living in after life. Some of the little ones however come to us with only a little while to live, and the angel of death has again visited "Bethesda" during the year.

We are thankful to record that of the 70 cots 39 are now endowed—leaving however 31 still unendowed. £600

is the cost of endowment, and the Committee earnestly appeal for gifts of this sum for the purpose of providing in perpetuity for a cripple or incurable child.

In a few cases the yearly amount necessary for the maintenance of a cot is provided by friends, and we shall be glad to receive from any of our readers an annual gift of £20 for the special purpose of supporting a bed.

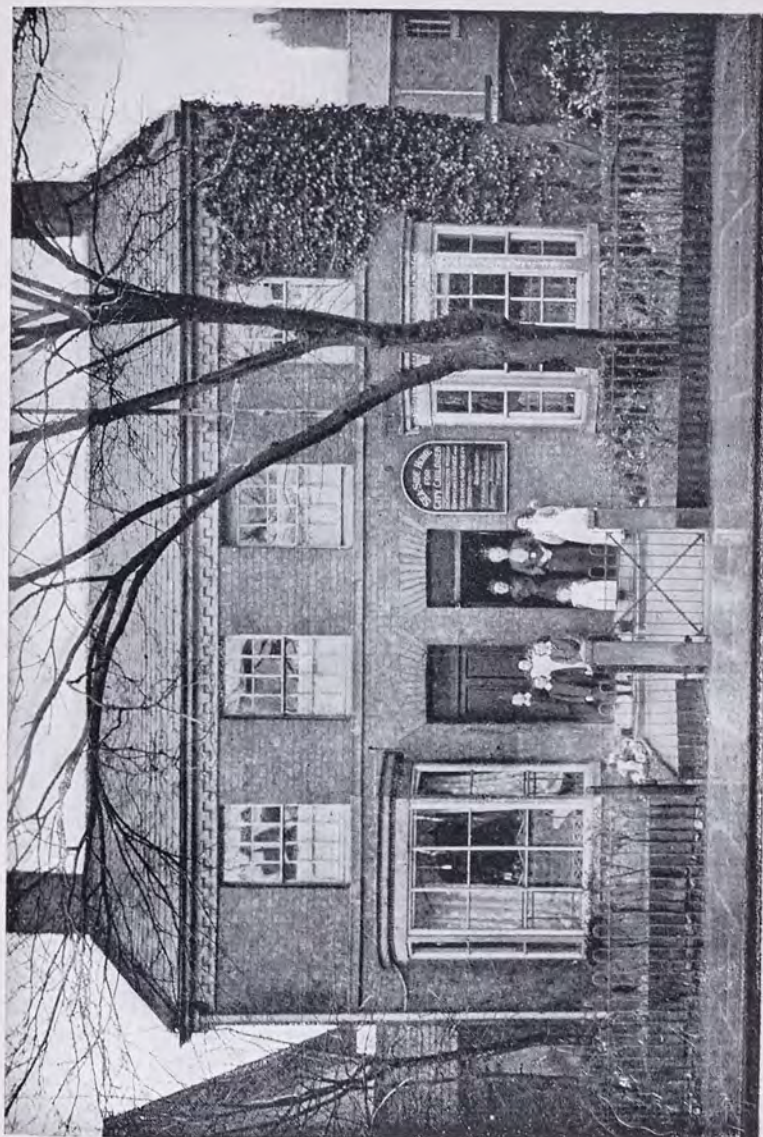
May we again state that admission to Bethesda, as to every Home of the Institution, is not by votes but by application to the Secretary. Each case is carefully investigated, and the Committee admit the most needy and the most suffering.

The Sea-Side Home, Lytham.

