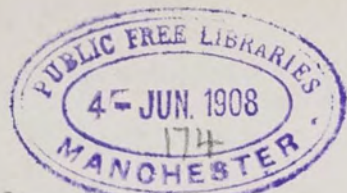

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Summary of Annual Meeting.

The Thirty-Eighth Annual Meeting of the Manchester and Salford Boys' and Girls' Refuges and Homes, and Children's Aid Society, was held in the Town Hall, Manchester, on Friday, April 3rd, 1908, at 3-30 o'clock.

The chair was taken by W. J. Crossley, Esq., M.P., who was supported by Lady Henry Somerset, Mrs. L. K. Shaw, The Very Rev. The Dean of Manchester (Bishop Welldon), Rev. G. Erskine Nicol, Sir W. H. Holland, Bart., M.P., Mr. Alderman McDougall, E. J. Broadfield, Esq., Dr. Boutflower, Dr. Walker, E. R. Lightfoot, Esq., Mr. Alderman Fildes, J.P., Theodore Crewdson, Esq., J.P., Thomas Johnson, Esq., T. L. Farrar, Esq., and others.

The Rev. G. Erskine Nicol offered prayer.

Letters of regret at non-attendance were received from Vice-Chancellor Hopkinson, Dr. Fulton, Sir Thomas T. Shann, Sir Wm. Stephens, and others.

The Annual Report and Balance Sheet were presented. The Hon. Sec., Mr. Thos. R. Ackroyd, gave a summary of the Report, which was taken as read, and also an abstract of the Financial Statement in the absence of the Hon. Treasurer, Mr. H. Charlton.

It was then moved by W. J. Crossley, Esq., M.P., seconded by Lady Henry Somerset, and resolved:—

"That the Report together with the Financial Statement be adopted, printed and circulated, under the direction of the Committee.

It was also moved by Bishop Welldon, seconded by Mr. Alderman McDougall, supported by Mr. Alderman Fildes, and resolved:

"That the Committee for the ensuing year be Messrs. W. J. Crossley, James Boyd, James Fildes, Mrs. L. K. Shaw, Messrs. Robert Shaw, Arthur Taylor, Harry E. Gaddum, W. C. Dunkerley; The Hon. Secretary, Mr. Thomas R. Ackroyd; The Hon. Treasurer, Mr. Henry Charlton; and the Auditors, Messrs. Theodore Jones, Crewdson, and Youatt."

A vote of thanks to Lady Henry Somerset, The Lord Mayor for use of his Parlour, and Lady Mayoress for kindly providing hospitality, proposed by Sir Wm. H. Holland, Bart., M.P., and seconded by E. R. Lightfoot, Esq., closed the proceedings.

Child Life.

Figures convey so little unless experience or at least a sympathetic imagination clothe them with life and make them reveal what they represent. This is true if we are dealing with bales of cotton or counting stars in a constellation, but how much more important when each unit is a young life quick with the potentialities of good and evil. Bales we may speak of by the thousand and of stars in groups according to their magnitude; but each child with its history of homelessness, of poverty, or of neglect with its own individual character and with its future now bright with hope, might be a text for a report eloquent with all that is involved for the child, the community and the nation.

Multiply this by hundreds and we have the basis of a year's record which would make a large volume of sadly pathetic interest and yet one, as seen in the development of these young lives, of real encouragement.

**Types
of
Cases.**

To focus the reader's attention at once on the object of our work may we say that broadly speaking there are three classes of poor children

among the many applicants throughout the year whose need we try to meet.

First.—Those children who on investigation are found to be friendless and requiring immediate and permanent admission.

Second.—Those who require some form of temporary help which we can render.

Third.—Those whose case on enquiry we find needs the attention of some other authority to alter the conditions of poverty or suffering under which they live, often through the gross and criminal neglect of their natural guardians.

We venture to give a typical case of each of these three classes of children.

1.—Cases for immediate and permanent admission.

An application was made for the admission of two lads aged 12 and 10. Their father had died of consumption in the hospital a few months

previously. Our visitor found the mother and four children in a room in Pendleton; the house was in a filthy condition almost unbearable; the children were half-naked though it was mid-winter and were evidently most neglected. The mother earned a little as a charwoman and they were all on the edge of starvation. The lads were admitted and soon gave evidence of the better conditions. They had no chance of an honest, industrious life in the old environment and we were glad to make such a life possible for them.

2.—Cases in need of temporary help.

After midnight in the early hours of the morning an attractive looking girl was found wandering about the streets of our city. A constable spoke to her but she refused to give an account of herself. She was conducted to our Children's Shelter where she was

admitted for the night and cared for by the matron. It transpired she lived on the outskirts of the city. She had quarrelled with a member of the family, left home and had wandered about until that hour of the night to her imminent peril. Her mother was communicated with and was very grateful to receive the wayward one home again without harm.

3.—Cases where the help of other authorities is enlisted.

**A Child
of
Sorrow.**

Not long ago we received information that a little boy of nine was sent out by his parents to hawk chips from door to door. He was a cripple with hip disease and had discharging abscesses. He dragged himself along with the aid of a stick. He was without boots, almost naked, and was forced out night after night in the bitter winter weather. The rope which held the bag containing the chips was round his neck causing it to chafe and swell under the pressure. He had both parents, the father employed by a well known firm and earning fair wages. Such were the conditions under which a little fellow creature lived in our city during the last Christmas season. The case was at once investigated by us and reported to the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children who took active measures against the parents.

Of course in these three classes there are many varieties of cases and though all are helped the character of such help takes many forms. This will appear as we name the several branches which comprise the Institution.

While the following pages give an outline of the extent and variety of the work as it is now carried on it will be no doubt interesting for a new friend to know something of the beginning of the charity some thirty-eight years ago.

**Beginning
of the
Work.**

In the winter of 1870 Mr. L. K. Shaw and Mr. R. B. Taylor, workers in connection with St. Ann's Sunday Ragged School, found children after the evening service absolutely homeless and leaving the school to seek shelter in some empty house, outbuilding, or archway. The need was so dreadful and so evident that they sought means to provide at least a shelter. The house in Quay Street, shewn in the illustration, was rented, a few hammocks slung up and an open door offered to the poor city waif. So began the Institution which to-day has in its fifteen branches nearly 500 children besides rendering aid to thousands of other poor and needy ones.

**Foundation
Principles.**

The Trust Deed of the Institution prepared in those early days states clearly the object of our work and it is well that we should for the interest of new friends give the following extracts.

To receive Homeless and Destitute Children found in Manchester and Salford and District.

To give immediate admission to such without distinction of Creed.

To provide such with suitable food, clothing, and Industrial training.

