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Summary of Annual Meeting.

The Thirty-Ninth Annual Meeting of the Manchester and Salford Boys' and Girls' Refuges and Homes, and Children's Aid Society, was held in the Town Hall, Manchester, on Monday, April 26th, 1909, at 3-30 o'clock.

The chair was taken by The Lord Mayor, who was supported by The Very Rev. The Dean of Manchester (Bishop Welldon), Rev. A. Norman Rowland, M.A., W. J. Crossley, Esq., M.P., Vice-Chancellor Hopkinson, E. J. Broadfield, Esq., Councillor Thewlis, Alderman Fildes, J.P., Theodore Crewdson, Esq., J.P., Geo. H. Charlesworth, Esq., W. A. Arnold, Esq., and others.

The Rev. A. Norman Rowland, M.A., offered prayer.

The Annual Report and Balance Sheet were presented. The Hon. Sec., Mr. Thos. R. Ackroyd, gave a summary of the Report, which was taken as read, and also an abstract of the Financial Statement in the absence of the Hon. Treasurer, Mr. H. Charlton.

It was then moved by The Lord Mayor, seconded by Bishop Welldon, supported by W. J. Crossley, Esq., M.P., and resolved:—

"That the Report together with the Financial Statement be adopted, printed and circulated, under the direction of the Committee.

It was also moved by Vice-Chancellor Hopkinson, seconded by Councillor Thewlis, supported by E. J. Broadfield, Esq., and resolved:

"That the Committee for the ensuing year be Messrs. W. J. Crossley, James Boyd, James Fildes, Mrs. L. K. Shaw, Messrs. Arthur Taylor, Harry E. Gaddum, W. C. Dunkerley, Geo. Leader Williams; The Hon. Secretary, Mr. Thomas R. Ackroyd; The Hon. Treasurer, Mr. Henry Charlton; and the Auditors, Messrs. Jones, Crewdson, and Youatt."

A vote of thanks to The Lord Mayor for use of his Parlour, and to the Lady Mayoress for kindly providing hospitality, proposed by Alderman Fildes, and seconded by Theodore Crewdson, Esq., closed the proceedings.

Immediately prior to the above meeting, a special meeting of Subscribers was held, at which resolutions re the Trust as explained by Mr. G. H. Charlesworth, Solicitor, and set out in the circular convening the meeting were passed.

**The Year's
Work.**

A STATEMENT which has for its object an account of a year's work among the sensitive material of young human life may well begin with the admission that it is impossible to convey by the written page one tithe of the facts, and this for the good reason that they soon lead from the surface of mere statistics into the deeps of mind, of morals, and of character. And so, while we speak mainly by figures in the following pages, we would beg our readers to interpret them by the love they bear to their own and other children, and in the light of all the possibilities latent in the young life. It is easy to make the clear, bald statement that a boy was admitted from degrading surroundings on a certain day years ago, lonely, orphaned, friendless; and again that to-day, as a young man he holds a position of trust,

honoured and self-reliant, but what lies between?—the work of the Institution.

A girl comes in the dawn of her maidenhood not “trailing clouds of glory,” but giving evidence of the staining power of the polluted moral atmosphere amid which she has lived; and now see her as wife and mother, mistress of a pretty Canadian farm, loved by her husband, and valued as a worthy member of an enterprising community; what lies between? more than figures can tell or money can value—the work of the Institution.

**Interpreted
by Love.**

We invite then our readers to take this lamp of interpretation—a veritable Aladdin’s lamp to those who use it well—as we glance at the record of the various branches for 1908, the thirty-ninth year of the work. Many of our subscribers and friends know the facts connected with the establishment of the Institution, but it may be of interest to others to restate them briefly.

**Beginning
of the Work.**

It was found in the winter of 1870 that there were children in attendance at the Sunday Ragged Schools, who, after being dismissed on the Sunday evening had neither shelter nor food. They slept in empty houses, in goods yards, in brick-kilns, or in any corner where the policeman’s

lantern was not likely to find them out, and during the day begged for bread. In those early years we knew their haunts, and have found them many a time, after midnight, asleep on a bale of cotton or crouching in some hovel. The need was so dreadful and urgent that when once realised means were taken to at least provide better shelter for the night. The house in Quay Street, shown in the illustration, was rented, a few hammocks slung up, and an open door offered to the poor city waif. As this simple form of help became known it was the means of revealing the appalling condition of poor, destitute children, and so the work grew, until to-day the Institution has fifteen branches with nearly 500 resident children.

**Thirty-Nine
Years.**

During this long period of thirty-nine years, tens of thousands of children have received temporary or permanent help, and testimony comes from all parts of the world from former inmates, gratefully acknowledging the equipment for the battle of life received in the Old Homes at Manchester.

**Voluntary
Support.**

All the work of the Institution during these years has been done without any financial assistance from State or Municipal funds, the whole cost being provided from voluntary sources, and by the earnings of the children of working age. It

would seem to be necessary in the social evolution to better conditions of life, that the voluntary agency should be in the vanguard, demonstrating to the slower apprehension of the State what can be, and ought to be, done for these needy and dependent children. And this is in the natural order, for the voluntary effort is the outcome of love and sympathy, while that of the State is largely based on expediency and self-interest.

**Foundation
Principles.**

Though many of our friends are quite familiar with the foundation principles of our work, as expressed in the Trust Deed, it is well for the sake of those who read our Report

for the first time that we should restate them here.

To receive Homeless and Destitute Children found in Manchester and Salford and District.

To give immediate admission to such without distinction of Creed.

To provide such with suitable food, clothing, and Industrial training.

To educate such in Christian principles based on the Bible only.

For children and young people up to sixteen years of age without friends, our doors are wide open day and night, for as an Institution we hold ourselves responsible that no destitute child in our city need be without food and shelter. These are not the difficult cases to decide, but rather those children who have relations

and homes, and are yet suffering from poverty and hunger. Between the responsibility of relieving the parents and the wish to help the little child in distress, we are often in a quandary as to what we ought to do.

**Advocacy through
many Years.**

As a Society we claim to have been with others in the front rank of the fight for the common rights of friendless, necessitous children, not only receiving such into the shelter of Christian Homes with all that that implies, but time after time since 1870 through municipal and parliamentary channels, as well as by means of the press, focussing upon public attention the lamentable condition of these neglected children.

The evils of street hawking and casual labour for young children; the protection of children from cruel parents and the limitation of parental rights so widely abused; the giving to Magistrates discretionary powers not to convict for a first offence; the establishment of separate Courts for the trial of children; their committal to Homes and not to gaol during remand; their protection from association with the drink traffic; the necessity for continuation schools; the importance of removing children from influence of degraded relatives by emigration or otherwise; these reforms so necessary in the interests of the children have been advocated in these annual statements, in our monthly magazine, and at public meetings, year after year.