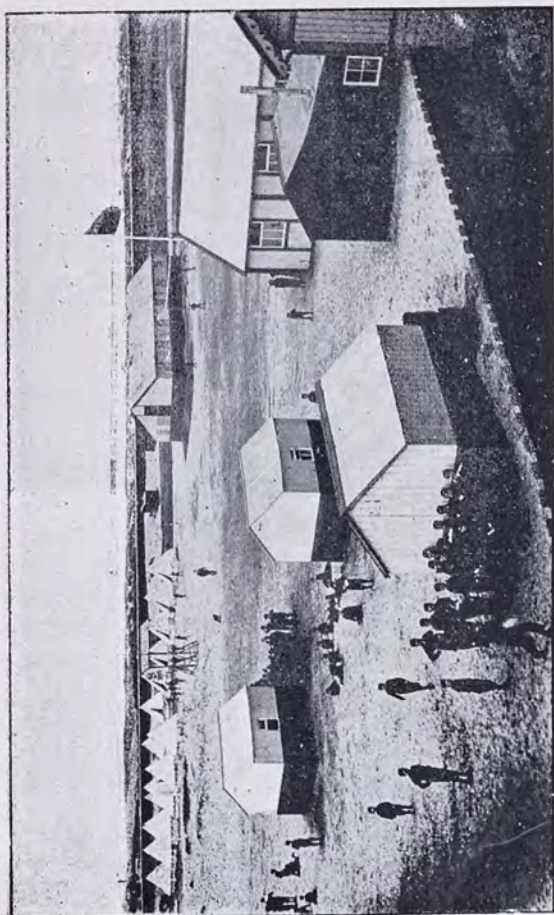
During the past twelve months 91 little boys and 214 girls—making a total of 305—have had an average stay of fourteen days at this home of rest. This branch of the work has been in existence for many years, and has once more proved a great blessing to many of the weak and ailing children of our city. The house is open all the year round, and we are glad so many of the workers amongst the poor are able to make use of this home for the delicate and pale faced little ones of the slums.

The Summer Camp for Poor City Lads.

Our Institution was one of the first in the country to organize holidays for poor children, and for the last

21 years we have provided a week's holiday during the summer months at the Sea-Side for the lads of the city's crowded courts and alleys.

Our Camp at Birkdale, Southport, has had the most active season of its existence, and during 1906 3,250 children have spent a week under canvas. The Camp opens in May and closes in September, and is one of the most popular branches of the work.

All the boys from the Refuge and other Homes, as well as the girls, had a week's holiday at the Camp, and this yearly change is of the greatest benefit to them.

We are specially indebted to the members of the sub-Committee who have charge of this branch, and we desire here to express our high appreciation of their devoted services.

The Messenger, Parcel, and Shoeblack Brigades.

This is another most active and useful department, its object being to find employment for poor respectable boys and save them from drifting on to the streets. During the year 172 lads have been employed, and 48 have been drafted into permanent situations. The Brigade has proved to be a very useful organization for the public, and we are glad it receives the sympathetic recognition of the authorities of the city.

Help at the Police Courts.

The Police Court Mission to lads and girls has carried on its beneficent operations as in previous years.

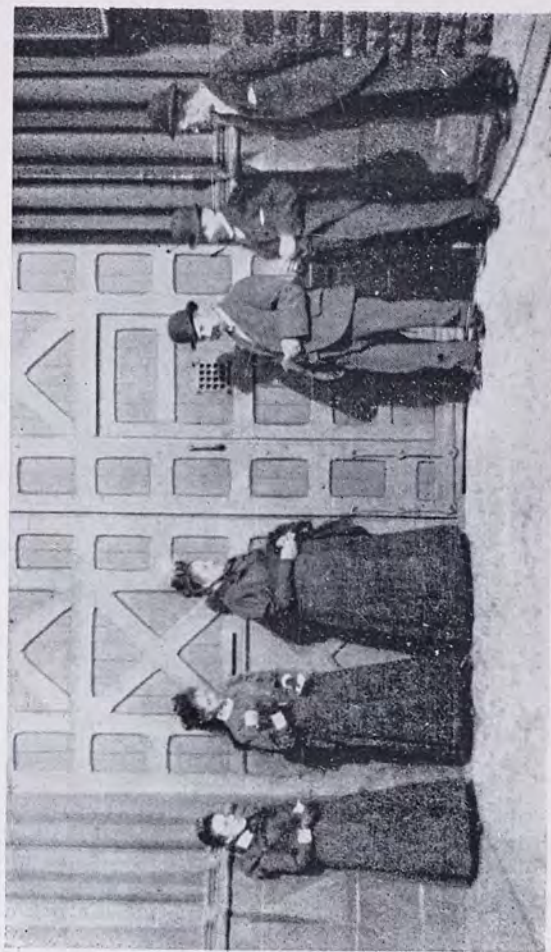
The three courts in Manchester and Salford are attended by one of our representatives and invaluable help and advice has constantly been rendered to the bench and to the children in various ways. 73 boys and girls have been dealt with specially by our officers at these Courts.