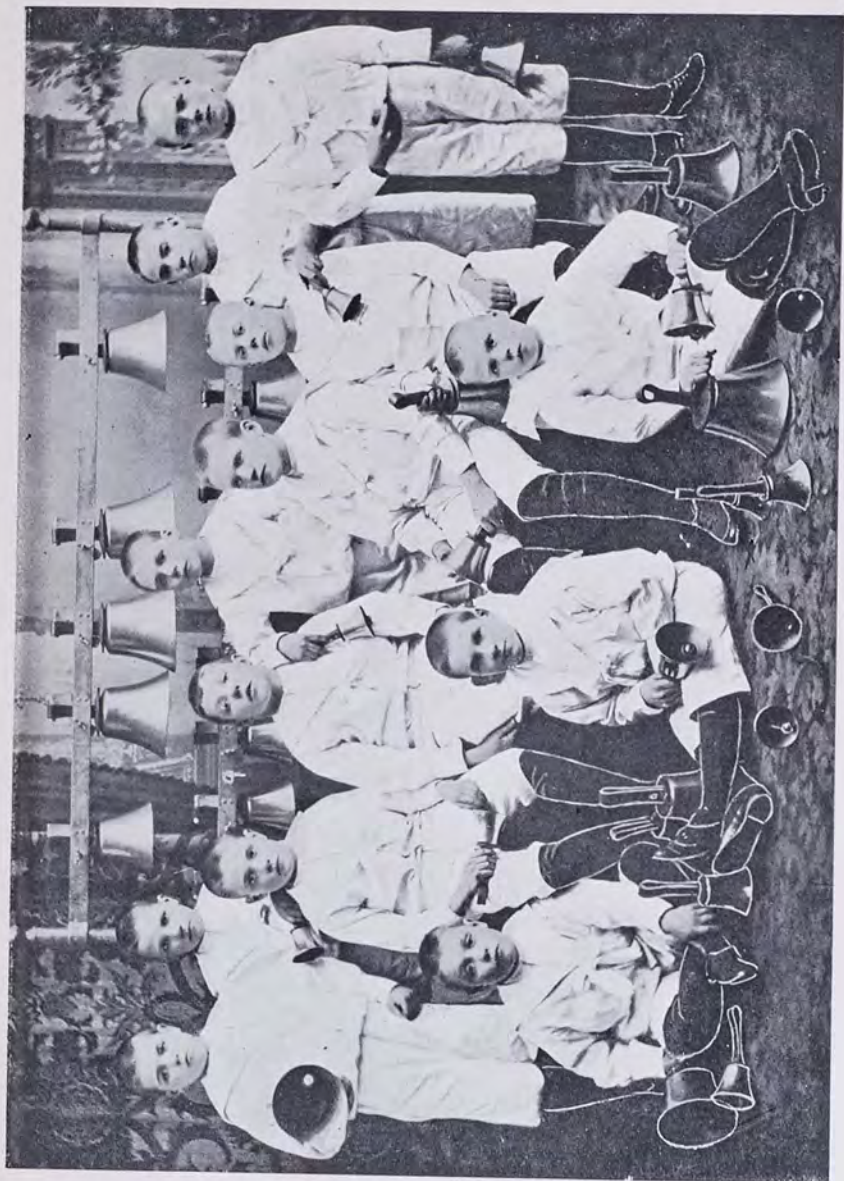
To educate such in Christian principles based on the Bible only.

**The Late
Mr. R. B. Taylor.**

In last year's Report we congratulated ourselves on still having with us (though unfortunately not in active service) Mr. R. B. Taylor to whom we have already referred. Now we have to mourn his loss for he fell asleep after a strenuous life on April 29th, 1907. He was a Trustee and member of Committee to the end and an active and wise administrator of the Institution for over 30 years. His was a singularly beautiful character in its simplicity and strength. The poorest whom he served so well in many ways felt no patronage in his service for any such possibility was lost in a sympathy at once deep and discriminating. And those who were his fellow labourers in philanthropy know how personal and direct was his work for others, and how unambitious he was for any mere official or recognised status. On the other hand his kindly and generous appreciation of the services of others was a real inspiration to some to whom his memory will still be an incentive to obey the ever recurring admonition—Be not weary in well doing. In taking his honoured name from our title page where it has been for 37 years we snap another link with those early days when many little children were "homeless near a thousand homes" until our friend opened a door for them in the name of Christ. Mrs. Taylor, who was associated with him in all his good work, only survived him a few months.

We have lost many other old friends during the year, to whom reference has been made in "The Children's Haven," month by month. Among them were Mr. and Mrs. G. F. Watts, of Plymouth Grove, who provided the Christmas Dinner for the boys at the Strangeways Homes for over thirty years; Mr. Thomas W. Freston closely associated with the inception of the Institution; the Rev. Samuel Pearson who took so deep an interest in our Orphan Homes at Cheetham Hill; and Mrs. Rylands whose death is announced as we are preparing this report.

Great
Object.**

And so amid the stress of its administration we constrain ourselves to look steadily for our own heartening at the primary object of the work—To take the child in all its distress and helplessness from surroundings of misery and degradation, and place it under conditions where it may have a normal chance of a happy child-life, and the prospect of growing up to be an honest, industrious, and respected member of the community.

**Loom
of
Love.**

This result is not attained by mere shelter, food and clothing—things money will buy—but by sympathy, patient training, a prayerful interest, and love on the part of those under whose immediate care the child is placed. In this aspect we would wish to

think of our work as a loom of love weaving by Divine help good character from the raw material of neglected childhood in which lie dormant, things of worth and good repute. A great authority on the welfare and protection of children has said that there is a Divinely given uplifting power in humanity which overcomes bad heredity, provided the child is removed from the evils of a bad environment at an early age.

The extent of the Institution
Operations of the Charity. continues as before and the 15 Branches are in active operation.

New Trustee.

Mr. Alderman Fildes has been appointed a general Trustee of the Institution and also as one of the three Property Trustees in the stead of the late

Mr. R. B. Taylor, who held both positions.

Those Admitted.

These numbered 327 which added to the 427 in the various Homes at the beginning of the year make a total of 754 under care and training during the

twelve months.

Many of these cases were full of the deepest interest and some sad stories of suffering and sin could be written concerning them but the limits of this report forbid.

Fresh Applications.

The figures for the year stand out clearly. The applicants number 591 boys and 179 girls making a total of 770. Of this number 361 had lost one or both parents, while 409 had a father and mother living somewhere. With the exception of a very few cases, all these were from Manchester and the district and were in need of our help.

Head Quarters of the Work.

