Gusto careers day

Gusto provided a great Careers Day to end the year. They gave the pupils an excellent flavour of the jobs and roles that you find in a restaurant. Their positive energy was infectious! Our students from across the school worked together as part of a team to provide a silver service standard of waiting on their clients.

Pupils had the opportunity to make fresh mocktails, including the hidden science behind making and mixing mocktails for example, releasing aromas from herbs, arrangement of garnishes and the skill behind a speed pour. They then learnt about the history behind the authentic dough and the secret to a perfect pizza. Skills such as how to carry trays and plates and serving drinks were showcased by even our youngest students, all looking like professionals and the team from Gusto agreed they would be honoured to have our students working alongside them.

The pupils thoroughly enjoyed the day and are looking forward to working on the skills they have learnt in our school café and no doubt producing more pizzas.

It's amazing that we have made a partnership with Gusto who are enthusiastic as we are around seeing our young people have the opportunity to become confident in a work environment, learning skills and getting them to think about future jobs. We are excited for further careers days, training in the cafe and pupils engaging in work experience at Gusto and possible employment.



Inscape are proud together!

Our weekly lunchtime student group has continued to meet all year round. We have focused on some particularly important dates to prompt discussions. This included Anti-Bullying Week, Trans Awareness Week or Lesbian Visibility Day.

The first school event we did was in support of the Rainbow Laces campaign. We organised a mini sporting event and talked about bullying in world of sports.

For LGBT+ History Month in February, we looked at various film clips to have a better understanding of how the LGBT+ community has been portrayed before and after the Sexual Offences Act (1967), notably The Imitation Game depicting the life of Alan Turing. Students were shocked to find out he was offered hormonal treatment to avoid prison. We had pronoun badges to hand out and some fun activities such as identity flag matching or guess who. Students also baked "genderbread" biscuits and fundraised £30 for the Proud Trust, a Manchester-based charity.

We visited the Proud Trust to hand the money fundraised and we had a great few hours in their brand new building. They organise youth groups and a range of activities and I would love to work closer to them as I think our learners would benefit from some kind of partnership. For most of our students, it was their first time accessing a purposely built safe space to welcome members of the LGBT+ community. Students had the chance to do some hammerbead craft but most importantly meet and talk to new people. On May 17th, which is the International Day Against Homophobia, Biphobia & Transphobia (IDAHOBIT), we organised a poster competition. Students were encouraged to make illustrations around the theme "our bodies, our lives, our rights."

The Awards are named after Glasgow-born Sadie Massey and her desire to spread a love of reading and writing. While living in Manchester, Sadie and her husband Alex began helping disadvantaged children through various charities. This desire to give opportunities to all young people is continued through the Portico Sadie Massey Awards.

Leo created a detailed Wikipedia page about his life, which this year's judge, Oliver East, commented the following: "Extensive life story told in a creative manner. In-depth with lots of interesting details. The work of a skilled storyteller with a keen attention to detail." Leo attended the awards ceremony in Manchester's Central Library, and he was able to see and hear from the judges and other students who created entries.

The Portico Library Sadie Massey Award is an inclusive competition designed to encourage students at SEND schools and PRU settings to engage with the life-changing power of creation and expression. Students were asked to create a handmade book that contains a story. It can be written, drawn or a combination of mediums! This year's judge, Oliver East, is an illustrator, who found that drawing allowed him to express himself and overcome barriers, including diagnoses of ADHD, dyslexia and a stutter.

Another big congratulations to Ebony Topham, who also received an award for "Beautiful Cartoon Style".