At the Prison Gate.

The Prison Gate Mission has continued its Christ-like work and during the last twelve months 13,363 prisoners have been met at the gate, of this number 6237 men and youths, 2890 women and girls—a total of 9127—accepted the invitation to a breakfast in our Mission Hall which is close by the Strangeways Gaol. During the simple meal a few earnest words are spoken and special cases of need are helped. Last year 1395 total abstinence pledges were taken. We would here pay a tribute to the earnest devotion of our workers, along with a sister from the Central Hall and a Deaconess of the City Mission, both of whom have long been associated with us in this special work. Every morning at 7 o'clock throughout the year these friends are to be found at the doors of the gaol waiting to meet and to welcome the discharged prisoners.

EMIGRATION.

We have had a very busy Emigration season this year, having prepared and sent out to our Canadian Home at Belleville, 103 children, 72 boys and 31 girls. This number, however, included 39 children from the Chorlton and 18 from the Prestwich Board of Guardians, many of whose members are realising from actual

experience the value of emigration especially for that class of children having connections of a degrading character, to whom they often drift as they come to working age and pass from the care of the Guardians.

These children from the Poor Law Union Schools are resident in our Institution for some weeks before the day of sailing, and so with our own children make one band of happy young emigrants going out under the best possible conditions.

The preparation of the outfits for so large a party involved, as will be readily understood, much thought and labour, a good proportion of the clothing and footwear for the boys being made in our own workshops, and much of the girls' outfits being prepared by the girls themselves at the Rosen Hallas Home.

The boys' party was taken out by Mr. Checker, of the Canadian Home, in April, and the girls' party by Miss Smethurst, our esteemed matron at Rosen Hallas, a month later. All the children arrived safely, and were in due course judiciously placed out in good farm homes by Mr. Wallace. The reports since received are with few exceptions very satisfactory, and compare favourably with the records of children at home. Many interesting letters have been received, most having the refrain that the writers like Canada very much, and would not care to return.

In this party there were several sad cases of boys dragged about from town to town, sleeping in common lodging houses, finally, through one agency or another,

entering the Open Door of the Children's Refuges. The following are particulars of a few:

A.—Father was dead, Mother in asylum, had been living with an aunt who was a confirmed drunkard, the conditions in which he was being brought up were most degrading.

B.—Both parents alive but had deserted him, and left no trace of their whereabouts. Boy had gone to an old grandmother, and was brought up before the magistrates for not attending school, and ultimately admitted to the Refuge.

C.—Had lived with father for years in common lodging houses, and had tramped about from place to place. The lad was brought to the Children's Shelter, Piccadilly, at 1-30 in the morning, and admitted. Father found to be of drunken, lazy habits, going in and out of workhouse.

D.—Came from extreme poverty, father dead, mother dying at time he was admitted.

E.—Before the magistrates at County Police Court charged with wandering. Investigation shewed that father had been dead seven years, mother was living an immoral life. Police report said "found wandering from place to place quite uncared for."

F.—This case came to the notice of a City Missionary. The boy was 10 years of age, illegitimate, had been maintained by an old woman for four years, she could do so no longer. Mother was dead, father not seen for two years.