**Rights
not Privileges.**

No one could be long in the active administration of the work of the Institution without realizing the urgent necessity of these reforms and the duty of advocating them. They were in no degree privileges to be granted but common rights to be secured for those unable to enforce their claim to an ordinary chance in the throng of human life. As we read them we give ready assent to the justice and necessity of their being enacted, and yet how slowly does public opinion in our land formulate itself to the point of legislative action even in a case of such imperative need.

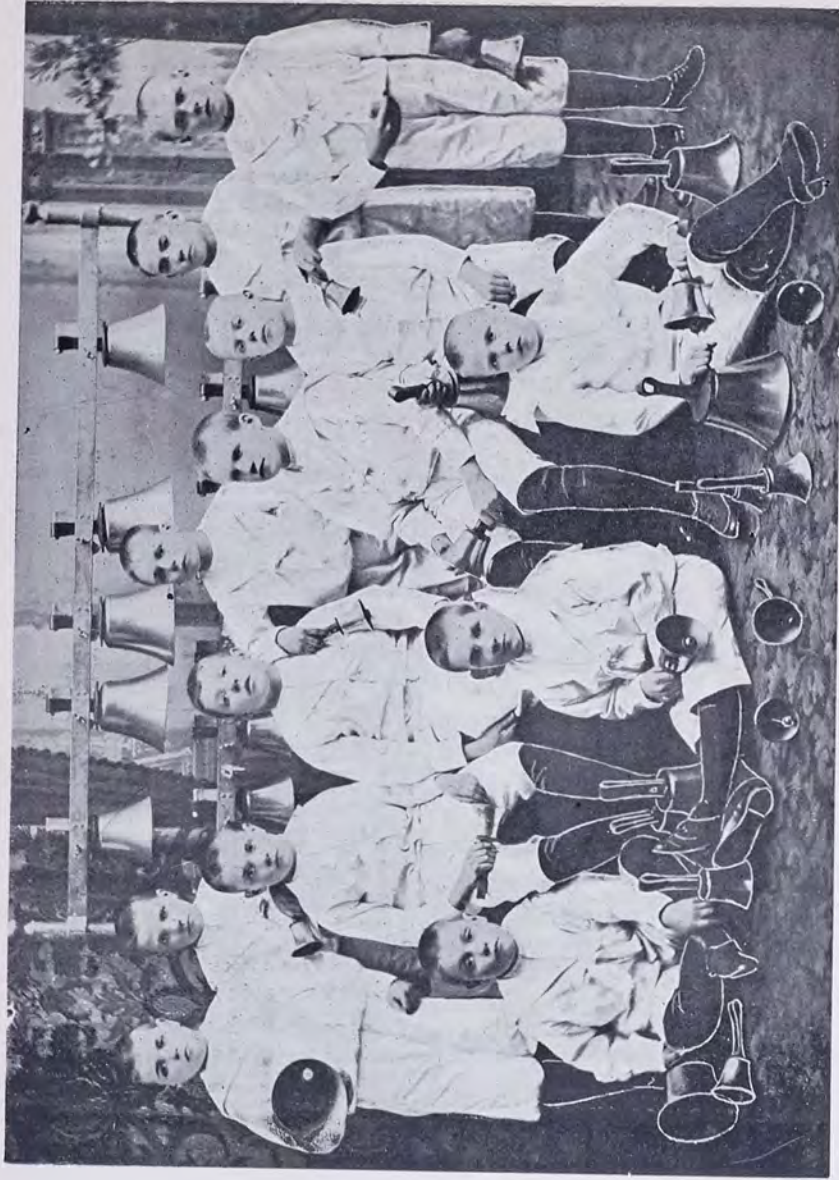
Something has been gained, however, through the years, especially in the matter of street trading by poor children, but we rejoice to think that the battle on their behalf has been pushed to the gate in many respects during the last parliamentary session.

**Children
Act.**

The Children Bill, which has been piloted through the House of Commons with so much skill and tactful enthusiasm by the Right Hon. H. L. Samuel is a welcome piece of legislation not only to those interested in poor children for their own sake, but to all who realize that the true prosperity of the nation is vitally involved in this question of caring for its child-life.

**Government
Inspection.**

We do not need, of course, to recapitulate here the various provisions of the Act but we may in a word refer to certain features which have a special interest to us as an Institution.

In part two it is enacted that the Secretary of State may cause any institution for the reception of poor children or young persons supported wholly or partly by voluntary contributions, and not liable to be inspected by or under the authority of any Government department, to be visited and inspected from time to time by persons appointed by him for the purpose. This is a wise provision in view of the unscrupulous exploitation of poor children by some persons for their own benefit.

Another commendable feature from our stand-point is the increased legal responsibility which is put upon the parents in respect to the wrong doing of their children; it is they surely who should be proceeded against when a child is found begging or exposed to its peril on the streets, and not the child.

The establishment of separate courts for the trial of children's cases is now made compulsory. Previous to the passing of the Act many local authorities, including our own city, had voluntarily established such courts.

From our experience of its necessity we appreciate very fully the value of the Act and are convinced it will, when fully administered, be very beneficent in its effect alike on poor children and on the Community.

**Voluntary and
State Effort.**

There will, however, always be a place for the voluntary effort even when the State organisation is much nearer perfection than it is to-day, if for no other reason than that it informs and leads the nation's conscience in respect to its duty towards those who are the victims of poverty, sickness, or immoral environment. The glory which made the Victorian era so resplendent a page in our national history, was connected with more than the achievements in science and literature and art. The theories of philanthropy became realities in the acts and lives of some enthusiastic humanitarians, and leading the way in voluntary efforts for the amelioration of the conditions of the poor and degraded, they set an example which has resulted in many social reforms being embodied in laws of State.

**Value as a Local
Institution.**

May we take this opportunity of emphasising the fact that we are a local Institution established for the direct and immediate benefit of destitute children in Manchester and Salford and District. We are not national in the sense of receiving such children from any part of the country (though for exceptional reasons we have occasionally done so) nor do we appeal for help to distant counties. This is not the case with many large towns for they are dependent for help for their homeless children on national societies,

There will, however, always be a place for the voluntary effort even when the State organisation is much nearer perfection than it is to-day, if for no other reason than that it informs and

centred in the metropolis. Many of our citizens do not realise how complete an organisation is in their midst for the purpose and how that the city has value and honour in the fact. If they did we are sure a spirit of local patriotism would lead them to help us on the principle that charity begins at home though we would not for a moment suggest that it should end there.