These are at the Central Refuge in Strangeways and all applications for admission and help are first dealt with here. Every story is listened to patiently and all particulars carefully recorded. If the children are apparently homeless and destitute they receive immediate admission pending the necessary investigation which follows immediately. After the enquiry the boy or girl is placed in which ever branch of the work their age and circumstances require, or they are restored to friends.

All the work of administration of the large organization is directed from here, and every fortnight the Committee gather to guide and control the various activities of the Charity.

This is the largest Home of the Institution and it is full of activity every day and evening. A portion of the big family go forth each morning to the school in the neighbourhood, another division to various situations in the city, while the remainder and larger portion are employed in our own workshops on the premises.

The Workshops.

These—Letterpress Printing, Joinery, Tailoring, Shoemaking, and Firewood-making etc.,—have been kept busy throughout the year and they are conducted on strictly business principles. Each shop has its own fully qualified foreman and provides employment for a large number of lads who are apprenticed to the various handicrafts. The result of last year's trading after paying every proper expense to each department and paying foremen's and boys' wages shows a net profit of £1077 1s. 3d. to the funds of the Institution.

Working Youths' Home and Institute.

This Branch provides for our elder youths and young workmen a safe and comfortable home, combined with the educational advantages of an institute and with its splendid gymnasium, games room and reading room, it is a well appointed young men's club. It is chiefly occupied by those of our elder lads who have passed through the Refuge and are now promoted to this place. When vacancies occur, youths are admitted who, coming from the country to situations in our city, are almost friendless here and whose small wages often compel them to dwell in uncomfortable and undesirable lodgings.

During the year interesting gatherings of the old boys who have passed through the Institute are held, and one of the most enjoyable of these is the annual re-union of former inmates together with their wives and little ones.

**Street Boys'
Home.**

This particular Home receives boys of tender years rescued from poverty and crime. All its inmates are of school age and are cared for here till old enough to be transferred to the workshops.

**Emigration
Home.**

The boys admitted to the Institution with a view of being emigrated sooner or later to Canada, are placed in this Home. They are carefully trained as far as is possible in a great city like ours, for a life in some farmhouse in Ontario, and each spring a certain proportion of them are sent to our Marchmont Home in Belleville where they are placed under the experienced guidance of the Rev. Robert and Mrs. Wallace. This home in Strangeways is one of the most important and useful, but what we really need is a farm house in the country where children intended for Canada could be trained beforehand. It is a great change from the streets of a large town with all its noise and traffic and its lighted thoroughfares at night to the lonely farm in the country. One decided advantage of a training farm some little distance from Manchester would provide the opportunity of sending there some of the boys who come to us, boys whose salvation lies in the breaking off altogether of their old street life and who are sadly in need of pure country air. Some day we may be in possession of such a home.

This Home, as well as the Refuge and our Rosen Hallas Girls' Home, at Cheetham Hill, is certified

A Canadian Now.

SIXTEEN years ago Walter B. came to us at 10 years of age, needing a helping hand. His mother was unable to maintain him, and his grandfather with whom he had lived previously had had to go into the workhouse. Walter was admitted and grew into a sturdy lad. Expressing a desire to go to Canada he was sent out in 1896 with the boys' party, one of our lady friends paying his emigra-



tion expenses. He is shown in his Canadian outfit on the point of departure. He was placed with a farmer in the neighbourhood of our Home in Ontario, and earned for himself an excellent character. After some years he went further west and then on to British Columbia, where he has prospered. He has just paid a visit to the old country, getting leave of absence for four months. The portrait will give some idea of the fine fellow he is. He is now in a position to help his mother who may well be proud of him. After a trip which must have cost him £100, he has just returned to Canada, for he is a thorough Canadian now, and proud of his adopted country as well as grateful for the help which enabled him to emigrate.

by the Local Government Board for the reception of children from the Poor Law Unions. Each year we take a number of boys and girls from Boards of Guardians, and they are emigrated with our own children to Canada.

All the boys resident in the Homes in Strangeways of school age attend the Day School close by, and there receive an excellent education. On Sunday morning they attend one of the places of worship in the neighbourhood, and are always made most welcome. In the afternoon all are at school at the Refuge, and in the evening they attend their own special service which is held in the Conference Hall, and which is also attended by the residents in the district. This service is very bright and hearty and is conducted by many friends of various evangelical churches.

**The
Ever-open
Door.**

No department of our work is more important than this. Opened in 1884 its door has never been shut night nor day. No less than 442 children of all ages and of "all sorts and conditions" have been received during the past year. The nature of the cases and the needs of those admitted may be judged by the fact that no less than **142 of this number were brought by the police and others between 10 p.m. and 4 a.m.**

The importance to the whole community to have in the centre of the city such a "place of safety" for neglected and suffering children and for girls up to 18

years of age who are found on our streets, friendless, destitute, and in grave moral danger cannot be over-estimated. Every day we are finding the great need there is for such a shelter and the fact of its existence cannot be too widely known.

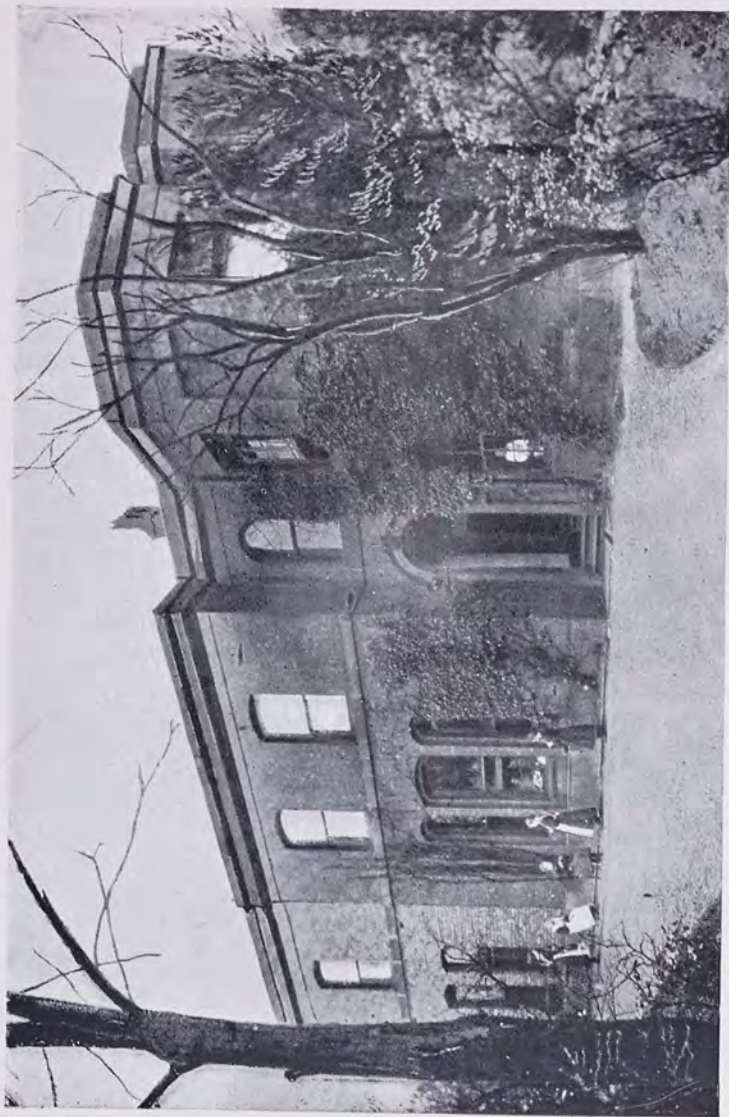
A very important part of the operations of the Institution is work amongst girls, which is carried on at Cheetham Hill where there are nine homes altogether. First, there are the Orphanages in George Street as follows:—