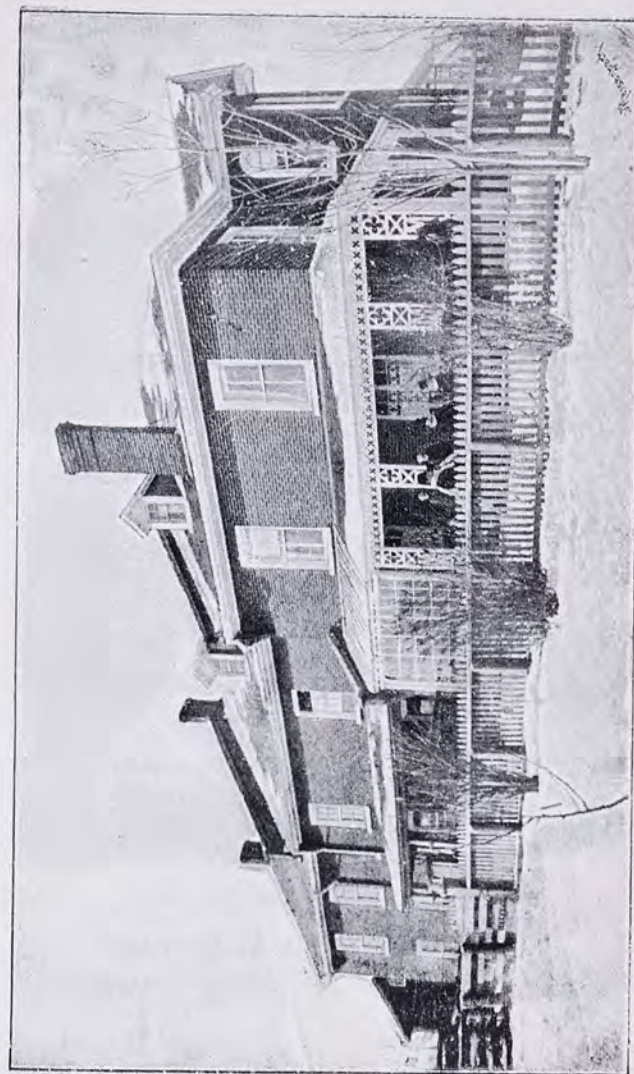
G.—A Scotch lad, formerly of Glasgow, had wandered about for some time, even as far as London. Father dead five years, mother dead two years. Now 16 years old and in great danger of drifting. Proved himself, while in the Institution, a lad very worthy of help and suited for Canadian life.

H.—The report in this case by the visitor of the Refuge was "I found the boy and his sister destitute, in a street off Deansgate, the mother having been turned out of a condemned house, father died recently, mother thriftless and drifting lower and lower."

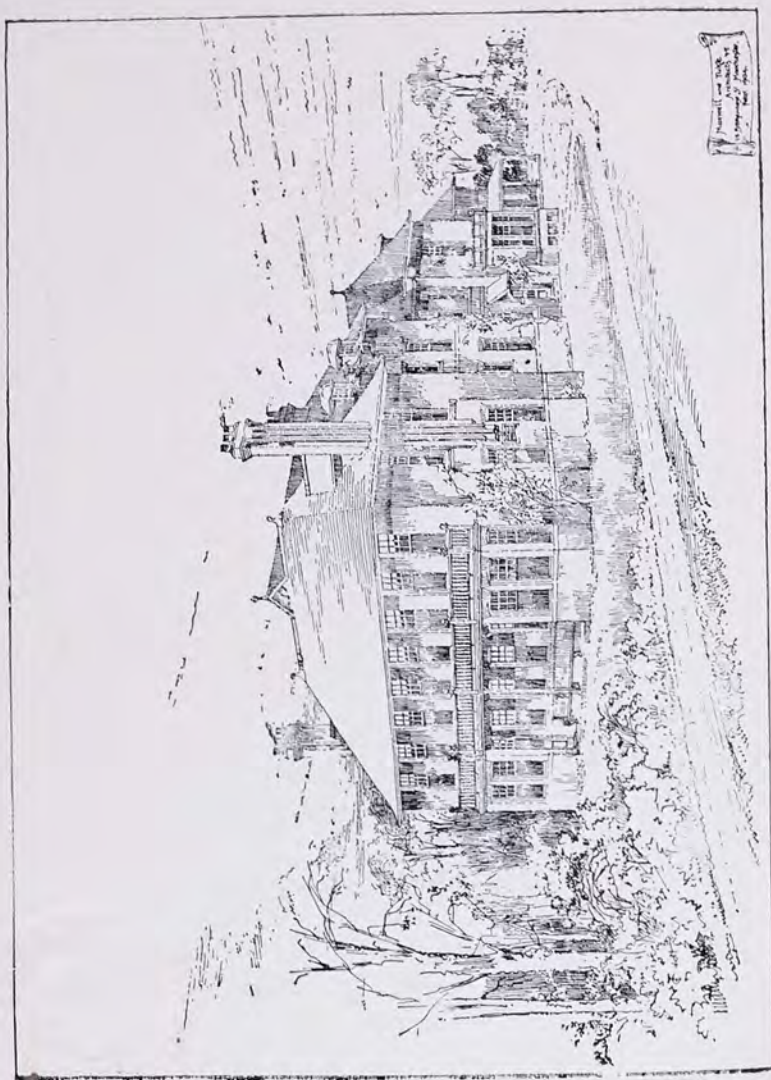
I.—Father and step-mother had been sent to prison for cruelty to this lad, step-mother the report said "was unable to speak a kind word to him, and reviles his dead mother to him most abominably: she frequently knocks him about with a copperstick, his father has punched and kicked him."