**Extent
of the Work.**

The Institution now comprises 16 distinct branches, each of which is in active operation on behalf of poor, needy, and suffering humanity. The following list shewing the numbers dealt with

during the year will convey some idea of the extent of the work, and in addition to these figures there has been a very large number of applications for temporary help and advice both of which have been freely and gladly given.

By means of these 16 branches, omitting the Prison Gate Mission which deals chiefly with adults, no fewer than 4816 boys and girls have during the year received the help their varied cases required.

**Those
Admitted.**

The number of admitted ones has been 360, and these, added to the 429 in the various homes at the beginning of the year, make a total of 789 under care and training during the twelve months. Most of these cases were full of the deepest interest, and as we listened to the sad stories of suffering and sin, and sought to help these needy ones, we were thankful for the existence of such an Institution as ours.

Applications.**

These number 587 boys and 153 girls, making a total of 740. As regards parentage it will be interesting to record that 369 had lost one or both parents while 371 had a father and

mother living somewhere. Most of these children, who were so greatly in need of our help, were from Manchester and the district.

Headquarters of the Work.

The Central Refuge and Home in Strangeways is the headquarters of the work, and all applications are first dealt with here. As each story of need is told it is sympathetically and patiently listened to, and all the particulars are carefully noted. If apparently homeless and destitute the children are immediately admitted and all necessary investigation takes place afterwards. After such enquiry the boy or girl is placed in the Home most suitable for their age and their special circumstances, or if need be they are restored to friends or relatives. It is at these headquarters that the Committee regularly meet to direct and control all the work of the large organization.

The Workshops.

Work has always been a feature of the Institution, and from the earliest days the motto "We help those who try to help themselves" has always been kept prominently before the minds of all the children. There are five workshops, *i.e.*, **Letterpress-Printing, Carpentry, Shoemaking, Tailoring, Firewood-making**, and they have been kept busy throughout the year. Each shop has its own fully qualified foreman, and they are all conducted on a sound

business basis. The boys, on the completion of their apprenticeship, find no difficulty in obtaining situations in their own particular trade, and some of the lads who received their early training in these shops are now in business on their own account and doing well.

A very gratifying feature in connection with these workshops and one we have great pleasure in recording is the fact that after charging every proper expense, with the exception of a rent charge, to each department and paying boys' and foremen's wages there is a nett profit of £454 10s. 2d. This has been placed to the credit of the Institution.

**Working Youths'
Home & Institute.**

This is a very important Branch of our work, and is situated in Strangeways. It is occupied chiefly by the elder boys who have passed through the Refuge and are now engaged in various occupations in our own workshops or elsewhere in the city. It is really a well appointed Young Men's Home and each member has full board, a separate cubicle, use of sitting room, reading room, baths, gymnasium, etc., and all these are provided for the small payment of ten shillings per week.

Youths are also admitted, who, coming from the country to situations in our city, are almost friendless here and whose small wages often compel them to dwell in uncomfortable and undesirable lodgings. The value of this Branch is found in the opportunity which it affords the Committee of keeping in touch with many of the old

boys, and one of the most enjoyable parties during the year is the Annual Reunion of former residents who gather with their wives and little ones.

**Street Boys'
Home.**

This particular Home is set apart for, among others, little boys found destitute upon the streets. All its inmates are of school age and are cared for here till old enough to be transferred to the Central Refuge and the workshops.

**The Boys'
Emigration Home.**

Here, the boys who are likely to go some day to Canada are housed and trained. We admit that the training they receive at this Home is of a very limited character, for in a great city like ours it is very difficult to fit them for a life on the farmsteads away in Ontario.

Whilst this Home in Strangeways is necessary and useful, what we need for this special Branch of our work is some farm house in the country where all our children intended for Canada could be carefully trained beforehand. Another useful purpose such a Home in the country would serve, would be the providing of a kind of labour colony for some of the bigger boys who come to us from the streets. How to deal with these youths is often a difficult problem but one solution we believe is to place them on some farm in the country

and provide them with wholesome out-door occupation and recreation. We are still hoping that some day we may be in possession of such a Home.

This Home, as well as the Refuge and our Rosen Hallas Girls' Home at Cheetham Hill, is certified by the Local Government Board for the reception of children from the Poor Law Unions. Each year we take a number of boys and girls from Boards of Guardians and they are emigrated with our own children to Canada.

The number of boys emigrated last year was 20, some of whom came to us from the Chorlton Board of Guardians.

**The Ever-open
Door.**

This is the Children's Shelter which is situated at No. 1, Chatham Street, Piccadilly, and its door ever since it was opened, 25 years ago, has never been shut night nor day. Prob-

ably no Branch of our work is more useful or more important than this and we are constantly realizing the need and the blessing of such a place of safety for wandering, lost, or homeless children and for friendless and destitute girls up to 18 years of age. During the year 475 boys and girls of all ages have been received and of this number 175 were brought by the police and others between 10 p.m. and 4 a.m.

It is here, too, that all the young prisoners, who are remanded to us from the Courts for a period, are received, and we are glad that the magistrates have so very largely made use of our Institution in this respect.

**Cheetham Hill
Orphanages
and Homes.**

These special Homes, which form so important a part of our work, have been fully occupied during the twelve months. We would first mention the Orphanages in George Street,

each of which is named after the donors as follows :

- No. 2—The Langworthy Home for girls.
- No. 4—The Garnett Home for boys.
- No. 6—The Crossley Home for boys.
- No. 8—The Higgins Home for Motherless Children.
- No. 10—The Atkinson Home for boys.
- No. 12—The Schoolgirls' Home for girls.

Each Home contains 16 to 20 children, a "mother" and a helper and a true natural family life is lived. All the children at Cheetham Hill, as at Strangeways, attend the ordinary day school in the neighbourhood and none of them wear any distinctive uniform.

**The Elder Girls'
Training Home
and Laundry,
Rosen Hallas.**

It is here that the homeless and destitute girls rescued from dangerous surroundings are dealt with. Each of them receives a thorough training for domestic service and the laundry work for the Cheetham Hill Homes is also done by the girls in this Home. All the inmates have been taken from sad surroundings and many of them were found in grave moral danger. This work, so difficult in its peculiar character, needs much patience, prayer, and faith, but we have cause for much rejoicing in the blessed results obtained in the after life and

character of so many of the elder girls. We are thankful to know of those who have been saved for time and eternity through the agency of this Branch of our work.

As in former years, a party of girls from this Home were emigrated in the spring to Canada and on May 14th left for their new life in Ontario. We would here take the opportunity of once more making it clear to our subscribers that the children, and especially in the case of girls, sent to Canada are only those whose early surroundings are such that if they remained in Manchester they would be exposed to great temptation and dangerous risks.