- No. 2—The Langworthy Home for girls.
 - No. 4—The Garnett Home for boys.
 - No. 6—The Crossley Home for boys.
 - No. 8—The Higgins Home for Motherless Children.
 - No. 10—The Atkinson Home for boys.
 - No. 12—The Schoolgirls' Home for girls.
- And the Convalescent Cottage.

Each Home has its own mother who with the helper and the children dwell together as one family. In this way the family life is more truly carried out than in any other, the result of which is seen in the after lives of those who are brought up therein. As each boy or girl reaches the age of 14 to 15 they enter some tradesman's family as an apprentice or fill a place of service. The mothers of the various Homes keep up a personal interest by correspondence with their former children, and many of them delight to visit their old home and have tea with "mother."

**Our
Elder Girls.**

We consider the work amongst the elder girls who reside at the Rosen Hallas Home, Cheetham Hill, amongst the most important of all our operations. In this Home, destitute and homeless girls as well as those rescued from grave moral danger, are received and thoroughly trained for domestic service. The results obtained here are such as to give cause for much thankfulness. No branch of our work needs more patience, prayer, and faith, and we rejoice in the knowledge of many girls taken from the worst possible surroundings, saved for time and eternity through the agency of this Home.

May we venture to give the following case which illustrates the kind of work done here.

A.R.—This girl was before the magistrates charged with stealing. She had been discharged from several situations, and was fast drifting to the level of her parents both of whom had been convicted of drunkenness and theft. The immoral environment of the child was evident in her behaviour when she was first received at “The Shelter.” After much patience and forbearance on the part of those who have had to do with her, she is now doing well at our Girls’ Home, growing in self-respect, and forming habits of industry. She is another example of the powerful influence of surroundings to debase or uplift—a few more months and she would have been lost, a curse to herself and to the community.

Each year a few girls, whose surroundings are such that remaining in Manchester would be highly dangerous, go forth from Rosen Hallas to Canada where they are placed in specially selected and excellent farm homes. In almost every case the result of emigration has been of the happiest character, and many of them have risen to positions of prominence and usefulness in the Dominion.

**Our Home
of Healing,
"Bethesda."**

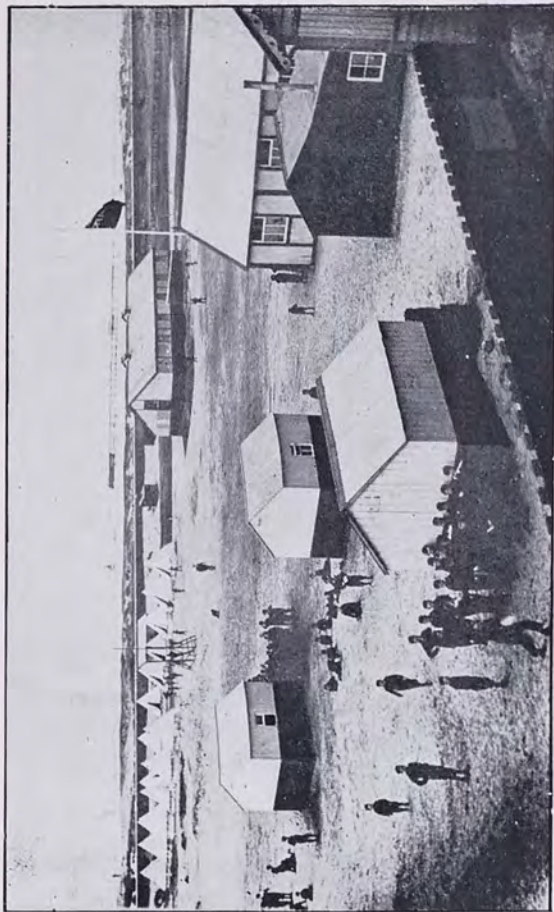
This Home, which, as our friends know, is set apart for the relief of the most suffering of all God's suffering ones. Its beneficent object is:—*To provide for crippled, maimed, paralysed, and generally incurable poor children—boys up to the age of ten, girls up to the age of fourteen—whose cases are unsuitable for the ordinary hospitals.* With such this beautiful Home has been filled throughout the year and it is universally acknowledged as supplying a real need in our great city. The inner life of the Home is full of the greatest interest and though the inmates are afflicted and many of them full of suffering they are wonderfully patient and contented. The place, standing in its own pretty grounds, is full of brightness and joy, and the children are tenderly nursed and cared for by our good matron and the staff of nurses. Some we rejoice to record, are nursed back to health and strength, and as a result of care and special training are fitted to earn in some degree their own living in later years. Some of these little ones, however, come to us with only a little while to live and very soon are taken from us by the Healer of all pain and pass into Eternal Rest.

A very delightful feature in connection with this branch is the fact that of the 70 cots 39 are endowed. £600 is the cost of endowment and the Committee earnestly appeal for gifts of this sum for the purpose of providing in perpetuity for a cripple or incurable child. In a few cases the yearly amount necessary for the

maintenance of a cot is provided by friends and we shall be glad to receive from any of our readers an annual gift of £20 for the support of a bed.

**Home at the
Sea-side,
Lytham.**

For many years our cottage close to the sea has been a haven of rest to weak and ailing children from the city's slums. It is open all the year round and is invaluable to us in all our work. It is occupied by little boys and by girls up to 16 years of age who are in delicate health and need a change of air. These children are taken from all parts of the district and stay for a fortnight or three weeks.