K.—Brought by an uncle who said the lad would have to go to the Workhouse if not admitted to the Refuge. Mother was dead, and father had not been heard of for years.

We can only emphasise what we have repeatedly stated, that this branch of our operations is a most

valuable adjunct to our work, providing as it does a good prospect for children who have not an equal chance if they stay here owing to worthless and sometimes vicious relatives.

We are grateful for the support received for this branch from many friends as shown in the subscription list. Some have contributed £12, the emigration expenses of a boy or girl, and in these cases a photo of a special child has been sent to the donor, and subsequently reports time by time as to their welfare in Canada.

EXTENSION FUND,

Bethesda and New Recreation Ground.

All our friends who have seen the extension at the Bethesda Home for Cripple and Incurable Children, which now has 70 beds, are delighted with the new wing and are glad, with us, that we are able to receive so many more of these poor little sufferers from the wretched surroundings in which so many of them otherwise would have to live. The Recreation Ground also, which has been purchased in Cheetham, is a great boon to our hundreds of children. It is of course a permanent possession and provides a very necessary adjunct to our various Homes.

Unfortunately we still have a large debt on this extension account. The total cost up to the end of the year is £9673 against which we have received £6534 leaving a balance of over £3000.

The Committee are most anxious to obtain this

balance and are making an appeal to the wealthy and generous citizens of Manchester and Salford to help them in this effort. Two gentlemen have promised £100 each. May we hope that other friends of poor children will follow their example and enable us to soon announce these extensions clear of debt. We are glad to say the ordinary maintenance account of the Bethesda Home is in a very satisfactory position and we are therefore all the more desirous of obtaining this capital expenditure once for all.

Finances.

In a voluntary Institution such as ours the financial position is naturally one of some concern year by year, and it will be understood how satisfactory it is to those who have the administration, when the liabilities involved are met by the year's income as we thankfully record is the case for 1906. If the financial conditions are thus calculated to bring some anxiety each year there is some compensation in the fact that the liberal support extended to the Institution through voluntary offerings for so many years testifies to the appreciation and confidence of the community which knows the work so well.

Over £14,000 has been expended during the year, particulars of which are given in the full financial statement, and it is of special interest to note that £3,264 18s. 10d. of this was provided by the children of working age, being the amount of their earnings, and profit on their work in the various trading departments.

In addition to this many old boys and girls who

It will thus be seen that the principle of self-help inculcated throughout all the work bears its natural fruit in these industrial results and also in the characters of the young people themselves.

The Committee desire once again to express their sincere appreciation of the devotion of every member of the large staff to the great and growing work of the Institution.

The spirit of loyalty and earnestness which has characterized the work of the masters, matrons and all the officials has helped in a very large measure to make the year's work so successful.

The Committee are very thankful that they have in their officers men and women who are in the fullest sympathy with the objects and aim of the work of the Institution, viz: the physical, moral and spiritual welfare of every boy and girl gathered into the Homes.