On their arrival at the Marchmont Home, Belleville, which for many years has been under the care of Rev. Robert Wallace and his wife, the children are placed in excellent farm homes, and in nearly every case the most satisfactory results have followed.

It may be interesting to our readers if we give copies of the following letters out of very many similar ones recently received from those young emigrants who were only a short time ago living in the slums of our great city and rescued from vicious surroundings.

"Thank you for the pretty card you sent me. How are you all keeping that side of the Atlantic. My, but it seems a long way. I would like to be on my way to see you instead of writing, but I intend to come and see you all some day. You will see I have changed my address. I am more in the city now than I was before. There are only two in the family (one a lady 75 although she doesn't look it), and a girl of 16 who goes to High school. We have good times in the evenings. We either sew, knit, or read, and sometimes Bessie and I are doing a little study. I have also taken up Bible study so you see my evenings are pretty well taken up. When I had done my ironing last week Mrs. Dudley said they are a credit to somebody's teaching so I am glad I was in the Laundry at Rosen Hallas. It may seem hard while you are there but it is of great use to you afterwards. So if I can't be a Missionary at least I shall be able to be something. Love to all." M.D.

"I received your kind and welcome letter and was so glad to hear from you. I am getting on fine. We have 28 cows and a lot of hens. It is fine out here. I wish I could send you some in a letter, but you might come out here with some of your girls and then I can give you some. Will you please give me your photo. I will send mine in summer for it is so cold out here I cannot go out only to the cowshed. Me and my mistress are going to have it taken together so please send me one. I will have to say good bye for I have to get supper ready. Good night and God bless you all." T.T.

"I often think of you but don't very often write. It is not very cold now here. It has been all buggy rides this winter, there has been no snow for sleighing. There is going to be an entertainment at our Church on Wednesday. I am going to sing, and our Choir leader says I am sure to get an encore. How are all the girls. Give my love to them. We have another little baby, he is a dear little thing. We call him Harold. I got a lot of Xmas presents. Mrs. Barrowclough gave me four shillings. I also got a letter from Mr. Ackroyd and Mr. Wallace. Our Church and the people are all working for local option. I hope they win for in the cities the distress through drink is fierce. It is late and hoping to hear from you soon." M.R.

**The Home for

This house, though only small, supplies a very real need. It stands in the grounds of Rosen Hallas and it is here that the weak and delicate children belonging to our large family at

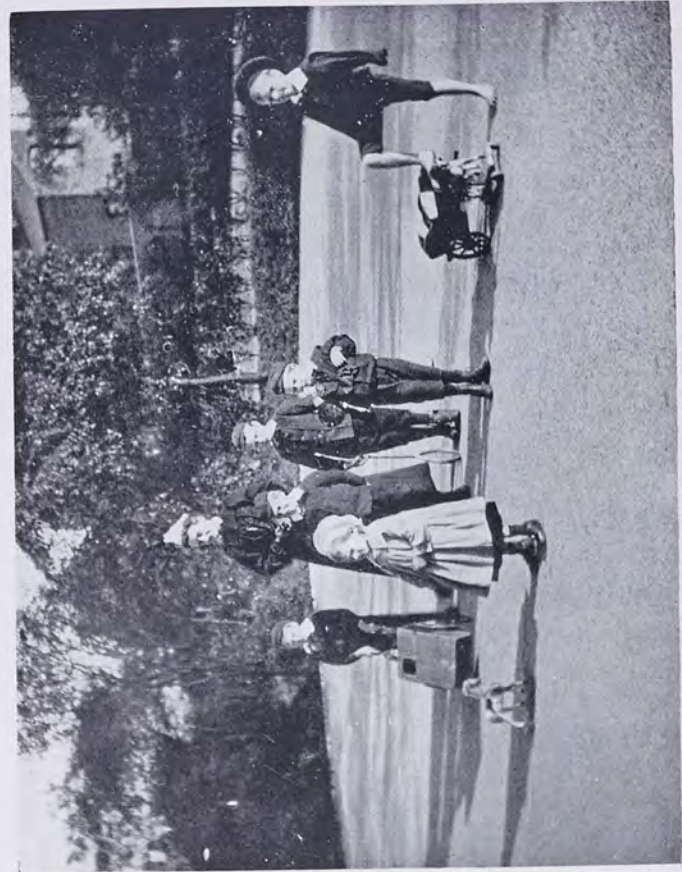

for Life.**

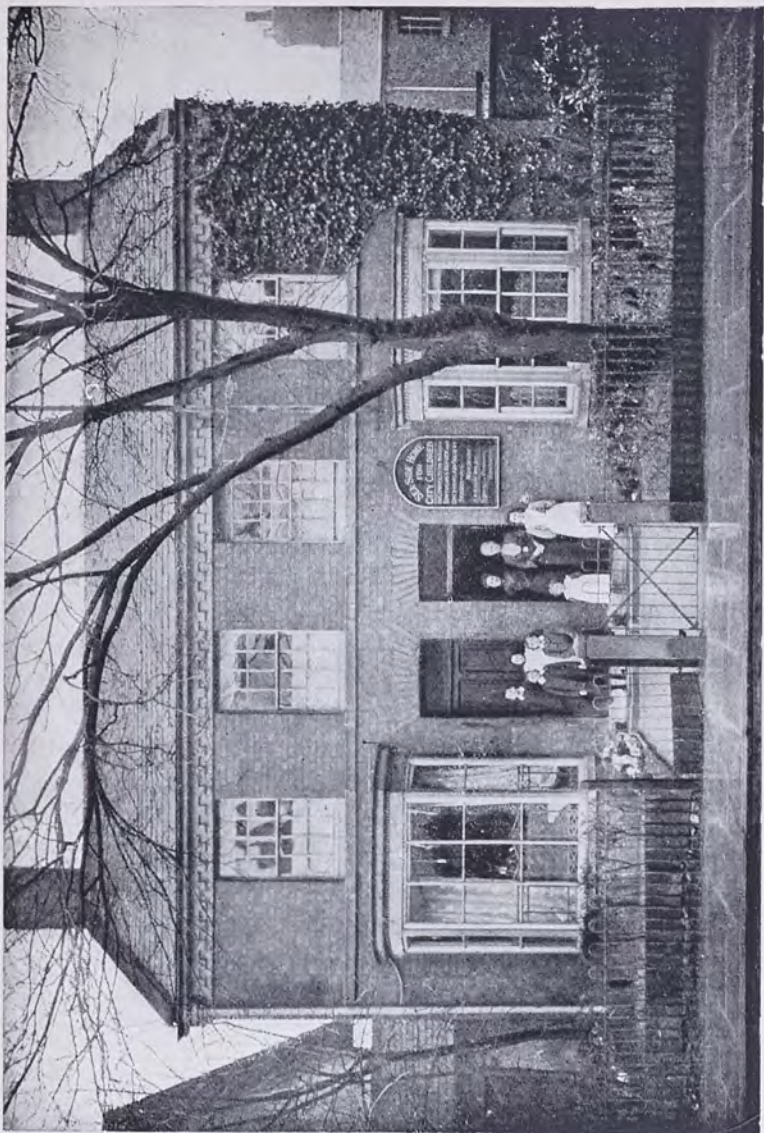
Among the sad aspects of human life there are few perhaps more pathetic than that of the little child for whom there is little or no hope of ever being active and well. Lying week after week and year after year helpless with spine or hip disease the little life seems blighted and useless. Add to this the conditions of extreme poverty—scanty food and clothing, the winter cold and summer heat endured in a crowded house of two small rooms in a city slum, cleanliness impossible, little relief from the pain and weariness, and perhaps a drunken mother completes the dreadful environment.