**Summer Camp
for Poor
City Lads.**

This department, ever since its commencement, has been most successful and is a very popular branch of our work. It exists to provide a week's holiday at Southport for the boys living in the poorest parts of Manchester and Salford, and last year 2,520 of them enjoyed a delightful time under the tents pitched by the sea at Birkdale. The Camp opens in May and closes in September, and has accommodation for 300 boys each week.

We would here pay a tribute to the devotion and enthusiasm of the members of the sub-committee who have charge of this branch, and acknowledge our debt of gratitude to them for all their very real help and services.

**Industrial
Brigades for
Outside Boys.**

The object of this special department is to save lads, who have passed school age and are desirous of finding employment, from drifting on to the streets.

By the agency of the Messenger, Shoeblack, and Parcel Brigade we have been able to provide work for 195 boys during the year and in very many cases these lads have been the sons of poor respectable widows who have been sorely in need of the help we have in this way rendered to them. A most satisfactory feature in connection with the Brigade is that 47 lads have been passed on to permanent situations. This branch, as indeed many of the others, is constantly receiving the sympathetic recognition of the authorities of the city.

**Prison Gate
Mission.**

This Mission was begun many years ago, at a time when it was not so unusual to see boys and girls issuing from the gaol as, thank God, it is today. Though now dealing chiefly with adults, it is continued because of the close proximity of the Refuge to the Strangeways prison, and of the continued blessing of God upon the work.

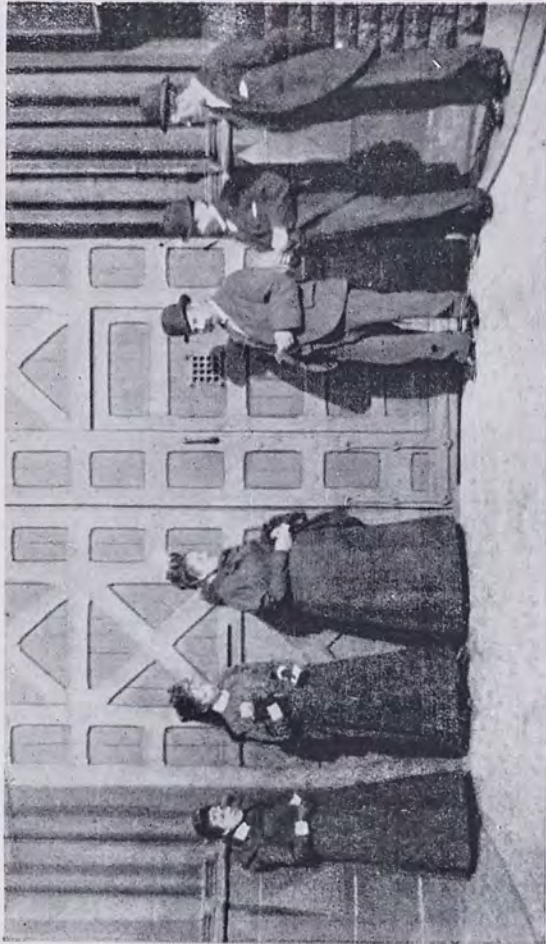
During the past year "The Gate" has been attended every morning in all weathers by our workers and the invitation given to the breakfast at the Mission Hall has been accepted by

out of 13,933 met at the gate as they were discharged.

While a simple breakfast is being given at the Hall a few earnest helpful words are spoken and special cases of need relieved, and 1426 voluntarily signed the total abstinence pledge. It is a work of great patience and requires much faith and the final results will only be known in "The Great Day."

Help at the Police Courts.

Each morning our officers attend the Police Courts to render what assistance may be possible to any boys or girls who may be brought up there.

In this way we are frequently able to render help and advice to the Bench and we believe the magistrates are glad to avail themselves of the assistance we can give them in very many cases. Our Mr. Ashley and Mr. Binns have recently been appointed by the magistrates as probation officers for young people under the new Act which came into operation on January 1st, 1908.

Fresh Start in Canada.

The number of children sent out to our Home in Ontario during the year was 66—boys 36, girls 30. Of this number however, 26 were from the

Chorlton Board of Guardians.

The selection of these children for emigration is made largely in view of the fact that they have unfortunately, degraded relatives or friends from whose

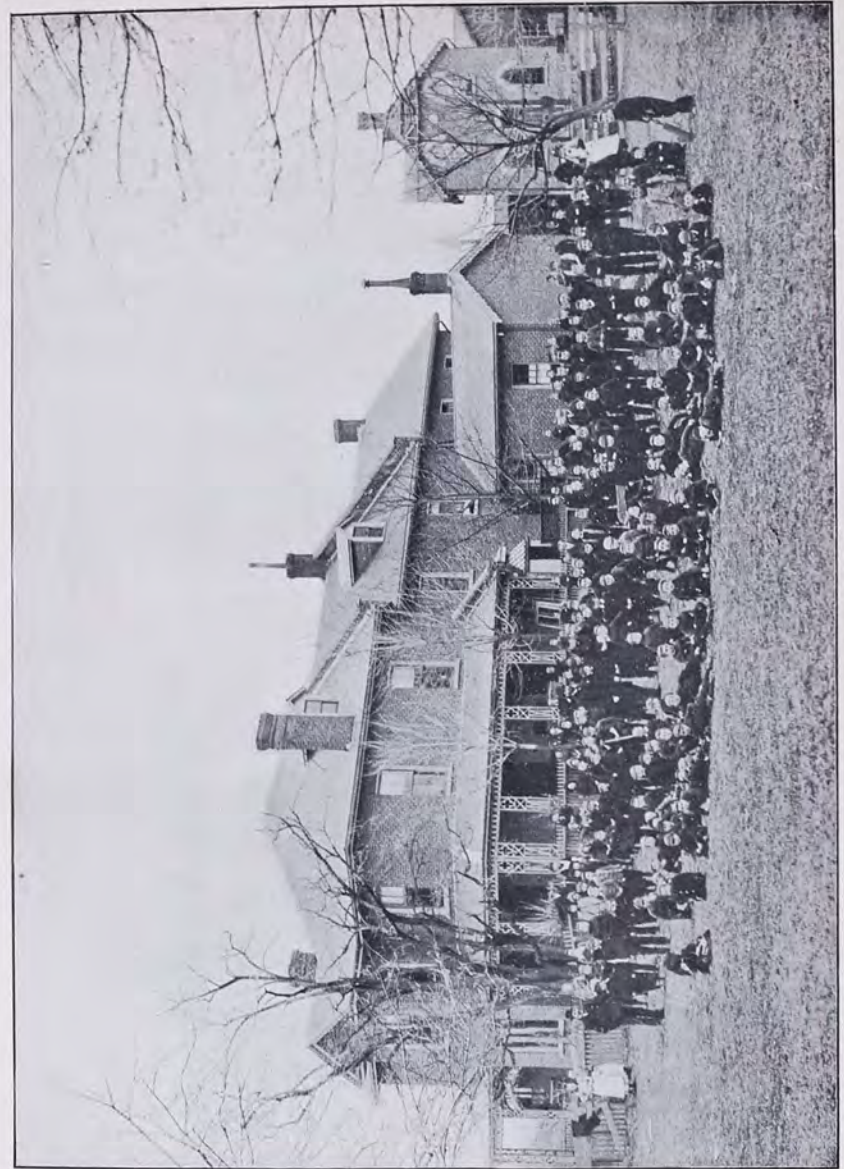
influence it is most desirable they should be entirely removed. This influence has been sometimes reasserted when the child has come to working age with disastrous results, especially in the cases of girls on whom much care and money has been spent.