We cannot but acknowledge also the very real and practical help we have again received from a large number of voluntary workers. It is a matter for deep thankfulness that we have so many who willingly and gladly render service which is simply invaluable. For all the sympathy and help received from these friends we would here tender our warmest thanks, and at the same time express the earnest hope that they will continue to us their interest, their support, and their prayers.

Closing Words.

We look upon our work not only as a Christian duty but as a great and distinct privilege. The year has not been without its anxieties and cares, but as we have gone down into the city's sin and suffering and rescued these little sorrow stricken ones from the misery, hopelessness and vice which have surrounded them, our hearts have been filled with a joy which passeth understanding.

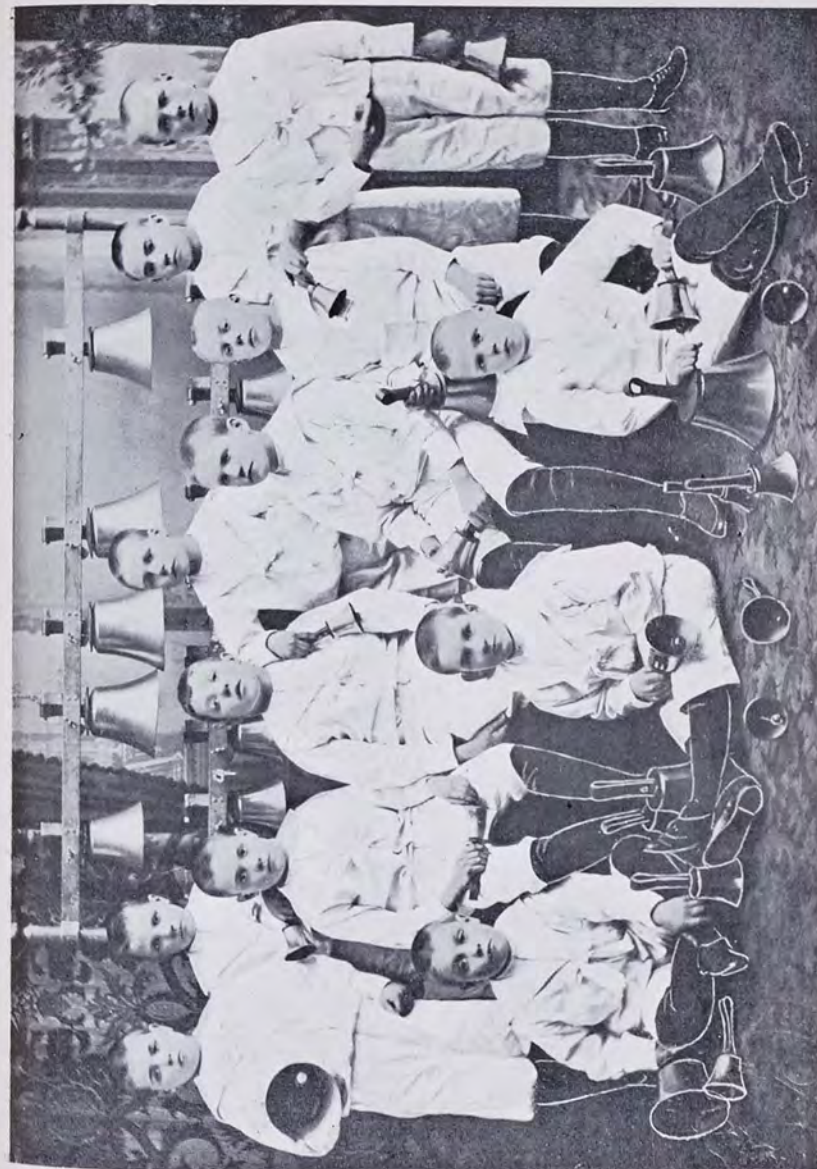
We are deeply sensible of the solemn trust which has been committed to us by God. The work is not ours but His.