The Bethesda Home receives such and is indeed to these weary little souls a "House of Mercy." Some of them say it is heaven and their thought is not far wrong, for the care and comfort and cleanliness with nourishing food and constant attention from doctor and nurses, to say nothing of books and toys, is such a contrast to former conditions that if they are not to call it heaven a new and adequate word will have to be coined.

We have had 86 inmates during the year and the sum of happiness resulting from the change of conditions for these little afflicted ones is inexpressible. Several of the less afflicted cases have been greatly benefited

and some quite cured. Others have had the comforts and benefits of the home for a few months ere they passed from the pain and limitation of their earthly life to the Homeland of which they had heard for the first time, perhaps, under this roof.

The object of the Home is thus defined :—

To provide for crippled, maimed, paralysed, and generally incurable poor children—boys up to the age of ten, girls up to the age of fourteen—whose cases are unsuitable for the ordinary hospitals.

Several of the 70 cots here are endowed, some in memory of loved ones. £600 is the cost of endowment and the Committee earnestly appeal for gifts of this sum for the purpose of providing in perpetuity for a cripple or incurable child. In a few cases the yearly amount necessary for the maintenance of a cot is provided by friends and we shall be glad to receive from any of our readers an annual gift of £20 for the support of a bed.

**Sea-Side Home,
Lytham.**

This branch of the work has been in existence for 26 years and it serves a very blessed purpose. It is used as a home of rest for the weak and delicate children of the poorer parts of our city who are in need of change of air and good food. The home is open all the year round and many workers in the slums of Manchester and Salford find it invaluable to the delicate and pale-faced little ones who are often in sore need of two or three weeks

at the sea-side. This home is specially for little boys and for girls up to 16 years of age.

**Summer Camp for
Poor City Boys.**

We take a pardonable pride in having been the pioneers in this country to organize holidays for poor children, and for the last 23 years we have provided a week's holiday during the summer months for poor city lads.

The Camp, which is at Birkdale, Southport, has again had a most successful season, and from May to September 3,113 boys spent a delightful seven days in the tents pitched by the sea-shore. This department of the Refuge work has always been most popular and we are very grateful for the special interest and support of so many of our friends. We have been very glad this year to take a number of poor boys from Stockport, Burnley, and Bury, the friends of these towns paying all the expenses of their own lads. The sub-committee who have the management of this special branch have again rendered magnificent service and we would here place on record our grateful appreciation of their devotion and loyalty to this work.

**Messenger, Parcel,
and Shoeblick
Brigades.**

Through this department 195 boys have been found employment during the year. It exists for the purpose of saving lads, who, having passed school age and desirous of securing work, are in danger of drifting on to the streets unless some

useful occupation is secured for them. We do not hesitate to state that it is serving a real need and we are glad to know that it continues to receive the sympathetic recognition of the public and the authorities of the city.

A most gratifying feature in connection with the Brigade is the fact that 47 have been passed on to permanent situations. We would again remind our subscribers that the boys helped by this agency are not those in residence in any of our Homes, they are all outside lads and in very many cases are the sons of poor respectable widows who are sorely in need of the help which they are able to receive by the earnings of their boys.

**At the
Prison Gate.**

The Prison Gate Mission under the care of our own staff and assisted by a Deaconess from the City Mission and other friends, has continued its Christ-like work. Every morn-

ing at 7 o'clock the devoted workers have stood at the doors of Strangeways Gaol and with a word of welcome have invited the discharged prisoners to a simple breakfast provided at our Mission Hall. Out of a total of 13,467 met at the gate during the year 9842—6919 men and youths, 2923 women and girls—accepted this invitation.

During the simple meal, which is so greatly enjoyed by these unfortunate people, a few earnest, helpful words are spoken and special cases of need are

at once relieved. Last year 1,175 voluntarily signed the total abstinence pledge. Our workers are often very much cheered by the happy results of their work but the final harvest of their seed sowing, which requires much faith and patience, will only be known in the day of "His appearing."

**Help at the
Police Courts.**

The Police Court Mission to lads and girls, involving the attendance of our representatives at the Courts of our city, has continued its most useful work. Our officers had 163 cases referred to them by the Bench—nearly all of which were first offenders—and we are glad to have the assurance of the magistrates that the assistance of our workers has been a very real help to them and is much appreciated by the Bench.

**Probation
Officers.**

Under the Probation of Offenders' Act 1907, Magistrates are empowered to appoint probation officers in connection with the respective Police Courts whose duties are, on the instructions of the Magistrate, to exercise a kindly oversight in the case of offenders who are put on probation. Two of our officers who attend the City and County Police Courts in connection with our Police Court Mission to boys and girls have been appointed Probation Officers for youths under sixteen.

During the year at the City Police Court thirteen youths have been put on probation and have been, according to rule, visited once a week for the first month and twice a month afterwards by the Probation Officer. He reports that ten of these have done well and recovered their character, three had to be brought again before the magistrates.

Our experience is, that this is a kind and salutary method of dealing with these young offenders and we think more use might be made of the Act in their interests. So much is gained if their self-respect is preserved or recovered by a sympathetic supervision during the critical period which follows their first appearance before the magistrate.

**Boy
Labour.**

The question of boy labour is another aspect of the social movement which seeks better conditions for the masses of the people, and the hope of its satisfactory solution lies in the fact that the nation is slowly realising in this as in other matters the importance to the State of healthy, intelligent, self-respecting citizens.

In this connection we owe a word of explanation seeing we employ a hundred boys in the Messenger and Shoeblock Brigades.

We agree that it is a social evil and a rank injustice to the boy that he should be practically shut up

during the important years following school to employment, that is casual, uneducative, and that leaves him as a young man stranded, untrained, one among the crowd of unemployables. Apprenticeships seem to have become almost extinct and the boy is exploited for his labour in those precious years when he should be in training for some handicraft or business. The Government with their telegraph message boys are among the greatest offenders. And we admit this applies largely to the boys in our Brigades, but what do we find is the present actual position of these poor lads we are endeavouring to help.