Emigration is the only safeguard in these cases. The children are received at the Canadian Home and cared for by our agents, Rev. Robert and Mrs. Wallace, and placed out with farmers after careful enquiries as to their respectability. Afterwards the children are visited by Mr. Wallace or his assistant, and reports sent on to us at home.

**Canadian
Government
Inspection.**

The Home is under Canadian Government inspection: the latest report of the Inspector says "On the occasion of my official visit I found but two young lads in the Home. The records are splendidly kept, and needed information readily available. In 1906, 117 children passed through the Home. No difficulty was found in placing them; they have settled down in their new homes very satisfactorily, and the work of visiting has been prosecuted as usual, and the reports have been most satisfactory on the whole both from the children's standpoint and that of the employers."

We are constantly having cheerful letters from the children, almost invariably expressing their preference for the new country.

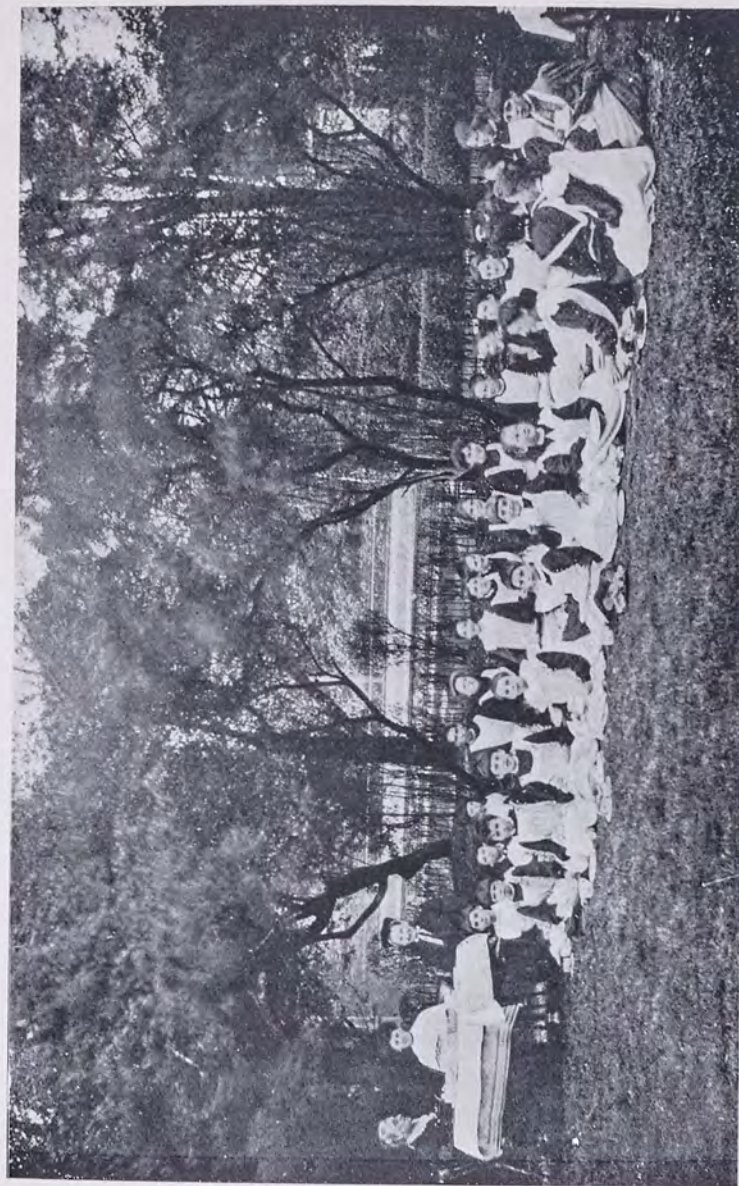
After Many Days.

ONE of our old boys, now a leading member of the community where he resides, called to see us after an absence of thirteen years in North West Canada. He reminded us that at eight years of age he was left an orphan in the slums of Deansgate over twenty years ago, and that the late Mr. R. B. Taylor gave him a helping hand in his great need. He passed through the Shoe-black Brigade, and afterwards was in the workshops at the Central Refuge. In

1894 he went out with the boys' party to Canada. In his own words he goes on to say "I was in two or three situations and saved money in order to purchase some land. I am now the owner of 160 acres of capital land in the Swan River Valley. I am Chairman of the District School, and Churchwarden, and try to do what I can to help on any good work that is started in our locality. I owe all my success to the Old Refuge where I was taught to walk in the right path; I often think of an address by Mr. Ackroyd many years ago on 'Ambition,' which often helped me to persevere."

Finances.

The full financial statement on another page gives details of the income and expenditure for the year. We regret that it shews a large deficit of £1,446.

We would hasten to add, however, that the list of subscriptions shews a larger number of contributors than at any previous period, and testifies to a more widespread interest than ever in the work of the Institution. This debt is due to the fact that while the amount from regular contributions is larger than before, the amount received during the year from large special donations and legacies is considerably below the average, only £1,200 coming from this source as compared with an average of £3,000 yearly for several years immediately preceding. We should be indeed grateful if we could increase our regular income to an extent that would enable us to put these special amounts to a reserve fund. We are glad to have an intimation as we write this report that under the will of the late Mrs. Rylands our Institution receives a bequest of £2,000.

Practical Self-Help.

There is always one item in our financial statement of exceptional interest, the amount contributed by the boys and girls of working age towards their own support. During the year under review the amount of their earnings and profit on their work in the various workshops was £3,055 3s. 6d., or practically one-fourth of the cost of the whole Institution. Besides

this many of the old boys and girls who have passed out of the Homes send amounts as Thankofferings, which are very welcome in themselves, and specially so as tokens of gratitude for help in years gone by.