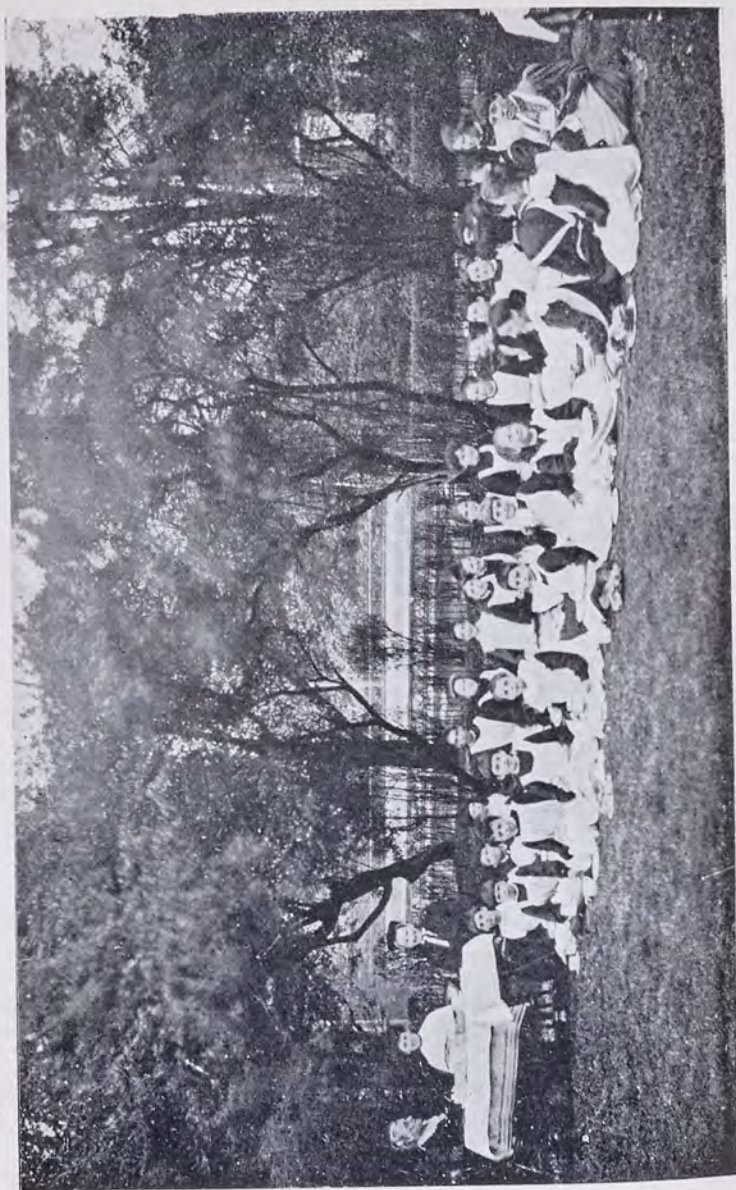

MEDICAL REPORT.

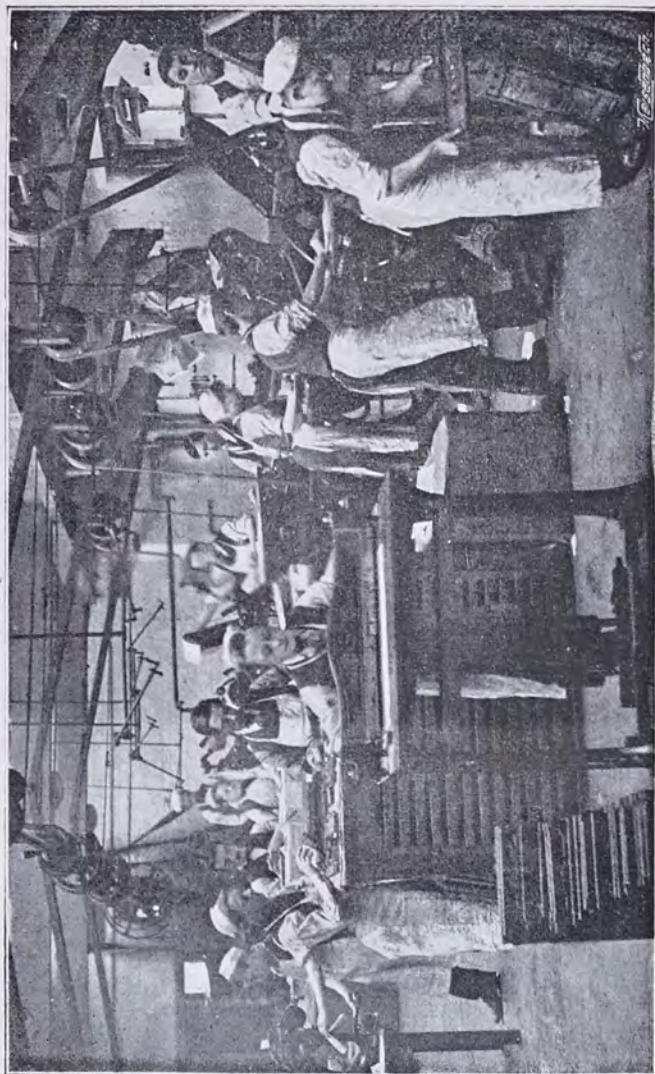
(Central Refuge and Strangeways Homes).