They are poor boys who have passed the school age of 14, or otherwise have received a certificate of exemption from school attendance, living with their parents or other relations. Being allowed under the present state of the law to seek employment they do so. At the best, the work they obtain is casual, and often work is not obtainable at all, with the result that they drift on to the streets, earning what they can by selling papers, &c., at all hours. It was this fact years ago that suggested our organising these poor lads in the brigades named. They are under supervision, uniform cap and jacket are provided, a minimum wage of 5/- per week is assured, and best of all they are drafted to more permanent situations as opportunity serves—47 were so placed during the past year.

So, in the meantime, until some remedy is applied, we must give a helping hand to those, who, under the

present conditions are the most heavily handicapped. Of course the proposed remedies of increasing the school age, abolition of the half-time system under 14, compulsory technical training schools, absolute prohibition of street trading under 17 years of age, &c., involve much in boy labour circles but the problem will sooner or later have to be faced in the interests of the nation.

New Children's Shelter.

AN APPEAL.

It is with much satisfaction that we look back on the work done at our Children's Shelter in the city during the last 24 years. For nearly a quarter of a century the door has stood open day and night offering a warm welcome to the poor child in distress—lost, neglected, cruelly ill-treated,—the wayward wanderer, the juvenile prisoner while on remand, the young girl stranded in a strange city. It has been a veritable children's haven for our city all these years, for to the end of last year 9355 young lives have been sheltered and dealt with since its establishment.

On the average every day sees a child, needy in one form or another, brought beneath its roof for protection, for guidance, for restoration, or for permanent help. Our city policemen value it as a place to which they can take at any hour of the day or night the deserted child, the erring

boy, or the girl exposed to the peril of the streets, and it must be a satisfaction to every thoughtful citizen to know that whatever may be the case with men and women, no child need be exposed during the night and without shelter and food.

It would be impossible to describe the variety of cases received here not only in respect to the circumstances which we have to some extent indicated but in regard to the condition of the children. Some have been at the point of death through ill-treatment and neglect, others have borne evidence of blows and even burns by brutal parents, and hundreds have been received in a condition of filth which has necessitated the destruction of every thread of clothing and an immediate bath, often at midnight, before they were fit to occupy one of the beds.

We have now, however, come to a crisis in the location of this important branch of our work, for the present building in Chatham Street, as shown on another page, is to be pulled down and we have notice to quit in March, 1909. The Messenger and Shoeblick Brigades are also involved as they occupy the basement and ground floor of same premises. The question has been a matter of some anxiety and much consideration, for the Committee felt it was most desirable to retain the Shelter in the neighbourhood where it had been for so long a period. Diligent search was made for suitable premises without success.

Then came the offer of the owners of the present site to sell a portion of the land in Chatham Street

adjoining the building we now occupy and it was ultimately decided in view of all the circumstances to secure this plot and erect a new building. This will enable us to have premises much more suitably adapted for the work carried on than those under the old conditions.

This, of course, involves a large expenditure, probably

Eight Thousand Pounds,

but the Committee are convinced it is, in view of the future, the wisest course for it gives a permanent position, much more convenience, and saves a heavy rent charge.

We are glad to announce that we are able to apply the legacy of £2,000 under the will of the late Mrs. Rylands to this object and that other contributions bring the amount at the time we write to over £4,000.

We earnestly appeal for special and generous contributions towards this urgent and important scheme, not only in the interests of these poor defenceless children but in those of the community itself for the well-being of the commonwealth depends in the last instance on the well-being of its members.

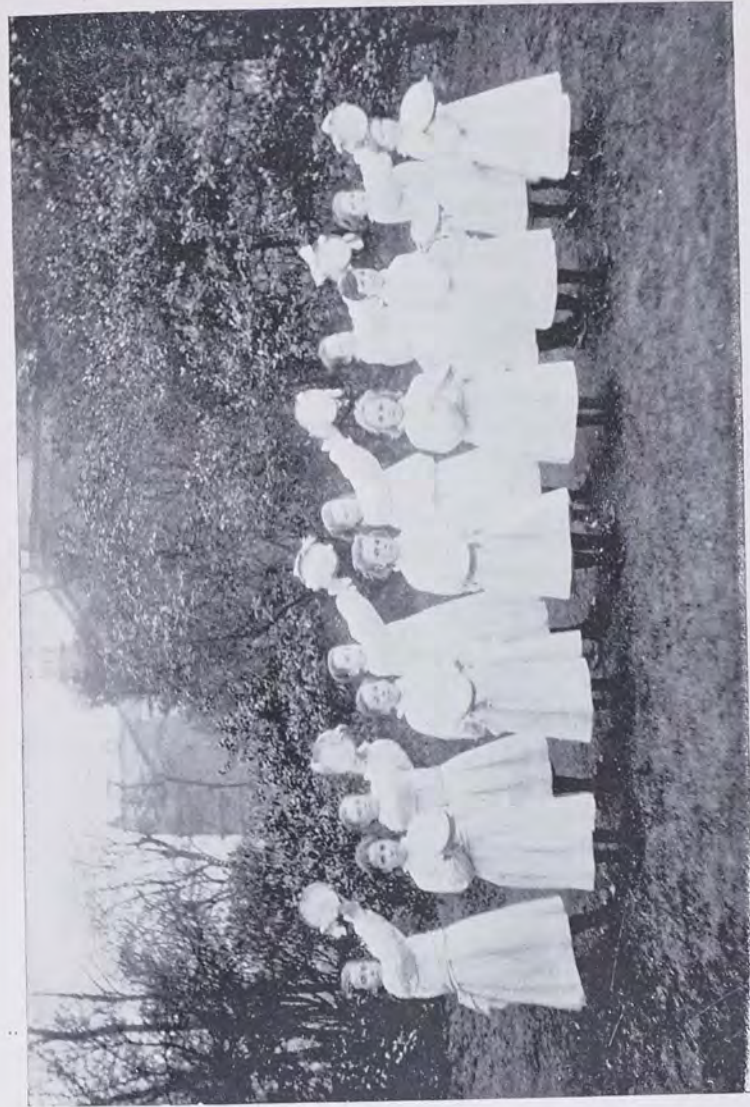
Finances.

In a year of much trade depression it is with deep gratitude that we report the ordinary income to be but little below the average. The income from special donations and legacies has been more than usual. This is specially gratifying in view of the fact that we commenced the year with a deficit of £1446. We have been able to reduce this to £251, and to place the legacy of £2,000, received under the will of the late Mrs. Rylands, to the new Shelter Fund as referred to on previous page. A cot at Bethesda has been endowed during the year by an old friend at a cost of £600.