It has been thought well to transfer a portion of the reserve fund to discharge the liabilities on the extension of the Bethesda Home and Recreation Ground account.

**New
Legislation.**

From one point of view or another most persons will be interested in the proposed new legislation embodied in the Children's Bill now before Parliament. The children of the nation have been slowly coming into their own during the past twenty years. The pity of it has been that their value to the citizenship of the country has been appraised with such hesitancy and limitations, to say nothing of tardy justice to the child himself. Thirty years ago, in the earlier days of our work, we pleaded in season and out of season for a recognition of the children's rights against the cruel circumstances of abject poverty, against their exploitation by so called guardians, against the bogey of parental rights, and against the degrading habits which were induced by the children's surroundings.

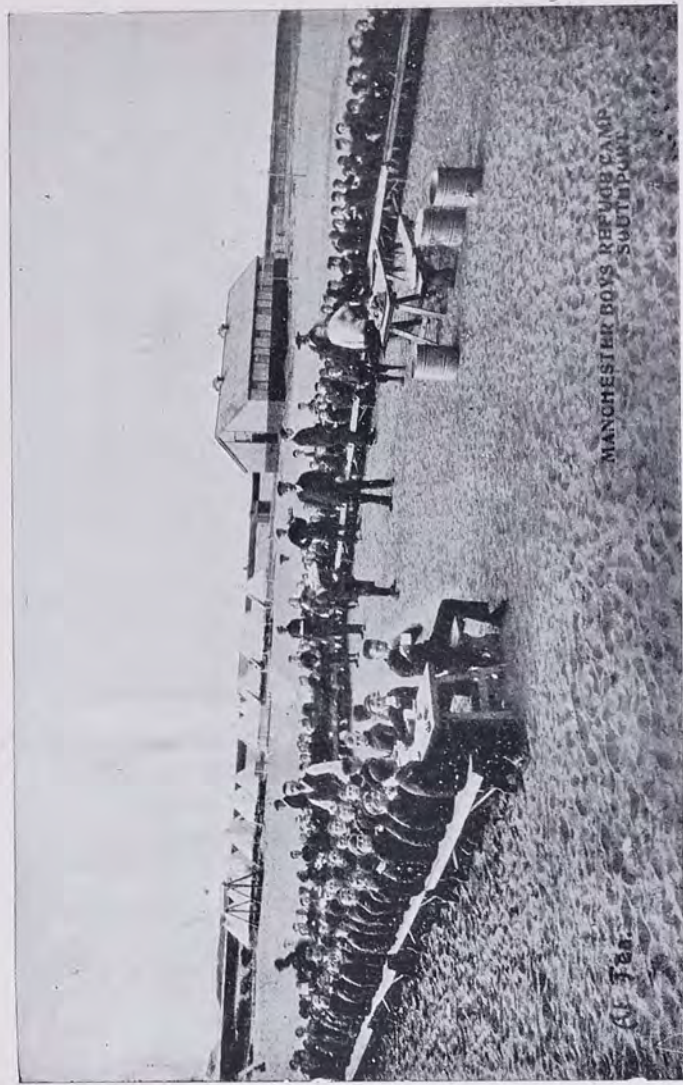
Juvenile street hawking in all weathers, at all times of the day and night was rife, and through the Press and by petition to, and interviews with, Municipal and Parliamentary authorities, we had a part in its abolition or control, but it was a slow and difficult matter to focus public opinion to the point of effective legislation. And

These two children came to us a few years ago from conditions of the deepest poverty. Father had died some time before, and the mother with four children and an aged mother to keep, was unable to get the necessaries of life. She earned ten shillings a week at a laundry, and paid four shillings rent. The visitor reported the house as "a most wretched looking place, only one bed, and an old sofa for them to sleep on, it is almost void of furniture, and altogether gives the impression of great poverty." These two children came to us, and after some time sailed to Canada. We cannot tell the sequel better than by giving part of a letter received from Nellie quite recently.

"No doubt you will be surprised to hear from me. I am Nellie N., Willie's sister, and I am sending you a Photo of ourselves, which I hope you will like. Willie often talks about you. I came to Canada in 1904, and Willie came in 1905. We both like Canada very much, and would not go back to England for any money. I was 16 on the 18th May, and I have saved about 40 dollars. On June 1st I went to see my brother for ten days, and we had a very good time."

how the parental right was held sacred and inalienable though it meant in thousands of cases ignorance, torture, deformity, and even death, for little children! It seemed based on the assumption that all parenthood was divine and perfect. Slowly, and it is remarkable how slowly such a claim was disallowed, and the rights of the child made to prevail in the name of our common humanity against the will of a parent who had forfeited all rights by ignoring all responsibilities, and in tens of thousands of cases adding cruelty to neglect. Before the local branch of the National Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children was established we had to deal with such cases week after week, and fight against the prevailing notion that a man's right to do what he liked with his own children was inviolable.

We make this passing reference to our experience to show how prepared we are to welcome and appreciate any legislation which will consolidate and improve the law in the interests of children, of poor children especially; and again justify the efforts of individuals and voluntary societies in shewing the State the value of its child-life.

The prospective enactment when it comes into force will, with the recent Act empowering the appointment of Probation Officers, be an effective instrument for improving the status of the child as a part of the nation. The question of children in public houses is one which needs to be drastically dealt with, and we hope the Licensing Bill will meet the need in this connection. We could have wished that the age limit under the new Bill had been seventeen instead of sixteen, for our

experience is that many just over the latter age need the protection of a kindly administered law in their own interests.

When this new legislation is on the Statute Book we shall still be behind some countries, in our care as a State for the welfare of those on whom its future depends.

**Closing
Words.**

The Institution is most fortunate in having a large band of enthusiastic and willing helpers. To all our voluntary workers, whose services in so many ways have been a very real help to us, the Committee desire to express their deep thankfulness and thorough appreciation of all the practical interest and sympathy rendered to the Charity. As the work grows our need of friends increases and we express the hope that our many helpers will continue to give us their interest, their support, and their prayers.

We cannot forget the members of our large staff, and it is a joy to us to pay a tribute here to their devotion to the work of the organization. We believe every officer and worker endeavours earnestly and loyally to co-operate with the Committee in carrying out the objects of the Institution, viz:—*To Reclaim, to Reform, to Evangelise Homeless and Destitute Children.*

Thus, with much thankfulness for the past and full of hope for the future, the Committee present the record of another year's toil. We are very grateful for the

MEDICAL REPORTS.

(Strangeways Homes.)