I am glad to be able again to record that the health of all our boys during the past twelve months has been quite satisfactory. Of course in such a large community we are never quite free from occasional serious complaints such as Pneumonia and Tubercular diseases, but this year I think we have been more exempt than usual. We have had no infectious diseases beyond two cases of measles in the Emigration Home, and there have been no deaths. Our sanitary arrangements, food, and clothing are all that could be wished.

(Cheetham Hill Homes).

The health generally of the inmates of our Homes for the past year has been very good indeed. This is specially true of the latter six months when compared with the inordinate amount of sickness prevalent all around us for the same period. We have had no accidents or injuries of any moment.

The foregoing shows that Tuberculosis accounted for all of our deaths. It only remains to be added that all of the Bethesda cases of Tuberculosis were admitted with, and because of, the disease. I am quite satisfied with the care and management generally exercised by the staff.

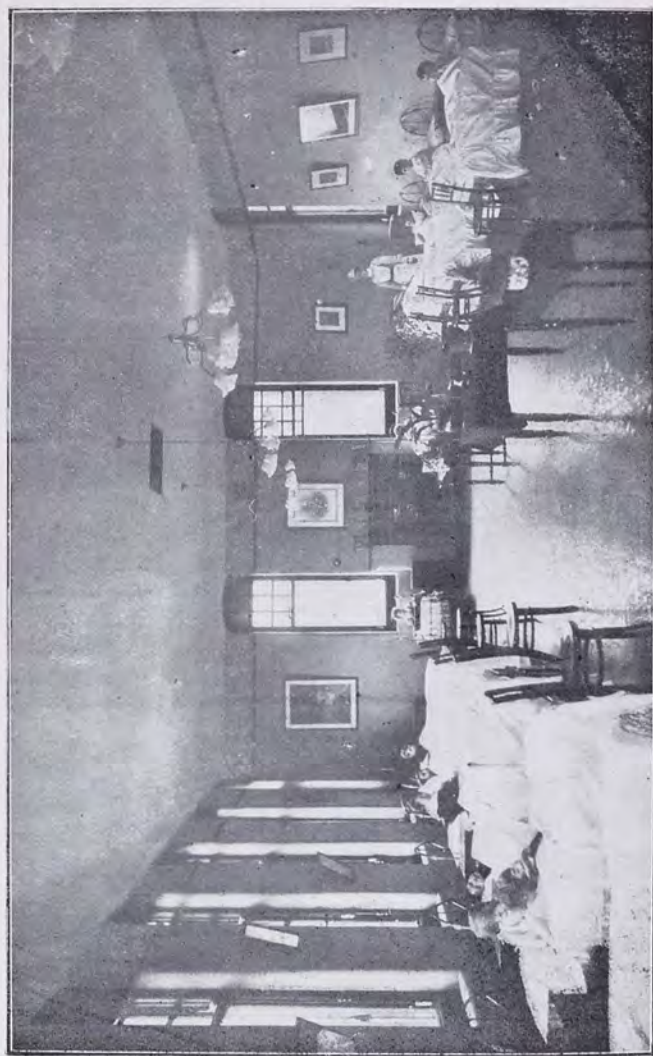