The total expenditure for the year, covering all the various operations of the Charity, as shewn in the full financial statement, was £14,601 9s. 1d. Towards this amount, the sum of £2,981 4s. 1d. represents the contribution of the young people of working age in the various Homes, being their earnings and the profits on their work in the various trading departments. And we may say that the work has been done under reasonable and healthy conditions, having in mind the training of the boy or girl as well as the efficiency of each department.

In addition to this many of the old boys and girls send contributions as thankofferings for the benefits received in years gone by.

The annual amount required from voluntary contributions to cover the expenditure of the whole

Institution is about £10,000. We should much esteem the help of any friend in our effort to increase the number of subscribers.

**Dr.
Boutflower.**

As an Institution we are fortunate in the staff of Honorary Medical Officers who kindly place their skill and experience at the call of the Committee for the good of the children, and we cannot too warmly acknowledge our indebtedness.

Our senior Medical Officer, Dr. Boutflower, whose portrait we are presuming to place as the frontispiece of this report, has served the Strangeways group of Homes for thirty-eight years, during which time he has visited the Homes twice a week, passing all admitted cases, and generally superintending the health of the inmates. In addition he has given immediate and unremitting attention to all sick cases, and has secured for us for many years the prompt admission of serious cases to the Salford Royal Hospital, where doctors and nurses alike have been most attentive and kind.

Perhaps in the whole round of officers necessary in so large a work for poor children, there is none—not even the matron-mothers—so popular as the good doctor, at any rate among the boys. It is natural for a boy to make a hero of his doctor, who has such wonderful power of re-setting the broken limb, and dealing effectually with mysterious pains.

Dr. Boutflower can never hope to be repaid for his long and devoted services, except it be by the happy consciousness that all these years he has given of his best for the poorest.

**Closing
Words.**

In sending forth this report of our thirty-ninth year's work amongst the poorest and most needy of the children of our city and district, the Committee would commend it to the thoughtful reading of all those who have so liberally and loyally supported the Institution. We have looked upon our work not only as a Christian duty but as a distinct privilege and a great joy. In this, many voluntary workers have shared, and we would place on record our indebtedness to them for all their devoted services. We would assure them that their help has been simply invaluable, and we would here tender to them our heartfelt thanks.

We would not forget to make recognition of the devotion and loyalty also of the members of our large staff. All their work has been characterised by thoroughness and earnestness, and the Committee desire to acknowledge in every way possible, that the conscientious discharge of their various duties by the masters, matrons, and all the officials has greatly helped to make the work of the year so successful.

Our last word shall be one of praise to our Divine Lord and Master. It is for Him and His children we have laboured

and throughout the year His benediction has been ours. At His command we continue to carry on the work, and "in His name" and in full reliance upon His strength, we cheerfully enter upon a fresh year of service.

We would assure all our Collectors, the Teachers of the Sunday and week evening classes, the members of Working Parties, and all those who took part in the Annual Sale of Work, that their interest in the Institution and the practical help they have rendered are highly appreciated by the Committee and are thankfully acknowledged.

To all who in any way, either by gifts, active service, loving interest, prayerful sympathy, have contributed to the success of another year's work, the Committee, in sending forth this report, tender their heartfelt thanks.

MEDICAL REPORTS.

Strangeways Homes.

Last year, in my annual report, I was unable to give a satisfactory account of the health of the inmates (owing chiefly to climatic conditions) such as I had been glad to record for the previous three or four years. This year I am happy to report that we have quite returned to our former normal conditions, and I have to record a year free from all severe or serious disease. And although I have to mention the fact of two deaths having occurred, one at the Institute and the other belonging to the Refuge, they were both cases of advanced Consumption when admitted, as they were, entirely from humanitarian considerations. Otherwise our complaints have been of the mildest description. Everything, so far as my observation has gone, has been extremely satisfactory in all the Strangeways Homes.

Cheetham Hill Homes

The general health of the inmates of these Homes continues to be satisfactory. Of Infectious diseases there have been 10 cases. These included seven cases of Measles, four at Bethesda and three at No. 10. All of them did well, and it is very gratifying that having gained entrance to Bethesda it was limited to four cases. The other infectious cases were two cases of Chicken-pox and one of Mumps. We were troubled for some time at Bethesda with an epidemic of Septic sore throat. No fewer than 18 cases occurred. This I think must have been due to inadequate drainage. When a heavy fall of rain took place, the drains were unable to carry off the water, causing a little flooding on each occasion. When this was put right the sore throats disappeared.

The other ailments we had to deal with were, as a rule trifling. Four girls and one boy were dealt with for enlarged Tonsils and Adenoids. Only two Accidents took place. One, a boy in No. 4 got a bad gash on the thigh, and a girl in No. 2 got badly scalded feet. Both did well.

Four deaths took place during the year, all at Bethesda. Three were due to Tubercular disease, and one to Heart Disease. The management of the Homes still continues to be exemplary and leaves nothing to be desired. The children seem to appreciate what is being done for them by those in charge, and they seem very contented and happy.

