
An <u>update</u> from Animal Assisted Intervention (AAI)

He has also been commissioned by the BBC on several occasions and even popped up on The One Show.

His enthusiasm for the spoken and written word, as well as his previous victories in Slam Poetry competitions ensure he is able to excite even the most reluctant reader about poetry.

A trip to ESTC Centre Liverpool

On the 22nd of January 2024 we travelled to the Emergency Services Training Centre in Birkenhead which is across the river from Liverpool. We were invited to do very exciting activities including putting out gas fires. The centre itself was a firefighters paradise, in fact it works with doctors and police officer training as well!

I got to try on the firefighters outfit and then choose the right helmet to wear. We got to control the fire hose connected to the fire engine, testing the water on an open space. I found it astonishing to ride in the fire engine across the site to refill the water tank using a reservoir near the entrance. After having our snacks in the indoor canteen, we walked to the north area of the centre to practise hosing down real controlled fires.

The centre was a huge warehouse that had structures that the firefighters would use to train for real blazes. This experience was very unique for any school. Most people would not be able to do these activities, but I'm very lucky!