I am sorry to say that I cannot give such a satisfactory report of the health of the boys in the various Strangeways Homes, as I have been able to do for the past two or three years. During the year we have had a good deal of sickness, but with the exception of some half a dozen very serious complaints, it has been mostly of a mild type, a great deal being due to influenza. This is but a reflection of the more or less unhealthy season we have passed through, a cold, wet, sunless summer, and a very raw, damp winter. I have only one case of infectious disease to record, and I am thankful to be again able to report that we have not had a single death. The boys are now in excellent condition, and all ailments are passing away. The food, clothing, and sanitary arrangements are quite satisfactory.

Cheetham Hill Homes.

Taken all round the general health of these Homes during the past year has been excellent, and the ailments mostly trifling.

Considering the prevalence of epidemic sickness during that time the inmates of the Homes have escaped wonderfully well, and very few infectious cases have occurred. The very severe influenza epidemic left them almost untouched.

At Bethesda there have been several cases of ringworm and a few mild cases of Chicken-pox. Of Scarlet Fever there were three cases all from No. 3 Home and all of them did very well. One case of Diphtheria appeared at No. 8 Home and though a fairly severe one a complete recovery was made.

There have been in addition a few cases of Tonsilitis and one mild case of Whooping Cough. In all, two deaths have taken place during the year, both at Bethesda. The cause of death in each case was "General Tuberculosis" and they were recognised as hopeless cases from the outset.

I think the health of these Homes will compare favourably with that of any similar Institution, and is an index of the care taken of the children by those in charge. The management is all that could be desired and could hardly be improved upon. The children also all look very happy and well cared for.

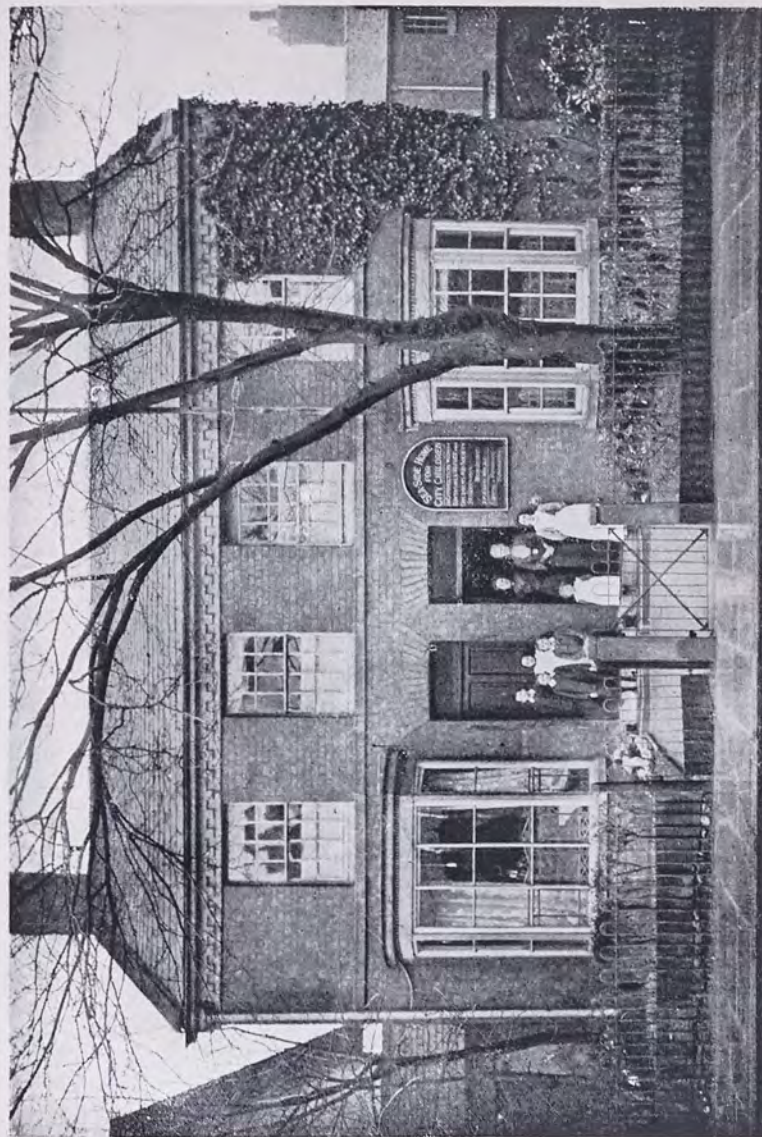

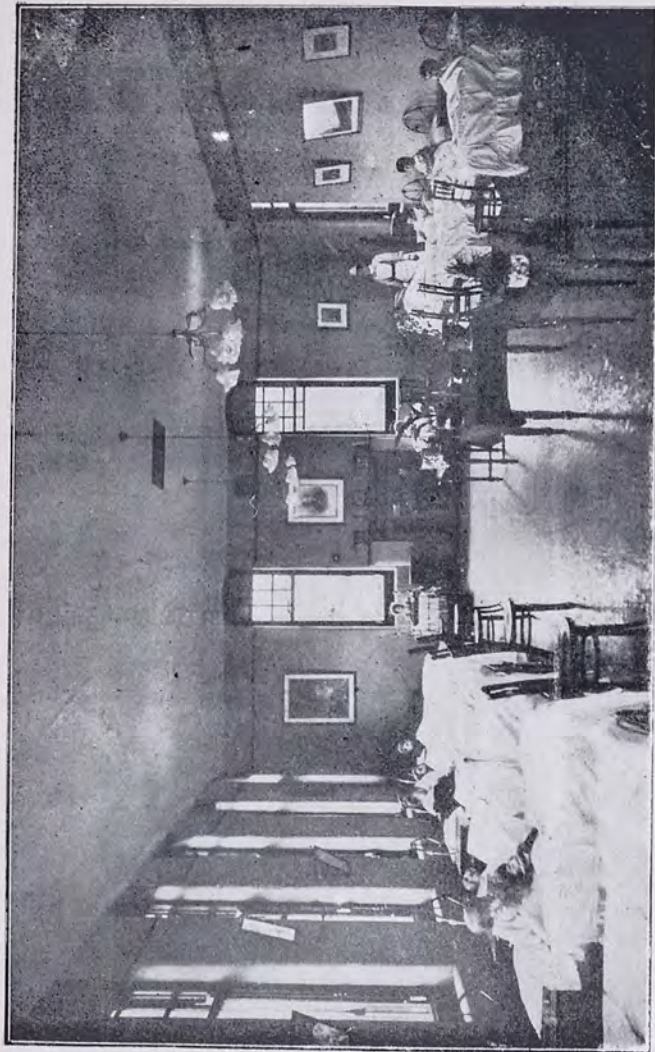