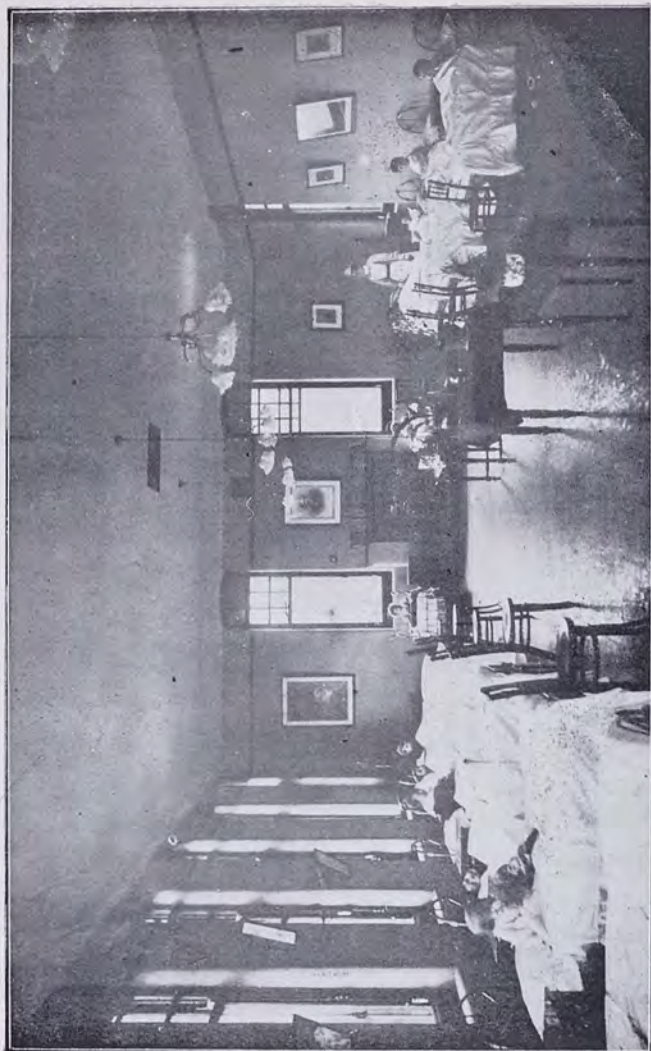

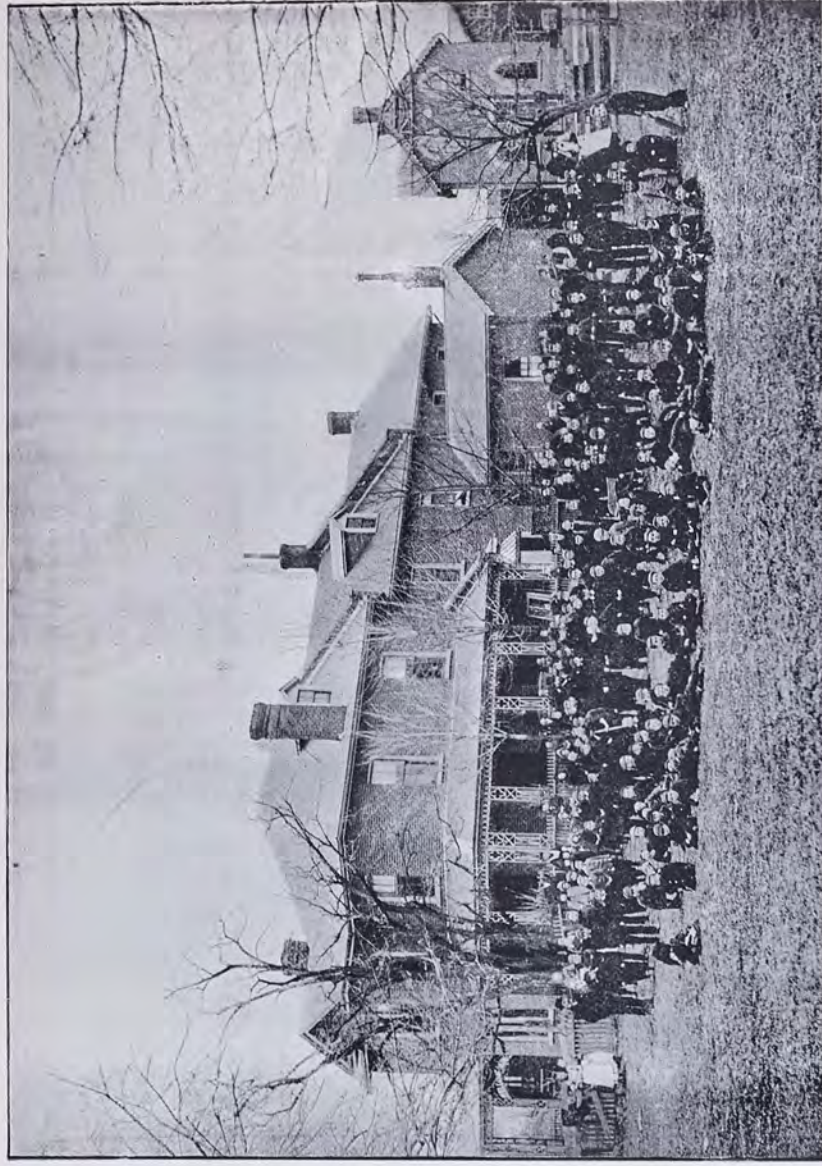

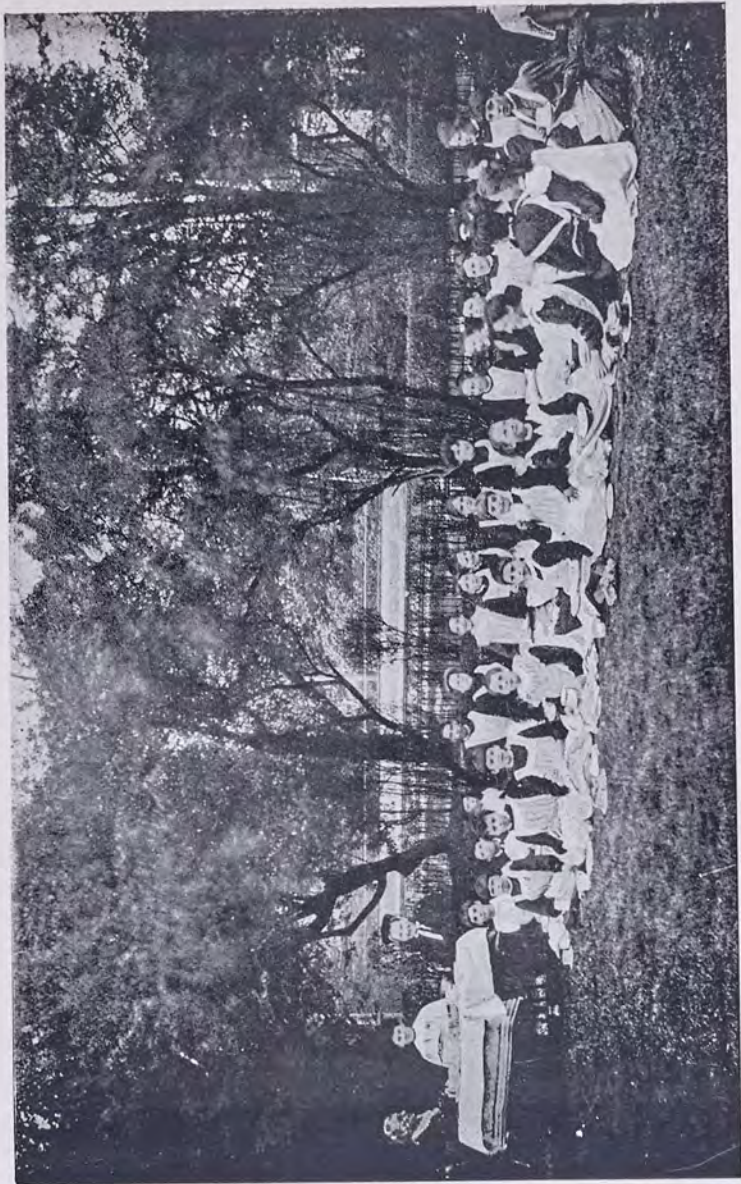
