School Safeguarding: Peer on Peer Abuse

Every month in school, we look at a different area of safeguarding in our staff training. This month the spotlight is on 'peer on peer abuse', and we also thought it would be useful to share this information with parents and carers.

Peer on peer abuse occurs when there is any kind of physical, sexual, emotional or financial abuse or coercive control exercised between children both on and offline. It is essential that adults understand the importance of challenging inappropriate behaviours between children/young people.

Downplaying certain behaviours, for example dismissing sexual harassment as "just banter", "just having a laugh", "part of growing up" or "boys being boys"; or not recognising that emotional bullying can sometimes be more damaging than physical harm and should be taken equally seriously, can lead to a culture of unacceptable behaviours, an unsafe environment for children and in worst case scenarios a culture that normalises abuse leading to children and young people accepting it as normal and not coming forward to report it.

Stopping harm and ensuring immediate safety is the first priority of a school,

and here at Inscape we have a robust policy and procedures for tackling peer on peer abuse.

The students raised £30. Great work everyone!!






Everyone's game
